### 341... Canada Militia cancel - Niagara No 1



Further to item 323, NL 40. On page 4, FPO No 1 is listed second from the top with earliest reported postal usage of PM JUN 18 09. Bill Robinson has reported an earlier date for this hammer of AM JUN 16 09 on Scott's Canada 89, on piece. This is remarkable as the proof strike is dated PM JUN 16 09.

As far as first day strikes are concerned it may be recorded here that Official Souvenir cards were prepared (186mm X 114mm) for presentation to dignitaries attending the opening day ceremonies of FPO No 1 and these bear a postmark dated PM JUN 16 09 on the front.

They were signed by George Ross, Chief Post Office Superintendent, Canada and Capt. W.

R. Ecclestone, Officer in charge Field Post Office.

We were fortunate to see one of these souvenir cards in a postal exhibit at CAPEX 78.


A cumulative index is being prepared which will contain references to Newsletters 1 to 50 inclusive.


John Frith sends photocopies of a number of military postal markings he has added to his collection. These have not previously been recorded and readers may add them to their survey answer sheets for the record.

An item of postal history interest is illustrated thanks to John Frith. A similar item is shown in H.E. Guertin's book in Part 10 page 10C.

Guertin records that in January 1940 Canadian soldiers in Britain were advised that surface mail could be posted free and some mail was dispatched dated January 23, 24 and 25. Shortly afterward it was discovered this concession did not apply to the Canadian Armed Forces hence covers with these dates may be considered as unique.

It was July 12, 1940 (see photocopied letter) when "free mail" was again authorized for the Army and one bag was dispatched from Aldershot on that date. Most letters however,

posted on the 12th, received the 13th date. Notice the straightline unit handstamp.

Item 338 in NEWSLETTER #41 illustrates the Victoria Post Office attempt to conceal the origin of Naval mail passing through it's office and evidence to date indicates that this was the first time a civilian post office in Canada altered it's equipment in such a manner for security purposes.

The removal of the City/Province hub from one of their electric machine cancellers appears to have taken place about February 1942. The blank square illustrated in Fig 1 and in Item 338, was not intended to register being that part of the die frame holding the hub in place, but perhaps it registered occasionally due to the thickness of some covers.





Fig. 3 "Naden"

A review of covers in my collection indicates that the "Victoria" City/Province hub was in use from the outbreak of war in 1939 until early 1942 (see Fig 2), while the earliest dated censored cover cancelled with the "missing hub" is 20 March 1942 (see Fig 3)

The introduction of the circular handstamps NPO 1112 and 1113 together with the "blackout" cancellations at major coastal post offices resulted in the gradual disappearance of the "Victoria" missing hub cancellation. 3 covers from the same writer dated 12 April through 21 June 1943 provides the approximate latest use of the "dumb" cancel (see Fig. 4).

In view of the foregoing, the question arises as to the reason behind the removal of the "Victoria" place name in order to give the cancellation the "dumb" character required in a security situation. Perhaps it was the outbreak of war in the Pacific in December 1941, or the large number of men streaming into H.M.C.S. "Naden" and "Givenchy" at this time that prompted authorities to tighten security. Whatever the reason, tighter security must have become urgent with the expected arrival at Esquimalt of H.M. Transport "Queen Elizabeth" on 23 February 1942. She was to enter drydock and remain for approximately 15 days. Understandably, the security staff would be most anxious that mail from the ship bear no indication of her location, thus the decision that all mail originating from the Naval installations at Esquimalt receive a "dumb" cancellation.

This reasoning does not explain why a particular security measure continued in use long after "Queen Elizabeth" departed the West Coast, however once in place and the war in the Pacific heating up, then the committing of Canadian Naval Forces to the Aleutian campaign, it is understandable that the practice continued until the nationwide use of the "blackout" cancellation came into effect.

It will be clear from the above that information on this particular cancellation is incomplete, more covers require to be studied to confirm or amend the time periods stated, particularly covers originating in "Queen Elizabeth" during her stay in drydock at Esquimalt. The editor will be pleased to hear from anyone with relative information.

## 348...F.P.O. 131 - a WW2 cancellation



One small item we have finally cleared up concerns the information in Major W.J. Bailey's handbook on page 42 concerning the above office. We have seen, and have had reports, of a number of covers with the FPO 131 cancel dated after 3 Dec 43 the date when supposedly the cancellor was lost.

A note from Bill Bailey confirmed that the information in the handbook should apply to FPO 133, not to FPO 131.





The 96th was from Saskatoon. proofing dates These cancellors were used concurrently during June to October 1916, inclusive.


### 350...Military Mail - WW2 - first sightings


In NL24, item 146 we mentioned the Canadian Army Priority Casualty Post Card and lo and behold a fine example recently appeared. It certainly received the promised priority handling as it was postally dated 6 JUL 44 at Canadian Postal H.Q. London and at Lennoxville, P.Q., JUL 10 44.

The circular marking on the left, below the Air Mail box, was struck in something approaching turqoise-blue and reads CANADIAN RECORDS C.M.H.Q. 6 JUL 1944 CASUALTIES CANADIAN ARMY OVERSEAS.



NL35 item 271 illustrated an undated strike (possibly a proofing strike?) and here again a fine example on cover was loaned by Ken Ellison for members to see. The strikes (3) are exceptionally sharp indicative of a new instrument. Use by Canadian Army Occupation Force on the Continent seems most likely but further details are sought? By the way, hammers 1, 2, 4 and 5 also are possible. Notice FPO 131 d NO 28 45 as a backstrike.

#### 352... History of the British Army Postal Service - Vol II - 1903-1927 by E.B. Proud

#### 353...some unusual items

Bill Robinson sent the photocopy of the Forces Letter and a caption from Guertin's book applies, in part..in 1944 about 500 Canadian Army personnel were flown to Australia on loan to the Australian Army for the purpose of operating radar equipment manufactured in Canada. These men belonged to the First Special Wireless Group. Some of the troops later accompanied the Australian and New Zealand Forces to Borneo and Morotai. The earliest arrivals reached Melbourne early August 1944. A later detachment arrived at Ingleburn Camp, N.S.W. in September 1944.

Some of these men saw active service in the East; this being one of the objectives in case Canada should become involved in the Pacific War. Unquote..
