#### BNAPEX'85

If you are planning to attend BNAPEX'85 remember the meeting of the Postal Stationery Group, Friday September 13th in the Waterton Room of the Westin Hotel in Calgary. There should also be time for general discussion so bring along items of special interest in any area of BNA stationery.

## HELP WANTED TO COMPILE STATIONERY PRICE INFORMATION

How are prices for BNA postal stationery changing? Has there been an increase in the number of copies of an item on the market? These are questions that may interest many members of the study group. For the commonest pieces of stationery it may not be possible to provide a good answer. However, many scarcer pieces sell at auction. Is there a member of the study group who receives a large number of auction catalogues with prices realized, and who would be willing to compile lists (item, sale, lot number, estimate and selling price) for publication once or twice a year in PSN? ## NEW POSTAL STATIONERY ISSUED

Postal rates in Canada were increased on June 24th. This has resulted in the release of four new items of Canadian Postal Stationery, 34¢ envelopes in the normal #8 and #10 sizes, a 34¢ postal card and a 68¢ aerogramme. Reports indicate that the new stationery was issued on July 15th, although I have not yet seen photocopies of the items postmarked with that date.

All the designs continue the previous "mail transportation" series. The #8 envelope (printed in yellow and olive-green, the multiple maple-leaf lining on the inside in yellow) shows a self-propelled rail car used on the Témiscouata Railway. The #10 envelope (printed in orange and maroon, the inside multiple maple-leaf lining in orange) depicts the ocean liner "Empress of Japan". The knives used for the envelopes are the same as those used for the previous 32¢ envelopes produced by Becon-Gage. A model T Ford used for carrying mail in Brantford is shown on the 34¢ postal card (printing in yellow and gray-brown).

The new aerogramme has a gray-blue background printed on two of its three panels. One of the three pictures of Stearman 4EM aircraft CF-AMB is printed in orange. The other two pictures of the aircraft are in gray, as is most of the wording. The denomination and the words "Air Letter" and "Aerogramme" are in red. The pictures of the aircraft and the "Canada 68" are smaller than the corresponding printing on the 64¢ aerogrammes. The knife used for the aerogramme is the same as was used for the previous 64¢ aerogramme. However, the printing of the new aerogramme has been done so the panel with the gummed flaps and the indicia appear right-side-up at the bottom of the unfolded sheet.

In PSN Vol. 3, pg. 17,29 we reported several different size tagging bars on the 32¢ Becon-Gage envelopes. Bill Grosnick, Sr. and John Aitken have noticed that different sizes of tagging bars continued to be used until the issue was obsolete. The #8 has now been found with bars  $30\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $3\,\mathrm{mm}$ ,  $34\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $3\,\mathrm{mm}$  and  $34-35\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $2\,\mathrm{mm}$  and the #10 with  $33-34\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $3\,\mathrm{mm}$ ,  $31\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $2\,\mathrm{mm}$ ,  $20\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $2\,\mathrm{mm}$ ,  $35\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $2\,\mathrm{mm}$ ,  $34\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $2\,\mathrm{mm}$  and  $38-39\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $3\,\mathrm{mm}$  bars. It should be noted that for the new  $34\,\mathrm{c}$  envelopes the bar on the #8 measures  $24\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $2\,\mathrm{mm}$  and the bar on the #10  $31\,\mathrm{mm}$  x  $2\,\mathrm{mm}$ .

## CIGARETTE ACKNOWLEDGEMENT CARDS

During World War II some tobacco companies printed cards for acknowledgement of the receipt by servicemen of private donations of cigarettes. These cards frequently show private roulettes inside the body of the card to facilitate the detachment of receipt stubs. The cards often show military or semi-military illustrations. To our knowledge no attempt has ever been made to survey what exists, although Ed Richardson listed a few varieties in an article in "Covers" many years ago. We think it might be interesting, since many members probably have one or two of these cards, to get front and back photocopies in an attempt to create a tentative listing.

Since these cards, when rouletted, are not merely rouletted in the usual sense (i.e., around one or more of the edges to facilitate separation), but are also rouletted internally, it may be possible ultimately to obtain a separate catalogue listing for them.

Members should send photocopies of the front and backs of the cards to the editor of Postal Stationery Notes at the address noted on the front of this newsletter.

#### MORE ON THE NEWFOUNDLAND FORMULA REGISTERED ENVELOPES

Our request in the last PSN for information on these envelopes brought a few replies. ERPs have been reported (Clarence Stillions and Bill Walton) as follows:

Clarence Stillions also sent along a photocopy of an advertisement from the Thursday, February 3rd, 1938 issue of "The Evening Telegram" of St. John's, Newfoundland. It reads as follows: DEPARTMENT OF POSTS & TELEGRAPHS The Department announces the introduction of specially made strong registered envelopes for the greater security of money and other valuables passing through the post. These envelopes are of four sizes and are lettered (A) (B) (C) and (D) as follows:

Envelopes	Size in inches	Price in cents
(A)	6 1/8 x 3 3/4	1
(B)	8 x 5	2
(C)	9 x 4	3
(D)	11 1/2 x 6	4

The ordinary postage and registration fee must be affixed in stamps in the right top corner of the address side of the envelope. Compensation in respect of money of any kind (cash, bank notes, currency notes, cheques, stamps, etc.) will only be made when the money is enclosed in one of these registered letter envelopes sold by the Post Office and the letter is tendered for transmission by registered letter post.

These envelopes will be on sale at all Post Offices. Arrangements are being made for the necessary supplies to be sent to all offices

#### SECRETARY.

As yet we have no used copy of size D reported. Fewer of these may have been used compared to the other sizes. Also, the attrition rate for larger envelopes is normally high. They are hard to store or display and are generally less appealing to collectors. It is apparent that the envelopes were widely used (no small wonder considering the text of the newspaper notice) as 1938 ERPs have been reported from a limited number of reporters for envelopes of sizes A, B and C.

Collectors will note that the envelopes with the round and square flaps differ in many respects aside from the flaps - for example the type faces are different. Sizes C and D have not been reported with the square flap. It is possible envelopes of these sizes were used less than those of sizes A and B, and it was not necessary to have another printing of the larger size envelopes.
