RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. This Department shall function entirely for and in the interest of the membership of the British North America Philatelic Society. Any Member, in good standing, may participate in the Department and, by his participation, attests and agrees to abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Department. Any Member, so participating, may be denied such participation for infracton of any of the Rules or Regulations of the Department.
- 2. The President of the Society shall appoint a Member to serve as Sales Manager who shall be responsible to the Board of Governors. The President of the Society shall appoint a Committee to serve as a Board of Examiners to examine any and all stamps or books of stamps submitted to it by the Sales Manager and to order removed any such stamps or other material entered which, in its opinion, is of a questionable character, without any responsibility or liability therefore to the owner or anyone else.
- 3. The Sales Manager shall keep accounts and records of all transactions of the Department in books of the Society so provided by it. He shall, at specific times, provide the Board of Governors with reports of the affairs of the Department, including a full balance sheet of all book-keeping entries and shall similarly cause such reports to be published in BNA TOP-ICS.
- 4. Members entering material for sale through the Department shall mount their material in such books as shall be prescribed by the Board of Governors, Books shall be obtained from the Sales Manager upon request and at such price as shall be determined by the Board of Governors. No other books or forms except the prescribed ones shall be used. The Department reserves the right to limit the dollar value of material entered in any one book and may reject any material which it feels will not be well received, except that such restriction shall be the joint action and decision of the Sales Manager and the Board of Examiners, without any responsibility or liabilty therefore to the owner or anyone else.
- 5. Any stamp or item which is damaged, counterfeit, re-perforated, cleaned, repaired, a reprint, or in any other way of doubtful or questionable character, must be clearly so marked next thereto by the affixer upon submission for entry in the Department books. Any such stamp or item, in any way of doubtful or questionable character not so marked clearly by the affixer, so decided by the Board of Examiners or established by any other means, in its sole discretion, and without

- any liability or responsiblty therefor to the owner or anyone else, shall automatcally cause a charge of at least 25 cents for any and each such unmarked item and be removed from the book. nI instance of gross or deliberate abuse or violation of this Regulation, or where it may be deemed requisite or equitable, the Sales Manager may, at his discretion, impose reasonable additional charges, or deny the services and privileges of the Department, or both. Such gross and deliberate abuse or violation of this regulation may be considered as "Conduct unbecoming a Member."
- 6. A charge of 2 per cent as an insurance fee shall be made of the net value of the material entered at any one time. Monies so collected shall be deposited in the Insurance Fund from which Fund claims for loss or damage to material shall be paid. The Board of Governors shall have final jurisdiction in the payment and settlement of claims.
- 7. A charge of 8 per cent shall be deducted from all sales made through the Department. Monies so collected shall be deposited in the General Fund of the Department, and all costs of conducting the Department shall be paid from this Fund. Both the Insurance and the Commission charges shall be deducted whenever a payment shall be made to an owner.
- 8. Circuits must be forwarded to the next Member shown on the Route Sheet within five (5) days of receipt by the forwarding Member, to be forwarded by him by Registered Mail insured for Five Dollars (\$5.00). Strict observance and compliance with this Rule shall be enforced by the Sales Manager and any violation shall be subject to a penalty and charge of 25 cents per book in the Circuit for each day delayed in forwarding Circuits. The loss of any material not so forwarded by Registered Mail shall be entirely the responsibility and liability of the remitter.
- 9. The Member, upon receiving a Circuit, shall verify the number of books in the circuit, as evidenced on the Route Sheet, and that all spaces on each page of each book contain a stamp or other item, or a proper indication that the stamp or item of the space has been sold or is accounted for.
- 10. The buyer must sign his name in INK (or use a suitable rubber stamp) and indicate his Society Membership Number in all spaces from which he has removed and retained an item. Each so identified purchase shall be entered on the forms specifically provided for that purpose with each Circuit.

A Member, on written application to the Librarian, accompanied by all charges, may have sent not more than two (2) volumes and shall not retain such borrowed material for more than thirty (30) days, at which time, or sooner, same borrowed material must be returned in good fully insured and all charges condition, prepaid. The Member so borrowing material from the Library shall be respon-sible and liable to the full value of the material until same shall have been acknowledged as received by the Librarian. A Member shall make such adjustment or payment for any damage or loss to the material borrowed from the Library in such amounts as shall be determined and established by the Librarian.

4. 4. There shall be a charge of twentyfive (25) cents per week or part thereof for each item borrowed from the Library and held in excess of thirty (30) days. A rental of twenty-five (25) cents or more per week may be charged for any special or rare book when so determined by the

Librarian.

