EDITOR'S MESSAGE

Once again, the indefatigable Cecil Coutts has provided a further listing of Proulx Catalogue corrections and additions. He sent it in with two comments. The first was "When will it ever end". The second was a request that special credit be given to Robert Thorne. John Robertson and Jean-Guy Dalpe for their helpful cooperation.

In this connection, the Editor has recently come across a catalogue inclusion that appears to be incorrect, but has not been mentioned in any of Cecil's listings. This involves catalogue number 4203, worded as Hamilton Rose Show, with use at HAMILTON in 1914. It can be noted that no event dates are given, although slogans advertising events of this nature invariably gave some indication of when the event would take place.

There is no official documentation of this slogan in either the Proof Book or the Distribution Lists, nor did CPSGB report it. It was therefore omitted from our 1912-19 Handbook, and no reader of that work has taken exception to the omission. Further, we have quite well documented information on Hamilton's employment of its single machine in 1914, as follows:

- 4450 HELP THE HAMILTON MOUNTAIN SANITORIUM retained from 1913 issue and used until at least April 14.
- 4185 HAMILTON HORSE SHOW receipted on April 11, probably put in use on the 15th and retained until the event ended on June 20.
- 4190 HAMILTON INDUSTRIAL EXPOSITION receipted on June 21 and retained until July 18, two days after the event ended.
- 4450 HELP THE HAMILTON MOUNTAIN SANATORIUM re-issued on July 27 and retained until into 1915.

This leaves only the eight day period between July 19 and July 26 unaccounted for. While a rose show could well have taken place in mid-July, the time gap is really so short as to hardly make issue of a slogan worth while. Nevertheless, it is hard to imagine how this slogan listing would have been included in the catalogue unless someone had reported something worded in this fashion or at least similar, with or without event dates. The slogan's use will continue to be omitted from the proposed 1912-53 unified volume, unless some member can reliably report it with an acceptable usage date.

Among the classifications in this Issue is a complete revision of Air Mail slogan 125, AIR MAIL SAFE SURE SPEEDY. This slogan was last classified in Issue 11 of December 1989, more than three years ago, but was also included in the Air Mail Handbook. It is obvious that Air Mail slogans are very popular with our membership, and updates to their published usage keep coming in, only some of which have been published. If a member has been annotating his original copy, it must be pretty scruffy by now, so from time to time we will publish full revisions of the major Air Mail slogans in order to provide some clean copies to replace less presentable ones.

There is also included in this Issue a rather lengthy article on slogan 3880, GIVE TO CONQUER CANCER, the first of several major multi-office slogan fund appeals for medical purposes. This is only one of nearly sixty catalogued slogans beginning with the word "GIVE", but even this appeal word is outranked by the nearly eighty catalogued slogans beginning with the word "HELP". Members interested in collecting slogans by themes might find "Charity" a very broad area, especially if slogans beginning with the words "BUY", "FIGHT", "SHARE" and "SUPPORT" were also included.

GRADING OF POSTAL OFFICES

IN THE 1930's

Among the official documents that have been obtained from the Canadian Postal Archives is a 1934 listing of offices with machine cancellers at that time, and therefore capable of slogan use. It also gives their revenue grading, which is an indication of the amount of mail that each processed. The grading was on a numeric scale, descending from 12 to 2, although with grade 8 divided into two catagories.

The value of the listing to slogan collectors is that the grading affords a scarcity guide for slogan use in the 1930's, based on the probable number of slogan strikes generated by the office in comparison to others. Clearly, a slogan used at a lesser grade office would not have been produced in as great a number as one used at a higher grade office.

A later document, dated in 1947, is too much lengthier to warrant publishing, but indicates that the numeric scale at that time was from 17 to 7. Such a grading system no doubt still exists today, although as the number of offices increased over the years, the numeric scale may have been much expanded.

AN UNUSUAL DATING PROBLEM

The proof book illustrates a proof and matching receipt strike of NELSON's slogan 1900, Come To Golden Jubilee Nelson, B.C. Aug.4-11-1947. This indicates that a die with this wording and dating was delivered to Ottawa, sent to Nelson and receipted on June 16, 1947.


Since it was receipted, it is possible that it had some use, but if so very limited, because there is also another proof of a different die, although with the same wording, but with dates AUG.3-9, which is receipted August 5, 1947. This suggests that the original die's dates were incorrect, that this was discovered either immediately or after short use, and a new die with corrected dates sent out somewhat later.

