Revision No. 3 to the Proulx Catalogue is totally new. It comprises 41 pages and incorporates all previous lists. This list is available from Cecil Coutts at a nominal cost of \$3.00 which includes postage.

With the announcement that David Proulx has retired from the catalogue business, the field is open for a new entry. Cecil Coutts plans to jump into the fold and is planning a "Made In Canada" bilingual product. Other features will include cross-referencing, revised pricing, and a complete listing of Newfoundland pre-confederation.

The Proulx catalogue numbering system has more than reached its maximum capacity. Sub-numbering and sub-sub numbering has left little room to maneuver. A feature of the new catalogue will be new numbering. Lest you get too excited about changing your whole filing system, it is quickly added that the new number and the Proulx number will be presented side by side for ease of reference. The added material will result in a catalogue which will be printed in landscape format.

Publishing a new catalogue would not have been considered if it were not for the work done by the executive and members of the Slogan Study Group. Dan Rosenblat in particular must be singled out for his tireless efforts. His research has given the field of slogan study much credibility. Incidentally, Dan has endorsed my plan to publish.

If a much improved catalogue is to see fruition, then the continued help of all study group members is needed. The latest slogan, seen at the top of this letter, tells the story. I do not need money. I do need information.

There are many bilingual slogans which I do not have. Proof impressions of these post-1953 are not available. I do need the French text and will be sending a list of wants to some of you have large holdings.

Post-Proulx slogans are needed. Right up to the present. Newer slogans are quite graphic. A bit of a description would be nice. Better still, a photocopy. They also appear in upper and lower case lettering. Please specify.

If you can add to multi-user list, please do.

Spray-on postmarks have opened a whole new look to slogans. Most of you have seen the POSTAL CODE CODE POSTAL spray-on but it has been reported that other slogans are making their appearance in the same style. New finds should be reported.

A target date of 1996 has been set for publication. There is much to be done in the interim. Your help is eagerly solicited.

Slogan 2985 - ENJOY LIVING SWIM SAFELY

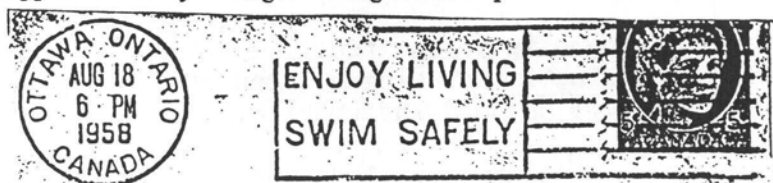
It is somewhat difficult to imagine what sort of organization would go to the expense of sponsoring over a dozen dies advertising the advisability of swimming lessons in order that one could continue to enjoy living. Aside from that, the slogan is not really important enough to warrant an article, were it not for some interesting oddities in its usage.

The Proulx catalogue list use at twelve major offices in 1957-61, but actually it appears certain that there was no 1959-60 usage. Additionally, a 1956 use at CALGARY only can be illustrated. This is difficult to understand, unless possibly some local Calgary organization sponsored one die in 1956 and some national organization was so attracted to it that the sponsored eleven more dies for broad use in 1957. Even if this were the case, the single die used in 1956 would not have been a master die, from which the other eleven could be struck the next year, yet this CALGARY die appears as identical to all those first used in 1957.

