Secretary's report - Annual meeting

The annual meeting of the Perfins Study group was held at the annual BNAPs convention in dearborn, Michigan on 30August 1986. In the absence of Dave Hanes, Jim cAtterick, editor of the Perforator, chaired the meeting.

Mike Hargraft, the new secretary-treasurer, was introduced, and each member present introduced himself - there were 12 in attendance. The treasurer's report was given reporting a balance of \$428.60 It was moved, seconded, and passed that annual dues remain at \$5.00 for 1987. one member present actually took Mike' suggestion to heart and paid his '87 dues on the spot. We also welcome two new members - Ed Whiting and Basil Burrell.

Jim continued with the agenda with a few comments on the 4 perforators still known to be in use - LA, and CNR Winnipeg, Edmonton, and Vancouver; he handed out sheets on "collecting aspects" and made a few commentson the results of his survey about collectors' interests. Jim mentioned that the count of stamps perforated as already listed in the Perforator is creating great interest - the c15 listing has resulted in 43 more stamps being reported! CPR's have yet to be tackled but this is coming up soon. It was mentioned that we will try to list the designs with H and I rarity factors first rather than attempt an alphabetical approach. Jim asked the membership to be careful in listing M15 and M16, two very similar perfins

In the "Show and Tell" portion of the program, we were treated to a series of items from Dave Hanes' collection on the W.J.Gage Perfins, also shown were 8 clock positions on some of the cGE designs, some mirror pairs, and some Perfins with random holes- and all of these provoked lively discussion. Some covers were displayed and their identification discussed.

Finally, Jim presented Michael Behm's squared paper inventory sheets for us all to see, and we were all agreed that this is a significant contribution to the inventory problem.

The meeting adjourned after a very informative hour - until next year.

I holidayed in England early this summer and thought that it would be a good public relations gesture to call on Study Group members living there. Took three names with me, two currently listed and one formerly, and as their addresses were all in the Greater London area, it seemed an easy matter to contact them all as I was staying in Lewes, Sussex, just 60 miles away and a quick one hour trip on the frequent electric trains.

On enquiring for their phone numbers, I was only able to obtain that of
Rev. David Izzett of Hamel Hampstead, some 25 miles NW of central London, the
others were not listed. I phoned Rev. Izzett and arranged for a visit. He
came to the station to meet me, took me to his home where we had an enjoyable
chat and I was able to see his collection of Canadian perfins. They are in
five albums, each page beautifully written up, a feat that would have taken
hours and hours in itself, and each stamp attractively mounted on the page.
I was impressed with the good representation of the scarcer perfins and while
I have seen no other collection of Canadian perfins in Great Britian, would
venture to say there is none over there to beat his, quite a feat when you
consider the difficulty he must have in obtaining Canadian perfins in England.

During the course of our conversation, he told me about the other two collectors who I had hoped to see. Maurice Gough, who lived at Watford, just three stations before Hemel, was in ill health and had moved to Dumferline in Scotland. Robert Taquair, who had lived in Sloane Court, London, was now back in Canada and mainly interested in precancels.

Rev. Izzett showed me his duplicates and I couldn't believe that he had two Queen Victoria Jubilees amoung them. They were perfin Sl3 - 20¢. I have always wanted a Jubilee with a perfin for my collection and was so pleased that I was able to obtain one. He has three different Jubilees in his Sl3 collection, including the elusive 2¢.

Rev. Izzett mentioned that he was expecting a letter from a Canadian dealer, H.G. Walburn. I told him I also dealt with Mr. Walburn and while I was there, the post came and in it was the letter from Geoff. quite a coincidence I thought.

At the conclusion of our philatelic ramblings, Mrs. Izzett joined us, on the patio in the back garden, for a very delightful luncheon which she had prepared, and then Rev. Izzett took me back to the station.

I thoroughly enjoyed making contact, a few thousand miles from home, with a fellow study group member.

While in England I called on many stamp dealers in Brighton, London and Eastbourne, enquiring about Canadian perfins and drew a blank with all. The closest I came was in a small shop in Eastbourne, in the station precincts, where I was shown an envelope of about a dozen perfins of various countries, (no Canadian) that they set aside for a collector, who came in twice a year to pick them up. I had more success with postal stationery, another segment of my Canadian philatelic interest, as I was able to pick up a few items.
