Write an article, send some information, an image of some interesting item or whatever you think others might like to see and read about.





PRECANCELLED STAMPS ON CANADIAN PARCELS


A domestic parcel post service had first been enacted in 1913 for shipping such items as farm and factory products, dry goods, hardware, stationery, seeds and bulbs, provided they did not exceed a weight of 11 pounds or 6 feet in length and girth combined. The monthly supplement to the Canadian Official Postal Guide for January 1918 permitted the use of precancelled stamps for this application. The directions stated:

"Pre-cancelled Stamps on Canadian Parcels — With a view to facilitating the handling and despatch of large quantities of matter mailed in conformity with Parcel Post Regulations at the larger cities in Canada, the Department has decided to authorize, on and after the 2nd January, 1918, and until further notice, the acceptance of all such matter when prepaid by means of pre-cancelled stamps of the 1, 2, 5, 7 and 10 cent denominations, under the following conditions:—

- "(a) Persons or firms desirous of using pre-cancelled postage stamps on articles mailed under Parcel Post Regulations must make application to the Postmaster at the place of mailing for the quantity of such stamps desired. Fifty dollars worth of pre-cancelled stamps is the least amount that may be purchased at one time.
- "(b) The postage on an article mailed under these conditions must be entirely prepaid by means of precancelled stamps, that is to say, no article will be accepted for mailing the postage on which is prepaid partly by means of pre-cancelled stamps and partly be means of ordinary postage stamps.
- "(c) All matter accepted under this arrangement must be presented for mailing in accordance with the Postmaster's directions."

The precancelled stamp values referenced were undoubtedly from the Admiral issue of 1912, though why the 20 and 50 cent values of 1912 were not included seems unclear. The 1 dollar Admiral was not issued until 1923.

A large part of a package from the Hudson's Bay Company, mailed to Kansas USA. Note at the right side the U.S. Post Office sticker with 5 cent Collect fee for international parcel deliveries. These days Amazon does the selling and Couriers do the delivery. The more things change the more they stay the same!
