
OPERATION APOLLO

The Canadian Armed Forces have recently been despatched to participate in the American-led coalition and campaign against terrorism in response to the attacks on the twin World Trade Centres in New York and Washington's Pentagon on September 11, 2001. A naval task force of several frigates, a supply ship, and a destroyer have already been deployed, along with six air force planes (three transports, one Airbus, and two maritime patrol planes), and troops from the Canadian army's special forces. Some 2,000 personnel will be involved in the operation.

Troops will undergo a six-month deployment in the Persian Gulf. They will be engaged in surveillance, airlift support, humanitarian assistance, as well as technical, carrier, and flank support. We would like to wish them all the very best and hope that their operations are successful. We also hope that they come back home safely and without any major incident. [Specific details have been withheld given the ongoing domestic problems within the U.S. Although several details have been publicly announced, I cannot help but remember the Second World War adage of "Loose Lips Sink Ships"! I am sure members will agree. Ed.]




THE CANADIAN NILE VOYAGEURS (1884-85): FURTHER NOTES--By J.C. Campbell and H.M. Street

The story of the Canadian Nile Voyageurs (1884-85) has been well recorded in the references listed below and it is a most interesting and action-filled account. Ref's. (1) and (2) by the late E.A. Richardson, OTB provide an excellent synoptic view of the event with the philatelic aspect an additional feature. Other reference material does not, of course, include the latter. Cards and covers from, and to, members of the expedition are of considerable interest to collectors but of little consequence to the general public. Not many are in collectors' hands [members will be familiar with Surgeon-Major John L.H. Neilson-addressed covers. Ed.].

The Canadian Contingent comprised 373* officers and men. Of the latter, few were members of the military; most being civilian boatmen who were engaged in the handling of the boats being utilized to carry soldiers and their supplies for the Relief of Khartoum. In the above total 92 were recruited in Manitoba and of these, 30 were of Canadian Indian extraction. The Contingent sailed on S.S. Ocean King from Montreal on September 16, 1884 and arrived at Alexandria, Egypt on October 7, 1884.

It was September 1-3 at BNAPEX '83 in Winnipeg, Manitoba, that Mike Street (then <u>Topics</u> Editor), and this writer, arranged to drive north to East Selkirk, Manitoba to view some grave sites thought to be connected with the Nile Contingent. Following an eighteen-kilometre drive we entered the grounds of St. Peter's Anglican Church, Dynevor, located on the east bank of the historic Red River.

On the south side of the church lay a large cemetery. After a brief search we located three graves whose headstones gave us the proof we sought. They read as follows:


"Boatman Alex Cochrane 1845-1927 Egyptian Exped. Force 'Lest We Forget'"


"Boatman Adam Cochrane 1849-1935 Egyptian Exped. Force 'Lest We Forget'"

These names are listed in Ref. (4) on pps. 259-60. The preceding photos are courtesy of Mike Street. The church, built in 1853, served the Saulteaux and Cree settlement established in 1834. It is still in use during the summer.

Two illustrations of covers may be found in Ref.'s (1) and (2), both from Canada to Egypt. We trust that readers will find these further notes of a little-known Canadian story interesting reading.


On a subsequent note, all 371* officers, men, and boatmen who had completed their term of engagement were subsequently awarded the Egypt campaign medal with "THE NILE 1884-85" clasp/bar. Forty-five also received the "KIRBEKAN" clasp/bar.


The preceding postcard postmarked APO 3 was from a Canadian Nursing Sister Irma van Bockstaele, a patient at Villa Tino. It was a hospital for nursing sisters, operated by the staff of Britain's No.24 General Hospital. At this time the Canadian Army Medical Corps had no facilities for caring for sick or injured Sisters. Later a ward for female patients was opened at No.8 Canadian General Hospital in Paris. The card bears an APO 3 dated December 17, 1916 (Boulogne).


LOSS OF C.P. COASTAL STEAMSHIP PRINCESS MARGUERITE IN AUGUST 1942--By W. Whitehouse

Early in 1924 Canadian Pacific Coastal Service awarded a contract to John Brown & Co. of Clydebank, Scotland, for the building of two passenger ships, 350 feet long, 60 feet wide, with a displacement of roughly 5900 tons. Both were powered by steam turbines and capable of 21 knots as their service speed.

These two ships would be named <u>Princess Kathleen</u> and <u>Princess Marguerite</u>. Both were strikingly handsome ships with luxurious accommodation; more like ocean liners than coastal vessels.

Princess Kathleen arrived at Victoria, B.C. on February 15, 1925, while Princess Marguerite arrived on April 20, 1925. Both ships were assigned to the West Coast Triangle run. On May 29, 1939, Princess Marguerite sailed from Vancouver with Their Majesties King George VI and Queen Elizabeth aboard for their trip to Victoria; their last stop on the cross-Canada Royal Tour.

In 1941, after being requisitioned for war service, the two ships sailed for Esquimalt on September 7 to receive a refit preparing them for war service and the voyage across the Pacific to the Mediterranean Theatre. In November the ships sailed from Esquimalt to Australia via Honolulu, then on to the Dutch East Indies and the Indian Ocean, where they were fortunate enough to avoid Japanese warship patrols.

On August 17, 1942, in convoy from Egypt to Cyprus, <u>Princess Marguer-ite</u> was torpedoed, set afire, and sank some time later. Thanks to the Royal Navy Destroyer escorts, loss of life was very low. No official mention of the loss was made until January 1945.

Meanwhile her sister ship, $\underline{\text{Princess Kathleen}}$, ranged far and wide over the Aegean and Mediterranean Seas for the remainder of the war and returned safely to the West Coast.

A SECOND WORLD WAR FIELD SERVICE CARD -- By C.D. Sayles

Field Service Cards were commonly used during the First World War, but these two examples from the Second World War are the first I have seen. The printing information on both is identical:

"Forms/A2042/7.
Wt. 18709/314. 45,000M 7/41. W. & S. Ld. 51-726. 192326F."

I take this to mean that 45 million copies of Army Form A2042/7 were printed by W. & S. Ltd. in July 1941. Why are these cards so uncommon if 45 million were printed? Can anyone show other examples or tell us why or how these cards were used by the troops?







- No.5 St. Dunstan's and the Great War No.10 Soldiers' Mail and the Army Post Office




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Dear CMMSG Members:
