

NOTES ON THE FLAG CANCEL STUDY GROUP MEETING, HAMILTON, SEPTEMBER 22 1989 Tom Almond

Our meeting was attended by 13 members of the group and one non-member, viz:

Doug Lingard - Types 21 to 46 and 53 to 54.


Fred Hollenbeck - Types 50 to 52, 71 and 72, and modern flags.

Tom Almond - Types 61 and 62.



THE WORLD WAR I FLAGS

Doug Lingard reports Lethbridge 23-5 used on March 16th 1917, an EKD that is only four days after the die was shipped out from Ottawa. He also reports an LKD for Ottawa 37-5, November 13th 1918.



Bill Angley has submitted details of a postcard with <u>2 strikes</u> of the rare Brandon 35-10. His postcard is a real gem and I have shown both sides of it. For flag collectors it is a LKD of April 5th 1917. For railway buffs it has a picture of an obscure (unless you live there!) station. For military collectors it bears a civilian censor's mark and a message about the entry of the USA into the war.




This recent find for Flag 35-10 is only the third reported. Of interest are the two strikes on front and back of a postcard, with different time marks. Previous speculation that the die was later sent to Moncton now seems dubious as the EKD for Moncton 35-5 is 04-06. Now that's too prompt a delivery even for yesteryear's mail service!

ROYAL TRAIN FLAGS


As a result of David Sessions' note in the June Flagpole two more Anglo-French hybrids have been reported. Bob Thorne has submitted a cover with the French flag and French dater containing "MAY 22". Wayne Curtis has submitted a cover with the English flag and English dater containing "MAI 22".

Why was the French canceller being used in Toronto? It really does look as if somebody was messing about. More reports of abnormal and normal use are needed to show some light on this problem. Can anybody through any light on the addressees of these letters, do they have philatelic connections?

Note that the French and English Flags may be differentiated by the size of the boss on the top of the flagpole. The French version is small, the English version is large.

ENLIST NOW FLAGS

Tom Almond reports a copy of 53-8, used on April 15th 1942, this is before the uncomfirmed LKD but it extends the confirmed period of use from 24th March. Doug Lingard has sent a photocopy of a strike of 53-10A with a new LKD of 24th April 1942.

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
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FREDERICTON CENTENNIAL

In the last issue I reported a strike dated 2nd June, Doug Lingard has pointed out that his photocopy, which is better than mine, shows the date as 2nd July. Doug has also sent a copy of the abnormal commercially used on 1st July and a set of reports of the normal including one for 17th March. This extends one of the periods listed in the last Flagpole. Bill Robinson reports the normal dater for 2nd, 12th and 17th March and 25th July and the abnormal used philatelically on 31st July. John Robertson reports the normal used on 13th and 17th March.

SMITH'S FALLS

Doug reports two examples, one is clearly dated 6th July, the other is partially dated 2? June. More reports of this scarce flag would be welcome.



OTTAWA INVERT

Doug reports that he has just one copy timed at 1230. He suggests that there are probably 8 to 10 of these inverts in existence.

MODERN FLAGS

The banner for this issue shows the Klussendorf flag used in 1984 to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the Postal Museum. The notice below explains the background and how collectors could obtain First Day Covers of this cancellation.

NATIONAL POSTAL MUSEUM TO ISSUE FLAG CANCELLATION



Last day of usage 26 September 1984



First day of usage 27 September 1984

On 27 September 1984 the National Postal Museum will introduce a new Klussendorf model 280/5 cancellation machine and flag cancellation to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the Postal Museum. The new Klussendorf will replace the current Pitney Bowes model DDU machine which will be removed from service on 26 September 1984.

This event will be of particular interest to philatelists because of the unique reversed design of the new flag cancellation. For the first time in the history of Canada Post the machine cancellation will feature the postmark to the right of the advertising slogan.

Collectors wishing to obtain first day examples of the new cancellation should forward stamped, self-addressed envelopes to:

National Postal Museum Canada Post Corporation 180 Wellington Street OTTAWA, Ontario K1A 1C6

to arrive no later than 27 September 1984.

Only envelopes with the proper Canadian rate for first class mail will be acceptable. All others will be returned unactioned. The current Canadian postage rate is 32¢ per 30 grams for mailing within Canada, 37¢ to the United States and 64¢ to all other destinations. All envelopes received which are not suitable for machine cancelling will be cancelled with the current Museum Posthorn hand cancel.

One cancellation only per envelope will be applied. Canada Post reserves the right to limit the number of items serviced per customer.