However, the revised dating die has been seen as early as July 15, well before the receipt strike Aug. 5 date, and it has on the reverse a large green and gold seal of the Jubilee showing the Aug.3-9 dates. Since this seal had probably been prepared locally some time before its July 15 use, it can be assumed that AUG.3-9 were the intended dates, not a late change, and that a corrected die was issued well before the Aug. 5 receipt strike date.

The question therefore arises as to whether the incorrectly dated die actually had any use, other than on the receipt strike of June 16, or was retired immediately after receipt and the only actual use was from the corrected die at some date after June 16, but probably well prior to the July 16 earliest so far seen.

Members should check holdings of this slogan, and if they have a strike from the original die, probably only in the second half of June, 1947 if at all, may cherish it as a relatively rare item.

The two proofs and two receipt strikes and the official seal are illustrated below.





FURTHER TO EARLY WINNIPEG USE

This subject was presented in prior issue 28, but recent photos from Jean-Guy Dalpe have produced interesting additions. Jean-Guy is much noted for his specialized interest in the slogans of Quebec province, so it was somewhat surprising to have him send three important photos of early usage in so mundane an office as WINNIPEG.

One photo is of a Jan. 23, 1923 strike of slogan 387, Auto & Radio Equipment Show, which has been previously established as consisting of three U dies issued in late 1922, retained to 1923. However, while two of the dies are quite common, the third has only been reported in one strike, but this is a second. It is interesting to note that the three dies, illustrated below, follow the normal WINNIPEG pattern of this period in having different numbers of cuts in the left line of the slogan box.

Jean-Guy's next sending is interesting in a different way, being a Mar. 8, 1921 strike of slogan 4563, Home Building Exposition. This is recorded in only two dies, although a third had appeared possible. The two are illustrated below, one by the only receipt strike in the Proof Book and Jean-Guy's strike, and the other by one of two clear strikes in the Editor's collection.

An actual strike of die 1 had not been seen before Jean-Guy's sending, but the receipt strike is odd. There are no cuts in the left side of the box, but the right side has been clearly cut in three places. This suggests a new experiment in box cutting, which would be reasonable if the purpose of the cuts was to drain off excess ink.

Jean-Guy's strike, although partial and quite unclear, does seem to show the same pattern of cuts at the right as appears on the receipt strike, but also shows three cuts at the left. This would suggest that the experiment of cutting only at the right was unsuccessful, so cuts at the left were resumed, but not until after the die had been receipted on Jan. 3, 1921.

There is a further oddity about this slogan, as illustrated below. In the Pritchard & Andrews proof book, there are two proofs of the slogan on one page and another two on the next. The two dies of each pair of proofs differ from one another, but the two pairs do not match, so there are illustrations of four dies.

The 2nd pair match the two recorded dies, but there is no known usage of the 1st pair and it is almost impossible that all four dies were issued. This suggests that the 1st pair were discarded as unsatisfactory and replaced by the 2nd pair. There are no obvious errors in the 1st pair, but the slogan boxes are about one mm. narrower and the lettering slightly more cramped than in the 2nd. In any event, the fact that these are pairs, rather than trios, seems to indicate that only two dies were used, rather than the three that might have been anticipated.

Jean-Guy's third photo seems to support the premise that the P & A proof of slogan 388, Auto Equipment Show with "6" reversed, was corrected and issued, to confirm three dies of this slogan, as illustrated below.



ADVISE YOUR CORRESPONDENTS OF YOUR CORRECT POST OFFICE ADDRESS

Slogan 63 was classified with related slogans 55 and 61 in Issue 23. There are no significant changes in slogans 55 and 61, but reports from members established that separating slogan 63 into seven dies was incorrect. The illustrations of dies 6 and 7 were duplicates and elimination of die 7 changes the the re-issue sequence of most of the other six dies. Accordingly, the following is an illustrated revision of slogan 63 usage as it now appears to be.

Two offices with documented use have not been seen, so die identification is not known.

GIVE TO CONQUER CANCER

Slogan 3880

Shortly after the end of WW II, a considerable number of Canadian slogans began to be sponsored by groups appealing for funds to combat various diseases, especially cancer and tuberculosis. There had been slogans of a similar nature issued much earlier, notably the Toronto proprietary Help the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives, first issued in 1913 and continuing for many years, plus the very limited multi-office use of Help Canada Conquer Cancer in 1935. However, these were either local issues, or if multi-office, limited in their duration.

The first major multi-office slogan of this nature originated when a national group, probably the Canadian equivalent to the American Cancer Society, began sponsoring a Dominion-wide annual appeal for funds to combat cancer with slogan 3880 in 1946, which continued in its original format until 1962. Since this use extended past the period during which the Proof Book was maintained, only use to 1952 is reasonably well documented, but the later years from 1953 to 1962 cannot be definitively established. For this reason, the Editor had previously hesitated to attempt classifying the slogan.

