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Chairman's Message

At the 1987 Annual Meeting of BNAPS at Charlottetown, P.E.I., the Machine Slogan Cancel Study Group became an official Study Group of BNAPS.

The idea for such a group developed during slogan correspondence between Daniel Rosenblat and myself. We found ourselves agreed that the area of Canadian slogans is one of, if not the final, great unexplored frontiers available for study.

Our goals were simple, to develop a forum for the collection and sharing of information pertaining to Canadian slogan cancels. We believe such a group can fit well between the Flag Cancel Study Group, currently headed by Bob Heasman and Doug Lingard, and the Machine Cancel Group, a private effort, I believe, of Geoff Newman.

The issuing of the first Newsletter has been much delayed due to a major business reorganization of my company, which has made leisure hours, for the time being at least, almost non-existent.

I will serve as Chairman of the Group, and Dan will serve as our Editor. The subject matter of the Newsletter will be determined by two criteria. First, what is available from members, and second, what Dan and I happen to be working on, or interested in, at the moment. Should any member be especially drawn to a pet interest, we hope that he will write it up and send it to the Editor for inclusion with the Newsletter. Any additions, corrections or updating to Newsletter data should be sent to the Editor, so that it may be published as a follow-up in subsequent letters.

A few words about the Group dues structure might be in order. I decided to set them at US\$9/C\$12 for two reasons. First it is a handy ratio for the 75% exchange of US\$/C\$. Second, it is a decent figure to work with, so that we can spend more time on our collections and on the Newsletter, rather than sending out dues notices. Responses were interesting, since all but one member made a payment without batting an eye. Those who did not join practically swallowed their tongues. Personally, I have always found that I have gained enough information from study groups to pay for the dues several-fold, and I feel that those of you belonging to several study groups will agree.

With this Newsletter is a listing of members. I will in due time notify Frank Waite, who writes a Study Group column for TOPICS, and he will get the word out to the Society membership.

Editor's Message

The Editor is fortunate in having, by courtesy of Lewis Ludlow, some 660 photocopy pages of the microfilmed Canadian Slogan Cancel Proof Book, together with 135 pages of Distribution Lists by offices.

While this data is of great research value to collectors, it should be understood that it has many frustrating drawbacks. Distribution Lists, showing dates when specific slogan dies were sent to offices, as well as when returned, normally cover the period 1912-33. However, the 1912-22 period was handled very casually, with issue dates often by year only, not by month and day, and return dates omitted completely. There is also clear evidence that glaring omissions exist, especially in the earlier period, so that while presence of an entry almost certainly indicates issue to and usage by an office, absence of an entry in no way precludes possible usage.

The Proof Book covers the period 1912-54, but again the early period of 1912-22 is obviously very incomplete, as are the last few years in the early 1950's, so its primary value is limited to 1923-50. Even within this period, photographic reproduction is by no means uniform and in many cases important details are unclear.

The Proof Book format is peculiar, being really more of a paste up scrap book than a true proof record, as for hand stamps, where new dies could be proof struck directly on the pages. The pages were too large to be inserted in a machine, so proofs were struck on smaller papers, cut down to minimum size, then pasted on to the proof book pages. Notation was not made of the date of proofing, nor of the office to which the die was to be sent.

However, space was left beside each proof, on which it was intended that there be pasted a cut down usage strike, complete with date, which the using office was supposed to forward shortly after receiving the die. These returned strikes were the only indication of using office and date of die issue to it. Being in the nature of a receipt, we therefore refer to them as "Receipt Strikes".

It appears that in the case of the numerous slogans used seasonally by multiple offices, dies were periodically returned and subsequently randomly re-issued in the next year, either to the same or to a different office, rather than new dies being issued. In such cases, there would be no proof strike, but rather just a receipt strike to indicate where the die had been sent in each succeeding year. The information gleaned from this form of data is considerable, but delay in sending receipt strikes confuses the earliest usage dates, and failure to send a receipt strike confuses confirmed usage by a given office, while unclear reproduction of strikes mounted make precise use listing from this source very questionable. As with the distribution lists, the presence of a legible entry indicates probable usage, but the absence does not preclude it.

In the case of slogan 895, discussed in this Newsletter, the proof data is extremely incomplete and unhelpful, but members should feel free to inquire about information available for other slogans in other periods.

Notes pertaining to slogan 895,
BUY WAR SAVINGS STAMPS AND HELP RECONSTRUCTION

Data based on recorded or reported usage, including listings by the CPSGB in Maple Leaves and in Sessions' book on the International Machine usage.

Use was initiated in early 1919, when a majority of offices still employed International Rapid Cancelling Machines, introduced early in the century. However, in mid-1919 a major change to Universal machines, or occasionally to Columbia, took place in most offices, requiring new dies and daters for slogans in current use, including slogan 895, so there are normally two dies employed consecutively by offices in 1919, the second often continuing into early 1920, or occasionally later.

Differences in the die types are present, if not obvious. However, the International usage can be easily separated from the Universal or Columbia by dater style, Internationals (designated I) had the year date at the bottom of the circle and Universals (designated U) and Columbias (designated C) had it in the indicea, with the province at the bottom.

It should be noted that there are more reported, rather than recorded, instances of 1920 use. This is because 1920 usae was normally restricted to JAN-FEB only and recorded material is therefore somewhat scarce.

