Popular Stamps, volume 1: Additional Information

The first volume of Popular Stamps - it included seven four-page mimeographed numbers in 1938 - is quite elusive.

For some years I have had these issues in a "reissue" form. Printed on green paper, they are really nothing more than price lists of E.C. Werner of Alton, Ontario. ...

After having submitted the previous article, I came across an advertisement by Mrs. Eleanor A. Totten on page 288 in the November 1961 number of B.N.A. Topics. The ad suggests that green paper may have been used for the originals. The ad, headed "Information Please!" asked: "Do you own or can you inform me concerning the first year (1938, mimeo. on green paper) issues of Popular Stamps."

This is the only reference I've found to date about the color of the paper used. Can anyone supply any additional information?

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The Publications of Dr. L. S. Holmes

One of the more common topics for discussion among collectors today is that of philatelic literature. In fact, collecting literature is becoming a very popular pursuit with many collectors, particularly those in the B.N.A. field.

Certainly Dr. L. S. Holmes was one of the most prolific philatelic writers of his day as far as B.N.A. material is concerned and the collector will no doubt profit by taking time to review some of these publications. His life span covered 77 years, 1884 - 1961, and for most of this period he was actively engaged in collecting, dealing and writing. In 1897 Dr. Holmes was one of three youngsters to form the Victoria Stamp Co., and early in the 1900's price lists appeared from this enterprising group.

In reviewing the publications by Dr. Holmes three distinct categories become evident. Firstly, there are the price-list editions prior to 1940, then the very interesting 1943-45 period and finally the 1949-68 series.

Although standard catalogue information on stamps is carried forward from one edition to the next, many additions and deletions do occur as his works progress. This will be particularly evident in the discussion of the Handbook period of 1943-45.

1940 and Earlier

By the 1930's the price lists of the Victoria Stamp Company had reached a fair degree of sophistication. Printing was done on good quality gloss paper, the format was in a handy 4" x 7 1/2" pocket-size and the contents included most of the collecting areas that are popular today. Up to 1939 the catalogues had a paper cover similar to the remaining sheets in the booklet. The 1939-40 editions however were dressed up considerably with a heavy velvet-paper cover. Several colors were used as indicated in the Catalogue Schedule.

The 1943-45 Period

Early in the 1940's, Dr. Holmes obtained the copyright for the well-known Jarrett B.N.A. Catalogue of 1929. This action together with Dr. Holmes great desire to produce a compact and comprehensive reference on B.N.A. postal material resulted in the 1943 Handbook and

Catalogue of Canada and B.N.A. This 443-page edition in purple cover was truly an encyclopedia compared to the earlier price catalogues. The first 246 pages form a handbook on stamps and postal material with the remaining pages forming a detailed, comprehensive catalogue. Although copyrighted in 1943, the work was not off the press until December 1944, due to Wartime production problems. By 1945 a second printing appeared, this time in a dark blue cover. In 1950 Dr. Holmes received a Certificate of Merit from the London International Stamp Exhibition for this major work.

The Handbook section enjoyed particular popularity and in 1954 a reprint of only this portion of the 1943 edition was produced in the U.S.A. The red cover is on hand with several collectors and a green colored copy has been reported.

1949-68

Up to 1949 no edition number appeared in any of the catalogues and now in 1949 we are confronted with a 7th edition. Referring to the Catalogue Schedule we will see six previous editions listed and earlier publications do exist. In any case by 1949 someone decided that the publications should have an edition number.

The series from 1949-68 are fairly similar in nature. These editions exhibit a departure from the 1943-45 format in that the formal Handbook section has been deleted and the publications revert to a catalogue pattern. One must hasten to point out that the various catalogue sections become enriched through added material and by 1968 the publication must be considered a comprehensive reference book more so than a catalogue.

The last two editions were published after Dr. Holmes' death by a group of B.N.A. specialists and hence the original Holmes works were extended to even greater fulfillment for the benefit of present and future collections.

The title page offers "Postage Stamps, Postage Due Stamps, Air Mail Stamps, First Flight Covers, Officially Sealed, Postage Paid Cancellers, Post Cards and Bands, Envelopes and Registered Envelopes, Reply Coupons, Armed Forces Cancels, Postal Slogans, Registration Gummed Labels, Postage Meters, Perfins, Inland Revenue, Money Order Tax, Transportation, Customs Duty, War Savings, Postal Rate Table, Table of Plate Numbers, Town Post Offices". A cornucopia of Newfoundland philately. On reading, the catalogue contains more.

Listed with each stamp are varieties, such as the chin strap variety on #29, 12¢ Queen Victoria of 1865, proofs and color trials, and positions of imprints. In the cases where plate numbers exist, they are listed as well. Later Newfoundland stamps, famous for their perf varieties, have their respective lists of known perfs. In the 1928 set, 19 different perfs are listed, and from a table, one can tell at a glance which perfs occur on which values.