However, preliminary study indicated that this slogan was so interestingly related to others as to warrant some attention. There is clearly a direct connection between it and other multi-office anti-cancer slogans that had some concurrent periods of use and much overlap of using offices. These were 3005, ENROLL TO CONQUER CANCER, first issued in 1947-48 and revived in 1955-62, 3412 Fight Cancer Give Now, initiated in 1951 and continued into the 1960's, a brief revival of 4310 Help Canada Conquer Cancer in 1955 and the considerably later 1260 Cancer Can Be Beaten of 1969-73.

Although most usage of these very similar related slogans is beyond the documented period, there is enough reported data to strongly suggest that it was most unlikely that these would have been sponsored by different organizations, and in effect competed with 3880. Rather, it appears that their somewhat irregular use from 1947 until into the 1970's may have been replacement or additional formats of 3880, sponsored by the same organization, with the intent of continuing and much broadening the appeal.

If in fact slogan 3880 is only the preliminary format of a clearly related major group of slogans, all advertising the same cause and probably under the same sponsorship, extending some thirty years from its 1946 origination, it seemed desirable to at least classify the documented use to 1952 and give some indication of what followed.

Original 1946 issue of 3880 was of nine dies, sent to the standard group of English speaking nation-wide major offices. They were OTTAWA and one large city in each of eight provinces, excluding Quebec. Possibly because MONTREAL began use of a proprietary Fight Cancer bilingual slogan 4510 in 1946, no bilingual dies of 3880 were issued. The nine English dies were of two machine types, as the three Maritime offices, HALIFAX, ST. JOHN and CHARLOTTETOWN, still used Perfect machines. The remaining six, VANCOUVER, EDMONTON, REGINA, WINNIPEG, OTTAWA and TORONTO, had Pitney-Bowes machines.

Issue was made in early April and use normally extended for a month, although in several years one or more offices retained its die for only the first two weeks in April, then re-issued it to a smaller neighboring office. This extension of use first took place in 1946, when the die originally issued to VANCOUVER was re-issued to VICTORIA, not in mid-April as would later be the case, but well into May. Therefore, 1946 use was by ten offices, using nine dies.

In 1947, all nine dies were issued in early April and there is no record of any subsequent re-issue during that year. However, the using offices varied somewhat from the 1946 usage. The three Perfect dies were randomly re-issued to the same Maritime offices that had used them in 1946, but the Pitney-Bowes group omitted OTTAWA and TORONTO, which were replaced by VICTORIA and LONDON. The 1947 use was therefore at only nine offices from nine dies.

It is pertinent to the concept of a related group of slogans that, while OTTAWA and TORONTO were omitted from the slogan 3880 usage in 1947-48, they were not omitted from the appeal in this period. Each office had 1947-48 use of one of two new dies of slogan 3005, ENROLL To CONQUER CANCER, first issued in these two years, then placed in reserve until re-issued in 1955. In 1949-50, both offices were again issued dies of 3880, but from 1951 both began continuing use of 3412, Fight Cancer Give Now when that related slogan was introduced in 1951.

Use of 3880 expanded in 1948 with the issue of one new Pitney-Bowes and two new Perfect dies. The three original Maritime offices received Perfect dies in early April, and so did two offices without prior use, CALGARY and MEDICINE HAT. Also, the P die issued to MEDICINE HAT was re-issued to LETHBRIDGE in mid-April, so the five Perfect dies were used by six offices. VANCOUVER, VICTORIA, EDMONTON, REGINA, WINNIPEG and LONDON were randomly re-issued Pitney-Bowes dies, as in 1947, but the additional PB die made possible the rather surprising inclusion of DRUMHELLER in this group, a relatively small office. Total 1948 use was therefore at thirteen offices, using twelve dies.

A further expansion of use occurred in 1949, when one new P and two new PB dies were added, but only five of the six available P dies are documented as issued. Four went to the three original Maritime offices plus to CALGARY, as in 1948, with the fifth issued to PRINCE RUPERT. There is no record of 1949 use at either MEDICINE HAT or LETHBRIDGE, but as mentioned, there was a sixth P die available, which may have been used, although an appropriate office is not documented or reported.

In 1949 nine PB dies were available. Four were re-issued to PB offices that used the slogan in 1948, LONDON, REGINA, VANCOUVER and VICTORIA, the other five to HAMILTON, KINGSTON and NEW WESTMINSTER for first time usage, and to OTTAWA and TORONTO for revived use. DRUMHELLER, EDMONTON and WINNIPEG, with 1948 use, were omitted.

