'95. In the meanwhile, your mailing label reflects your paid up status showing the year and month i.e. 95/08 or whatever.

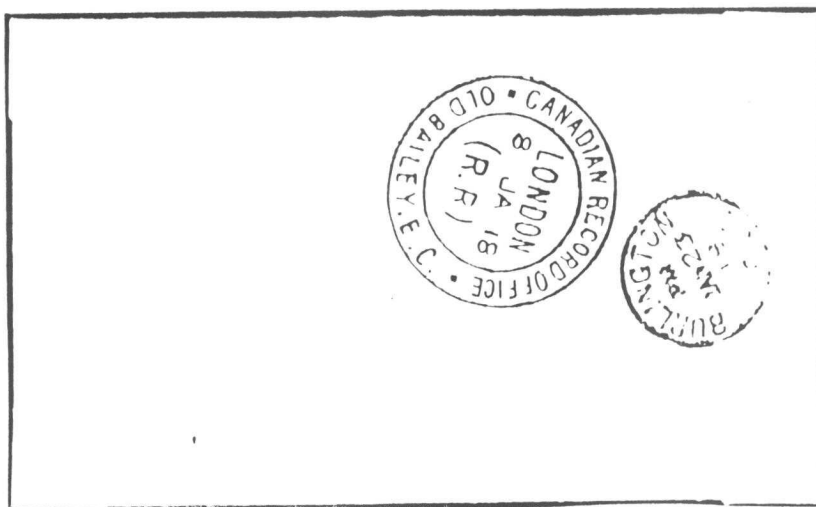

Canadian Record Office - Old Bailey - by Ritch Toop

Newsletter No. 69, September 1986 (new page No. 464) illustrated a marking from the Canadian Record Office, Old Bailey, E. C. and wondered what the letters (R. R) stood for. We now know it's for Records Registry. The OHMS cover below, postmarked London, E. C. 8 Jan 1918 with an oval RECORDS / C.E.F. / REGISTRY on the front, was addressed to Mrs. Ida E. Heeks, Burlington, Ontario, Canada. The reverse as illustrated, shows the Canadian Record Office double-ring handstamp dated 8 Jan 1918 and a Burlington receiver of 23 Jan 1918.

A brief history of the C. R. O. (Canadian Record Office) during WW I was published in the C. R.O. Bulletin, War Souvenir Number, Christmas 1918, from the Canadian Record Office, Green Arbour House, Old Bailey, EC4. This article details the make-up of the Canadian Record Office in London, catering to Pay & Record Services, together with expansion at the time to accommodate the thousands of Canadian troops arriving overseas. As a result, various functions were split in 1916 and an entirely new "Records Registry" was created as a separate establishment, thus the (R. R) in the handstamp illustrated.

Civil and Military Censorship During World War II

General - A digest type publication covering a very broad field which has been generally well researched during the 50 years since the events.

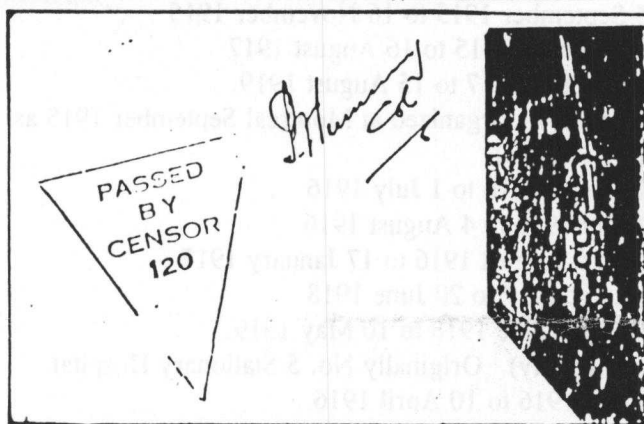
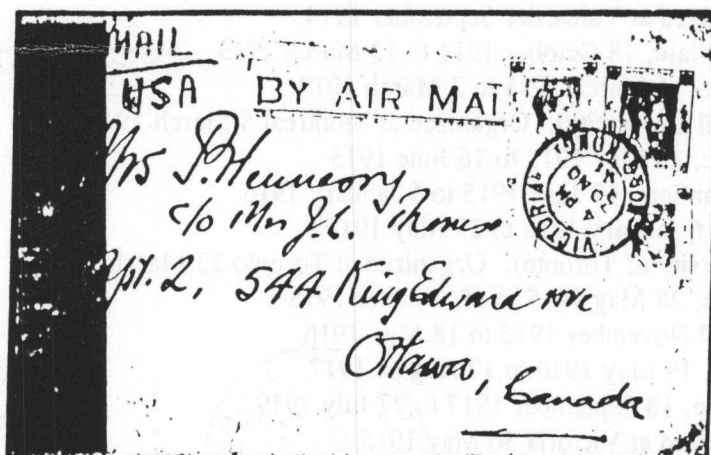
Treatment of Content (Authorship) - A condensed general overview of world-wide censorship during the period of World War II. It is generally adequate within the size of constraints of the book, and is clearly written.

Originality, Significance & Research (Philately) - There is no evidence of original research, but it is a good digest of information gathered from numerous cited detailed sources. The significance is marginal because of the lack of detail; eg. - page 107 fig. 55B was used by Canadian Forces in several locations in addition to Jamaica, such as Bahamas, British Guiana and Labrador. These are not mentioned.

Technical Matters (Editing) - Generally good, but perhaps too tight. Anyone requiring detailed information must still consult the source publications. There are a few errors of fact - eg. page 107 - Tombstone Marks - "the name of the ship" was never used, as this would defeat one of the main objects of the censorship.

