A ROYAL FLYING CORPS CHRISTMAS CARD 1917 FROM TEXAS



Herewith an unusual Christmas card that by now must be one of a kind!

You will recall that an exchange training scheme with the US Airforce was set up for the winter of 1917 when the RFC trained in Texas where it is always summmer. Canadian winters had not yet been conquered by fliers!

This lovely card is trimmed in gold, the aeroplane and clouds are in blue, the Maple Leaf in green and the RFC wings are blue and green. All lettering is in gold print. The spandrel symbol on the inner leaf is in the usual red and navy.





A SPECIAL CHRISTMAS CARD

Canada's FORCE "C" was sent to Hong Kong shortly before the Japanese attacked the Colony. By 25 December 1941 the FORCE was overcome and those remaining were taken Prisoner of War.

In 1942, 1943 and 1944 an 'official' Christmas card was printed for, and sent by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King to all FORCE "C" P.O.W.'s. Few of these cards were reported to have reached the prisoners. This 1943 card would have been mailed in time for "normal' delivery at Christmas but it was reported received by the P.O.W. in February of 1945 when he was at the Oeyama Camp near Osaka in Japan.

WAS THE RCAF IN ADEN IN WW II?

This question was raised in the last FORCES POSTAL HISTORY SOCIETY NEWSLETTER. To students of Canadian military history this is an important point.

The writer of the query evidently had such a RCAF cover from Aden. An explanation, of course, boils it down to the fact that many RCAF, or army personnel for that matter, served in purely British forces, or later in WW II, in the U.S. forces. Perhaps this would be a good field for a member to pursue - how many different places can you find where a Canadian serviceman served with other countries?

NO. 8 CANADIAN STATIONARY HOSPITAL

The No. 8 Canadian Stationary Hospital (otherwise known as the Saskatchewan Field Hospital Unit) recruited in Saskatoon from late March to mid April 1916. It was a resounding success and some 14 officers, 1 matron, 26 nursing sisters, and 119 rank and file volunteered for service with the unit. This hospital was located at he following points:



5th INFANTRY BATTALION, C.E.F.

The cover pictured here, from Jim Felton, is a beautiful item! Let's see if we can provide, with the help of J.C.C., some information on it.

Private W. Gillborn was a member of the 5th Infantry Battlion of the 2nd Infantry Brigade which formed part of the 1st Division of the Canadian Expeditionary Force in WW I. He was in "F" Company of the Battalion.

The official O.H.M.S. cover was sent by Captain Edward Hillman who was the adjutant of the 5th Infantry Battalion. Maybe we could speculate and say that the Captain was calling Private Gillborn back from leave in Nottingham?

Shown here are two Canadian Army Christmas cards from 1916 and 1917. We are told they are multi-colored and must therefore be very attractive!