From 1950 to 1952 six P and nine PB dies were available. In 1950 all six P dies and eight of nine PB dies are documented as issued. There is a report of LONDON 1950 use, but no receipt strike, so it may be that LONDON used the ninth PB die.

An oddity of 1950 usage is that a PB die is receipted from OTTAWA on March 27, several days earlier than any of the other receipt strike dates, but the same die was then receipted from TORONTO on April 1st. While there had been prior instances of a die being used at two offices in a given year, their interval between the two issues was greater than the only four days in this instance. Because of the OTTAWA-TORONTO joint use of one die, there were fifteen documented using offices in 1950, with LONDON as a reported but undocumented sixteenth.

In 1951, all fifteen available dies are documented as having been issued, and five of them were re-issued to a second office after about two weeks use. Therefore, the fifteen dies were used by a total of twenty offices. One PB die has not been recorded after 1951, so it may be assumed that it was damaged and not replaced. Also in 1951, five P and five PB dies of 3412 were introduced, so there were actually thirty offices with combined use of 3880 and 3412. It should be noted that nine of the ten 3412 using offices had previously used 3880, the only exception being first time use of a cancer related slogan at SASKATOON. This certainly suggests that the original appeal had been much broadened by slogan 3412 as a new format of additional dies, rather than as a completely separate slogan.

All six P dies were issued in 1952, but one was re-issued after two weeks to a seventh office. Also, there is a reliable report of undocumented 1952 Perfect use at TRAIL, so if this is correct, one of the other five P dies must also have been re-issued. Seven of the eight PB dies are receipted and two of them re-issued to an eighth and ninth office. There is a reliable report of undocumented 1952 Pitney-Bowes use at NEW WESTMINSTER, so if this is correct, it may have used the unaccounted for PB die that was not receipted. The total of confirmed 1952 using offices for 3880 is therefore sixteen, plus two very probable reports.

Also in 1952, two new dies of 3412 were added to the original ten and all twelve are documented as used, bringing the total combined use of 3880 and 3412 again to thirty offices.

Although there are several pages of proofs and receipt strikes for 1953, they are obviously incomplete, not including anything for slogan 3880 or 3412, and the Proof Book was not maintained thereafter. Nevertheless, 3880 use is reported or seen until 1962 and 3412 until 1968, but a definitive listing with all dies identified cannot be made after 1952. It can be assumed that the Perfect dies were obsolete during or after 1955, when Perfect machines were withdrawn from all but a few very small offices. However, all 3880 material seen from 1955 matches prior known PB dies, which suggests that the Perfect dies were not replaced and that all the 3880 later use was only from the earlier PB dies, together with PB dies of other related slogan formats.

Appendix A and C give the documented 1946-52 usage of 3880, but an Appendix B is added that lists seen or reported 1953-62 material with die identification when seen, plus non-identifiable reports from CPSGB and from some members of our group. This at least gives an indication of the extent of the 1953-62 usage.

Additionally, a special Table has been prepared which lists cancer related slogan use from the fifty-one offices confirmed or reported as having used any of the four related formats in the period 1947-62. It must be stressed that most of the 1953-62 use is based on unseen reports only, so it may be both incorrect and incomplete. Also, it can be noted that in four instances there are reports of an office using two formats in one year. This seen as more likely erroneous reporting than actual practice.

In any event, the Table certainly gives considerable support to the concept that these four differently worded slogans were a related group, with a single message and purpose, distributed more or less randomly to a growing list of offices as more dies in one format or another became available. The table ends when the reported usage of 3880 ceased, as too little is known about the post 1962 use of the other formats or of the introduction of slogan 1260 and the 1260-A bilingual version to continue it.

However, it is not unreasonable to assume that, by the time of the introduction of 1260 and 1260-A, most dies of the original four formats were no longer serviceable, so were replaced by this new format with a different wording that was nevertheless essentially a continuation of the basic message, used at much the same group of offices as in the prior years.

Incidently, although no research has yet been done on the subject, it is very possible that much the same concept of different but related wordings of the same message applies to the considerable number of fund appeal slogans pertaining to the fight against T.B.

UP-DATES AND CORRECTIONS TO BUY VICTORY BONDS

Bob Thorne wrote the original article on slogans 890, 890-A, 8520 and 7190 in Issue 16, and the Editor subsequently published an illustrated revision in Issue 23. Now Bob has taken a good look at the revision and finds some embarrassing errors made by the Editor.