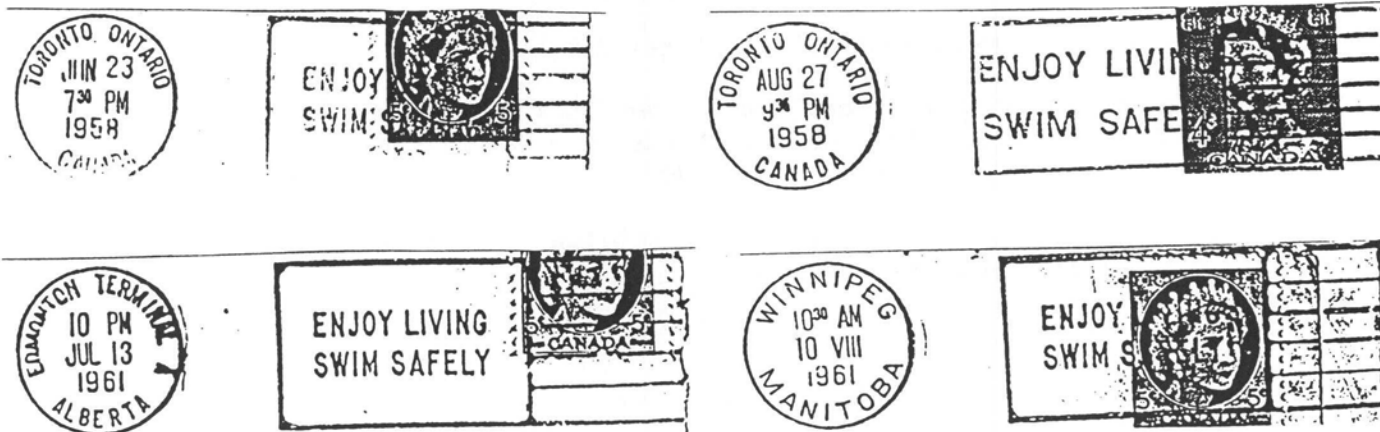


Usage in each year was in mid-summer, and appears to have been very generous. The Editor has enough EDMONTON 1958 material to strongly suggest use every day from at least mid-June to mid-August. While EDMONTON was a multi-machine office, to dedicate one machine to a slogan of this nature for a two month period is certainly unusual.

It would also be unusual if all twelve dies survived heavy usage in three years without some damage, so it is not surprising that one die appears as badly damaged during the later part of its use at OTTAWA in 1958, as illustrated below.



However, this could not have been the only damage, since the early TORONTO use in 1958 is from a new die in much smaller lettering, as illustrated below. However, and again very oddly, the later TORONTO 1958 use reverts to the format of the original dies, but the smaller lettered die reappears, with an identical companion, at both EDMONTON and WINNIPEG for the revived 1961 usage.



The only usage not actually seen is that of HALIFAX in 1957 and of OTTAWA in 1961, but it can be reasonably assumed that both exist. A bilingual version, slogan 430, reading Baigneur prudent baigneur content enjoy living swim safely, was used at MONTREAL and at QUEBEC in the same three years.

THE 1919 VICTORY BONDS SLOGAN

Having recently purchased the Jeffrey Switt 1919 Victory Bonds slogan collection, it occurred to me just how difficult a complete collection would be to obtain.

When Daniel Rosenblat prepared his Slogan Postal Markings book on Canadian slogans "In the Classic Period 1912-19", many of these Victory Bonds slogans were listed as "undated report".

Many of these, I feel, are rarer than the 1917-18 flags, which have been extensively researched, first by Ed Richardson, and then in all the issues of "The Flag Pole".

Periods of use for these slogans were certainly quite short, all probably having been issued on October 15th, and with the exception of WINNIPEG, all withdrawn after November 15th.

The Editor and I have prepared a listing of the total usage, which we believe to be complete in terms of the using offices, with such specific dates as have been recorded from the several collections available to us. When compiling this, a strange pattern surfaced. There were over 30 single machine offices known to have used two different slogans in the Oct. 15-Nov. 15 period, but of these only KITCHENER has recorded dates for two different slogans.

In the case of the other offices, we either have seen dates for one slogan only, or for neither of the two reported usages. Obviously, if these offices actually used two of the slogans, use must have alternated, but it is very surprising that the accumulated dating available show this alternation for only one office and not for any others.

Especially in order to rectify this odd situation, would all members kindly check their holding and send me information on any usage outside of the dates indicated on the following listings. If replies are received, I will report the results in a future Slogan Box article, which hopefully will be much enhanced from that now presented. Please address your replies to

Fred Langford has very kindly given me a copy of a News Bulletin of the International Postmark Society, dated January 22, 1920, illustrated on the following page, showing the extent of the contemporary research, which omits slogan 3468 and quite a few using offices now known.

Slogan 38

Issue 35 had a short article on slogan 845, BUY CANADIAN KEEP CANADIANS WORKING, together with its bilingual version, slogan 38. The article stated, and attempted to demonstrate with illustrations, that both MONTREAL and QUEBEC used individual non-separable dies in 1958, and that while no QUEBEC use had been seen for 1959, it very probably existed.

