




HAITIAN EARTHQUAKE RELIEF -- By Jerome C. Jarnick

On January 12, 2010 Haiti was struck by an earthquake measuring 7.3 on the Richter Scale, with the epicenter located about 15 km. from the centre of the capital city of Port au Prince.

According to Red Cross estimates, some three million people were affec-[Cont'd.]

ted by the quake. A Joint-Task Force Haiti was established, under the command of Brigadier General Guy Laroche to provide emergency relief. The destroyer <u>H.M.C.S. Athabaskan</u>, with a Sea King helicopter detachment, was despatched to Léogâne for the operation. CFPO 5054 was opened to support the task force.



The Disaster Assistance Response Team (D.A.R.T.) was based at the resort city of Jacmel, about 35 km. southwest of Port au Prince. The team was equipped to purify water, provide medical assistance, and provide some engineering aid. CFPO 5046 was opened in Jacmel to support Canadian personnel. The frigate $\underline{\text{H.M.C.S. Halifax}}$ supplied Jacmel by speed boats because of the condition of the port.

At the peak the components of the task force comprised about 2,050 personnel of the maritime, land, and air components divided between Port au Prince, Léogâne, and Jacmel. Air operations were based at Toussaint Louverture International Airport at Port au Prince and the municipal airfield at Jacmel.

CAMP BORDEN REGISTERED PARCEL TAG RE-VISITED -- By Mike Street

I believe that Colin Pomfret's registered parcel tag (NL#196, Aug. 2010, pp. 1120-1121) was not for a parcel. According to the notes and comments in BNA Topics (Whole No. 505, Oct.-Dec. 2005, p.70 and references) after approximately 1921 with only a very few exceptions (ballot boxes being one), parcels could not be registered. Colin's item was thus a bag of some sort weighing between one and two ounces which was mailed at the double first class rate (3c + 2c = 5c + 10c registration). The item was most likely a souvenir or forget-me-not. Since it was registered, I suspect that it may have been a "sweetheart pin" or something similar.



UNUSUAL CENSORSHIP FROM THE 4TH CANADIAN DIVISION--By Colin Pomfret

The following cover, from the 4th Canadian Division H.Q., bears two different types of censor handstamps. Type 4 (#4203) is associated with the 54th Canadian Infantry Battalion and Type 5 (#844) is connected with the 4th Canadian Division H.Q. The cover also bears an "F.P.O. D.W.5/X/NO 21/16" datestamp.

The reason for this unusual usage appears to have occurred because the Divisional Headquarters had received the new Type 5 censor handstamp but had not yet passed on the other device to the lower units.

Frank Daniel states that the witch-over date was approximately November 5, 1916. This cover dates it around November 19 (at least for this Division).




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
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
OPERATION PODIUM--By Robert Toombs










A SPECIAL ENVELOPE FOR A SPECIAL CARD: 1943 CHRISTMAS GREETINGS TO FORCE "C"--Robert Henderson

A unique mailing envelope for Prisoner of War Post is presented here, with it having been produced specifically for the Canadian Prime Minister's Office to send 1943 Christmas greetings to Canadians held as prisoners of war--in this case, presumably still being held in Japan.

The colour is off-white, with all printing in black except as noted. A penciled initial is located at the top left of the address. The censor stamp ("EXAMINED BY D. B/" bears an additional "650" in pencil. To the right centre is a blue pencil marked "S" [signifying Sham Shui Po Camp, northwest of Kowloon.Ed.], and the Japanese P.O.W. control stamp or "chop" at the lower right is also in black. The oval, at the bottom of the hash marks, is in the usual red.




With free postage and being directed to the Japanese Red Cross, the Canadian Government no doubt expected a rapid delivery of the above letter to the recipient. Private Rutherford received the card on September 15, 1944; though it would have been intended that he receive it for Christmas 1943.

There can be little doubt that the only reason it was delivered was the source of the letter in combination with using the Japanese Red Cross in the delivery.

It was Private Rutherford's good fortune to survive the war and return


to Canada after his horrific experience. This card was one of his prized souvenirs from his time as a prisoner. [Members will know, as noted by at least two of our Study Group specialists, Ken Ellison and C. Ron Mc-Guire, that these special Christmas cards were sent to members of "Force C" in 1942, 1943, and 1944. One of Ken's cards, depicted in his The Canadian Army's Hong Kong Story, 1941-1945 (BNAPS Exhibits Series No.8, p.43), had similar delivery delays and the card wasn't received until February 1945 at Oeyama Camp (it too was dated Christmas 1943). Ron's telling "The Postal History of Canada's World War II Hong Kong Field Force," in Stampex Canada Exhibition Programme (Stamp Exhibitions Canada, Inc., Downsview, Ontario, 1982), notes that few of these cards were ever received. One can only imagine the severe psychological effects upon prisoners (among other unspeakable horrors) that delayed or non-existent mail had upon them.Ed.]



1942 "S.O.I." ADDRESS: AN ENQUIRY--By Robert Henderson

I'm illustrating a patriotic cover that I've had quite a spell, but I've never been able to ascertain what the fourth line of the address represents. So that is a question for members and any help would be appreciated.

The Regimental Number "K.75980" indicates "Unallotted Infantry, "A.3" is a specific barrack area of Camp Shilo, while "C.A.T.C." respresents the Canadian Armoured Training Centre" [Bailey & Toop note it as the "Summer Army Camp.Ed.]. But what does "S.O.(I)" indicate? [Perhaps "Signal Operation Instruction"? Members' help would be most welcome.Ed.]
