Another new BNAPS member, John D. Rhodes has chosen our study group. Welcome!

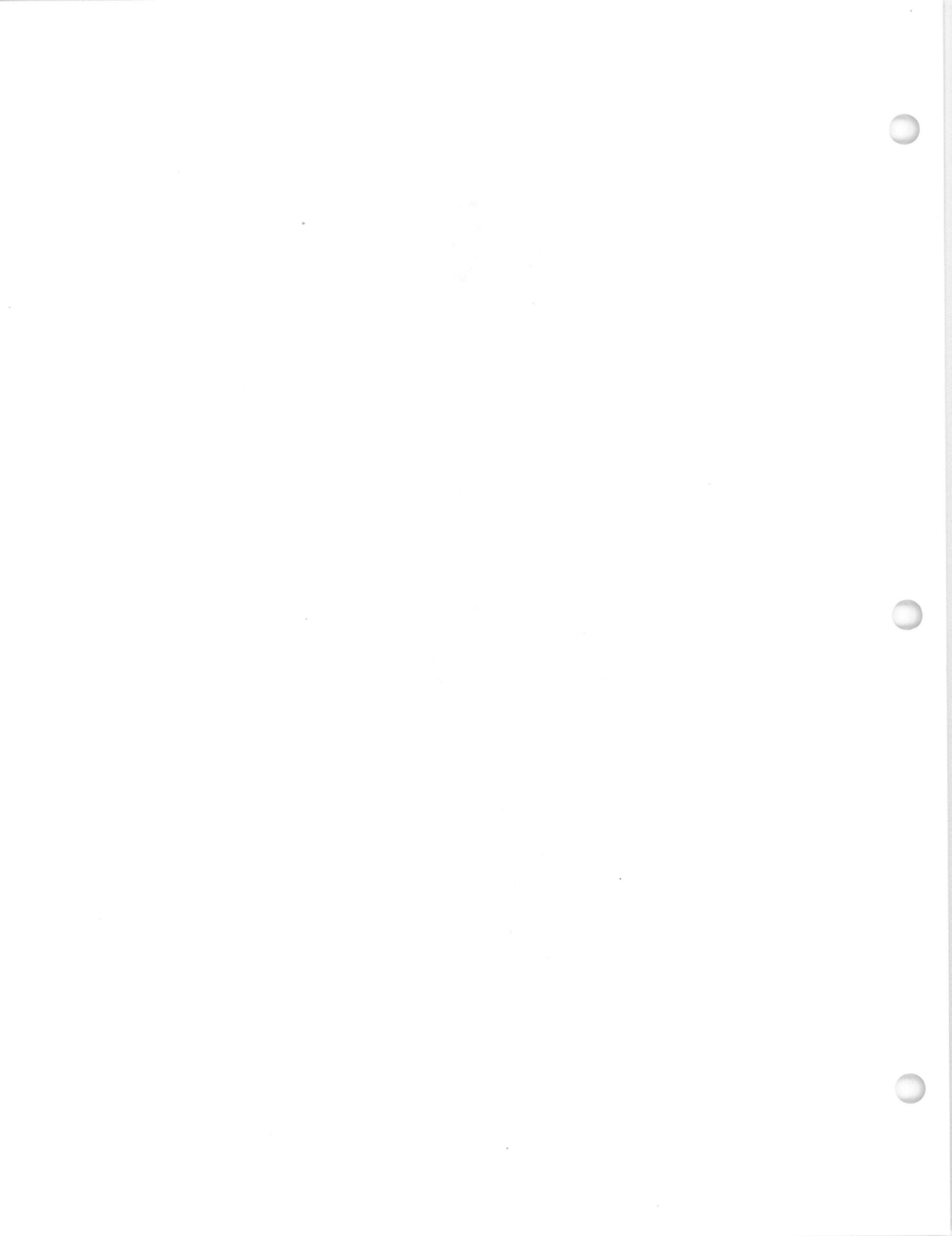
I think that all of you will find this issue quite interesting, as our Editor has gone to great lengths. Dan, we all so much appreciate your ongoing efforts.

## EDITOR'S MESSAGE

Douglas Lingard's article in this issue explains how the Editor has had the very good fortune to recently come into possession of the entire Proulx reference collection of nearly 15,000 non-duplicated premium quality cut-squares. Rather oddly, this collection was mounted by offices, not by slogans, as one would have expected from the author of the Catalogue. This was satisfactory for proprietary slogans, but the Editor's multi-office material is mounted and has been classified by slogan, so a rather vast resorting has been necessary before attention could be given to individual multi-office slogans or related groups of slogans.

However, most of this drudgery has been accomplished, and it has now been possible to select various slogans that either had not been previously classified or where the new material well warranted a substantial revision of prior classifications. This issue of the Newsletter includes examples of both possibilities. The article on slogan 8760 is a first for this previously neglected early issue slogan, and the very massive revision of the Crippled Children group of related slogans demonstrates how a strong influx of new material can obsolete a very recent major classification effort.

The Proulx collection is somewhat disappointing in terms of the pre-WW II material, which is weaker than would be expected, but since this period is well documented, there is little or no new information needed. However, the amount of material in the post-documentation period after 1953 is dramatic, and this will continue to provide excellent data for classification of slogans that the Editor hesitated to address because his own material was inadequate. Major forthcoming projects will be to research and present the large number of related Christmas Seal slogans that derived from the original slogan 8670 classified in this issue and then to attempt classification of the truly enormous quantity of cancer related slogans now available, far greater than Easter Seal and Christmas Seal slogans combined.

It is even a possibility that at some point an attempt will be made to classify the monster slogan "WHY WAIT FOR SPRING", of which literally thousands of impressions are a part of the Proulx material. Member Jean-Guy Dalpe has indicated to the Editor that he has done extensive research on the "POURQUOIS ATTENDRE" version of this slogan and he proposed to present an article on it, but the new material will no doubt expand whatever he had already prepared.

The Editor somewhat apologizes for the fact that almost half of the present issue is devoted to a revision of the Easter Seal slogans, so shortly after a rather lengthy article in the previous issue. However, the prior article drew detailed responses from three members, indicating that this subject is of considerable interest, so with these responses and the Proulx material available there was little alternative to a prompt and thorough revision.

Members should be aware that after Bob Thorne and I have completed our selections from the Proulx material, the still massive surplus will be made available in large lots at very reasonable prices. Anyone interested in purchasing these should promptly notify Thorne and we will attempt to get at least the first few orders out with minimum delay.

