This issue's **Favourite Cover**, posted at Union Bay, BC, on Nov 19, 1910, has several elements of interest. The Wellington Colliery Co Ltd was incorporated by James Dunsmuir in 1902 in order to take over his Ladysmith and Wellington coal-mining operations. They had previously been part of an unincorporated company started by James's father, Robert Dunsmuir. This company also owned the Cumberland coal mines, which explains the Union Bay return address.

The cover travelled from Union Bay to Nanaimo on the steamer *City of Nanaimo* (Nov 19, 1910, ship cancel), which at this time worked the east coast of Vancouver Island between Comox and Victoria. It arrived at Nanaimo the following day. The BC Coast Service cancel (Topping type 13-RS) has been seen only in 1909 and 1910; five examples are reported. The *City of Nanaimo* was built in 1891 at Vancouver for the Mainland & Nanaimo Navigation Co. (See photo at *http://digitalcollections.library.ubc.ca/cdm/singleitem/ collection/chung/id/19538/rec/2.*) It was obtained by James Dunsmuir through a mortgage foreclosure in 1896 and became part of the Esquimalt & Nanaimo rail and marine system. The E&N was acquired by Canadian Pacific in 1905 and the *City of Nanaimo* absorbed into the BC Coast Steamship Service.

The cover will have been forwarded by ship from Nanaimo to Vancouver and then on to Montreal by the CPR.—*Morris Beattie*

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## **Auction results for the Jack Wallace Collection**

The colonial British Columbia and Vancouver Island collection of well-known Victoria philatelist Jack Wallace was sold at auction on Oct 16, 2014, in Halifax by Eastern Auctions Ltd. On offer were 292 lots, with strength in express covers, local and US destinations and (a particular Wallace interest) BC's numeral grid cancellations, on stamp and cover. Eastern specialist Yohann Tanguay produced an excellent, well-researched catalogue, with a very useful

bibliography of BC auction catalogues, articles and reference works. A sampling of auction results follows, with illustrations of half-a-dozen better items. All prices mentioned are in Canadian funds, and include a 15% buyer's premium.

The first part of the sale featured 93 lots of stamps or covers with numeral grid cancellations. Notable covers included an 1870 6p Yale (#4) to Victoria, \$740; a nice 6p Lytton (#7) to New Westminster, \$1,840; a fine 6p Clinton (#8), \$1,840; a 9p Seymour (#9) to

#### Jack Wallace continued

The rest of the sale contained some fine stampless items, including a page of fur "returns" from an 1841 Hudson's Bay Co ledger (\$545). The Express section offered an abundance of Wells Fargo, Dietz & Nelson, Barnard and Ballou material. An intact

sheet of four different Dietz & Nelson Express labels brought \$4,890, while another complete, but severed, set realized \$4,025. A fine cover with a scarce Barnard's Cariboo Express collect label brought \$1,840, while one with a Barnard's paid label went for \$2,415.

Two attractive 2½p covers from Nanaimo, with the rare POST OFFICE/NANAIMO handstamp, sold for \$1,440 and \$3,740, while an 1869 cover from Langley (grid #26) to Upper Canada brought \$1,955. A somewhat rough 1867 incoming mourning cover from Baden (Germany) to New Westminster realized \$2,415.

The emphasis in this summary has been on covers, but the Wallace sale also offered an array of mostly mint colonial stamps, with many fine multiples (including an outstanding 3p blue block of 25, \$3,335, and a 2½p dull rose block of six, with gutter imprint, \$2,645). A fine large die proof of the 1865 10c Vancouver Island stamp, in black on card, brought \$1,840.

### Here and there

Readers will note, at the bottom of page 2, that digital back issues of the newsletter can now be downloaded for free. While older issues have long been available from the BNAPS website, allowing free universal access to recent newsletters is a new development. We are using a "cloud"-based file-sharing website called Spideroak. If you go to *https://spideroak.com/browse/share/Andrew\_Scott/Backissues* and click on "Back Issues," a list of individual newsletters will appear. These can then be "opened" (ie, previewed)

and/or "saved" (ie, downloaded). We'll keep the list up to date, and we'll continue to offer printed and snail-mailed newsletters to any-one who wishes to subscribe.