These involve the illustrations for the three bilingual or French versions of the slogan, one of each used in 1941, 1942 and 1943. Bob points out that in each case MONTREAL used two dies, while QUEBEC and TROIS RIVIERES each used one, so there were four dies issued in each year. However, again in each case, the illustrations show only three different dies, the two MONTREAL die illustrations being duplicates, rather than different. He is quite right in this, and it should have been caught before it happened, but there is at least a reason why such an error could occur if close attention was not paid.

It was Post Office policy that, whenever a slogan die was sent to an office, with directions for its period of use, the receiving office was requested to strike an example of the usage on an unfranked O.H.M.S. envelope, on its first day of use, and immediately forward it to Ottawa. The documentation does not give any official name for these strikes, but the Editor refers to them as "Receipt Strikes", since they indicated receipt of the die.

When these strikes were received at Ottawa, the envelope would be cut down to approximately 1" by 3 3/4", just large enough to show the dater and slogan, and the cut down would then be pasted into the proof book to show the dates and locations of each die in use. It was a very effective system, so long as everyone carefully followed orders, but human laziness and error created problems for subsequent researchers.

One problem was delay in sending the receipt strikes to Ottawa, sometimes for several days or more. This accounts for the occasional instance of recorded use from an office several days prior to the officially documented receipt date.

A second problem involved those offices having more than one machine--most notably TORONTO and MONTREAL--and could therefore be issued two or more dies of the same slogan for concurrent use. The policy intention was that if more than one die of the same slogan was issued, an appropriate number of receipt strikes would be sent to Ottawa.

This injunction was normally followed, and in most cases the proof book shows multiple receipt strikes equal to the number of multiple dies issued. However, human tendencies to short-cut time and effort often took its toll, since it was quicker and easier to just run off two or more receipt strikes from one die in one machine than to run off a receipt strike from each die in each machine being used.

Accordingly, receipt strikes of multiply issued dies are too often identical, rather than showing each individual die involved, and that is precisely what happened at MONTREAL in the case of each of its three versions of Buy Victory Bonds slogans, issued in 1941, 1942 and 1943. The Editor's failure to notice this resulted in the revision showing in each case duplicate illustrations of the MONTREAL dies, taken directly from the proof book.

The proper illustrations have now been determined, and all twelve dies involved are shown on the next page, together with updated—and in the case of slogan 7190—corrected usage.

AN ATTRACTIVE W.W.II COVER

While slogan collectors should be more concerned with a slogan strike than the cover or piece on which it may have been struck, there are times when a connection between the slogan and the cover can be attractive. Slogan 7190, PRETEZ POUR LA VICTOIRE, is a very W.W.II related slogan, being one of the French versions of BUY VICTORY BONDS, and a cover with this slogan, addressed to the United States and illustrated below, certainly connects to its war related slogan in two fashions.

An obvious connection is the patriotic chachet (in green on the original) of two battleships, but additionally it can be noted that this cover was "Opened to verify contents in accordance with requirements of Foreign Excange Control Board" and then officially resealed, the Foreign Exchange Control Board being a major war-time agency with broad powers over the export of funds.



HELP THE MUSKOKA

The only major article on this important TORONTO proprietary slogan to have previously appeared in the Newsletter was one page unillustrated in Issue 10, which referenced the fact that a comprehensive article had appeared in an 1989 issue of MAPLE LEAVES, the Newsletter of the Canadian Philatelic Society of Great Britain.

Nevertheless, not all members of our group are also members of CPSGB, so some attention to this slogan deserves reference in this Newsletter. The important factor here is to define and illustrate the various multi-die annual usage in the various formats and machine types over the period 1913-45.

Accordingly, this is presented below, in as condensed form as possible, but listing and illustrating all the die interchanges involved. The related slogan group actually involves four catalogued numbers, but is in fact a single slogan with varying formats and wordings.

Slogan 4485 - HELP THE MUSKOKA FREE HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTIVES

Slogan 4530 - HELP THE TORONTO FREE HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTIVES

Slogan 4486 - HELP THE MUSKOKA HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMTIVES

Slogan 4380 - HELP MUSKOKA HOSPITAL FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS


This related group of slogans, all used at TORONTO only, originated in 1913 as 4485, was altered to 4530 in 1916-19, reverted to 4485 until 1921, then became 4486 by removing the word "FREE". In 1944 it made a final change to 4380.

Multiple dies were issued in Nov-Dec. of each year and retained until Jan-Feb. of the following year.







Slogan 4380 use - late 1944-early 1945 only Three replacement PB dies

The Proof Book illustrates three proofs and three receipt strikes, indicating three dies issued, but all illustrations duplicate a single die. However, two dies are seen and a third probably exists.
