The Chairman's Chatter Manual and Mark Fennell

This heading is no doubt far from original but as it came to mind am going to use it.

Attended BNAPS 91, at the end of August in Vancouver, the 43rd Annual Convention of the Society, and also the Perfin Study Group Annual Meeting which was held in conjunction with the convention. This article is going to deal with our study group meeting, and in subsequent articles other aspects of the convention will be covered.

In the absence of Floyd McNey, who was unable to attend, our meeting was chaired by Jon Johnson. Those attending-Barrie Clarke - Whangarei, New Zealand Mark Fennell - Saskatoon, SK Dave Harding - Victoria, BC Tom Hillman - Ottawa, ON Lorne James - Victoria, BC Jon Johnson - Calgary, AB Doug Lingard - Ottawa, ON

Jon stated that as the finances of the group were in good shape, thanks to the generosity of some members and as a result of auction proceeds, there was no need to raise dues for 1992 and it was agreed they should remain at \$5.00.

When the 4th edition of the handbook was printed in 1985, the intention was to reprint in 5 years time. However as the publisher has about a third of the original press run still on hand, there would be reluctance to print at this time. It is tentatively planned to reprint in 1995 with updates and corrections. Three sections that are badly out of date and need revising

Lorne James felt that the Perfin Factors A, B, and C were out of date and needed revising as auctions were quoting our original survey to assign a

higher scarcity to some perfins than was a fact and thus produce bids that were higher than they should be. He agreed to organize a new survey of these three factors.

This report was prepared from memory sometime after the Study Group meeting so there may be errors, but as I recall it was Lorne who mentioned that a friend showed him an item that had been found in the back of an office desk drawer and it was the old A.E. Ames punch, now delisted. This lead to a discussion of perforators themselves and Dave wondered, if for the historical record, whether a list should be made of the known whereabouts of any existing machines, be it in the Postal Museum or without. Mark gave a brief summary of efforts made years ago to track down some perforators, the result being that 3 were located but 1 has since been lost track of. No conclusion was reached in this regard.

The election of officers took place. As Floyd McNey had stated he did not wish to continue as chairman, yours truly was elected. Floyd had agreed to continue as editor of the Perforator, and as Mike Hargraft had not indicated he would not let his name stand for Secretary-Treasurer, they were elected. TO THESE POSITIONS.

Jon concluded the meeting with a very interesting presentation of CPR perfins, which were not the C49 to C53 perforators listed in the handbook, on other than Canadian stamps. No more will be said as it is hoped Jon will do a write up on this, with illustrations, for a future issue of the Perforator.

The new chairman thanked Jon for chairing the meeting and for his presention and thanked the study group members for attending.

After the meeting, Barrie gave us a novelty souvenir from 'down under' of a Frama label with a perfin thereon.

Just another item and that concerns our news letter. In speaking to Floyd he said he hoped to print an issue every two months, but that depended on there being enough material on hand to make it productive. At the final banquet of the convention, it was emphasized that the life blood of a study group was the newsletter as it is what keeps the group together and sustains interest. If you have not contributed an article to the Perforator before, would you please give consideration to so doing. Send your material to Floyd.

Mike Hargraft's excellent article, in Perforator Vol. 12 #5 on Perfin Factors A to D, reinforces Lorne James' remarks made at the annual meeting re this subject. For example L4 and L7, currently rated A, should only be found on no more than 3 stamps be it the same catalogue number or different catalogue numbers, yet they each exceed this number and should be rated B. After the survey is completed and tabulated, it may be found that many more adjustments need to be made. Most likely Lorne and Mike will work together on this survey and we will have results that will be of benefit to all and also make the next edition of the handbook that much more accurate.

In an accumulation that I purchased several months ago, I stumbled accross quite a unique philatelic item.


The item is an incomplete pattern C50 on the 2 cent Brown War Tax Stamp FWT 8 in position # 2. Not very scarce. When I looked at the postmark I was surprised to see a R.P.O. cancel. After consulting Ludlow's RPO catalog, I determined that the cancel was 0 - 335c RP 500*. This was a mis-spelled hammer used briefly in 1923. The cancel is "28/SP 11/23" "TRAIN No./SUB*. & SOO. R.P.O. "


This leaves me in quite a predicament. Does this item go into my Perfin; R.P.O. or Revenue collection? Well, I choose the former collection. Enclosed is a xerox copy of the item. Hope you can share this with others.

Letter to the Editor from Michael B. Dicketts

I really enjoyed reading Mark Fennell's excellent item on rarity factors in May's newsletter. This is a topic which continues to be talked about and one that we all have to face from time to time when either buying or selling material. To my way of thinking our present system is acceptable (and unlikely to change in value unless an exceptional 'find' of A or B material is uncovered), and only the market can determine the value of any one stamp, and then only AT THAT TIME AND PLACE. Typically, the prices realised at our next Group auction will tell everyone what certain its are currently worth.

Mark also asked for expressions of opinion on the open use of perforators at stamp shows. While I'm sympathetic towards his viewpoint, and have written in the past about the ethics of collector-created material, I feel the benefit of having a perforator at a show for all to see and examone outwayghts any 'creations' which eventually come on to the market. Fortunately, all perforators that are likely to be on public view are of designs which are quite common and have little temptation to the fraud artist.
