
Slogans 7525 and 7525-A

This slogan, followed three years later by its bilingual, was introduced in 1922 and was among the first truly multi-office, multi year slogans, with use extending for decades. Additionally, it appears to have been one the earliest instances of the Post Office using a multi-office slogan to advertise one of its own functions, nearly all prior use to 1920 having been sponsored by special groups or by such other government departments as the Finance Ministery or the Department of the Interior.

There are reports of 7525 usage in 1921, but the documentation clearly indicates that the first five format A dies were issued in late 1922. Their wording was in four lines in a box at the left, with a grid at the right. However, there was 1921 issue of two much related slogans, both used at Toronto only, slogan 7525, REGISTER LETTERS OF VALUE and slogan 2625, DO NOT PLACE MONEY IN UNREGISTERED MAIL.

Either simultaneously in 1924, or during the period 1924-26, four additional dies in the same format were introduced, bringing the total of the format A dies to nine. The usage to this point was by no means seasonal, it appearing that the dies were rotated very randomly between about 25 offices for periods ranging between a few months to several years. Their usage, together with other postal service orientated slogans which followed, was esentially as a substitute for the standard wavy line obliterators which had been used when no sponsored dies took priority.

In late 1926-early 1927, the popularity of the slogan was evidenced by the issue of eight additional dies in format B, with the same four line wording, but extending over the full width of the die, without a grid. These 17 dies, nine format A and eight format B, were all for use in the Universal machines that had been introduced in 1919 and continued to be used through 1929.

In 1930, many major offices, led by Toronto, began switching to the Canadian made Perfect machines, which would predominate until 1939. To accommodate these offices, three new Perfect dies were added in format A, for a total to 20 dies, 9 format A Universals, 8 format B Universals and 3 format A Perfects. Thus, the number of offices having rotating use of these grew to major proportions in the early 1930's.

The number of offices which had switched to Perfect machines, which could use only the last three format A dies, had risen to nearly 50 by the end of 1932, so the number of offices still able to use the 17 Universal dies decreased sharply. Many of the Universal dies were retired, and by 1935 use of the 8 format B dies ceased altogether, as did at least three of the Universal format A and one of the Perfect format A.

This left most of the 1936-48 use to only two of the format A Perfects, but in 1947-48 a major change back to Universal machines, now manufactured by Pitney Bowes, had reached a point where many offices could resume use of the retained Universal

dies, and 6 of the original format A Universals, plus two format A Perfects, are recorded from 1947-48. This revival continued through 1950, but usage thereafter dropped sharply, though what very little remained, all from three Universal format A dies, extended for a very considerable period.

Usage is recorded at KENORA from 1949 until at least late 1956, all with one of the Universal format A dies, and at ORANGEVILLE from at least 1956 to 1964 from another. A third Universal format A is recorded at AURORA from 1948 until at least 1970, and may well have been used there even longer, since the same die has been seen used at KING CITY in 1979. Bear in mind that this die was issued in 1924, yet was still servicable 55 years later.

Use has been recorded or reported from 102 offices between 1922 and 1979, many of them with from four to six usages at intervals, and LONDON with seven.

A bilingual version, slogan 7525-A, was introduced with a single Universal die in 1925, documented as being issued to HULL, then sent to CHICOUTIMI and finally to THETFORD MINES, where it remained in use from 1927 until 1932. With the advent of the Perfect machines in 1930, a new Perfect die was issued to TROIS RIVIERES, then rotated between 14 province of Quebec offices until 1950. These two die uses were the total for the bilingual slogan.

The bilingual Perfect Die





Presenting a slogan of this dimension in a detailed fashion takes considerable space. An Appendix A has been prepared which illustrates each of the 20 English and one of the two bilingual dies involved, followed by a chronological listing of the offices using each. An earliest and latest date is given, if either are available. Some of these dates are those of issue and return, as given in the Distribution Lists, but where this documentation is not available, dates of seen usage are substituted.

Since the differences that permit identification of the 12 format A dies are relatively minor, they have been illustrated at approximately one and a half times actual size, in order to better facilitate separation.

It should be noted that Appendix A does not include all documented or reported use, since some of this has not been seen and the die cannot be identified for inclusion in its appropriate group.

An Appendix B lists all using offices alphabetically, separated into English and bilingual, with the periods of use and dies as in Appendix A, but including any documented or reported use where die identification has not been made and is indicated by a ?.

