

R.C.A.F. STATION CANCELS

Having joined the RCAF in 1961, and with this year being the 60th Anniversary of the RCAF, I have undertaken the project of attempting to produce a proper check list of the various types of Station cancels.

Major W.J. Bailey in his handbook - "Canadian Military Postmarks" touched briefly on the topic indicationg that there were many types, but he didn't attempt to compile a checklist.

Back in 1977, an attempt to put together a list of the cancels via "the Canadian Military Mail Study " Newsletter was made. Seven collectors responded at the time but I believe nothing else has been attempted to date.


I have approached the project in another manner. I originally drew up a checklist, and then approached known specialists in this field, for their comments and different cancels in their collections. Needless to say, I have had to change and add to the original list.


Upon checking the submitted list, some collectors may comment that the "straight line" type cancel has been obmitted. I am aware that these type of cancels (?) exist but feel that they are only rubber stamps which in most cases are return addresses.