The Editor was rather disappointed that there was negligible response to his offering of the illustrated proprietary slogan publication. He concluded that perhaps the price was a deterrent, and therefore planned to revise it to a smaller more condensed version that could be offered more inexpensively. Needless to say, work on this has been completely disrupted by the need to address the Proulx material, so that project has been abandoned for the present. However, it could be revived in the future if there is any indication of interest, so will members who might be willing to order a set at a better price kindly so indicate to the Editor.

It is pleasant to be able to report that at least three or four new members of BNAPS have selected our Group as their choice for a free membership in a Study Group. However, it is unpleasant to hear from the Chairman that quite a few present members will not be receiving this issue, because of severe delinquency in payment of dues. Therefore, we cannot really say that our membership is growing.

# THE DAVID PROULX SLOGAN CANCEL COLLECTION

## Introduction

Last fall I purchased David Proulx's Slogan Cancel collection. As a result of this transaction, and at the request of our editor to document the story of this purchase, I have prepared a short write up on David Proulx, how he got interested in Canadian Slogans, the collection itself and why he recently sold his reference collection.

## Mr. David Proulx

Anyone who has met David Proulx will soon realize that he is a remarkable person. David was a high school teacher who retired last summer. In addition, he has been a part-time philatelic dealer for many years. Today, his main area of interest seems to be New York State postal history, although he has formidable collections of world wide and U.S. private perfins, Zeppelin covers, U.S. Ship covers, U.S. machine cancels, Canadian postal stationery, etc., etc. One room in his home has been dedicated to his philatelic pursuits with considerable shelving installed to handle the many boxes of covers and albums in which his numerous collections are stored.

David is a member of numerous philatelic organizations and holds a number of executive positions such as in the Post Mark Collectors Club. He is very highly regarded by collectors in the Syracuse area. One example that illustrates David's integrity occurred when I was sitting at his table and a person offered him a stamp collection for sale. He quickly evaluated it, told the individual what he would pay for it but suggested that the man first offer his collection to another dealer a few tables over who specialized in the type of material that was being offered for sale. David explained to the seller that the other dealer would probably offer him more for his collection since he had more customers for that type of material. This is a good example of Mr. Proulx's integrity, as most dealers I know would have made an offer for the collection and then tried to sell it for a small profit to the other dealer themselves.

## His Slogan Cancel Collection

David got interested in Canadian Slogan Cancels around 1970 and drove out to British Columbia to purchase a major slogan collection from a collector named Potts in Duncan B.C. According to Bob Thorne, this same Mr. Potts had driven east in the 1950's to purchase much of this material from a collector in Hamilton. Apparently, the Hamilton collector sold Mr. Potts all of his duplicate material keeping only his reference collection for himself. Mr. Potts added to this material over the years. David continue to add material to the collection until he lost interest in Canadian Slogans in the mid 1980's. In the mid 1980's, David apparently held a mail bid sale and sold off his better slogan cancels, although I did find a few better, such as a nice 1927 Ottawa 5250 "LEAGUE OF NATIONS DAY APRIL 17TH" in the boxes of covers.

In fact, David had two slogan collections. One was a four volume collection of Canadian Flag Cancels. Three years ago he decided to sell his flags and I got just about first refusal on these. A year or so earlier I had shown David the Flag Cancel Study Group's revision to the World War I Flag Cancel values and told him that I would give him these prices for anything I could used. He was surprised we



had valued some of them so high but also realized how rare some of them are. David had many rare flag cancels in his collection such as a lovely Montreal 3-1, a nice Hamilton 8-3 on piece, the Toronto 7-16 and 7-17 on piece, the Charlottetown 23-2 on a nice illustrated cover, the rare Prince Albert 40-2 and 40-3 and Saskatoon 41-1, 2 and 3 Exhibition cancels, the Smiths Falls 62-1 Old Home Week cancel, etc. Since I had offered to give David more than he probably would have asked for his 1917 to 1919 flag cancels, he gave me just about first refusal on his whole collection.

Last summer he asked me if I was interested in purchasing his reference slogan collection as well. He had lost interest in Canadian slogans and wanted to sell his collection to someone who would continue on with his research. After purchasing the Pott's collection in 1970 he continued to add to it and issued his handbook based on this collection and Potts' reference notes in 1973, revised it in about 1978, again in about 1983 and for the last time in 1990. When David purchased the Potts collection in 1970 he joined BNAPS at about the same time and his application for membership (#2562) appeared in the September 1970 edition of *Topics*. He withdrew from BNAPS in the mid 1980's and according to David, he was approached by someone in the Slogan Cancel Study Group in the late 1980's asking him if he was interested in joining the group. However, by then, he had dropped out of BNAPS and had the last edition of his handbook just about ready to go to the printers. Although he had lost interest in Canadian Slogans, the previous edition of his handbook was sold out and he thought that he should issue one more edition to reflect the reports that he had received since the 1983 edition. He is selling this 146 page handbook for \$10 U.S. which barely covers his publishing costs. Apparently, this edition is now almost sold out also and he does not plan to publishing any further additions.

The reference collection was a 35 volume 2" x 4" collection sorted alphabetically by town. The collection contained one example of each slogan for each year that slogan was used at each location. For instance, there were two examples of many of the ENLIST NOW Flag Cancels since this slogan was used at most locations in both 1941 and 1942. Examples ranged from 1912 to the early 1970's with strength in the 1940's, 50's and 60's. There were some old photocopies of slogans that filled in for missing examples and there were also some hand drawn examples of slogans he had seen but did not have in his reference collection. These 35 volumes contained from about 200 to 550 slogans per volume for a total of about 12,000 to 14,000 slogans, all mounted in Hawid Mounts. In addition to the 35 volumes of mounted slogans, there were another 4 boxes containing an additional 12,000 to 14,000 slogans on 2" x 4" sorted by Proulx number. I went through some of these and picked out about 450 different dates of the 9965 "V...-" from many towns and over 100 different towns that used the 10530 "WHY WAIT FOR SPRING DO IT NOW" slogan in 1961. However, some of the slogans in these boxes were heavily duplicated.

