The main article in this issue is a catalogue of the FDC cachets produced by Victor Brosz of Calgary in the 1960s. Although he only produced them for an eight-year period, it is perhaps the most varied and beautiful series of Canadian cachets ever done. Harold Houston presents a recently discovered FDC cachet by George Eppstadt which was produced 40 years after his first effort in 1927. AT LONG LAST, ANOTHER GEORGE EPPSTADT CACHET

George Eppstadt of Maxville, ON produced Canada's first FDC cachet for the 1927 issue celebrating Canada's 60th anniversary of confederation. It was produced in large part as a salute to his adoptive country, and was thought to be his only cacheted cover. Today it is one of the treasures of Canadian philately and is much sought after by FDC collectors.

At a recent stamp show I came across a second Eppstadt production. I found this cover, shown in Figure 1, in a dealer's "Junk Box" for the grand price of 25 cents. It is hand drawn and painted, and commemorates the 100th anniversary of confederation. It is not a FDC as it was postmarked with a Maxville duplex cancellation on September 20, 1967, some nine months after the centennial stamp (Scott 453) was issued.

The cover has Eppstadt's return address, Box 58/ Maxville, Ont on the back flap. An enclosed letter (see Figure 2) discusses his earlier cachet and offers it for sale at \$2.00 with the three stamps of the 1927 Historical issue. He also indicates that he had "a lot of stamps and covers" on hand, but had not been an active collector since 1960.

All told, it was an exciting find and well worth the price and then some!

AN UNUSUAL CACHET ERROR

I have a number of cachet errors in my collection. All of them are absent a colour due to missing a second or third run through the printing press. The following Robert Cole cachet for the Isaac Brock stamp (#601) is a bit of an anomaly. Figure 1 shows the three-colour cachet as intended, and Figure 2 shows the irregularity. Not only is it missing the colour blue, the red is inverted and covering the stamp. I would speculate the cover was sent for servicing missing both the blue and red colours. When returned to Cole he noticed the missing colours and sent it through the press again, this time up-side-down. Voila, what a variety!