Loss in Total Membership Over Past Year

Concerns Members at Thirteenth Annual Meeting

President Walter W. Chadbourne took the chair at 11:00 a.m. and declared the meeting open for the consideration of such busi-

ness as should come before it.

It was moved by V. G. Greene, seconded by W. C. Rockett, that the meeting dispense with the reading of the minutes of the previous Annual Meeting and that same minutes be voted accepted as published in the magazine. The motion was affirmed.

The Secretary advised the meeting that he had no correspondence on hand to be read to the meeting. V. G. Greene rose to express the regrets of Clare Jephcott for not being able to attend the meeting. President Chadbourne advised the meeting that there were two communications, one from D. C. Meyerson and the other from E. A. Richardson, but that these two messages would be read at the banquet the following night.

President Chadbourne rose to read his

report to the meeting.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

I wish to keep these remarks as brief as possible so that the principal business of the meeting may be given the greatest amount of time and careful consideration. Your President assumed this office with no particular mandate to pursue any specified policies or institute any particular reforms. He undertook his term of office after a successful two years under Vinnie Greene and hopes to turn over the office to his successor in equally flourishing condition.

As a matter of routine, I will review actions that have been taken on appointments and committee personnel, most of which have appeared already in BNA

A matter of particular concern is the present trend of membership. May I present some pertinent statistics. (See Table 1).

It is clear that the attrition of drops, deaths, and resignations is increasing. Also, in three years the number of new members per year has been decreasing. It is difficult to believe that the potential of new collectors of B.N.A. material is pointing in the downward direction or even that we had previously saturated the total market. Our problem, I believe, is one of raising new memberships per year back to the 1958-59 level of 100-125 and that requires the efforts of all of us here and a spreading of the news to all members of the Society. This is a vital subject that should merit some discussion and possibly some action at at this meeting.

In conclusion, President Chadbourne expressed his appreciation to all officers and appointees for their faithful performance of their duties.

The chair then called on Mr. Levine, Secretary, to make his report to the meet-

ing.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

It has been my pleasure for the past 12 annual meetings to offer reports which have each shown an increase in total membership over each previous year. For the first time, my report will show a loss in total membership over the previous year. The report last year showed a total membership of 1054 as of September 1, 1960, Our total membership as of the same date this year stands at 1034-20 less! Let us study the following comparative membership summaries for 1960 and 1961; the same period for both:-(See table II).

1960's report shows an increase by new members and replacements of 99 compared to 67 for this year—32 less. Losses last years were 78 compared to 87 for this year -9 more losses. It becomes obvious that if recruiting of new members had been maintained instead of being 32 less, our net decrease of 20 would have been more than

offset. It becomes equally obvious that greater efforts should be made to enroll new members. We have never sponsored a concerted drive for new members but have and do realize membership gains by and because of the firm belief and knowledge that BNAPS is the Society for collectors of BNA, that BNAPS offers and provides any and all of the services and benefits wanted and expected by the collector. This reason to become a member is still the best one and needs only to be told to be realized and accepted. Let's tell it!

We are always concerned with losses and the possible cause or reason for such losses. As previously noted, losses this year were 87 compared to 78 last year—9 more. Let us again review losses this year compared

While dropped members were 4 less than last year, resignations were 10 more. Members accepting the dropping action is always cause for wonder since there isn't a known reason except in instance of removal with present address unknown. I made an analysis of the reasons offered with this year's resignation and learned the following:—19 gave no reason; 12 discontinued or sold collections; 4 considered the Society too specialized; 4 found it necessary because of other demands on their time; 4 because of age; 2 because of failing eyesight; 1 for personal reasons; and 1 dissatis-

fied. The 19 without reason, like the dropped, are not understood with reason not known or learned. Explained or unex-plained, losses are and will continue to be cause for concern and therefore do certainly deserve study to a reduction if not elimination. To that end, I do sincerely and earnestly recommend that a definite and specific program be enacted whereby a special and separate committee be named and designated with the prime function and purpose to review each notice of resignation and all liable to be dropped whereby the committee shall try in such manner as it deems possible or necessary to retain and continue in membership such resignors and in order to be dropped. I strongly urge a ruling to the enactment of such a retention committee in the hope and expectation that future annual membership reports will never show a loss.

The President's Certificate

Each year "The President's Certificate" is awarded to the member who proposed the most new members accepted and enrolled during the year. From January 1960 to December 1960, new members were enrolled after proposal by the following members in such numbers as indicated: Richardson, E. A., (16); Crosby, L. S. (4); Binks, B.C. INTERIM REPORT OF THE TREASURER

(January 1 through August 31, 1961) The report of the Treasurer for 1960 was published in the September issue of TOPICS, so I will only give you a comparsion between what Mr. Peterman estimated and what the actual was.