Presentation (Publishing) - Generally good. A few scattered typos and grammatical errors, but these aren't serious, and proof-reading has been generally good. Typography is clear and readable, layout is good, binding is adequate and the book is quite useable.

FORCE "C" HONG KONG - by Ritch Toop



Col Patrick Hennessy, DSO, MC, was born 1 April 1885, County Cork, Ireland. He served during WW I and on 27 September 1939 enlisted in the RCASC. He was the Sr. Administrative officer with FORCE "C" comprising 96 officers and 1877 other ranks which sailed from Vancouver 27 October 1941 for Hong Kong.

The Japanese attacked Hong Kong 8 December and during the battle Col Hennessy was mortally wounded; he died 20 December. This letter dated Victoria, Hong Kong 20 November, was sent via the US Clipper and was censored with a British triangle PASSED / BY / CENSOR / 120. It is the only known cover from FORCE "C" bearing this censor number. Other censor numbers known used on Canadian mail are 113, 136, 137 and 138.

WORLD WAR ONE HOSPITALS

After the 2nd Division arrived in England medical units were organized as required. These eventually reached the following in number; 16 General, 10 Stationary, 7 Special and 8 Convalescent hospitals. Some of the Stationary and Convalescent hospitals were eventually converted into General hospitals. The following shows the date and place of organization and periods of operation for each unit.

MISCELLANEOUS HOSPITALS

The majority of the hospitals in the following list were British military hospitals taken over by Canadian personnel. After operating for a period under their original names they were organized into General Hospitals.

Military Hospital, Basingstoke.

4 April 1917 to 18 September 1917. No. 4 General Hospital upon its return from Salonika 18 September 1917, took over this institution.

Military Hospital, Kirkdale, Liverpool.

21 May 1917 to 13 October 1917. No. 5 General Hospital upon its return from Salonika 13 October 1917, took over this institution.

Shorncliffe Military Hospital, Shorncliffe.

25 July 1915 to 10 September 1917. At various times during its early career this hospital was staffed by personnel of No's 4 and 5 General Hospitals, No. 3 Casualty Clearing Station, and No. 7 Stationary Hospital. From June 1916 to September 1917, it was staffed by personnel from CAMC Depot.

No. 9 General Hospital was organized 10 September 1917, and took over this institution.

Kitchener Military Hospital, Brighton.

14 March 1917 to September 1917. No. 10 General Hospital was organized September 1917, and took over this institution.

Moore Barracks Military Hospital, Shorncliffe.

4 May 1915 to 13 September 1917. At various dates during its early career this hospital was staffed by personnel of No's 2 and 3 Casualty Stations, No. 3 Stationary Hospital and the CAMC Depot. No. 11 General Hospital was organized in September 1917, and took over this institution.

Bramshott Military Hospital, Bramshott.

29 September 1916 to 12 October 1917. During its early career this hospital was staffed by personnel of No. 9 Stationary Hospital. No. 12 General Hospital was organized in October 1917, and took over this institution.

Military Hospital, Eastbourne.

11 January 1917 to 10 September 1917. During its early career this hospital was staffed by personnel of No. 10 Stationary Hospital. No. 14 General Hospital was organized in September 1917, and took over this institution.

Hastings Military Hospital, Hastings.

1 January 1917 to 2 October 1917. During its early career this hospital was staffed by personnel of No.'s 1 and 8 Stationary Hospitals. No. 13 General Hospital was organized in October 1917, and took over this institution.

Duchess of Connaught's Canadian Red Cross Hospital, Taplow.

16 December 1914 to 10 September 1917. This hospital was originally staffed by personnel of No. 1 Casualty Clearing Station and the CAMC Depot. In September 1917 it was reorganized as No. 5 General Hospital.

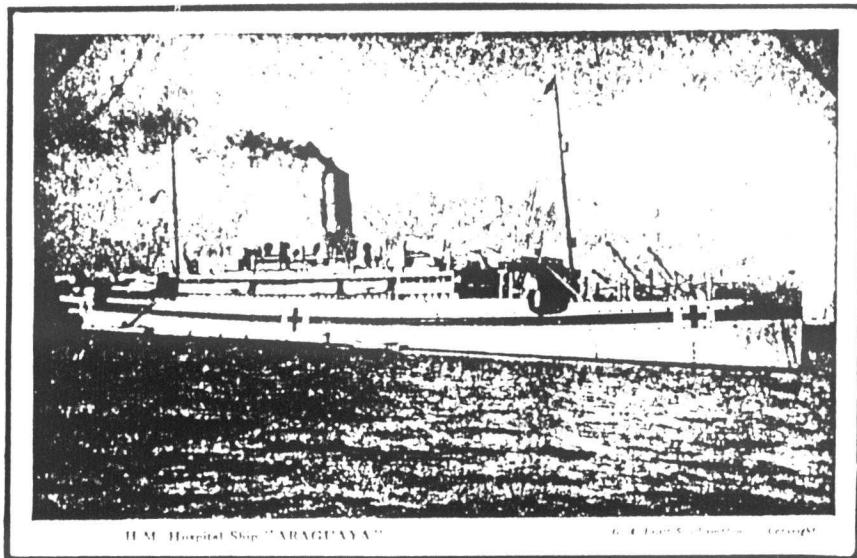
Ontario Military Hospital, Orpington.

19 February 1916 to 10 September 1917. This hospital was first staffed by personnel from the CAMC Depot. In September 1917 it was reorganized as No. 16 General Hospital.
