A CENTURY STAMP COMPANY FDC

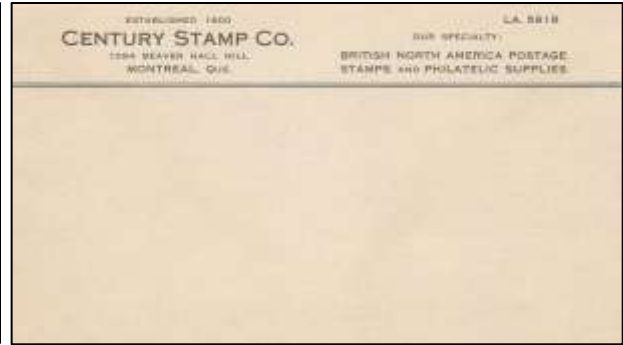


Figure 2. Reverse side of cover in Figure 1.

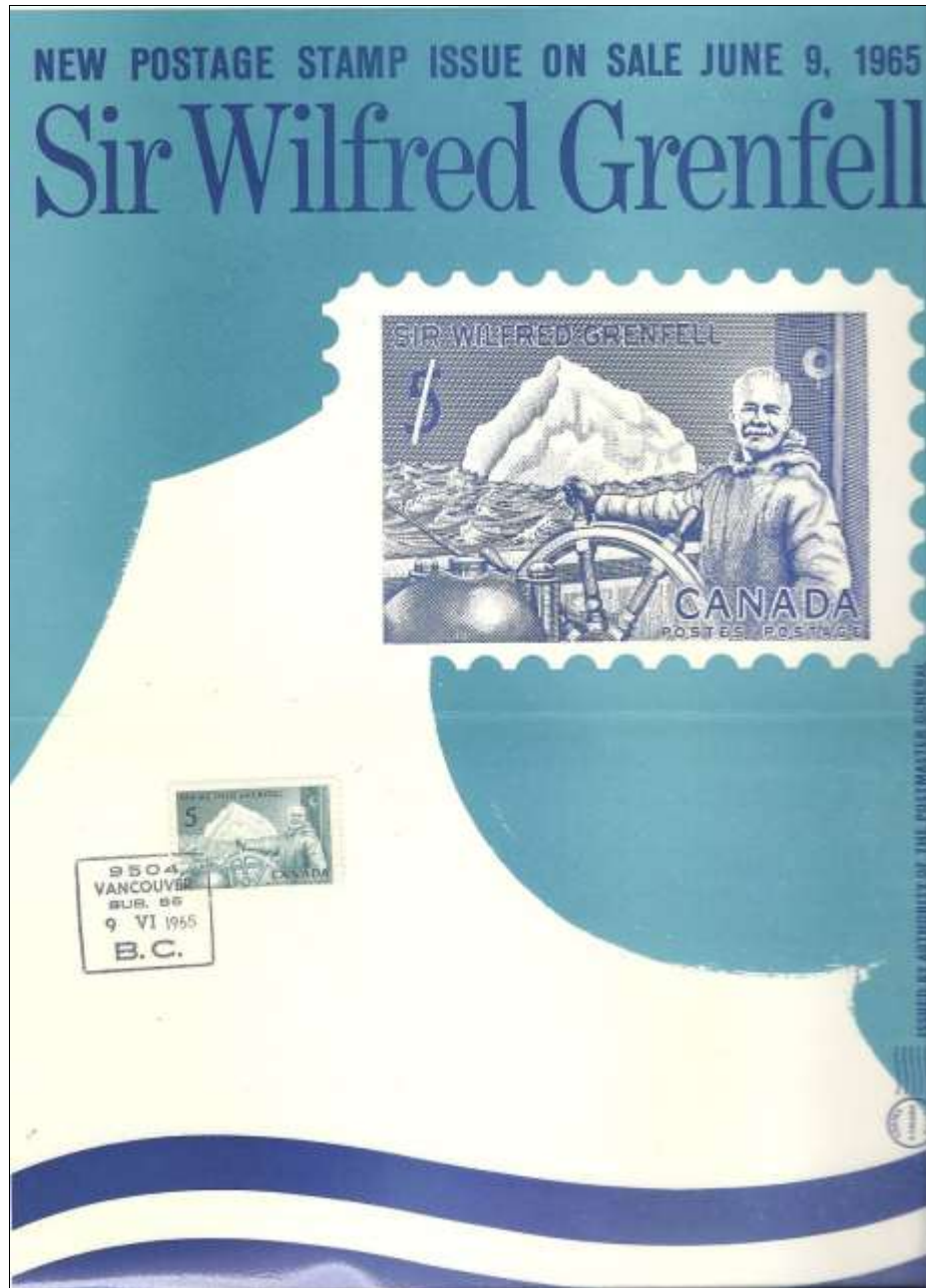


Figure 1. Uncached Halifax FDC by Emily King franked with #143 and 144.

Last month at one of the shows I bought the cover in Figures 1 and 2, with Figure 2 being the back of the cover. The nice part about this cover was that it had an insert, shown in Figure 3. It was mailed from Vancouver, BC on May 15, 1939 and judging from the rubber stamp on the back, from Notary Public Victor K. Welder. The addressee was George Bond in England. I can only think that both Mr. Bond and Mr. Welder were philatelists.