Last issue we showed the 2-cent Numeral stamp at right and asked readers if they could explain why the Tzouhalem cancellation must be a forgery. Peter Jacobi and Brian Copeland wrote in with two very good reasons: the carmine 2-cent Numeral, Die I, wasn't issued until 1899, and the Tzouhalem post office didn't open until 1903! Associate editor Tracy Cooper suggests that this "creation" probably wasn't a deliberate attempt to deceive, as most fakes are created to sell for high prices. Still, our advice is: be wary!



### Vancouver's suburban straightline markings by Andrew Scott

Students of Vancouver-area postal history will be familiar with the early suburban post offices. Today, they would all be located within the City of Vancouver, but in the early 1900s, when the city was smaller (its southern boundary was 16th Ave for many years, until 1929), they were in the neighbouring municipalities of Hastings, South Vancouver and Point Grey. Vancouver's first suburbs were essentially villages or rural settlements that coalesced around early streetcar lines, roads and railway stations. As the city expanded, and absorbed the surrounding land base, the suburban offices were renamed and became sub post offices.

There are about 30 suburban offices in all, and their datestamps can be difficult to find. Nearly all are rated rarity factor "D" or "E" in Bill Topping's *British Columbia Post Offices* (1991). Some, like Winnott, Grimmett and Langara, are rare indeed. A few offices used duplex and circular datestamps, as well as the more frequently seen split-ring hammers (some of the duplex markings are particularly scarce). Suburban cancellations are usually found on postcards, often as receiving marks; dispatch strikes on covers are not common. Assembling the entire group is quite a challenge, especially as Dominion Mills, tucked away in the southeast corner of today's Vancouver, and only open for two weeks in 1911, has never been reported.

Of particular interest to specialists are a group of suburban "straightline" handstamps. These are undated, consisting of a single line of serifed, upper-case text, and usually struck in a particular shade of reddishpurple ink. Examples have so far been seen from six communities: Point Grey, Marpole, Dunbar Heights, Collingwood East, Langara and Kerrisdale. They seem quite rare; in fact, Kerrisdale is the only office from which the editors have seen more than a single example.

The "straightlines" raise a number of questions. Why were they used (ie, were they manufactured for a specific purpose)? Where were they used (ie, at the named offices themselves, or at postal stations or the main office)? Are examples known from other suburban offices? What was their period of use? The purpose of this article is to examine these questions in the light of the few known examples, and to solicit study group members to report examples from their own collections, preferably with scans. We hope to revisit the topic in future newsletters and extend the table of known handstamps located at the end of the article.

**Kerrisdale** The first example shown of the Kerrisdale straightline (*Fig 1*) is on a postcard from Chu Chua (a sawmill settlement north of Kamloops), dated June 15, 1919. The card was addressed to the Convent of the Sacred Heart, Vancouver, and endorsed "via Point Gray." It's easy to see how officials at the Vancouver post office, where the card was presumably first sent, might have felt that additional clarification was required. The sender's endorsement likely referred to the Municipality of Point Grey, which covered the entire west

side of Vancouver, a huge area. Without the Kerrisdale marking, the card might have ended up at the Point Grey post office, located at West 10th Ave and Sasamat St (the convent was on 29th Ave). If this hypothesis is correct, then the straightline handstamp was probably applied at the Vancouver post office.

The other example (*Fig 2*) was mailed from Regina on Nov 11, 1920 (machine cancel) to Alfred Holmes at the corner of 49th Ave and Magee Rd, and endorsed "not known as addressed" by the letter carrier. A Nov 15 Kerrisdale split-ring backstamp and same-day Vancouver CDS (with a "14" timemark) suggest to me that the undeliverable cover was sent to the main post office. With this cover, however, it seems more likely that the straightline marking was added at Kerrisdale, though why it was applied is a mystery.

**Point Grey** This Point Grey straightline (*Fig 3*) is on a clearly addressed cover from Brandon (Dec 24, 1917, machine cancel). There is a letter carrier endorsement that I can't quite decipher; could it be shorthand for "out of district"? There's also a light Dec 27, 1917, Point Grey split-ring backstamp. Again, the reason for the handstamp is not evident, though it appears to have been added at the local office, and not at Vancouver.