An Appendix C lists the English use chronologically. The bilingual use is omitted, since it would be essentially the same as in Appendix B. It should be noted that for purposes of computer sorting, the dates in this appendix are numeral, year followed by month, and the format A die numbers are given in two digits, i.e. those with numbers 1 to 9 have a preceding O.

Appendix A permits grouping strikes by die, by office and by chronology, Appendix B permits grouping them by office, by chronology and by die, while Appendix C permits grouping by chronology, by office and by die.



Slogan 125 revision

Slogan Box 7 included a classification of this slogan and several members have contributed substantial additional material. These have so enhanced the original that a complete revision seems more appropriate than a very lengthy list of updates.

The slogan is one of the large group of related Air Mail slogans that were issued in 1938-39, continuing to 1948. Original issue was of three Perfect dies in early 1939, designated 1 to 3, followed shortly by a Universal die, designated 4, for use at those offices which were then beginning to adopt the new Universal machines. Die 4 required replacement by a fifth die in 1946, but dies 1 to 3 continued in rotating use among nearly 50 offices until 1948.

Usage, as was the case for all Air Mail related slogans, was by no means seasonal and continued throughout each year. Interchange of dies 1-3 was originally very frequent in 1939-40, often at intervals of only five to six weeks. In this period more than 30 offices used the slogan at least once and in some cases several times. However, thereafter the number of offices which still retained Perfect machines began to decrease, and coupled with the requirement to give priority to war related slogans, the rotation became less frequent and among smaller offices.

Die 4 appears to have rotated between only four offices, KAMLOOPS, KENORA, PORT COLBORNE and TIMMINS. until early 1944. It was then issued to TORONTO for the first time and remained in use there until mid-1946, when it appears to have been worn to a point where it required replacement by a fifth die, again used only at TORONTO, until 1948.

The usage, by offices alphabetically, with years and dies, appears in Appendix A. This is followed by Appendix B, which lists the usage by illustrated dies, in their chronological order. The dies are relatively easy to separate, especially die 1, which has a uniquely distinctive corner marking in the lower left.

These two appendices therefore assist in mounting a collection either by offices or by dies. both in chronological order. However, if mounted by offices rather than by dies, reference should be made to Appendix B, since several offices had more than one period of use in a given year, either of the same or different dies, depending on the random re-issue.

It is an interesting point, though the answer cannot yet be established, whether the dies were returned to Ottawa for re-issue after each usage, or whether they were forwarded directly to the following office on instructions from the P.O. Department.

Some New Information

A review of Dan Rosenblat's article on this subject in Slogan Box No. 10 with material at hand has produced new information regarding WINNIPEG die use in the years 1929 to 1932 of 7879, Die 10 use of 7879 at SOUIX LOOKOUT, and Die 1 use of 7880 at TORONTO in 1939.

WINNIPEG, 1929-1932

On page 5 Dan wrote "While WINNIPEG was originally issued four dies, the recorded use makes it doubtful that more than one or two were actually used." This writer has been able to identify and document use of all four dies in this time period which are illustrated:







The four dies bear similar characteristics which make distinction difficult but examination of the airplane tail assemblies, side bars and fusilage shape permits identification. It is not yet known which two dies were sent to EDMONTON in 1931.

SOUIX LOOKOUT, 1949, Die 10


At the time of writing his article Dan was unable to identify the original issue of what appeared to be a reissue of a 1929-1932 die. This SOUIX LOOKOUT die appears to be a reissue of the WINDSOR die. My WINDSOR strike is on a brown envelope which defied reproduction, and as such was not fit for inclusion.

TORONTO (7880) 1939 use

According to Dan, this die 1 of plane flying to left is recorded at TORONTO only in 1939 only. In fact, this is the same die used at MOOSE JAW in 1931.

Slogans 6465 and 6465-A

In a recent Message, the Editor spoke of visiting the Postal Archives at Ottawa and being able to study some of the many files pertaining to the above slogans. He said that added information from these would probably require a future broad revision of their classification, as published in Issue 8, but it now seems appropriate to precede this revision by presenting here some of the newly-learned historical background to the origination of these slogans.

The concept of a slogan advocating observance of Sabbath, the seventh day of rest and worship, originated early in 1929 when a Quebec Roman-Catholic religious group, the Lique du Dimanche (League of Sunday), asked the Post Office if they could sponsor a slogan issue based on the Sabbath theme, for use in the province of Quebec only.

