

BUENA VISTA

Buena Vista Post office was located on the bluffs half way between Burnaby Lake and Sapperton Post Office. Although it was open from 1912 to 1946 postal markings from this post office are extremely rare and it illustrates the problem of collecting markings from post offices in the Greater Vancouver region. Many offices such as Lozells, also located near Burnaby Lake, were open for more than ten years and should be relatively common but because they tended to be isolated and served a small population, these offices are assigned a "D" or "E" rarity factor.

THE WEST VANCOUVER STOR

By JOHN C. CLUCAS

(Former Postal Officer in charge, West Vancouver Postal Station, now retired)

The earliest unauthorized postal service in the district, which later became known as Hollyburn, dates back to 1907. John Lawson had acquired a home from an early settler, Navvy Jack. It was located on the south-west corner of 17th and Bellevue Avenue, and still stands on a new location a little further west on Bellevue, to where it was moved some years ago. Lawson rented a Post Office Box in North Vancouver, as this area was then included in that District. The majority of residents in the district which is now known as West Vancouver had their mail addressed c/o Mr. John Lawson, who picked up the mail from his P.O. box, once or twice a week, and delivered it to the residents from a small office in his home.

It is interesting to know that the original name of Hollyburn was selected by John Lawson. Amongst his other varied interests he was a great admirer of holly trees, and he imported a number of them to plant on his property. A stream ran nearby and so he christened his place "Hollyburn". Two of these original trees are still flourishing in John Lawson Park just south of the new post office.

In 1909 Postal service was authorized and the first Post Office, under the name of Hollyburn, B.C., was established in a store building three doors west of 17th Street on the

in a store building three doors west of 17th Street on the south side of Marine Drive (then known as Keith Road).

John Lawson was appointed first postmaster and remained in the position until about 1921. When he served overseas during the First World War from 1916 to 1918, Mrs. Lawson carried on the postal duties for him.

In 1921, the store was leased to J. T. Watt, who became postmaster for about twelve months. He was followed by John Lynn, another lessee of the store. Lynn was postmaster for a short period, until John Lawson again assumed the position of postmaster.

It was found that the space in the store was not ade-

It was found that the space in the store was not adequate to meet the needs of the growing population, which from 1912 to 1921 had grown from 600 to 4,200, and by 1931 showed a further gain to 7,000. Another store next door was acquired for additional space. It was from this office that the first letter carrier service was established June 1st 1931, and it consisted of four walks.

Growing pains were still evident and a new government

building was erected at the north west corner of Marine Drive and 17th Street in 1937. In 1940 Hollyburn, B.C. be-came part of the Greater Vancouver system so far as postal arrangements were concerned, and on August 1st of that year the office became a Postal Station of Vancouver, B.C. Mr. James Turner, Post Office Inspector (who later became Postmaster, Vancouver, B.C.) transferred the office from John Lawson to John Clucas, who became Clerk in Charge. John Clucas had been employed at the Vancouver Post Office for twenty-eight years previously. Miss Lorna Thomson, who had been Mr. Lawson's assistant, became a postal clerk and remained to be of great assistance to the comparatively new staff taking over. Lorna is presently employed in the office of the District Director of Postal Services, Vancouver, B.C. When the office was first taken over in 1940 it was for

when the office was first taken over in 1940 it was for all practical purposes an independent office. All sorting, both for despatch and letter carrier routes was done on the premises. The staff numbered 3 clerks and 5 letter carriers. Gradually over the years, and with the further increase in population in 1941—8,324 and 1951—13,990, it was found necessary to have the sorting done in Vancouver, in order

to speed delivery.

The name of the office was changed in 1955 from Vancouver (Hollyburn) B.C. to Vancouver (West Vancouver) B.C. This was done because of the increase in area covered by the Postal Station, and because the use of the name

Hollyburn was causing some confusion.

John Clucas retired from the Postal Service in 1956 after forty-five years' service, sixteen of which were spent in West Vancouver. He has been succeeded by the following Postal Officers: P. D. Fagan, C. G. Hawkes, and A. J. Wirth who is presently in charge of the new office.

It had been very evident for a number of years that the accommodation provided in the Government Building at the corner of 17th Street and Marine Drive was inadequate to meet the postal needs; and proposals had been made at various times to ease the situation.

