## TERRACE TO HONOLULU - What rate what route?


The study of postal rates and postal routes plays a major part in the display of the early postal history of any country. With modern covers it is rarely possible to provide such information because of a lack of significant postal markings.

Arlene Sullivan has provided a 1937 Registered Air Mail cover mailed on the CNR train at Terrace for delivery to Honolulu. Her question is simple "What was the postal rate and what was the route?".



Normal routing would be:

Terrace to Prince Rupert
CNR Train No. 197
Prince Rupert to Vancouver
B.C. coastal ship
Vancouver to Seattle
Canadian Airways air mail
Seattle to San Francisco
Direct U.S. air mail
San Francisco to Honululu

## Possible routing:

The letter was short-paid for transmission on the Pan American Clipper Air Mail service from San Francisco to Hawaii (FAM 14) and as a result was sent by surface mail It should have been marked as surface mail at the Vancouver Registration Branch.


The sender, L. McKenney, delivered the letter to the Mail Clerk on CNR train 198 (west) at Terrace on Tuesday, July 13, 1937, with the request that it be sent by Registered Air Mail to The clerk stamped the envelope with the oval "R" registration hand stamp and not having a Train 198 hammer or a boxed registration stamp made one using the Train 197 hammer, marked the letter "Terrace", and signed it. The letter arrived in Prince Rupert that night and was postmarked the next morning, July 14. It was then transferred to one of the coastal ships for delivery to Vancouver, where it arrived the next evening and was delivered, in a sealed bag, to the Vancouver Registration Branch. At this point it was noted the letter was short-paid for Pan American Clipper service to Hawaii and as a result was dispatched by ship for Honolulu. It arrived in Hawaii seven days later, July 22, by which time Miss McKenney had returned to the "continent" The letter was date stamped July 22 and July 24, 1937 and marked "FORWARDED" before being returned to Vancouver by ship mail. It arrived at Vancouver on the evening of July 29 and on the morning of July 30 it was transferred to a coastal ship for delivery to CNR Train 197 at Prince Rupert. arrived back at Terrace on August 2, 1937.



SALT SPRING ISLAND - revisited - See Vol. 4.4 page 123-124 Covers courtesy of Andrew Scott


The settlement of Salt Spring Island began shortly after the founding of Fort Victoria in 1848 but no Colonial Post Offices were established on the Island. It was not until British Columbia entered Confederation that the Island obtained regular postal service. The SALT SPRING ISLAND Post Office was established, in 1874, near the present British Columbia Ferry dock at Vesuvius Bay. Locally the post office was called Vesuvius but there is no evidence that an office of that name ever existed.




In the 1880's two additional post offices were established, BURGOYNE BAY (1880), and BEAVER POINT (1884). In 1893, post offices were established at FULFORD HARBOUR and NORTH SALT SPRING to serve the east coast of the island. In 1900, the FULFORD HARBOUR Post Office closed and was replaced by SOUTH SALT SPRING post office. In 1924, the SOUTH SALT SPRING post office was relocated closer to the Government Dock and the name reverted to FULFORD HARBOUR.



The NORTH SALT SPRING post office was established to serve the northern portion of the island and was locally referred to as North End. The office closed, in 1902, shortly after the opening of the new post office near the Ganges dock. The GANGES Post Office had opened in 1900 and was initally called GANGES HARBOUR.



From 1923 to 1957 the Smith family operated the MUSGRAVE LANDING Post Office, at their farm on the Musgrave Estate near a small dock at Musgrave Landing. In 1929, the name of the post office was changed to MUSGRAVE.



Today three post office serve Salt Spring Island: FULFORD HARBOUR, GANGES, and GANGES Retail Outlet.



There is an Odd Fellows' lodge with a membership of 38. Noble Grand, P. Purvis; Secretary, Jos. Akerman, Jr. They meet once a month. There are five Post Offices on the Island, viz.: Vesuvius (Joel Broadwell); North End (Levi Lakin); Burgoyne Bay (S. Maxwell); Fulford Harbor (H. M. Rogers); Beaver Point (A. McLennan). Five steamboat wharves, viz:—Fernwood, Vesuvius Bay, Ganges Harbor, Burgoyne Bay, Fulford Harbor. Two boarding houses, (1) by Mrs. Stevens, at Vesuvius, roomy and home-like, with accommodation for 12 guests; charges by the day, \$1, by the week, \$5. (2) by J. Akerman, in the Valley, charges the same. One tavern, with barroom at Fulford harbor, by H. M. Rogers. One general store, Vesuvius Bay, by E. J. Bitancourt.

The present population of the island is estimated to be 450. A large number of different nationalities are represented. There are approximately, old and young, 160 English (or Canadians), 50 Scotch, 20 Irish, 22 Portuguese, 13 Swedes, 4 Germans, 2 Norwegians, 34 Americans, 90 Halfbreeds, 40 Colored, or partly colored people, 6 Sandwich Islanders, 10 Japanese, also 1 Egyptian, 2 Greeks, 1 Patagonian.

## **WAY MAIL**

The late Daniel Rosenblat was in the process of producing an article on WAY MAIL at the time of his death. A copy of his draft came into my possession and I have been able to enlarge upon Dan's findings.

Although catalogued by Proulx as a Vancouver Special Service Marking, Coutts has seen fit to eliminate all references to such SSM's in his catalogue.


Nevertheless, slogan collectors will come across this marking and may wish to include it in their collections, so some reference to it is appropriate.

The Distribution List (DL) records the Way Mail Universal die issued to Vancouver 18 December 1931 and returned from the user to the POD 12 November 1934. The DL does not record Perfect use of this slogan.

A Pritchard and Andrews proof, showing a post office order number, exists that matches the 1932 seen usage. This is further confirmed as a Universal die since Vancouver did not convert to Perfect machines until about 20 November 1934. Usage of the U die has been seen from January 14, 1932, in 1933 and the last reported date of 18 October 1934.



What Proulx was not aware of is that a replacement Perfect die was proofed and put into service in 1934. Earliest reported use of the P die is 3 December 1934. No further use is reported until 27 October 1938. LRD is 10 July 1939. To easily separate the dies, note the placement of the Y of WAY in relation to the A of MAII.



But this is not the end of the story. Member Bill Topping reports a striking resurrection of the Universal die on 29 May 1984 at New Westminster of all places! Note that the word WAY has been burnished from the die. Topping thinks this die was used as a trial for about a week in a Pitney-Bowes machine.



Thanks are extended to Bill Topping for reporting dates and the New Westminster connection. Updates to what has been reported here are always welcome.


