### Statistical Data on the 2¢ Edward VII Dies

Horace Harrison has submitted the results of examination of the different dies found in a lot of 1438 cut squares of this issue (Webb EN17 through EN 17e).

He continues in a letter sent to Jim Webb, Pat Feiner (Higgins & Gage) and Scott:

"Of course, I have no way of knowing whether these Cut Squares were accumulated over the entire period of use of the King Edward envelopes, since the prevalence of wavy line machine cancels is overwhelming. What dated cancels there are, seem to predominate in the period of 1906 and 1907, but this would be normal as the use of machine cancels became ubiquitous as the period of use of the envelope extended. Based on the fact that Cut Squares from this lot were accumulated from the 1870's through the Queen Elizabeth era, I believe it is

logical to assume that the accumulation of Edward VII envelopes does run for the entire period of their use, and therefore this study should be statistically valid.

My reasoning behind the pricing which does not reflect the real scarcity is because the demand for the scarce dies does not begin to approach the demand for the standard envelope which was in common use. Prices for the rarer dies could be raised as the demand increases due to the additional publicity generated by the inclusion of the die varieties in the Webb Catalog. "

This painstaking and extensive study has produced extremely useful and interesting results. Provided the sample is reasonably representative of the envelopes used for the Edward Issue (see Mr. Harrison's comment above), die 1 is much commoner than any of the other 2¢ dies, and dies 3, 5 and 6 are so scarce that their relative scarcity is not well established statistically even when this large number of cut squares has been examined. Does anyone else have a large holding of the 2¢ Edward envelopes that could be checked?

#### The Canadian Pacific Express Freight Advice Postal Cards

In 1926 the Dominion Express Company (see Vol. 1, No. 6 of Postal Stationery Notes for a listing of their cards) changed its name to Canadian Pacific Express Company, and on most cards the freight advice was printed on the front of sheets four postal cards, rouletted between specifically for Canadian Pacific Express. These cards were in use until approximately 1959 when they were replaced by the flimsy multiple forms.

There are two main types of these prestamped cards and these types can be identified by a form number found on the upper part of the card. Both forms had a specific purpose.

- Form 186: These were used to inform the shipper that the article had not been picked up at the express office, and to ask for further instructions. Form 186 always had the printed slogan "When Remitting Use Canadian Pacific Express MONEY ORDERS"
- Form 161: These were used to inform the consignee that the shipment was at the express office to be picked up. From 1928 on, the form 161 cards had a Canadian Pacific Express shield on the front. This shield was changed in style and size on various cards. One card exists in French only, and several cards were bilingual for use in Quebec.

A few cards for special purposes were issued without form numbers, mainly on regular postal cards (not rouletted).

The different types of printed fronts of the Canadian Pacific Express Cards can be identified as follows:

- Type 1: "When Remitting Use Canadian Pacific Express MONEY ORDERS" on the right half of the card
- Type 2: "En faisant des remises envoyez un MANDAT D'ARGENT de la Canadian Pacific Express" on the right half of the card
- Type 3: "CANADIAN PACIFIC EXPRESS" in a large shield with a beaver on it on the right half of the card
- Type 4: "CANADIAN PACIFIC EXPRESS" in a small shield with a beaver on it on the left half of the card
- Type 5: "Canadian Pacific" in a large shield with a beaver on it and "EXPRESS" in a frame under it on the left half of the card
- Type 6: as for Type 5 but a small shield (bilingual)
- Type 7: a small shield as for Type 6, but on the right half of the card
- Type 8: "CANADIAN PACIFIC EXPRESS WORLD SERVICES" in a shield
- Type 9: No shield. Directions and money order rate table in green on the front. Freight advice on the back (Toronto Customs)

Type 10: No shield. Toronto Customs house shipment notification on the left half of the card