At the time of last year's Annual Meeting at Banff, Pete estimated that there would be a loss of about \$50 for 1960. The actual indicated a surplus of \$82.69 for the

year of 1960.

I will now give you a summary of the financial operations of BNAPS for the first 8 months of 1961, as an interim report which will later be published in TOPICS in detail.

As in the past, this report does not include income or expenses in connection with the current Yearbook for which records are not complete. The total 1961 income to August 31st., from all sources was \$4,521.61 and the total expenses for the

same period was \$3,474.11 leaving a balance \$1,047.50 of 1961 for use toward paying expenses through the balance of 1961.

It is estimated that the income for the balance of the year will be about \$380 and expenses for the same period will be about \$1,440.00. If this estimate proves to be accurate we should show a loss for the year of 1961 of about \$15.00.

The above estimated expenses include a loss of about \$100 on the yearbook.

(See table III).

I wish to take this opportunity to thank Mr. William C. Peterman, our Treasurer Emeritus, who is better known to all of us as just plain Pete, for all his help during the past nine months that I have been Treasurer and especially for the help he gave me in the preparation of this Interim Report.

This report is respectfully submitted for your consideration and I move its' approval.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

It is with deepest regret that I find it necessary to forward this report to Elmira so that it can be read to the assembled members. This is the first function in the history of the Society dating back to 1943 that I have ever missed and I sincerely hope it will be the last. It is only a Doctor's specific order that keeps me from joining all of my fellow members at Elmira.

As in the past years, the Board has discharged all of the obligations put on it by the Constitution such as having its committee pass on membership applications, having the books audited and also passing on the current budget. In addition, the Board had only two other specific problems that required circularization of all members of the Board. In the first instance the Board definitely decided that a new member could not assume the old membership number of a late member because of kinship, and in the second the Board voted to restore advertising rights to a member in good standing. From the contents of the above, it can be readily seen that the Society operates in a very substantial manner as those matters submitted to the Board are of minor import.

During the latter stages of this current meeting, I believe invitations will be put forth for future conventions up into 1965, quite an achievement and a great deal of the credit for this fine program should be paid to our Chairman of the Convention Committee, Al Kessler. It would be a fitting gesture at the appropriate time during this meeting, if Al Kessler were given a

heartfelt vote of thanks by all in attendance.

See you all in 1962 at the Alpine in the Laurentians.

C Meyerson for such fine conduct of his of-fice. On suggestion of J. S. Siverts, the meeting again rose to express thanks to Al. Kessler for the fine performance of his duties as Convention Chairman. President Chadbourne at this time advised the meeting that Mr. Kessler has agreed to continue to serve as Co-Chairman of the Convention Committee to help and assist with his knowledge and experience.

Advertising Manager, G. B. Llewellyn, rose to read his report to the meeting.

REPORT OF THE ADVERTISING MANAGER

Income from display advertising in 1960, exclusive of the Yearbook, amounted to \$912.19, an increase of 5.6% over the \$863.72 realized in 1959. The 1960 Yearbook grossed \$493.88 in display advertising, representing an increase of 7% over 1959, when \$461.50 was realized from this

source. We are currentl preparing the 1961 Yearbook, which in line with the change last year, will be the November issue containing the report of this Convention and Annual Meeting. Up to date display advertising received for the Yearbook amounts to only \$436.00, and Monday, October 2nd is the deadline. Under the circumstances, the Yearbook will show a loss unless additional support is received from those attending this meeting, who have either overlooked or neglected sending me their Yearbook advertisements. Anyone in this category who wishes to rectify their oversight may do so by submitting their copy to me immediately after this meeting is declared adjourned.

Marguerite, At-lantic City, Banff and now today, we are assembled at Elmira, as guests of the Apple-Knockers (the Ithaca Group) who were our Hosts when this Committee was established.

It is altogether fitting and proper that the Chairman of this Committee should relinquish this post at this time to another member of the Society, with the scincere hope that the future Conventions and Exhibitions will be as pleasant and successful as have all the past Conventions and Exhibitions of this Society.

There is nothing but words, hollow at a time such as this, to express the sincere thanks of the Committee, for the splendid co-operation given by the Host Groups down through the years. To all the members who have served on this committee and especially to BNAPSer Edward Richardson, whose tireless efforts have done so much for this Society, the retiring Chairman wishes to say "thank you."

During this session, invitations will be extended to you the members of the Society for the 1962, 1963 and 1964 Conventions. I have studied them and there is every reason to believe that same deserve the con-

sideration of the membership.