Now how did this cacheted envelope from Montreal end up in Vancouver where it was mailed? The insert shows that this cover probably was published and prepared by Century Stamp Company at 1094 Beaver Hall Hill in Montreal. Now the big question is, was Century Stamp Company the producer of this cover? Did they have someone outside of the company prepare and print it for them? Did they have someone on staff that produced covers for them? The reason for this question is when you look at the two green maple leaves on the first scan in the bottom left corner of the envelope then you might have seen covers again with that maple leaf in 1949 and 1951. I am only deducing that this could be a possibility and at the same time determine the maker of the following covers that are currently shown as "Unknown" cachet maker.

In Bruce Perkins' catalogue (1) on page 25, cachet Type 13 for the Newfoundland issue (Scott No. 282) has similar maple leaves on a cachet by an unknown maker. The same maple leaves also appear on JCR cachets for #275 and #282, and on a cachet for #311-314. Is there a connection here? Maybe some members who are more in the know can confirm or refute these similarities.

MORE ON THE STANLEY STAMP COMPANY

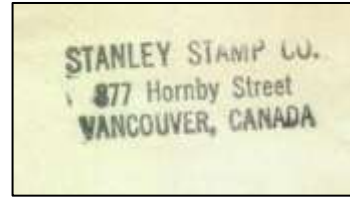

Prompted by John van der Ven's article on this company in the September 2010 *First Impressions*, I checked to see what was in my own collection. I found the two general purpose cachets (Figure 1) shown below, with the first day cancel for the 1951 Royal Visit stamp (#315).

On the reverse of one of the envelopes was the hand stamp shown at right from the Stanley Stamp Co. Is this in fact a Stanley cachet? It is similar in style to the cachet shown in van der Ven's article with the same Coat of Arms. My earliest use for the van der Ven's cachet is for the 1952 Forestry stamp (#316) putting the above cachet in the right period for a changeover. My question to the reader is; Do you have any of these cachets in your collection that would confirm or refute my supposition?

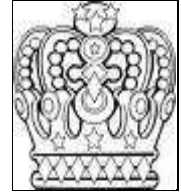

Two additional notes on van der Ven's "Stanley": this cachet also comes in a gray/black colour, and Stanley did not change the cachet to reflect the Coronation of Elizabeth II maintaining the King's Crown throughout the period of use rather than changing to the Queen's Crown.

Another stuffer I recently found again presents a Stanley puzzle. In Figure 2, Stanley states they have produced an illustrated deluxe album page for the 1951 CAPEX issue with the artist's conception of the allegory of the centenary. In Figure 3 the artist is Geo. T. Mercer. Did Stanley also publish the cachet with Mercer being the artist? I would be interested in receiving comments from other members. The stamps on the album page shown here were cancelled on the day of issue at Toronto Sub. A.

TWO FDCs OF INTEREST

The official first day of issue for the 3 cent King George VI Coronation stamp was May 10, 1937. The cover shown here is dated May 1, 1937. Could it be that a postal clerk made an error in setting the dater, or did the Montreal Windsor Station post office really get a ten-day head start on the rest of the country?



Dave Hanes reports having recently purchased the cover shown below while “snowbirding” in Florida. This is a registered airmail FDC for Scott No. 243 posted at Winnipeg on June 15, 1938, and the cachet was drawn by W.C. Thorne.



A CHECKLIST OF CANCELLATIONS ON 1927 FDCs

The year 1927 saw the publication of the first cachets for Canadian FDCs by George Eppstadt of Maxville, Ontario and Century Stamp Company of Montreal, Quebec. Those cachets were franked with the Sixtieth Anniversary of Confederation and Historical Issue stamps put into service on June 29, 1927. This date marked a starting point for both publishers and collectors of Canadian FDCs.

The nine stamps in the two sets were distributed in advance to postmasters across Canada. They were instructed that July 1 was to be the official first day of issue, but since that was a national holiday, the de facto release date became June 29. In their study of these issues, Melvin Baron and Stan Lum listed first day post offices for each stamp separately, with between 8 and 22 locations for the Sixtieth Anniversary values and only 4 or 5 for the Historical Issue. Baron and Lum did not indicate what types of cancellations had been applied to the covers.

In compiling the checklist shown here, the FDCs in the Gallery section of the First Day Cover Study Group website were identified first, then any Baron and Lum towns were added. These latter FDCs are marked with an asterisk and do not show the type of postmark. Flag cancellations are identified by their Ed Richardson number and slogan cancellations by their Cecil Coutts classification.

A total of 75 different cancellations from 46 different locations have been reported. Some appear to be quite rare, with only a single use on a single stamp recorded while others such as Maxville and Montreal are more common, largely because of the efforts of the two cachet makers noted earlier and a handful of stamp dealers such as Emily King for whom a sample cover is shown in Figure 1. The author would be delighted to hear of additional cancellations.

FIRST DAY COVER RESEARCH PROJECTS

Gary Denis writes a column with the above title in the periodical *First Days* which is published by the American First Day Cover Society. The lead item in the March 1, 2011 issue report was titled Canadian Cachet Catalogs and reads as follows:

AFDCSers who collect Canadian FDCs may be interested in knowing that there is a FDC Study Group affiliated with the British North American Philatelic Society (BNAPS).

The study group is working on several catalog projects, including: earliest known usages of early Canadian stamps; ArtCraft, Roessler and Colorano FDCs for Canadian stamps; and the cachets of Joseph C. Rosenbaum, who produced cachets under his name, followed by JCR and finally Rosecraft.