In addition to these examples on piece, there were ten cartons containing another 25,000+ slogans on cover and fronts. Many of these were addressed to Vancouver businesses such as the Vancouver Sun, Gaults, David Spencer, etc. Also, a number of them were addressed to well known philatelists from the 1950's and 1960's such as T.P.G. Shaw of RPO fame, Alfred Whitehead, Walter Purkis, Wally Gutzman and our own editor, Mr. Daniel G. Rosenblat. It seems that these individuals must have been trying to help Mr. Potts with his research work. Also, in the 1970's, there were many covers from John Calder. It appears that, Mr. Calder was a subscriber to the newsletter issued by the Public Affairs Branch in Canada Post. This newsletter listed all of the slogans that had been approved by Canada Post and gave the locations and time frames when these obliterations were to be used. Mr. Calder sent off envelopes addressed to Mr. Proulx to the postmasters at these locations requesting an example of these slogans for Mr. Proulx. I hope he had better luck than I did as I used to do the same whenever this list showed that the slogan would be a flag cancel. About 40% of the time I would get my envelopes back with the wrong cancel, especially if more than one slogan was being used at these locations. In fact, some of my envelopes were never returned and must still be somewhere in the bowels of Canada Post.

### What Happened to the Collections?

The material was so voluminous that I had to make two trips down to Syracuse to pick it all up. In total there were ten large cartons of fronts and covers, three cartons containing the 35 binders of 2" x 4" and 4 additional boxes of 2" x 4". David wanted to sell the material intact so it was all or nothing. You can imagine the look on my startled wife when I started to unload the car from my first trip to Syracuse. She could not imagine why I would buy a car load of slogan cancels especially since I didn't even collect them myself. And was I using our household money to pay for these?

I have been going through the cartons of covers and fronts and pulling out the heavy duplication which for some slogans is quite extensive. So far I have filled up 5 cartons of lightly duplicated material (about 15,000 or so covers and fronts) and sold them along with 34 of the 35 volumes and the 4 boxes of 2" x 4" to a consortium of Dan Rosenblat, Bob Thorne and John Robertson. I understand that Bob has sent the 34 volume reference collection intact to Dan and that Bob and John are going through the other material to select what they need before shipping it on to Dan. A local collector purchased the volume of Ottawa slogan cancels, and I have set aside about 1200 Quebec covers and fronts for Jean-Guy Dalpé to have a look at.

I enjoyed going through this material and in finding some illustrated advertising covers, patriotic coves and blackout slogans. However, my one disappointment was that there were no Flag Cancels, other than some in the 35 volume reference collection. This was the main purpose of acquiring the material, in the hope that there would be some flag cancels in the boxes. Since I have now disposed of 8 cartons and 4 boxes of this material, my marriage seems to have been saved for a bit longer and I have recovered the family money I used to pay for the purchase. In fact, as I was going through the material I wondered if I should start collecting slogans again, but in the end, decided to continue to concentrate in Flags.

# UNUSUAL VANCOUVER COVERS

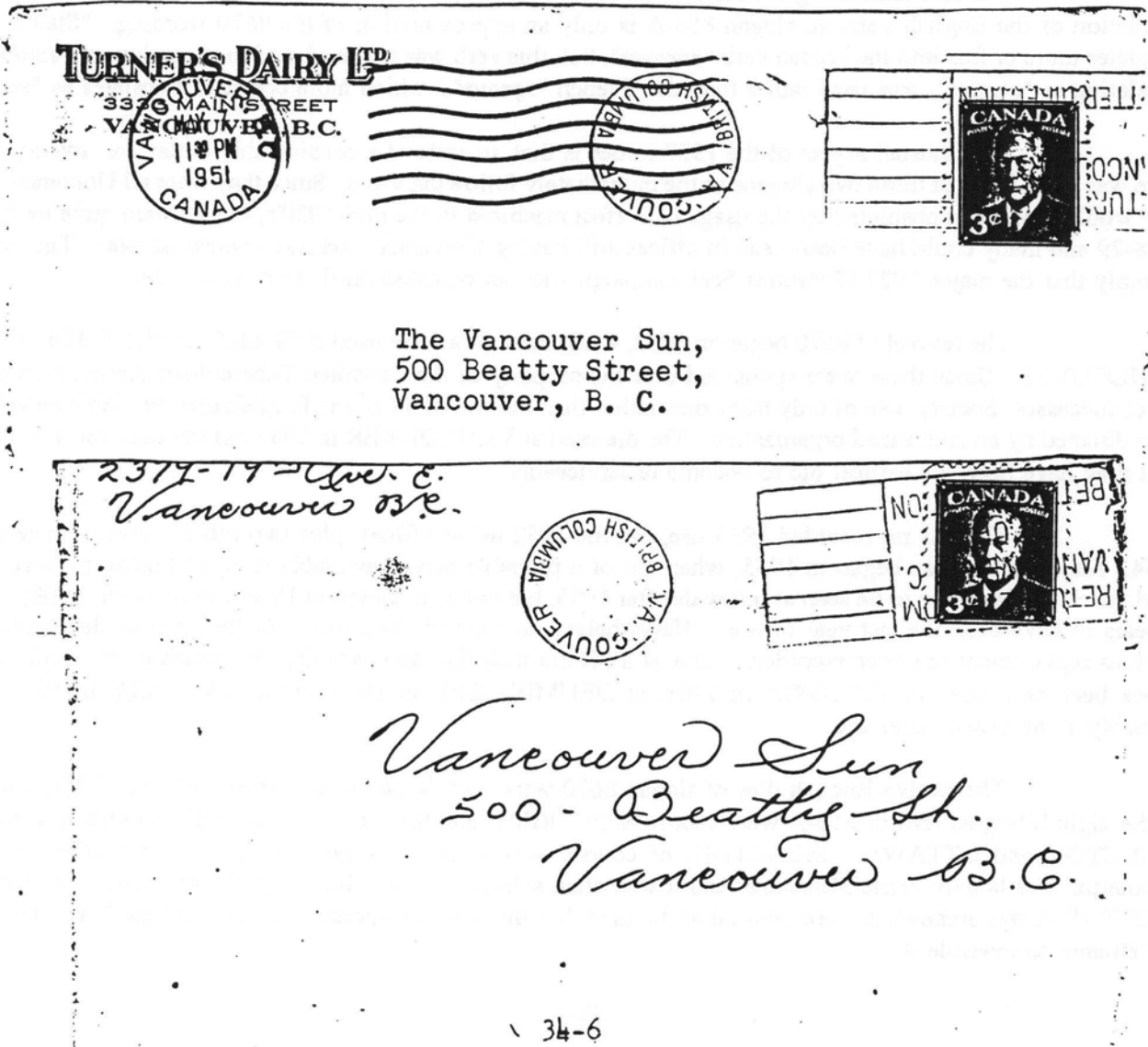
Among material in the Proulx collection recently made available are two 1951 Vancouver covers that are sufficiently peculiar to warrant illustrating. Both are addressed to The Vancouver Sun, 500 Beatty Street, Vancouver B.C., though mailed by different parties. One received an improperly placed wavy line cancel with full dater that missed the stamp, the second has a back stamp of the same cancel with identical time and date.

