


In this newsletter, we continue showing copies of some of the material on display last spring at CAPEX 87.

The plate proofs for the 2¢, 3¢, 4¢ and 5¢ were imperforate sheets of 100 stamps with four inscriptions (two are seen at left) but no plate numbers.

The Canadian Bank Note Company engraved accounting numbers along the right edge of each plate proof and these are shown on the copy of the right portion of the plate proof of the 4¢ (copied from a slide).

THE HIGH VALUE CENTENNIAL DEFINITIVES

Several essays were on display at CAPEX 87 for allow set of high value definitives to be issued for Canada's centennial. Seven colour essays submitted by the British American Bank Note Company depicted fishing on an 8¢ value, computers (10¢), agriculture (15¢), wood industry (20¢), energy (25¢), metals industry (50¢) and telecommunications (\$1) in colour (see page 2 of our last newsletter (number 37) for reproductions of four of these essays and of course one of the sets of colour slides offered in the last newsletter contains all of these essays).

Seven essays by the Canadian Bank Note Company were also displayed, two in colour (aviation (8¢, blue) and ballet (\$1, red)) and five as pencil sketches (hydroelectric dam (8¢), relay station (8¢), prospecting (8¢), industrial scent (8¢) and port activities (10¢)).

The 8¢ and 10¢ definitives

The final designs chosen for the high value Centennial definitives were submitted by Rapid, Grip and Batten of Ottawa. They featured reproductions of paintings by Canadian artists. The 8¢ featured "The Alaska Highway between Watson Lake and Nelson" by A. Y. Jackson and Tom Thomson's "The Jack Pine" was shown on the 10¢ value. The artwork for the designs was the same as the final issue. The full die proofs of the 8¢ and 10¢ were not on display at CAPEX (consequently we do not know the proof numbers). Instead, cut out die proofs on backing, with approval signatures were shown, as were full plate proofs of the 8¢ and 10¢ (sheets of 50 stamps with four inscriptions but no plate numbers).