The Lique's first choice of wording was "Thou shalt keep holy the Sabbath Day", which if worded bilingually would have been quite lengthy. The P.O. was not adverse to the concept, but felt that the wording was too controversial, so a compromise was reached that it was to read simply "Observe Sunday, Observez Le Dimanche".

The Ligue requested and paid for 7 dies, to be used in April-MAY during Easter season, and re-issued annually in the spring. They selected as the using offices CHICOUTIMI, HULL, MONTREAL (2 dies), QUEBEC, SHERBROOKE and TROIS RIVIERES.

The slogan use in Quebec province does not appear to have drawn any objection, but rather drew the interest of a Toronto non-Catholic religious group, the "Lord's Day Alliance of Canada", which soon asked to sponsor slogans reading "Observe Sunday" in English only, for use throughout Canada, with the exception of Quebec.

The P.O. was willing to oblige and the Alliance paid for 16 dies, to be first used in many major English speaking offices in September-October of 1929, but then re-issued annually in the spring, shortly following the bilinguals.

The first reaction to the English version that is recorded in the files is when the Calgary Postmaster thought it appropriate to furnish Ottawa with a clipping of an October 10th letter to the Editor of the Calgary Herald. This was probably the least vehement reaction the P.O. was ever to receive, and it is illustrated to show its quaintly humorous approach. Since it was not directly addressed to the P.O., no official reply to it was felt necessary.

However, beginning in 1929 and extending long thereafter, the P.O. was to receive many other responses. a very few laudatory, but the vast majority harshly critical. These came from non-Christian individuals, from several inter-denominational groups that were devoted to religious liberty, and especially from Seventh Day Adventist groups and individuals. These latter did not object to the religious over-tones, as did the others, but to the official association of Sunday with the Sabbath, which they said was so objectionable to them as to be abhorrent.

Since these letters were addressed directly to the P.O., the Post Master General felt obligated to reply personally to each, attempting to placate aggrieved writers and to defend the P.O. actions. A form letter response was prepared which attempted to serve this purpose in an ingenious but not totally honest or convincing fashion.

The P.M.G. begged to inform writers that the slogans made no religious reference at all. He noted that 20 years prior, Parliament had passed a law which was still extant, regulating the extent that business could be conducted on Sunday, entitled "The Lord's Day Act". Thus, the slogan was only a reminder to citizens of all faiths that this law existed and urged them to observe it. Any objections to so proper a purpose should be made to Parliament, not the beleaguered but inoccent Post Office.

A Suggestion to

The Postal Officials

On leoking over my Monday more than a perrespondence a mustly due the mostmark, "Observe Sunday." Immediately I stiffened to attention, On hunday lest I releaned out the heurouse and did some other jobs, little thinking that the argus-eyed P.O. was on my track. It is certainly a remendous asset to a community to save at moral post office around. We are (in Calgary) pretty well attended to spiritually (I am speaking in the Dickensian sense of the term). Would it he impolitic of me to suggest that such elegans as "Cheerio" or "Are We Downhearted." he used around the beginning of the month when hills some rolling in "MICAWBER."

An Oct. 10, 1929, letter to the Editor of the Calgary Herald, retained in the files of the Archives.

This contrived apologia should have been beneath the P.M.G.'s integrity, since he well knew that the slogan's concept was initiated and paid for by religious groups, for religious reasons, and that no government officers responsible for legal observances had been in any way involved in the decision to issue them.

It is doubtful that the rationale satisfied any of the objectors, but few of them were prepared to enter into a debate with the P.O., so the form letter provoked only limited response. However, an American group, the Religious Liberty Association, was prepared to point out the obvious flaws in the explanation, and did so in 1932 by way of a well worded rebuttal that is illustrated in full on the following page. It is regretable that the reply to this letter, if any, is not in the files.

Intermediate files of the 1940's and 1950's have not yet been studied, so neither the extent of further objections nor the nature of the response during that period is not known, but since the slogans use continued unabated, the objections clearly fell on deaf ears and the P.O. must have felt that they were successfully defending their position.

That the use of the slogans continued to offend, even 40 years after their issue, is attested to in the final files of the 1958-69 period. These continue to include strong letters of objection, but by then the original response had been dropped and the P.O. had prepared a new form letter that abandoned the pretense that the slogans had no religious significance.