In both cases the stamp is canceled by an undated inverted postal marking reading RETURNED FROM VANCOUVER B.C. FOR BETTER DIRECTION. A postal marking of this nature is not uncommon, but has not been previously seen in this slogan like format, complete with grid, nor as an original stamp cancellation, since letters are usually first cancelled and the need for better direction is then determined on later examination.

However, the major oddity about these covers is that both are inverted, with the wording to the left of the dater, rather than to the right is as far more usual, and in fact these must have been canceled on a special machine, since it seems likely that the normal machines would only accept a dater in the usual position.

Finally, a question arises as to why better direction than that shown should have ever arisen. The Sun is a major Vancouver newspaper, to which thousands of pieces of mail are regularly addressed to the street address shown. Further, there is evidence that these covers were not returned, but were delivered to the newspaper, since a large portion of the Proulx collection came from the files of this newspaper, which had apparently been available to George Potts, from whom Proulx purchased the bulk of his collection in 1970.

Members with knowledge or theories pertaining to this usage are requested to inform the Editor, and these comments will be passed on in a later issue.



## BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS TUBERCULOSIS ACHETEZ DES TIMBRES DE NOEL

## SLOGANS 8670 AND 855-A

Slogan 8670 is probably the only major multi-office usage originating in the 1920's that has not yet been classified in the Newsletter. This omission was due to the fact that, while first issued in 1927, its usage then terminated until it was extensively revived in the 1950's. Since the Proof Book maintenance had ceased prior to the revival, data on the later use was only available from the Editor's own collection, which was not sufficient to warrant publication. However, acquisition of the Proulx material has now supplied enough information to make a reasonably detailed listing possible. Slogan 855-A, the bilingual version of 8670, was classified in Issue 12 by Jean-Guy Dalpe, but again the Proulx material has added enough to warrant a revised listing.

The forerunner of these two slogans was a single bilingual die of slogan 852, sponsored by the Royal Edward Institute for use at MONTREAL only in 1924. It was re-issued at MONTREAL in 1925, and has been seen revived thirty-four years later at MONCTON in 1959. The wording was BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS AND FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS ACHETEZ DES SCEAUX DE NOEL ET COMBATTEZ LA TUBERCULOSE.

In 1927, probably prompted by the earlier example, a national group undertook to sponsor twelve English and eight bilingual dies of slogans 8670 and 855-A. The sponsors are documented as being the Canadian Tuberculosis Association, organized to assist local Tuberculosis Committees in the sale of Christmas seals. Slogan 855-A is really mis-numbered in the Proulx Catalogue, since it is the bilingual version of 8670, both having first issue simultaneously in 1927, rather than of the similar worded slogan 855, which was not issued until 1956.

It is also interesting to note that while the French wording of the earlier slogan 852 is an accurate translation of the English version, slogan 855-A is only an approximation of the 8670 wording. "Stamp out" translates more or less into the French verb "*enrayer*", but this verb was not used, and the French noun "*timbres*", translating as "stamps", was used rather than the French "*sceaux*", which more correctly translates as "seals".

The unusual aspect of the 1927 issues is that, in spite of a considerable outlay for twenty dies, there was no re-issue of these two slogans in the immediately following years. Since they were all Universal dies, they would have been obsoleted by the usage of Perfect machines in the mid-1930's, but all were quite usable in 1928-29 and many could have been used in offices still having Universal machines somewhat later. This seems to imply that the major 1927 Christmas Seal campaign was not repeated until many years later.

The revival of 8670 began in 1952, when three dies were used at EDMONTON, ST. JOHN'S and VANCOUVER. Since these were sponsored dies the property of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association or its direct successor Society, use of only three dies rather than the use of all of the English dies available must have been directed by an authorized organization. The die used at VANCOUVER in 1952 has not been recorded later, so it may have been the earliest die to become unserviceable.

There is no recorded 1953 use, but the 1952 using offices, plus two others, have been seen in 1954. Major further use began in 1955, when ten of a probable eleven available dies are known to have been used. Various dies cease to be seen at intervals after 1955, but one is recorded to 1968 and two until 1969, which appears to have been the last year of use. Nevertheless, in spite of the attrition of the original dies, only one obvious replacement has been recorded. This is a PB die with the same wording in a much more simple style. It has been seen used at VICTORIA in 1963, at DRUMHELLER in 1964 and at CALGARY in 1965 with probably some unseen later use.

The twelve English dies of slogan 8670 were each issued to a different office in 1927, but half of the eight bilingual dies of 855-A were sent to MONTREAL and the others to QUEBEC, TROIS RIVIERES, MONCTON and OTTAWA. MONCTON, of course, was in New Brunswick rather than Quebec, but its population was largely French-Canadian and it was often selected to use a bilingual slogan. Issuing a bilingual to OTTAWA was somewhat more unusual at the time, but this was the sponsor's choice and the Post Office did not attempt to overrule it.



## SLOGANS 8670 AND 855-A CONTINUED

The revival of 855-A began in 1955, but did not include multi-die use at MONTREAL, since that office still used Perfect machines only in that year. The revived use was largely at such smaller Quebec offices as SHAWINIGAN, RIMOUSKI, DRUMMONVILLE, ROUYN and JONQUIERE KENOGAMI, although with at least occasional use at OTTAWA. As with 8670, the last year in which use has been seen is 1969.

For both of these slogans, the usage patterns that have evolved from seen material strongly suggest that there was further unseen, and therefore not die identified, use between 1955 and 1969 and this is supported by CPSGB reports of some unseen use between 1955 and 1965, when its reports cease.

It can be assumed that the revival of these dies in 1952, and the later issuance of a considerable number of closely related multi-office slogans, was directed by a national organization for Christmas Seal campaigns, as was the case for Easter Seal and cancer fund raising campaigns in this period. However, some with use in Quebec province only may have been controlled by a provincial rather than national group. The wordings of these related slogans vary considerably as additional or replacement dies were required, with most referencing either Christmas Seals or Christmas Stamps, but some referencing only Tuberculosis, and the annual random re-issue was clearly of available dies, without regard to wording. The termination of their use in 1969-70 coincides with the decision to make bilingual slogans standard for all offices, and it has been reported that English only dies were then withdrawn as not acceptable.