A nice addition to the catalogue is the list of Newfoundland First Flight covers, covering five pages, followed by 12 pages of photos of planes from those flights. For those who collect slogans, a list of Newfoundland slogans appears, as well as a list of all the towns which had gummed registration labels. I did not know that these existed. Meter lovers will delight, as these are listed as well as are Newfoundland Perfins.

For postal history lovers, a table contains the postage rates for each year for local, inland, Canada, US, Great Britain, British Empire, and Foreign postal rates. Each stamp issue has a list of rates for each value in the set, a check list for the collector of that issue.

The section on town cancels is superb. Each town listed includes information on population, open and close of the office, and the type of cancellers known: split circle, small circle, large circle, large double circle, money order, box cancel, and telegraph.

It is unfortunate that the illustrations for many of the stamps are dark and muddy. In some cases, it is very difficult to discern what the stamp looks like. What would make this excellent publication even more valuable to the collector would be illustrations of the varieties. A nice enlargement of the differences between a Die I and a Die II would help the collector in many cases differentiate between the common and scarce variety. A very worthwhile book, one which I readily recommend for the casual or specialist collector of Newfoundland. **pmb**

A function of philatelic literature is to document information while it is current and before it has been forgotten. This book deals with the Elizabethan Era of Strike, Courier and Local Posts. Local Posts are an important facet of postal history, for they carried the mail when the official mail carrier did not, or could not, carry the mail. And it is these local posts that enable commercial mail to flow when other means are unavailable, or too expensive.

This book illustrates over 325 stamps, making it very easy to identify the various labels of the strike, courier, and local posts. The illustrations are crisp and clear, making identification easy.

The various postal services are broken into three categories: 1- mainly philatelic; 2- philatelic with a large volume of usage; and 3- essentially utilitarian. I was previously aware of a few of these services, but I had no idea that there were in fact so many.

A well laid out book, with information captured for future postal historians which would otherwise have been lost. Highly recommended. **pmb**

**RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS AT
CANADA'S SECOND NATIONAL PHILATELIC LITERATURE EXHIBITION
April 30 - May 2, 1993**

1. Participation is open to all philatelists in the following classes:
 - a) Handbooks, Monographs, Pamphlets and Studies (published after January 1, 1988);
 - b) Catalogues (other than Auction Catalogues);
 - c) Newsletters or Periodicals of National or International Societies or Groups (a full volume or year);
 - d) Newsletters of Study Groups (a full volume or year);
 - e) Commercial Philatelic Newspapers or Periodicals (a full volume or year);
 - f) Articles, Series or Columns in the Philatelic Press (complete year or 10 consecutive columns);
 - g) Articles, Series or Columns in the non-Philatelic Press (complete year or 10 consecutive columns);
 - h) Club Newsletters
 - i) Show Programmes
 - j) Other
2. Each exhibitor, by signing an entry form, indicates his/her willingness to abide by the rules of the exhibition.
3. Exhibitors shall enter their entry in the proper class. The jury, at its discretion may transfer an exhibit, if incorrectly entered.
4. A single entry may be eligible for multiple awards. In addition to Royal Philatelic Society of Canada medals, other awards will be available to the jury.
5. The entry fee is \$15 Can. per entry. These fees are payable in advance with the entry form and, if the exhibit must be returned, must include sufficient funds for the prepayment of the return of the exhibit if it is to be sent back by mail, EMS or Priority Courier. Otherwise the exhibit will be returned by Express collect.
6. The exhibition committee reserves the right to reject, restrict, or limit the number of entries allowed an exhibitor.
7.
 - a. All entries (in two copies) if shipped or mailed must be in the hands of the Exhibition Committee by February 1, 1993. The shipping address is: P.O. Box 2788, Station 'D', Ottawa, CANADA K1P 5W8.
 - b. Exhibitors are informed that their entries will not be returned unless requested in writing. They will be put on view at the Show and donated to local philatelic libraries afterwards.
 - c. Exhibitors may send along publicity information to be distributed during the Show.
8. Although stringent precautions against theft, damage or other mishaps are taken (including uniformed armed guards) no responsibility shall attach to the R.A. Stamp Club, the R.A. Centre, The Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, the Radisson Hotel, their agents, officers, employees, voluntary or paid assistants or any other person authorized to perform any tasks in connection with the exhibits.
9. Insurance is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor, since all exhibits are entered and received at the risk of the exhibitor.
10. A panel of judges accredited by their national societies will decide on the allocation of awards. Their decision is final.
11. The Exhibition's Organizing Committee concerning any and all exhibition matters shall be final.