Instead. it reads in part, "We do not consider the die OBSERVE SUNDAY, requested by the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada, to be offensive, as Canada is predominantly a Christian country with a large number of its people observing Sunday as a day of rest." It goes on to close cheerfully with, "Thank you for showing interest in the cancellations. Please be assured that every effort is made to avoid discrimination."

This is at least somewhat more forthright and honest, in that it admits to the religious nature of the slogan's sponsor, but the P.O. was again treading on dangerous ground in contending that a predominantly Christian country would take no offense. Among the latest protests received in 1969 are still those from avowed Seventh Day Adventists, a totally Christian sect, but who view government advocacy of a Sunday Sabbath as a very disturbing instance of discrimination.

The slogan's sponsorship by the Lique appears to have been discontinued in 1965, but that of the Alliance continued until 1969 and was in fact revived in 1972, when at their request three dies of slogan 6475, a bilingual with French above English, was issued at CALGARY, HALIFAX and WILLOWDALE.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of the 18th instant, in response to my inquiry, just received. Your answer does not satisfy the Canadian citizens who are members of the International Religious Liberty Association in whose behalf I am writing. They cannot understand why the Post Office Department of the Canadian Government should single out one particular law upon the statute books, to the neglect of all other important laws, and place it as a cancellation stamp upon all envelopes, including their own epistles. They feel that such a procedure is contrary to the ideals of the Canadian Government which advocates equal justice and fair play to all its citizens, irrespective of what their religious belief may be.

Why did not the Post Office Department place the cancellation stamp reading Observe the Prohibition Law on all mail when Canada had the prohibition law? Obviously, for the reason that all Canadian citizens did not believe in the prohibition law. For the same reason the Post Office Department should not single out the Lord's Day Act because it is a religious law upon which many of the citizens differ honestly. If you want to be fair and impartial to all your citizens, why not single out a law upon which all your citizens are agreed, like, Do not Defraud, Do Not Kill, if you deem it necessary to place any law on the cancellation stamp?

There are many thousands of Canadian citizens who believe you ought to desist carrying on a religious propaganda so objectionable to them. You say that this slogan does not force upon any one the religious beliefs of any particular sect or creed. It certainly does add force to a religious law that should in justice be wiped off the civil statute books of Canada. This law does force the observance of Sunday upon all dissenters who believe in another day of the week as holy time and has brought hardship and religious persecution upon their heads, and your Post Office Department is aiding and abetting the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada in this unChristian work.

I hope you may see your way clear to cease being partial in this respect and that the wishes of/Canadian citizens may be respected even though they are in the minority.

Updates to issue 8

Slogan 5560, MAIL YOUR CHRISTMAS PARCELS EARLY

1922 usage, previously reported HALIFAX is confirmed as die 3. 1934 usage, BRANDON is die 3, not die 7. Bilingual usage, 1924 and 1925 usage is MONTREAL, no SHERBROOKE in 1925. 1926-28 usage is all TROIS RIVIERES. no MONTREAL 1926.

Updates to issue 9

Slogan 4400, HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Since publication of the article on this slogan in issue 9, a very interesting addition to the data has been discovered. The article indicates that Winnipeg used two dies, No.s 3 and 4, in 1920-22 and that these were joined by a new third die, no. 10, in 1923. Then the Ediror received from new member Bill Barry photos of Winnipeg strikes of 1921 and 1922 that did not match either dies 3 or 4 nor any later uses by any office.

This clearly indicated that Winnipeg had three dies starting in 1920, dies 3 and 4 and a third, now designated 4a. What must have happened is that die 4a broke after the 1922 use and was therefore replaced in 1923 by the new die 10, rather than die 10 being an addition, as had been previously thought.

In a rather amazing case of coincidence, shortly after receiving Bill's photos, the Chairman somewhat excitedly sent a photo of a 1920 Winnipeg strike that he claimed did not match dies 3 or 4. In this he was quite correct, since it was the to-be-expected 1920 use of the newly discovered die 4a. The Editor, therefore, now has a very nice page of photos showing the only three years of use of this die, and one of the strikes is illustrated below.

Additionally, the opportunity to see the Postal Archives files on this slogan have added enough background data and additional usage informatation to probably require a future complete revision of the original article, but it seems appropriate to make the additions above available without delay.
