



I have sent some images of "Camp Hughes Day" which was hosted on October 2 by the "Friends of Camp Hughes". Approximately 240 people participated in six guided tours of the training trenches. Twelve volunteers from the Military History Society of Manitoba helped with the tours and informative stops along the way.

In a tent nearby, displays included archaeological findings from the area, a Vickers machine gun from the Winnipeg Rifles Museum, and I had a display of the operations of the Canadian Postal Corps from the Militia-era camps to the 1915-1916 Great War C.E.F. training camps.






ANOTHER LOOK AT THE "WHITEHOUSE" R.C.N. CENSORS--By Colin Pomfret








WHITEHOUSE TYPE 1b


WHITEHOUSE TYPE 1c ("FROM H.M.C. SHIP" REMOVED)






WHITEHOUSE TYPE 2a ("C" OF H.M.C. SHIP REMOVED)


WHITEHOUSE TYPE 2b (OLD WHITEHOUSE TYPE 4) DISTORTED STAMP





THIS NEW TYPE IS RECOGNIZED BY THE SLOPING LINES IN THE "M" OF H.M.C. SHIP AND THE SMALL "Y" IN BY CENSOR.

A COVER POSTED FROM H.M.C.S. GEORGIAN, A MINE-SWEEPER, WAS COMMISSIONED IN TORONTO ON SEPTEMBER 23, 1941, AND ARRIVED IN HALIFAX ON OCTOBER 13. AFTER COMPLETING WORK-UPS SHE WAS ASSIGNED TO THE SYDNEY FORCE. IN JANUARY SHE JOINED THE NEWFOUNDLAND FORCE AND REMAINED WITH IT UNTIL FEBRUARY 1944 WHEN SHE CROSSED THE ATLANTIC FOR DUTIES CONNECTED WITH THE INVASION OF EUROPE. GEORGIAN WAS PAID OFF AT SYDNEY OCTOBER 23 AND LAID UP AT SHELBURNE UNTIL SOLD FOR SCRAP.

THE BNAPS CATALOGUE OF CANADIAN MILITARY MAIL MARKINGS VOL. II: THE WORLD WAR II ERA, 1936-1945: A REVIEW

The above volume follows C. Douglas Sayles' Volume III (2006) in the ongoing series and concentrates on military postmarks and markings from 1936 through to 1945 and the end of the Second World War. The author decided years ago to compile, edit, and update the previous works by W.J. "Bill" Bailey and E.R. "Ritch" Toop (B&T), so that recent discoveries could be included within a contemporary series.

Volume II follows a similar format as that contained in Volume III and includes a table which cross-references catalogue numbers used in B&T to the "new" BNAPS catalogue numbers (in Appendix 2). Volume II is divided into five chapters (7-11) which deal with Base Post Offices; MPO's in Canada; MPO's in Alaska and Newfoundland; MPO's in the U.K., Europe, Africa, and India; and internment and POW camps in Canada.

The three other appendices are useful additions and deal with Canadians abroad (lacking Canadian postal service); the ten postage meters used by military units (Appendix 3); and a section on the BCATP (Appendix 4).

One of the several major strengths of Volume II is the quality of the illustrations. Many of them have been scanned using today's modern technology and some have been "cleaned up" to ensure the very best possible quality. This will greatly enhance research now and in the future.

Although there have been hundreds of additional markings added in this volume which greatly complement the previous works by B&T, the author admits that not all known markings have been included. Markings known only as proof or favour strikes have not been included. This is unfortunate as their addition would not have been onerous and they are important facets to Canadian military postal history. The proof or favour strikes related to "Z Force" (the FPO Z hammers) are some of the rarest of postal markings associated with the Second World War. Items from "Force C" and some censor markings are also excluded (even though they have been included in B&T).

It is also somewhat unusual that a work of this magnitude did not include a bibliography. While many military postal historians will immediately recognize the frequent usage of "Daynes" as a source for many non-Canadian items (the late John Daynes—a well-known British author of military postal history), some may not. A bibliography would have been a nice addition and helpful for collectors and students to pursue further research.

Despite some of the minor misgivings noted above, Volume II is a tremendous effort and should be on most collectors' bookshelves. Collectors will still require B&T for their comprehensive knowledge of Canadian military postmarks and postal markings, but this volume will update previous editions and greatly add to a contemporary study of military mail.

IN MEMORIAM: C. DOUGLAS SAYLES, P. ENG.



CMMSG Chairman and Treasurer, Clinton Douglas Sayles, P. Eng. (Nov. 6, 1945-Jan. 15, 2012), sadly passed away after a brief illness in his 67th year. Loving husband of Mary Jane (née Reich) and dear brother of Bernice Rohe (Bill) of Whitby. Doug leaves to mourn his various family members and many friends and past co-workers. He was predeceased by his parents Clinton and Georgina Sayles.

Doug was a retired engineer with Atomic Energy Canada Ltd. His interest in Canadian military mail culminated in his election as the CMMSG's Chairman and Treasurer at the London, Ontario BNAPEX in 2003. Doug compiled and edited the BNAPS Catalogue of Military Mail Markings Volume II: The World War II Era, 1936-1945 (2011), and Volume III: From Victory in 1945 to Afghanistan (2006).

Doug's interest in research and writing on various military mail areas led to his first BNAPS E.R. "Ritch" Toop Award in 2002 for his article "Dieppe: Before and After" within BNA Topics. He also received the Award in 2007 for Volume III noted above. He contributed many articles to Topics as well as to our own Newsletter. Doug was the Editor of BNA Topics from 2006-2008, when illness forced him to relinquish his position. As Editor Doug introduced the popular semi-regular feature "Matters Military" in Topics Whole No. 511 which still continues. At the time of his death Doug was working on his first volume of the catalogue series covering Canadian military postal markings before 1936.

Doug will also be remembered for his beautiful gardens and custom wood projects. He was an avid amateur historian, loved sailing, and was involved in the Canadian Warplane Heritage Bolingbroke restoration project.