Additionally to the multi-office use, there are several instances of slogans with proprietary use by a single office, but since these were sponsored by local organizations and were not a part of the national distribution, they are omitted from the following list, from which it can be seen that frequently a bilingual or French only slogan is clearly related to an English slogan.

# ODDITIES REGARDING MAIL YOUR CHRISTMAS PARCELS EARLY

SLOGAN 5560

This Postal Directive issued in 1922 is the earliest Canadian slogan to reference Christmas. It was first classified in issue 8 and revised in issues 15 and 24, and these efforts appeared to cover the usage rather completely. However, access to the massive Proulx material has brought to light two very interesting oddities that are worth attention. The Editor much hopes that some members may have either the material or the imagination to suggest solutions.

The first oddity involves WINNIPEG usage in 1924. The Proof Book contains a receipt impression with a WINNIPEG dater reading NOV. 26, 1924, and this is clearly die 2, with the P/PARCELS over the left leg of R/EARLY. However, a regular usage impression has now been seen dated only one day later, on NOV. 27, 1924, which is just as clearly die 3, with the P/PARCELS over the middle of the R/EARLY. There are also later impressions, always of die 3.

The Distribution List shows the issue of this slogan to WINNIPEG on NOV. 26, 1924, with no indication of the number of dies sent or date of return, but these records were only casually maintained prior to 1926, so the absence of exact detail does not mean that subsequent actions did not take place.

Since WINNIPEG had several machines, it is possible that it received two dies, but receipted for only one, and this would be confirmed if there was recorded use there of die 2 in addition to die 3, but all WINNIPEG use seen is from die 3 only, and no die 2 use in 1924 has been seen from any office. Even if die 3 had been damaged immediately after receipt, it could not have been replaced by die 2 as soon as the next day, and since die 3 is recorded undamaged in later years, damage could not have been a factor. The two impressions involved are illustrated below.



The second oddity involves 1923 use of die 4 at two different offices. The Distribution List shows issue of the slogan to BRANDON on OCT. 23, 1923 without date of return and die 4 has been recorded there used on NOV. 16th. There is also a DL record of the slogan being issued to HALIFAX on DEC. 6th, quite a bit later than the usual issue of the slogan in late October or early November, and use has been recorded at HALIFAX on DEC. 8th.

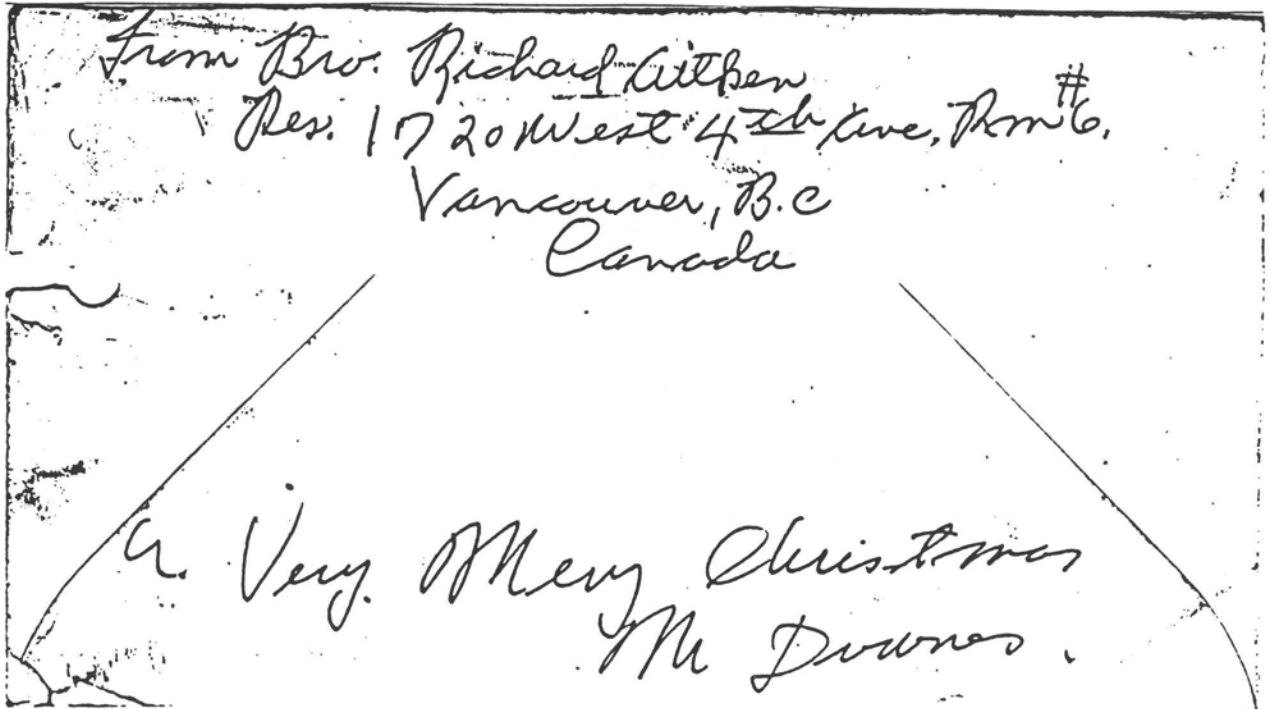
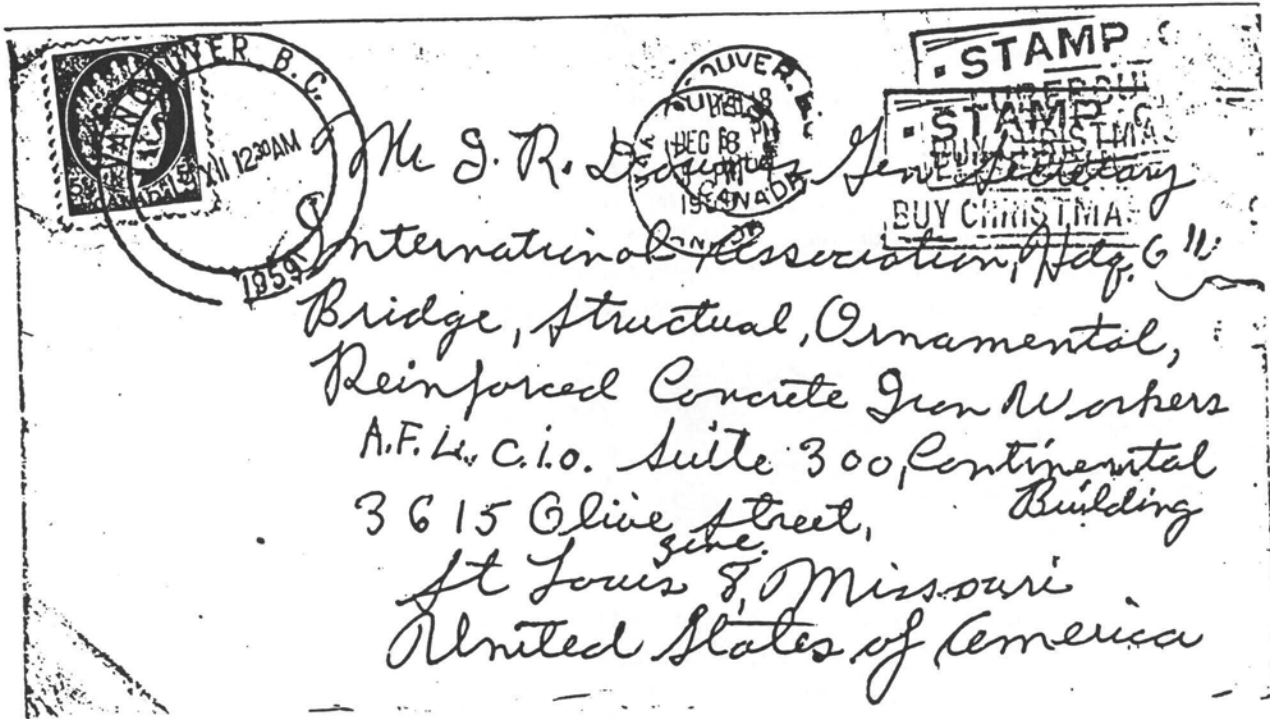
However, the two recorded usages are both of die 4, suggesting that the die was withdrawn from BRANDON well before Christmas and sent to HALIFAX. This would have been a most unusual practice for this slogan, which would normally be retained until after Christmas, but it appears to have occurred in this case and the DL indicates that the slogan SEND YOUR MONEY BY POST OFFICE MONEY ORDER was issued to BRANDON on DEC. 4th of 1923. Since BRANDON was a one-machine office, it would not normally have a die sent to it without withdrawing the previously used die. The two usages are illustrated below, and while the photo copies are somewhat unclear, the actual impressions leave no doubt that both are from the same die.