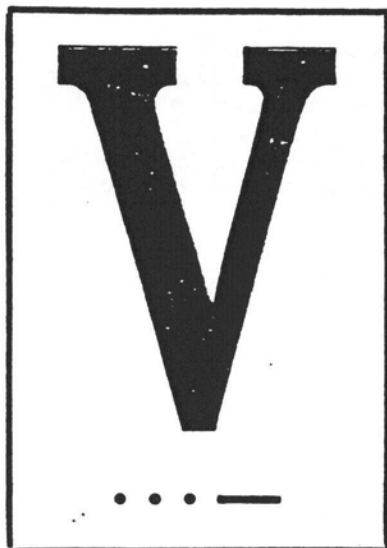
This W.W. II slogan is distinctively unique in its design, being very simple, yet attractively direct-to-the point. It was used by a reasonably large group of offices, probably 19, during a period from mid-1941 until early 1943. Based on an example from each office during each year of use, there are nearly 60 collectables, offering the opportunity for an interesting, though not overwhelming, specialized collection.

Their usage was during a period when the Proof Book Receipt Strikes were generally complete and can be relied upon to give a clear picture of the issued dies, with probable earliest dates. Note that Receipts were normally sent out soon after delivery of dies to a using office, so there can be earliest actual usage somewhat prior to the strike dates, as in TORONTO, and instances where recorded earliest matches the Receipt date.

The list of using offices provided by the Proof Book varies slightly from the Proulx listing and the reports of the CPSGB Study Group, but being an official source, it is probably the most correct. A majority of offices were issued only one die, although some had two. They were usually sent in August of 1941, but in some cases later.

Since the usage was at least intermittently continuous, the issued dies were not annually returned and then randomly re-issued, as was often the case with multiple office seasonal slogans. Accordingly, the originally proofed die for each office probably had use throughout the period, but there are possible exceptions as noted below.

The recorded usage dates listed herein are from only some 300 strikes in the combined Switt-Felton-Rosenblat collections, and may be subject to considerable updating, especially in terms of latest use, which normally extended until early 1943, even if not so presently recorded.

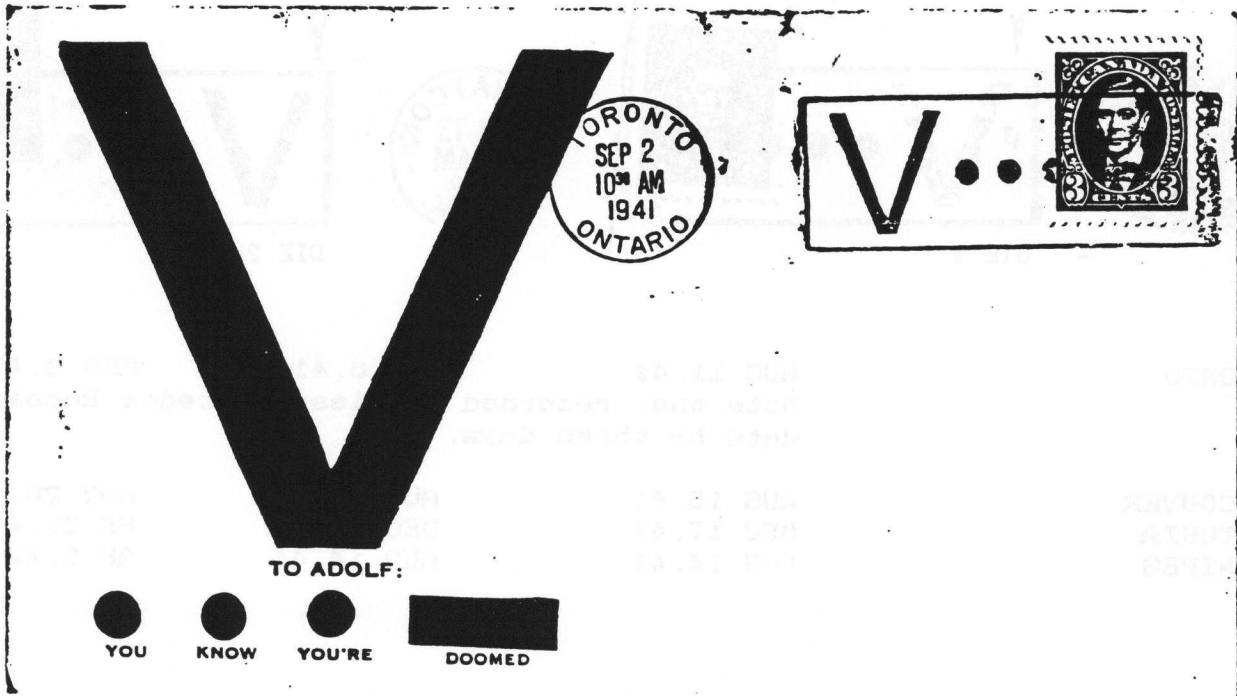
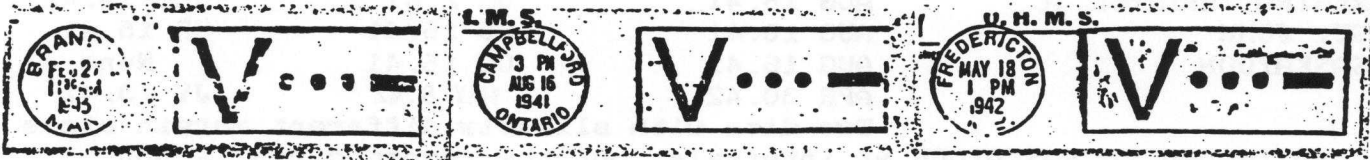