**Dunbar Heights** This remarkable soldier's letter (*Fig 4*), marked 15th Canadian Reserve Battalion Orderly Room, was sent from Bramshott, England, on Feb 24, 1918. It was addressed to a druggist, W G H Campbell, at Port Coquitlam. "Druggist" and "Port Coquitlam" were then struck out in pencil and "Vancouver" written in in a clumsy hand. An address on the west side of Vancouver was added, in a much neater hand,

and the Dunbar Heights straightline struck over it, beneath a BEYOND LIMITS OF LETTER/CARRIERS DELIVERY marking (applied in a different shade of ink than the straightline handstamp). A "no such #" notation in pencil completes the endorsements on front, while the back sports partial 1918 split-rings from Port Coquitlam (March 25) and Dunbar Heights (March 27). The fact that the two straightline marks were applied in different shades of ink suggests, to me, that they were applied at different places. I suspect that

the Dunbar Heights handstamp was added at Vancouver's Enquiry Office, where an address for the elusive druggist was probably hunted down, and that the "beyond limits" mark may have been struck at the Dunbar Heights post office to indicate that the suggested address was outside its jurisdiction. It appears that a censorship strip has been removed from the cover's right edge.

**Marpole** Markings from Marpole are rare, despite the fact that the post office used three datestamps (a split-ring and two different duplexes). The Marpole straightline appears on a postcard mailed from Portland, Oregon, on Aug 28, 1921 (*Fig 5*). There do not appear to be irregularities in the address that might require the addition of the handstamp. The card was not forwarded and the address is plainly legible. The street name, Selkirk, could possibly be read as "Selkrik," but that, surely, would not be sufficient cause for an additional marking, especially when "Marpole" is clearly written in the address. With this card a case could perhaps be made that the handstamp was applied at the Marpole post office.

**Langara** Here we have another fabulous redirected soldier's letter (*Fig 6*), mailed to Vancouver from the UK on Dec 3, 1918, and "passed by censor." The sender did not indicate a street address, and the cover, as with the Dunbar Heights cover, probably went to the Vancouver Enquiry Office, where it received a docket number ("41"). Attempts were made to locate the secretary of the Jellicoe Chapter of the IODE (Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire). This was eventually determined to be Mrs Welsh, who lived at Queen's (the old name for Northwest Marine Drive) and Sasamat streets, in the jurisdiction

of the Langara post office. The docket number was then struck out. But at which post office was the Langara straightline applied? The reverse of the cover has a splendid example of the incorrectly spelled "Langarra" split-ring, dated Jan 2, 1919. It's interesting that the two postal markings from this office, both exceedingly rare, are spelled differently, and that both are here represented on a single cover! (Langara, incidentally, is the correct spelling.)




Figure 7. Colour viewcard from Hove, UK, to Collingwood East, Vancouver.

**Collingwood East** This marking is anomalous, in that it is the only straightline seen in red ink, and the only one with "B.C." at the end of the line. It appears on a postcard from Hove, UK (*Fig 7*), with a manuscript dateline of "1-3-19." There is a Collingwood East split-ring receiver dated March 21, 1919. It has been proposed that the straightline handstamps were applied as directional markings. This one could have been added to clarify the written address, where the "East" of "Collingwood East" is not very clear. But such a use would also imply that the marking was struck at the main post office or at a district postal station (because why would the name need to be clarified after the card had safely reached the intended destination)?

**Collingwood East/West** To complicate matters further, we end this analysis with a rather extraordinary registered cover sent from Hollyburn on Dec 1, 1916, to J R McIntyre in Vancouver (*Figs 8 to 10*). On Dec 2 it was backstamped with a large rubber CDS at Postal Station "C" and the front marked BEYOND LIMITS OF LETTER/CARRIERS DELIVERY. Next it was mailed under cover, along with the "Inquiry Department for Missing and Dead Letters" form, to the Collingwood West office for delivery. No joy: the letter was "not deliverable at this office" and "not for McIntyre at this address." It ended up at the Vancouver Dead Letter Office (Dec 12, 1916, Branch DLO oval backstamp) where multiple docketing numbers suggest that several more attempts at delivery were made.