ADDRESS PROPERLY AND PLACE STAMP IN UPPER RIGHT

Among the many Postal Directive slogans introduced by the Canadian Post Office is one stating PROPER ADDRESSING HELPS SPEED YOUR MAIL, and another is PLACE STAMP IN UPPER RIGHT HAND CORNER. Both are sound pieces of advice, but following one without the other can delay mail, not speed it. Note the very carefully worded proper addressing of the the following illustrated cover, but note also the result of addressing so properly that there was not room to place the stamp in the upper right.

The cover went through the canceling machine at 8:00 P.M. on Dec. 18, but because of the misplaced stamp, it was not speeded on its way, but rather delayed until a hand stamp cancel was applied at 12:30 A.M. of the following morning. Thus, not only the letter itself, but also the warm Christmas greeting on the reverse, suffered delay because of heeding one slogan, but neglecting the other.



## CRIPPLED CHILDREN EASTER SEALS

Slogans 820-825-865-866-2690-4335

A preliminary classification of these slogans appeared in Issue 33, but several responses from members, plus the availability of the Proulx collection, have produced an enormous amount of new data, which in turn prompted further research. This has led to the conclusion that all the multi-office slogans containing the words EASTER SEALS were closely related, and ought to be collected as a single entity, irrespective of differences in wording or format.

Study of the very considerable usage leads to the following conclusions. The organized Easter Seal campaigns, intended to raise funds to assist crippled children, appear to have developed largely in Ontario. There, several local organizations dedicated to this cause unified their efforts through the formation of an Ontario Society for Crippled Children, which in 1947 undertook the sponsorship of the first postal slogans with an Easter Seal theme, intended for use in Ontario offices only.

Shortly thereafter, other organizations throughout Canada with similar goals, including many Rotary clubs, adopted the postal slogan concept and sponsored proprietary dies with various similar wordings, intended for use in their particular localities. By about 1955 there is evidence that a National Society had been organized, with which the Ontario group and many others became affiliated. Eventually this National group appears to have been given full authority to coordinate use of all existing slogan dies, including such former proprietary ones as still existed, to instruct the Post Office regarding the offices to which they should be annually re-issued, and to sponsor such replacement and additional dies as might be required. However, the annual re-issue was entirely random, so that offices only occasionally used truly similar dies for two or more years in succession.

Also, the exact wording and format of new dies appears to have been very casually administered, and the decisions regarding these matters seem to have been left almost entirely in the hands of Pritchard and Andrews, who supplied the dies to the Post Office. Accordingly, the national organization was eventually the issuing authority for a very diverse group of slogan dies, now catalogued under several numbers because of minor wording differences, and with considerable differences in their formats, depending on the decisions of Pritchard and Andrews at the time they were ordered.

Therefore, a classification of the complete usage could be simplified by basing it entirely on usage by office, since neither the Proulx catalogue's arbitrary numbering of slightly different wordings, nor the Editor's attempts to separate formats of similar wordings, are necessary to the collection of related dies as used by more than 85 offices over a 25 year period of combined usage. Nevertheless, since members tend to collect by slogan number, rather than by indicated relationship, and since the formats and sub-formats are easily recognizable, the following rather massive new classification retains these distinctions, although in a considerably revised fashion.

While this new classification is far more complete than the prior one, it reveals office usage patterns which indicate that there are still missing usages of some offices, as well as some instances of reliably reported, but unseen usage which cannot be identified by sub-format or separable dies, so still can only be listed with a "?" in place of full detail.

The first use was of slogan 820, BUY AND USE "CRIPPLED CHILDREN" EASTER SEALS, which eventually had five formats. The earliest of these, format A, originated with the sponsorship by the Ontario Society For Crippled Children of two Perfect and four Pitney-Bowes dies in 1947, with one P and two PB dies added in 1948. The Perfect die usage ceased after 1956, because of the withdrawal of Perfect machines, but four of the five PB dies are recorded to 1963-66. It is interesting to note that GUELPH was still being issued one of the P dies in early March of 1956, but by mid-March switched to a PB machine and was therefore issued a PB die of slogan 865, well indicating that by then the wording or format of related slogans used by an office was a random matter of no importance.



