

GREAT WAR NURSING SISTER MAIL--By Colin Pomfret

This re-directed cover to Nursing Sister Miss Bessie I. Beyer was sent from St. Catharines, Ontario on January 21, 1918.



It was sent to her at the Sick Sisters Hospital, St. Cloud, France and was finally directed to the Bank of Montreal, Cockspur St., London, England.

The Sick Sisters Hospital was a ward of No.8 Canadian General Hospital for ailing nursing sisters, and was located at St. Cloud (a suburb of Paris, France).

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
A cover to Canadian N/S H.C. Claxton at the British Convalescent Home for Nurses follows. It bears the "APO S.X.6/25 JU 17" dater (Vertekop),



a "BAPO X/29 JU 17" (backstamp) from Salonika. It also has the "APO S.X.4/ 1 JY 17" of Kalamaria.

The cover was re-directed to "V Can. Gen." and was stamped there "NOT AT NO 5/CAN. GEN. HOSP'L" [Fire-brace #CAH 31.Ed.].

It was subsequently redirected from there "c/o Prin. Matron/86 Strand/ England".



The above card, postmarked "APO S.7/2 FE 18" of Marseilles, France, was self-censored by Nursing Sister F.A. Page who was a patient at a Nursing Sisters' Convalescent Home in Cannes. Several homes were opened on the French Riviera and offered hospitality to 327 sisters.

BAILEY & TOOP: UPDATES -- By George Sawatzki

Reviewing some of my reference material, I came across a few older copies of The Three Penny Beaver. Of interest were the Canadian Forces Europe Postal Unit cancels.

Checking Vol. II of the Canadian Military Postal Markings by W.J. Bailey & E.R. Toop, I found a listing for the one cancel. On p.751 the following

information describes the one example at left:

Number: M21-138 Proofed: Unknown Size: 38mm Rarity Factor: D

The cancel below shows a bilingual centre hub which is not listed. This may be of interest to the Study Group members or any subsequent updates.





The last Newsletter made me look through some of my Second World War material, and what follows are a couple of discoveries I made that may be worthwhile commenting on. Both of these covers seem to have some differences with the Bailey & Toop references (ie. Canadian Military Posts, Vol. II; and Canadian Military Postal Markings, Vol. II).

FPO 453: Dated AU 4/41 (1 Cdn. Corps Supply Point). Issued 18.7.40. At the $\overline{\text{U.K.}}$ (5.8.41)-(6.12.41) and (30.3.43)-(21.10.43). From Gnr. T.R. Sullivan. D-10911, F.S. Bty. (Flash Spotting Battery), 1 Survey Regt., RCA. It bears a purple 6.5mmx65mm "1 SURVEY REGT. R.C.A." Orderly Room marking. Cancel Type: D1; Cancel No.: M15-141. In this case, the "AU 4/41" date indicated on the cover suggests an earlier first used date than that noted in Bailey & Toop.

FPO 320: Dated DE 14/43 (HQ, Canadian Reinforcement Units, Borden, Hants). The history of hammer D1 is noted in Candian Military Posts, Vol.II as: "Issued 30.6.40. Returned for repair 26.11.43 and re-issued 2.2.44, returned 4.2.46". The reverse of the cover bears two purple Orderly Room/ Commanding Officer markings. The FPO 320 date of "DE 14/43" would suggest that the hammer was used while it was being repaired.


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SECOND WORLD WAR CIVIL-CENSORED--By J.C. Campbell

[Although the following cover is not, technically, military in nature, it does provide some interesting insights into the special case of Japanese



residents in Canada.Ed.]

Shalath, British Columbia is on the north shore of Seton Lake, a few miles west of Lillooet. The cover, dated June 10, 1944 was sent from "S.Nuffiwa? of Bridge River, B.C." to a "Mr. H. Tanabe, Westwold, B.C.". A letter, in Japanese, was enclosed which I forwarded to specialist William E. Topping in the hopes that he might be able to translate. He kindly wrote: "At last I have a translation of the letter. There is modern Japanese, pre-war Japanese, and Samari (turn-of-the-century Japanese) which is no longer used. It is written in the latter, which may account for the double censor markings. The letter...confirms what I had expected, that Mr. Tanabe owned an orchard near Westwold, and he employed Japanese to help with the work.


The cover itself is from the Shalath/Bridge River settlement which was a group of Japanese, mainly from the Vancover Island logging area, who moved

on their own and took over the Bridge River mining camp. They appear to have had money as most of the mail from Bridge River is addressed to topend stores in Vancouver. Both censorship markings were applied in Vancouver and DB299 probably read Japanese. I cannot make out the sender's name but it could be "Nishimura", but I am only guessing...".


The following picture postcard of "Spuzzum Bridge" was sent from Hope, B.C. June 3, 1943 and arrived in West Summerland, B.C. on June 5, 1943. Because of the source, and destination, it was internally censored. Note part of the message reads: "...Met the mountie[,] he is very nice. No red

tape."




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NIAGARA CAMP, 1906 -- By Colin Pomfret



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
The previous card was sent from "Jack" at Niagara Camp. He was with the 20th Lorne Rifles, Company 7. The 7th Company was headquartered at Milton, Ontario. Note the card was posted from Toronto, so it may have been taken there by steamer.



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
ALDERSHOT CAMP, 1917 -- By James Felton

This card, believed to be dated from June 1917, shows an interesting unit: the "Nova Scotia Forestry Depot".[According to J.C. Hopkins' <u>Canada at War</u> (1919), by July 1918, 40 Forestry Companies were working in <u>Great Britain</u> and 60 in France, with a total of 30,000 men employed who delivered 100,000,000 feet of lumber in France by that date! P.191.Ed.]



STADACONA AND HMCS SKEENA -- By A.D. Hanes

Although the square POCON from <u>Stadacona</u> has been in use some time before 1999, the round postmark is relatively a newer cancellation type.



A commemorative cover from <u>HMCS Skeena</u> follows. The first day of November 1993 is the day proudly celebrating the paying off of the ship. Laid down in June 1951 at the Burrard Drydock, Vancouver, B.C. and commissioned on March 30, 1957, <u>Skeena</u> was the fifth of the St. Laurent class of anti-submarine destroyers.

Skeena was commissioned a second time in August 1965 after a thirteen-month refit at the Davie Shipyards in Lauzon, Quebec. This refit included the addition of a variable depth sonar, helicopter hangar, and flight deck.





This Air Letter departed Meaford, Ontario on July 13, 1945. It arrived in the Netherlands on July 20, 1945 as per the CDS "FPO T.C. 3".

The "S.O.S. TO CANADA" auxiliary handstamp is in pink denoting, of course, "struck off service/strength".


There are various readdresses, then finally to Camp Borden, Ontario (the C.A.P.F. Base).

There is also another auxiliary marking "NO TRACE P.T.?" in pink. The mark has a light "S" denoting "Postal

Tracing Section".

The most interesting CDS postmark is the one on reverse "P.T.S./PM/AU 29/45/C.A.P.F."

Commander HQ ISAF Kabul - Afghanistan 64298 Darmstadt Feldpost



AROOSTOOK WAR, 1839 (EX. STEINHART)

Each is from Benjamin Howlett, No.1124, Pte. Soldier, 69th Regiment. Lot 1231 realized SF4,500 and lot 1232 reached SF2,100 (+18% buyers' premium)!.
