NEW SURCHARGE ERROR REPORTED

Pierre Gauthier reports that a Montreal dealer has found a single copy of the revalued #8 34¢ on 32¢ envelope with no sepia printing on the front or back. The envelope is tagged and has the normal security printing on the inside. The envelope was purchased at the Desjardins Complex post office in Montreal.

LIGHTHOUSE ENVELOPES

There are in the current Webb Catalogue ten official envelopes listed with the Victorian envelopes. These were prepared for the Nova Scotia Lighthouse Service of the Marine (later Marine and Fisheries) Department, and a short article describing a few of them was written over twenty-five years ago by Ed Richardson (BNA Topics 16, 209 (1959)). The Webb listings are scattered and many members may not have recognized the envelopes as being a single unit. In addition the current descriptions are not clear. Below is a listing, and I hope an adequate description of the known items. The order of the first four items is based on hypothesis, the rest on the form dates.

They are <u>not</u> measurements of the length of the underline. The heading measurements given in Webb's Catalogue were not taken in a consistent manner, and in most cases do not correspond exactly to the measurements given above.

UNUSUAL MULTIPLE TAGGING PATTERNS ON BECON GAGE ENVELOPES

Recently I had the opportunity to purchase two unusual used copies of the 32¢ #8 envelope manufactured by Becon Gage. One has three bars of tagging as shown below.



Bar 1 is in the normal position for the tagging bar. Bars 2 and 3 are further to the left and do not conform in size to any of the tagging bar types previously reported on this envelope (PSN $\underline{4}$, pg. 28). The second envelope has only bars 1 and 2.

How the extra bars 2 and 3 could be produced is uncertain. It seems unlikely that these are true "double" and "triple" tags resulting from impressions from a different size of bar on a second tagging plate. John Aitken made the reasonable suggestion that excess tagging ink accidently applied to portions of the printing press could be responsible. At this point it is also still possible that the varieties have been manufactured by an enterprising philatelist. Has anyone seen other copies? From what sources? Does anyone else have any suggestions as to the origin of these varieties?

Along a similar vein, I have now seen an untagged copy of the current #8 34¢ envelope.

CANADIAN PACIFIC - A REVISED LIST OF ADVICE CARDS (continued from PSN Vol. 5, pg.7)

3) CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY COMPANY

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company was founded in 1881. In addition to post cards used by its subsidiary, Dominion Express Company (later Canadian Pacific Express), Canadian Pacific also used a wide variety of prestamped post cards for freight advice notices and distribution of general company information.


The early Canadian Pacific Railway Cards, like those of Dominion Express, had all company information and identification on the back only. Webb P7, P9 and P13 are known used in this way with form numbers 13 or 496, but a detailed list of these cards is not given here. From 1898 on, when regulations permitted, pictures of CPR hotels and other Canadian views were printed on the front of regularly issued cards. The freight advice notices and other company information continued to be printed on the back. These pictorial cards were used until about 1935. The different views are listed in Webb's catalogue, and as far as I know Steven Whitcombe is still working on a detailed list of form numbers, freight advice notices and other messages on the backs of these cards. Around 1935 a few cards were prepared with freight advice notices on the back of cards that were again blank on the front. Cards P50 and P55a (rouletted) are known in this format with "Form 13" on the back.


At about the same time cards first appeared with freight advice printed on the front. These cards are listed below.

There are two types as shown below.

Type A cards were printed in English only. They have the form number on the front and the form date on the back.

Type B cards are bilingual. They have the form date on the front and the form number on the back.




PRIVATE PRECANCELS - ADDITIONS TO THE HANDBOOK





A LISTING OF CANADIAN CERTIFIED MAIL ENVELOPES

The "Certified Mail Envelopes" are unlike anything else in Canadian postal stationery. They consist of a multiple form and an envelope. If the item to be certified is small it may be enclosed in the envelope with the multiple form (41-16-140). For larger certified items the multiple form (41-16-143) is placed in the envelope and the envelope is attached to the item being mailed. For the first certified mail "envelopes" (Webb CM1 and CM2) the 40¢ value was printed on the front of a multiple form. This prepaid the extra cost of obtaining the signature of the recipient, but not the normal postage for the item being mailed. In this way they were similar to the Canadian registration envelope (Webb EN33) for which the preprinted 10¢ impression paid for the service but not the postage. Thus the first certified envelopes fell into the realm of postal stationery.

It is not clear the same can be said of the later certified forms. Because of rapidly increasing rates the Post Office decided to use forms marked "Fee Paid Certified Mail" with no indication of value. Two of these prepaid formulas (with printing dates of 4-77) are listed in Webb's Catalogue as CM3 and CM4. Later issues have not been listed. Below is a summary of known multiple forms. More may exist. The multiple forms and the envelopes provided to contain them have separate Post Office form numbers and form dates.