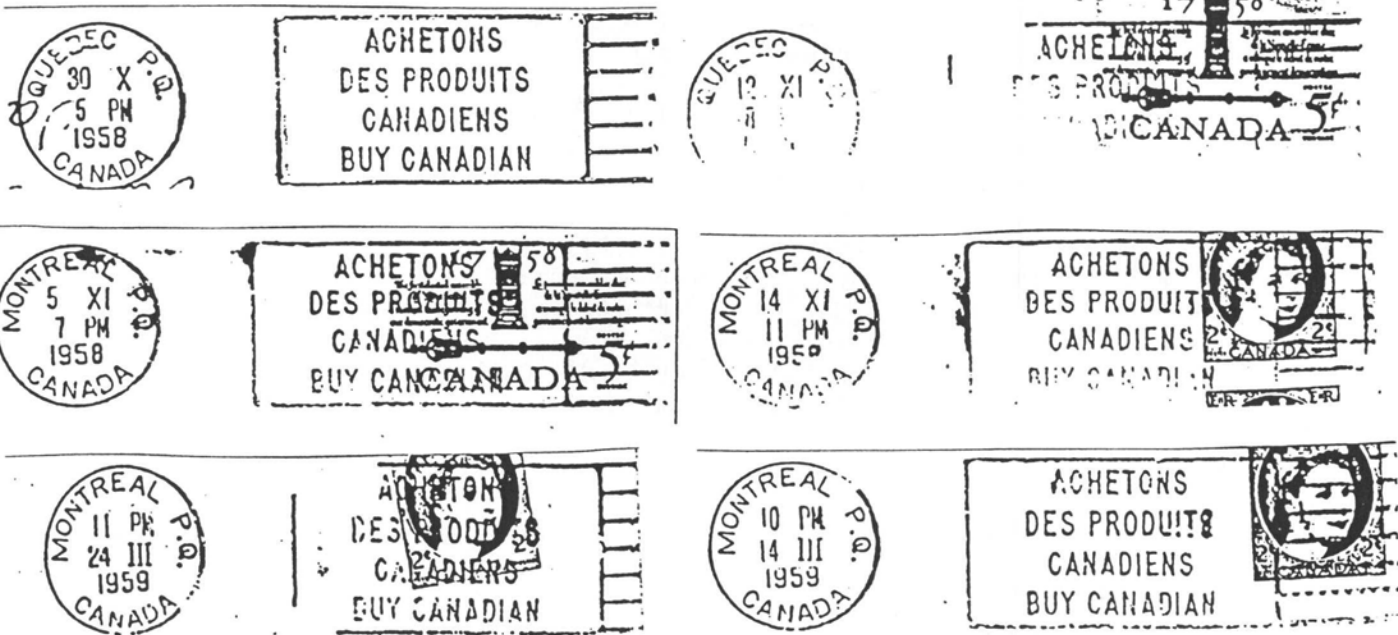
The basis for this concept was that the QUEBEC die suffered damage in the upper left corner during 1958 use, but it appeared that it was nevertheless reissued to MONTREAL in 1959, leaving the undamaged 1958 MONTREAL die available for 1959 use at QUEBEC. Certainly at first glance, the illustrated 1959 MONTREAL damaged use of March 25th, 1959, closely resembled the damaged QUEBEC use of November 12th, 1958, so the belief that both impressions were from the same die was not unreasonable.

However, Jean-Guy Dalpe, with considerably more material available to him, has been able to very cleverly prove that the two impressions were not from the same die. Rather, he has demonstrated that MONTREAL was reissued its 1958 die in 1959, so it was not available for QUEBEC 1959 use, and therefore, because of the damage that the 1958 QUEBEC die suffered, it was not reissued to QUEBEC in 1959.

The March 25th, 1959 damaged MONTREAL impression was the only one that the Editor had seen, so he mistakenly assumed that it had been issued to MONTREAL in that condition in early March. Jean-Guy had the advantage of finding in his collection a very clear MONTREAL impression of March 14th, 1959, showing that at that time in earlier March the die did not have the damage in the upper left corner which had developed by March 25th, and therefore, in spite of the resemblance to the damage of the QUEBEC 1958 die, MONTREAL's 1959 use was a reissue of its 1958 die.