Is this COLLINGWOOD EAST/WEST P.O. marking a different class of handstamp, reserved for departmental use and not struck on regular mail? A san-serif style of typeface has not been seen by the editors on any other suburban straightline marking. And the EAST/WEST configuration, where one of the options has to be struck out, is quite curious. Are there other, similar examples out there? And if anyone has any information on the rather unusual "Inquiry Department" form, we'd be delighted to publish it.

**Conclusions (or lack of them)** Some straightline markings appear to have been added as directional handstamps at the main post office or at postal stations; others seem applied at the suburban offices themselves, especially when mail was being forwarded or redirected. Is the ink colour significant? Very similar shades of purple appear on all handstamps except Collingwood East. Were they all applied at the same location? All straightline handstamps seen so far were used between 1916 and 1921. If we exclude the Collingwood East/West handstamp, that date range can be reduced by one year. Based on these dates, might we expect to also find straightlines from *South Vancouver, Britcola, Janes Road, Vancouver Heights, Collingwood West, Earls Road, Grimmett, Vicosa, Joyce* and *Marine Heights?* (All these suburban offices were open during the period in question.) Obviously, we need to see additional examples before drawing any conclusions. If readers have relevant covers that we can add to the table below, please let us know.

## Ask the experts: 1895 Kaslo to Switzerland routing

Study group member Bill Pawluk recently acquired this attractive five-cent Leaf UPU cover from Kaslo to Switzerland, endorsed "via Spokane." Bill wonders if we could provide additional details about the item's routing. Associate editor Tracy Cooper responds (thanks also to Peter Jacobi for additional research):

Via Shokane 868

*Five-cent UPU cover from Kaslo (Aug 16, 1898 CDS) to Chateau d'Oex, Switzerland (unclear receiver, Sept 11, 1899?). New York transit machine cancel dated Aug 22, 1898.* 

1898 was a tumultuous period of railway expansion and consolidation in southern British Columbia. For more information on the routing I went to the Postmaster General reports for the period from June 30, 1898, to June 30, 1899. This is what I found.

When the cover was posted, the writer had two choices: send it northward via the Kaslo and Slocan Railway to New Denver, where it would enter the CPR system, or send it south "via Spokane." The Spokane route was considered at the time the faster of the two options, owing to the unreliability of the narrow-gauge K&S railway (due to slides, forest fires, etc).

#### Kaslo routing continued

Here is the only official routing going south:

- 1) Kaslo to the steamer landing by foot (1/2 a mile, S H Green, 12 trips per week).
- 2) Kaslo wharf to Nelson wharf by steamer (45 miles, International Navigation and Trading Co, 6 trips per week).
- 3) Nelson wharf to Nelson by foot (½ a mile, Wilson and Harshaw, 12 trips per week)
- 4) Nelson to railway station by foot or wagon (1 mile, Wilson and Harshaw, 12 trips per week)
- 5) To Spokane by rail, via Ymir and Salmo (Nelson and Fort Sheppard Railway).


(American financier Daniel Chase Corbin received a charter from the Canadian government in 1891 to construct the Nelson and Fort Sheppard Railway from Spokane to Nelson. It reached Nelson in 1897. Sometime in 1898 James Hill of Great Northern Railway fame acquired this railroad.)

The cover would then have entered the GNR system. From New York it would have gone onward by steamship and rail to Switzerland. The Chateau d'Oex receiving date is indistinct but could be Sept 11, a trip of 26 days.

## **Recent BC six-digit post office numbers**

The most recent previous list of new post offices was published on page 755, in newsletter #85 (March 2013). We continue to try to update this information, most of which comes from the Canada Post website. ERDs listed are the earliest reported dates for the outlets' six-digit datestamps (pickup depot #104597 had no datestamp). Thanks also to Doug Murray, editor of the *Bull.MOOSE* newletter, for his help with these. Some of these office numbers (eg, Vancouver City Square 104453) were only operational for brief periods of time. Perhaps examples of short-lived datestamps will become sought-after rarities for tomorrow's collectors.

Here is the third and final section of the 12-page listing of British Columbia "wing" markings that we've published over the past few issues of the newsletter. This section was last updated on Nov 5, 2014.