A Permanent Convention Committee of a Society, such as this, with its limited powers, can only be successful if it receives the full co-operation of the entire membership,

the host group and its officers.

Therefore, as one who has been behind the scenes and witnessed the WORK that is involved in providing the very best possible, I urge that you participate in this effort of your Society, to continue the success of the British North America Philatelic Society.

Mr. Levine read the following report from the Editor:

REPORT OF THE EDITOR

It is a continuing matter of regret to the Editor that he is unable to attend the Convention each year and present his report in person, but it is impossible to get away at

this particular time each fall.

The magazine continues to need more material for publication, especially articles on the stamps themselves, rather than on cancellations and postal history; we seem to be well supplied with the latter. A majority of our members have critized the lack of articles on stamps, but all the Editor can do is to publish all such articles received, and hope for more in the future to satisfy the demand.

Commencing with the September 1961 issue, BNA TOPICS has been printed by a new firm, organized by two gentlemen formerly connected with the management of our former printers. Members should see no difference in the printing quality of the magazine, as the same production facilities

are available to us as previously.

As many members may have known, since April 1954, when TOPICS was first printed in Canada, the Editor assisted with the production of the actual type matter used in printing the magazine. It was this arrangement that enabled us to publish a top quality magazine at a very reasonable price, although the extra work has been very time-consuming for the Editor over the years, and has presented many difficulties in keeping up with the other duties entailed in his job—article writing, reviews, editorial work, and a vast amount of correspondence.

The pressure of other duties and activities has made it apparent for some time that something would have to be done in order to relieve the Editor of this production work. The immediate result of this would, of course, be an increase in the cost of producing the magazine. It was my intention to announce that I would stop this work with the July-August issue, but the thought that the extra cost in the middle of the year would create a strain on the funds of the Society, which had already been budgeted to the end of 1961, made me decide to continue the present arrangement until the December 1961 issue of TOPICS.

It is with regret that I announce that, because I will no longer be able to donate this production time to the magazine, with the January 1962 issue, the cost of printing based on our regular issue of 28 pages and cover, will be \$350 per month. The change of printers has no bearing on this as the change was contemplated before, and the

new price was originally obtained from our old printers, and has been verified by the new firm.

The Editor has previously suggested that the number of issues per year be reduced to nine rather than 10 (plus the Yearbook), so this may be a good time to repeat the suggestion. The reason for this is one of economics only—if the Society can budget for the extra cost without reducing the number of issues, the Editor is certainly willing to produce them. It might be stated that the price quoted is lower than other firms' estimates for comparable quality and service.

I leave the matter in the hands of the

members at this Annual Meeting:

A. P. Cook, Sales Manager read his report to the meeting.

REPORT OF SALES MANAGER

This is my first report on the stewardship of the Sales Department,—at Banff the report was the final audit as of the actual transfer of material, books, records, and equipment. The first sales were made at Banff in October 1960, due to the fact that it was the end of May before the material was finally received by me and the Department is closed during the summer months.

Several innovations have been made in this Department; among the more important being an annual report the first week of June to all circuit owners of the status of their books, which gives them an opportunity to retire or not at the close of the active season. Nearly one hundred books were so retired along with checks for over \$2.000.

A second innovation was the specialized circuit, which must be requested in writing and postage and registration paid both ways by the recipient unless he takes over \$10 worth of material. About eighty of these went out, and they represented over 75%

of the total sales of the year.

Third: Our checking account carried a balance averaging \$3,000, and upon my return from Banff, I took the liberty of transferring to our savings account an amount sufficient to earn our insurance premiums out of the interest. At some point along the line, we should consider the possibility of becoming self-insurers, this may be about four years away.

Fourth: I recommend that the host of future Conventions provide a committee to handle circuit sales at the Convention. Most of Bill Hassan's and my time at Banff was spent in the confines of a room with the circuits, instead of seeing that beautiful spot

and enjoying the Convention.

Now we come to an item which, I believe, needs approval of the membership and/or the Board. The registration rate in the United States is now 60c which is the mini-

mum, the balance being covered by our insurance policy. Our rules now require registered mail from Sales Department throughout circuit and back to Sales Department.

Certified Mail, which guarantees delivery, is 20c, and a tracer on this is 25c. We have not needed a tracer on our circuit yet. Thus, by the use of Certified Mail on circuits in the United States, there would be a savings to the Department of 40c per circuit; on a hundred circuits this would be \$40 per year, times three years, the period of our policy, making a total of at least \$120. Our insurers advise us that for \$50 additional for three years we can be insured the same way with our Registered Mail requirements. Furthermore, this represents a savings to U.S. members of \$4 per circuit to the members themselves. I might add, that a circuit costs about a dollar per mailing, which adds considerably to the cost of the stamps purchased.