The new building, opened on February 23, 1959, stands on the corner of 17th and Bellevue, just across the street from Mr. Lawson's home where postal service in West Vancouver started. The staff of twenty five under the direction of Al Wirth, has a building modern in every way, in which to service the estimated population of 21,000.

Hollyburn P.O. now just plain West Vancouver

WEST VANCOUVER - Name of Hollyburn postal station has been changed to West Vancouver. B.C.

Change was made because the station now serves far more of the municipality than just Hollyhurn.

However, residents now receiving mail through post offices at Eagle Harbor, Horseshoe Bay or sub offices at Cypress Park, Dundarave, Park Royal and j Wadsley should continue to have mail so addressed.

West Van Mail Service Speeded Up

WEST VANCOUVER -Local mail will reach its destination within 12 hours of being posted, thanks to municipal council's request for a thorough investigation of postal services throughout West Vancouver.

Although many of the requests for improved delivery could not be granted, J. Turner, postmaster for the Greater Vancouver area, has approved a special chute earmarked for Hollyburn mail at the local post office.

This mail will now be handled entirely by West Vancouver staff instead of being sorted in Vancouver.

Council also requested . two deliveries a day in husiness districts but the postmaster replied: "Two deliveries cannot be made to any letter carrier walk in which the number of business calls does not exeeed 25 percent of the total number of calls in the walk."

A request for widening of residential postal service was also turned down. also turned down.

Letter carrier delivery is not considered, in cases in which the average distance per call exceeds 40 yards.

Extension of Letter Carrier Delivery Service has been authorized to portions of the Sherman, Cypress Park and Caulfoild areas of West Vancouver. However, the area in which you reside does not meet requirements for normal Letter Carrier Delivery. Until such time as it does, the Postal Department will provide a service through the installation of "Group Mail Boxes".

Group Mail Boxes are designed in units of ten and are of steel construction. The master door in front of the unit contains individual doors for each of the ten boxes comprising a unit. (They are supplied without cost).

An individual box which can be locked with a padlock will be allotted to you at the corner of The Dale + Waree Lane, on request. However, before service can be provided, it will be necessary for each patron to place a padlock on his respective box. Any padlock which can be used to fasten a door with a hasp will be suitable.


Ordinary mail, including small parcels, will be delivered to Group Mail Boxes. A card will be left advising you to call at the nearest Post Office or Sub Post Office to take delivery of C.O.D.'s, registers, large parcels, etc.

If you are now taking delivery through General Delivery at a Sub Post Office and wish to continue you may do so, but, in this case, it is essential that your mail be properly addressed to the Sub Post Office. Mail addressed to street and number will normally be sorted for delivery to the Group Mail Boxes. and will have to be re-directed to the Sub Post Office, with consequent delay.

Should you wish to take advantage of this service, which is provided without additional cost to yourself, please complete the attached form and return it in the enclosed envelope which requires no postage. You will then be advised further.

The extension of Letter Carrier Delivery Service to various sections of West Vancouver will commence on October 7th, 1963.

The area in which you reside will be included in this new service, provided the mail receptacles now lacking are installed before that date.

When this service is established, the residents of homes not equipped with the necessary facilities will be required to call at the West Vancouver Postal Station for their mail.

If you are now receiving your mail through the West Vancouver Postal Station, or a Sub Post Office and your mail does not bear your street address, please file a change of address card at that office.

Group Mail Box patrons are advised to arrange to pick up their mail on October 5th, 1963, and remove their padlocks from their boxes.

These Group Boxes will be relocated to provide service for residents in other areas.

You are also requested to advise your correspondents that the correct manner of addressing your mail is as follows:



VARGAS



The first reported copy of the VARGAS/B.C. split ring hammer. Vargas was a steamer landing and fishing settlement on the east side of Vargas Island, 2 miles west of Clayoquot. It opened in 1914 and closed in 1922 and as was the case with most seasonal west coast settlements, was characterized by low Post Office annual revenues. This postcard has a real photo of large group of posed troops obviously going off to war. It was enscribed with a manuscript OHMS but a one penny stamp was added, probably at Salisbury dated OC 22/14, and it arrived at VARGAS/B.C. NO 12/14.