It has now been established that format B of this slogan, the same wording, but without the quotation marks, is die separable into six PB dies, one sponsored by the Rotary Club of Oshawa in 1954 and five more added in 1955 by the Ontario Society for Crippled Children. Three of these dies show major damage between 1955 and 1960, but two of the other three are recorded to 1964. Their difference from the original format A appears to have been inadvertent, rather than deliberate.

The next format of slogan 820 is prior format F, now designated as format C, with the same wording in larger lettering in a wide box, without a grid. It appears to have been sponsored by a local group in Sudbury, with only one die, which is recorded used at that office only in 1956, but was damaged during use and this format is not recorded thereafter.

The former format D, first recorded in 1957, remains so designated. Its sponsorship is not documented, but dies are recorded as having had concurrent use from three Ontario offices in 1957, so there must have been at least three dies, all appearing as identical, with an over-sized box and a short grid, since from 1956 multiple dies were manufactured from a master die and cannot be visually separated. Its 1957-59 use was exclusively in Ontario, but HALIFAX used one of the dies in 1960 and REGINA used another in 1961, again indicating that by then formerly proprietary dies were being randomly re-issued throughout Canada.

The very similar prior formats C and E are now listed as two sub-formats of a single format E, so they are designated as sub-format E-1 (former format E) and E-2 (former format C). Again, sponsorship is not documented, but the format E-1 dies are first seen in 1959, with use to 1968, and the format E-2 dies are seen in 1964-69. Both sub-formats have small lettering in a larger than normal box, with a shortened grid, and the E-2 is almost certainly a series of replacements for unserviceable E-1's. The dies of this format are not separable, but there appear to have been at least two dies of E-1, used exclusively by three offices in 1959-68, and at least three dies of E-2 used at a larger variety of offices in 1964-69.

The second slogan with an Easter Seal theme was 865, reading BUY EASTER SEALS HELP CRIPPLED CHILDREN, omitting the words "AND USE" that were part of slogan 820, the omission probably being brought about merely to shorten the wording, rather than any attempt to create something different from earlier use. This became the wording most frequently used by slogans urging support for the sale of Easter Seals, and eventually had use in six formats, but it originated with format A, consisting of only two dies sponsored by Saskatchewan Rotary Clubs in 1951.

They were sponsored for use of one PB die at Regina and one at Saskatoon in 1951, the dies being similar, but separable. The original dies were proprietary to the using offices, and are documented as re-issued to these two offices in 1952-55. Both offices continued to use Crippled Children slogans until 1961, but after 1955 their proprietary dies became part of the national pool of dies, the Regina PB die 1 being recorded at TORONTO in 1958 and 1960, and from 1956 on the two Saskatchewan offices received randomly issued dies of other formats.

The same wording in a second format, designated B, originated in 1955, when the Canadian Council for Crippled Children sponsored two slogan 865 PB dies for use at SYDNEY and ANTIGONISH. In the same year the Sunshine Camp Association, a Newfoundland branch of the Council, and the North Bay Rotary Club sponsored dies in this format for use at ST. JOHN'S and NORTH BAY respectively. These four PB dies had use in their originating office in 1955 only, but the two Nova Scotia dies became part of the national pool and were re-issued in Ontario from 1956 until 1961, since they were then under the control of the dominion-wide Council, rather than of a local organization.

A third format of the 856 wording, originating in 1958, was prior format B, now designated as format C. The sponsorship is not documented, but although most of the early use is in Ontario, the dies were later used elsewhere throughout Canada. The usage of it is in two sub-formats, the second being replacement dies from 1963 on, and it had by far the greatest use of any format of any Easter Seal slogan. It is recorded from twenty-five offices in 1959, but each die probably rotated to two offices during each year. Even so, it means that there were over a dozen dies.

The difference between the original sub-format 1 and the replacement sub-format 2 is merely in letter placement, but the multiple dies of each sub-format were normally non-separable as they came from a master die, though there is one oddity. One of the sub-format A dies issued in 1958 has the word CRIPPLED clearly spelled CRIPPLED, and it reappears in 1959 and 1961, with very probable unseen use in 1960. That the error should have had use for four years before being withdrawn is strange, but it is even more strange that a single die from a group manufactured from a master die should vary in any way from the balance of the group.

The next format of slogan 865 was prior format E, but is now designated format D and it is divided into two sub-formats, the first being the original issue dies and the second being subsequent replacements. Both sub-formats are in the overall slogan style, without a grid and with the wording in only three lines rather than four, and vary only in letter placement. Usage of sub-format D-1 began in 1956, there probably having been an issue of four dies, with at least three sub-format D-2 dies added from 1957. It is probable that the entire format was intended as additions or replacements of earlier formats of slogans 820 and 865.

The fifth format of slogan 865 was prior format D, but is now designated as format E, and like format D above it is divided into two sub-formats of original issue and later replacement dies. Its 1956 issue and subsequent usage to 1971 was very concurrent with that of format D, generally to the same offices as those using format D. It reverts to the more common style of a separate slogan box with a short grid at the right and the wording in four lines.

The sixth and final format was a group of non-separable dies, prior format C, now designated as format F. The dies are similar to those of format E, but the word placement of the four line wording differs. Its earliest use was not until 1967, continuing to 1971, and obviously was intended to replace earlier dies that were no longer serviceable. It has been recorded at eight offices in 1969, so there were at least that many non-separable dies.

In addition to the major use of the wording of slogans 820 and 865, there are a number of other multi-office slogans with slightly different wording, but all referencing Easter Seals and all clearly related to the general usage of slogans with this theme. Of these, slogans 825 and 866 were included in the prior classification, but slogans 2690 and 4335 have now been added. This group of four slogans is described below.

Slogan 825, BUY AND USE EASTER SEALS, is a variety of slogan 820, with "CRIPPLED CHILDREN" omitted. It originated in 1952 when the Rotary Club of Halifax sponsored a proprietary P die with this wording, again merely an attempt to shorten the wording rather than to alter the message in any fashion. It is documented as having been re-issued to HALIFAX in 1953-55 but appears to have been replaced in 1956 only by a new P die. Since HALIFAX switched to PB machines in mid-1956, this replacement die became obsolete and the office was thereafter issued various available PB dies of other numbered slogans.

