


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#LK 198, a four-engine Stirling bomber, failed to return from oper-



ations dropping secret agents and supplies. P/O Barnicke has no known grave but his name is inscribed on the Runnymede War Memorial, Engle-field Green, Egham, Surrey, England.

Also lost were P/O (N) Lloyd William Nelson, F/S R.A. Best, P/O L.A. Ouellette. Three of the crew were non-Canadians who were missing, believed killed [Allison/Hayward, p. 34].

No. 9 Bombing and Gunnery School, Mont Joli, Ouebec, operated from December 15, 1941 to April 14, 1945. [Dunmore, p. 356]. The cover bears the MPO #502 CDS dated October 30, 1943 (hammer in use from April 1, 1943 until April 16, 1945)[B&T, p. 185]. Sayles denotes the hammer usage from April 1, 1943 to April 15, 1945 [p. 93].

The story of No. 9 B&G also includes interesting controversy as well. Senator Jules A. Brillant, who had extensive land holdings in Rimouski (some ten miles from Mont Joli), called for the establishment of the air training school. By 1942 the base had almost six hundred pilot and bombardier trainees and was one of the largest bases among the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan.

Rimouski's archbishop, Monseigneur Georges Courchenes, had voiced opposition to the establishment of the base at Mont Joli due to a personal conflict and rival moral authority with Brillant in the area. Despite his opposition, civilian authorities and the public supported the base and its occupants [Greenfield, pp. 193-194].

On October 11, 2012 Canada Post Corporation issued several booklets and a souvenir sheet (illustrated below) featuring The Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) of Canada, The Royal Regiment of Canada, and The Royal Hamilton Light Infantry. All of these regiments had early beginnings in 1862 and were formed, in part, to ward against a perceived threat from invasion by the United States as it was engaged in its Civil War. The stamps depict various regimental uniforms throughout their history. One hopes that this will be a series to highlight Canada's regimental heritage.

It was decided that Dean Mario would remain as the <u>Newsletter</u> Editor with the additional duty of Treasurer.

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
The meeting concluded with a show and tell and a Q&A session which was helpful to a number of our members; both old and new".






H.M.C.S. AVALON, ST. JOHN'S, NEWFOUNDLAND: POSTAL MARKINGS "COLLECTED", OCTOBER 1945--By Paul Binney

We have all entered a post office at some point in our lives, passed an envelope or card across the counter, and asked for the postmaster to provide strikes of all their postal markings. These make nice "collection" items that also provide a snapshot in time of the markings avail-

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able (if not always used) in a given post office. The other feature of this type of cover is that the postmaster usually cleans the marking and takes care to provide a "perfect" strike.

In effect, this process was followed by Gustav J. Lund on the following item. Lund was a collector of paquebot mail and the reason for his acquiring a "collectible" from a Canadian Naval Post Office may just reflect a wartime interest in other "maritime mail". As a result of his efforts we have a series of clear impressions of some of the devices extant in the Fleet Mail Office at Avalon on October 15, 1945 after the end of the Second World War. Some of these markings are easily understood, but one marking in particular may shed some light on usage of the GPO triangles. Each marking will be dealt with in turn. The cover is shown full size. All markings are struck in red and, from the condition of the cover, it is most likely that it travelled in a "carrier cover" back to Lund in California.



POSTAL MARKINGS

Avalon F.M.O.

Frith's Type PM5 marking, 29mm ring with coloured slug where time indicia should be located and serif lettering. Marking is shown near the end of its known period of use (August 18/45-October 27/45) [1].

G.P.O. Triangle

Type 5 GPO marking with clear cut in base [2]. The inclusion of this

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marking in an Avalon suite of marks raises some interesting questions. These particular triangles were used at least in the period from September 1944 to March 1945 and were placed on mail originating at Avalon where an extra service such as air mail, registration, or special delivery had been paid for by the sender.

It has always been suggested that the markings were struck at the General Post Office in St. John's upon the transfer of appropriate fees to the civilian post office. This mark appears to demonstrate that in the latter part of the war [or much after war's end.Ed.] at least some of the triangle markings were applied at FMO Avalon and NOT at the General Post Office. This would have entailed an accounting of money collected at Avalon and perhaps a periodic tranfer of these funds to the G.P.O.

This marking with a cut in the base from Avalon once again raises the question "why the cut in the base"? Triangle markings are seen both with and without the cuts. Were the markings with cuts used to identify postal employees at Avalon and thus provide a "paper trail" in case any accounting issues arose?

<u>Air Mail</u>

A typical boxed air mail marking not commonly used but seen on some mail from Halifax and other naval post offices.

ORDERLY ROOM AND OTHER OFFICE MARKINGS

H.M.C.S. Avalon

Most likely an office marking used to direct internal mail. This mark appears in the post-war period on philatelic covers usually in conjunction with an Avalon F.M.O. PM7 marking [3].

FMO

Most likely used as a marking for mail bag tags or similar items.

Fleet Mail Office

This marking may have been used during the war on official mail originating at the Fleet Mail Office, but it is more commonly seen in the post-war period struck on philatelic mail.

As always, more information on some of the "office" markings would add to our knowledge of this postal facility. Opinions as to the meaning of the G.P.O. triangle marking are also sought. [Paul raises an interesting point with regards to the "GPO triangles" having been possibly used at Avalon. However, given the date of the cover and the fact that markings may have been simply transferred given a reduction in security measures after the war's end, may not necessarily indicate that the triangles were used at Avalon throughout the war. Members' opinions are solicited.Ed.]

On August 23, 1918 John Hales, now Captain, was killed-in-action while serving with 203 Squadron, R.A.F.

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
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GREETINGS FROM RUSSIA--By Ken Ellison