An alternative might be Certified Mail with return receipt, this costs 10c extra, and still represents a reduction from 60c to 30c,

plus postage, of course.

Finally, I want to thank the membership for their interest and co-operation .-(the flowers far outnumbered the brickbats), and to thank especially Bill Hassan, who helped me for over four hours a week, every week, all year; not including a three-

day, full-time coverage at Banff.

The detailed report of this Department will be submitted to the President, Treasurer, and Members of the Board, and will be published in the November issue of

TOPICS.

I respectfully move the acceptance of this report.

Mr. Cook's motion to accept was seconded by F. Jarret and accepted on vote. It was moved by J. N. Sissons, seconded by G. L. Lee that the recommendation of the Sales Manager regarding future method of mailing of circuits be referred to the Board of Governors. The motion was affirmed.

Chairman of the Handbook Committee, R. J. Woolley, provided a detailed report to the meeting and advised that a written report will be submitted for publication in

a later issue of the magazine.

W. C. Rockett, Chairman of the Revenue Study Group advised the meeting of the continued progress of the Group with a membership of 50 and invited any and all interested members present to attend their group meeting to be held later in the day.

There being no unfinished business for the consideration of the meeting, the President, Mr. Chadbourne, opened the floor for bids for future annual conventions. Mr. Levine received the floor to enter a bid for

the 1963 convention to be held at Williamsburg, Virginia, September 18-22nd. Mr. Levine explained that the 1963 convention would be the 15th such convention of the Society and also the Society's 20th anniversary and that it would be his extreme pleasure to host the convention with the full co-operation of the Philadelphia Group, Mr. Culhane of Philadelphia took the floor to provide some information of the many prospects for a fine convention. It was moved by V. G. Greene, seconded by E. J. Whiting that the meeting accept the invitation for 1963 at Williamsburg, Va. The motion was affirmed.

The Chair recognized John H. M. Young who rose to enter a bid for the 1964 convention to be held in Toronto, Ontario, September 24-27 at the Royal York Hotel. Mr. Young explained that the hotel offered excellent facilities for the convention and that his committee was already at work preparing to provide a most successful convention. Mr. Young moved that the meeting accept his bid for the 1964 convention and the motion was seconded by Dr. K. M. Day. The meeting voted to accept the mo-

tion. Mr. Levine asked for the floor to read a correspondence from Lewis M. Ludlow which asked that he, Mr. Levine, act on his behalf to issue an invitation for the BNAPEX 1965 convention to be held in San Francisco, California, The letter in-dicated that a canvass of some 200 members west of the Rockies gave indications of a fine attendance from that area. No definite dates for the convention were offered in the letter but would be made known in ample time; likely later part of September. It was moved by S. Nickle, seconded by J. Culhane that the meeting accept the invitation for the 1965 convention in San Francisco. The motion was voted accepted.



(1870-97)

As my modest familarity with this group increases, so does my profound respect for the problems surrounding the evolution of the plates involved, and inevitably my appetite for suitable material is keeping pace in accordance.

I am at all times eager to purchase multiples of the 6c value, as well as marginal pieces representing corners, imprints and letter or numeral inscriptions of the 1c, 2c, 3c and 6c. Shades, papers, perforations and centering are of secondary importance, If the gum is missing, I shall consider it an asset rather than a detriment, since that glossy substance is the most insidious enemy of the preservation of larger multiples.

By the way—somewhere there ought to be in existence a bottom block of twenty (10 x 2) with the M. & O. imprint matching the 6c part sheet of eighty from the Jarrett collection, and for which I am prepared to pay an unrealistically high price. Similarly, I doubt if I could resist a part or full pane of any 6c.

If you prefer trading to selling, I can oblige with anything from fancy cancels on the 3c vermillion or re-entries and constant plate varities of the 2c and 3c, to a 12d. No 20th century, however, since I don't have any.



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An unused set of Canada's 1897 Jubilees in blocks of four sold for \$2,440 (catalog \$1,603.80) when Harmer, Rooke & Co., Inc., the New York auction firm, dispersed the first part of the British North America collection of Gordon C. Liersch of Montreal on Oct. 26-27. The 851-lot sale realized approximately \$38,000.

A record price of \$1,000 was obtained for Newfoundland's rare lp reddish brown of 1862, No. 16. cataloging \$1,250. The De Pinedos also set new records-\$675 for a used one (cat. \$750), and \$925 for one on cover (Sanabria \$850).