In 1954 the Co-ordinating Council for Crippled Children (Alberta) sponsored five proprietary dies, coincidentally with the slogan 825 wording, for use at CALGARY, EDMONTON, LETHBRIDGE, MEDICINE HAT and RED DEER. Since CALGARY, LETHBRIDGE and MEDICINE HAT still used Perfect machines at that time, three of the five are P dies 1 to 3, while the other two are PB dies 1 and 2. The documentation indicates re-issue of these in 1955, but since most Perfect use terminated in 1956, the three P dies became obsolete and only the two PB dies are recorded in 1956 at EDMONTON and RED DEER. These two dies became dormant for several years, but were briefly revived in Ontario in 1964 as part of a general distribution of all Easter Seal dies.

Slogan 866, BUY EASTER SEALS TO HELP CRIPPLED CHILDREN, is a variety of slogan 865, which originated as a single proprietary slogan die sponsored in 1952 by the Society for Crippled Children of Manitoba for use at WINNIPEG. The sponsor selected the slightly different wording, since WINNIPEG had not previously used an Easter Seal die. It was not re-issued in 1953, probably because the Manitoba Society affiliated with the National Society and WINNIPEG was randomly issued a slogan 820 die in 1953. However, the original die has been recorded elsewhere in 1958 and 1962, with other unseen usage very probable.

In 1953 the British Columbia Society for Crippled Children sponsored two proprietary dies for use at VANCOUVER and VICTORIA. They selected the wording BUY EASTER SEALS-HELP CRIPPLED CHILDREN, but unaccountably the manufacturer delivered two dies worded as slogan 866, which were accepted and put into use. The VICTORIA die was re-issued there in 1954, but in 1955 it was somewhat oddly used at CHATHAM, although the VANCOUVER die, not requested for re-issue in 1954, was re-issued to that office in 1955. Both dies have been recorded elsewhere in 1958 and 1961.

Slogan 2690, EASTER SEALS HELP CRIPPLED CHILDREN, is catalogued as used in 1956-58 by unnamed offices, but the Proulx material included only SUDBURY use in 1958, so its origin, probably as a single proprietary die, is not known. However, it appears to have become part of the pool of Easter Seal dies and is recorded at three different offices in 1964-66.

Slogan 4335, HELP EASTER SEALS HELP CRIPPLED CHILDREN, is recorded in 1968-69 only at various Alberta offices, although oddly also at DAWSON CREEK B.C. in 1969. It appears to have had at least three dies, and its restricted use suggests that it was proprietary to a local Alberta Society.

Additionally to the above, there are several Easter Seal theme slogans that originated as proprietary to a single office, and remained so, rather than being incorporated with the national campaign. For the present, these are outside of the scope of this study.

The usage appears to have terminated in 1969-70, although there are very occasional instances of 1971 use. It seems probable that this termination was related to a Post Office decision in the early 1970's that all future slogan wording be bilingual, requiring new dies for all slogan use that would continue. The sponsors may not have been willing to undertake purchase of at least forty of the by then rather expensive bilingual dies.

Additionally, it can be noted that the National Society did not appear to have any affiliation in the province of Quebec, since what little slogan use with the Easter Seal theme that was in a Quebec bilingual form, such as slogans 34 and 865-A, appear to have been of local proprietary origin.

The appendices to this article are lengthy, since the overall usage covered is very heavy and extends over many years. Appendix A list usage by slogan, by format, by sub-format, by office, by year and by die identification if the die involved is separable. When any element of this information is missing, because the impression has only been reported by slogan and format, but has not been seen, the missing data is referenced by a "?"

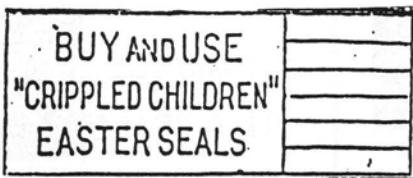
Appendix B is a listing by office by year that provides interesting information. It indicates the number of recorded using offices, presently 87, although further research may indicate one or two more. A very few offices are recorded in one year only, but the usage period of others is normally extensive. There is some usage from each province except Quebec, but the great majority of it is from a dozen major Ontario offices, many of whom appear to have had continuous usage over twenty or more years. In the case of these latter offices, when an intervening year's usage is missing from the list, it can be very safely assumed that this missing usage existed, but has not yet been recorded.

Finally, there is considerable illustration of the material classified. Whenever dies are separable (those issued prior to the Master Die concept initiated in 1956), they are all illustrated. Additionally there is at least one illustration of each format and sub-format.

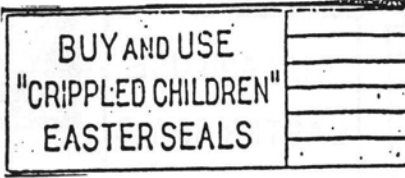

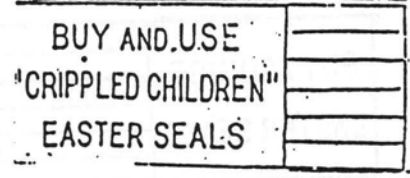
Slogan 820 - Format A - 8 Separable Dies



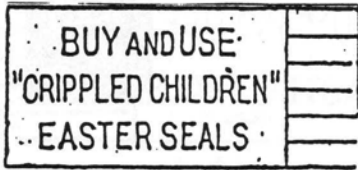

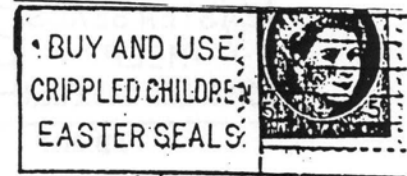
Slogan 820 - Format B - 6 Separable Dies



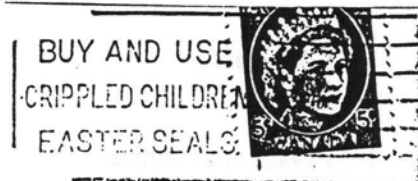

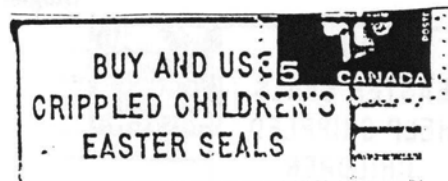
Slogan 820 - Format D - 3 Non-separable Dies

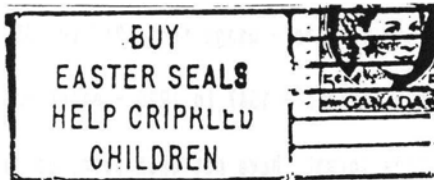

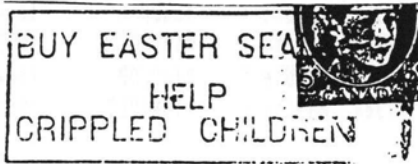