To even further prove that MONTREAL's 1959 use was of its 1958 die, Jean-Guy very cleverly checked his several impressions of the MONTREAL 1958 use, and found that between March 5th and 14th, 1958, the die had developed a small, but unquestionable, break in the upper box over the left leg of N/ACHETONS. It can be seen that the same break remains constant on the MONTREAL March 14, 1959 impression and is still evident on the March 24th impression, showing the subsequent major break in the upper left corner that so much resembled the damage to the 1958 QUEBEC die.

Accordingly, the several following illustration from the Dalpe collection offer ample evidence that QUEBEC could not have had 1959 use of slogan 38.

Slogans 835 and 6440

In 1961 the Canadian government began a major postal advertising campaign to promote the sale of Savings Bonds, and continued it in varying degrees for over twenty years. The initial issue appears to have been to 41 English and 8 bilingual offices, all of which continued to use the slogans to 1969. Beginning in 1970, the P.O. policy was to convert all slogan wording to bilingual, and by 1972 this appears to have been accomplished, since there is no recorded use of slogan 835 after 1971. Some of the prior 41 English using offices are recorded as using slogan 6440, and some additional previously English offices also began using it, as well as province of Quebec offices.

Slogan 835 usage - Original non-separable dies were issued to 41 offices in 1961, with the three line wording in relatively thin lettering. By 1963, these original dies began to require replacements, but some originals were still recorded to 1968, and there may have been unrecorded later use of a few. The replacements that originated from 1963 were all from a master die, but not from the original master die, having somewhat broader lettering. By 1965 additional replacements were required, but oddly neither of the two prior master dies were used, since replacement dies beginning in 1965 were in three new formats, with wider lettering similar to the 1963 replacements, but in three differently sized slogan boxes, all wider than the original and first replacement dies.

Just why prior master dies did not seem to be available at later dates, and why three different master dies should have been created in 1965, is quite unclear, but there were eventually at least six separable formats of the slogan, the sixth being first recorded in 1966.

Although not all use has been seen, and therefore die format identifiable, it seems clearly assumable that all the original 41 offices continued to use the slogan in each year 1961-69, from October 1st into very early November, with no additions nor subtractions from their number. However, BELLEVILLE was added to the using offices in 1970 by the issue of a slogan 6440 die, but continued use in 1971 with a slogan 835 die, then reverted to slogan 6440. Also, OSHAWA, part of the original 41 using offices, switched to slogan 6440 in 1970, but reverted to slogan 835 in 1971 only.

VANCOUVER has been recorded in 1965-68 as using two dies in each of these years, so it is very probable that it used two dies in each year, and other multi-machine offices may have done the same.

Appendix A lists use of the 41 offices for 1961-69, with the seen die formats A to F indicated as available. The six formats are illustrated below. Note that care has been taken to illustrate correctly sized die impressions, but in practice many impressions suffer horizontal distortion, usually an enlargement of the right half, but occasionally a diminution. Accordingly, some impressions will appear as not matching any of the illustrations, but such mis-matches are very probably caused by distortions.

Slogans 835 and 6440 continued

Slogan 6440 usage - This bilingual version of slogan 853 was also initiated in 1961, with use at nine province of Quebec offices, all of which appear to have continued to use the slogan in each year of 1961-69, with no additions or subtractions from their number. The original issue of format A non-seperable dies with narrow lettering was probably ten, since there is strong evidence that MONTREAL used two dies in each year

By 1962 the original dies began to require replacements, but at least two originals were still recorded in 1967, and there may be unrecorded use in 1968-69. As with slogan 835, the wider lettered format B replacements were from a master die, but not from the original master die. By 1963 additional replacement dies have been recorded, very slightly different from the 1962 replacements, but not sufficiently so to warrant being treated as a third format. Therefore, the 1961-69 province of Quebec usage is only separated into two broad formats, A being the original thin lettered dies and B all the broader lettered replacements.

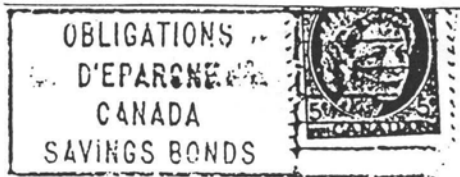
All appear as withdrawn after 1969, and replaced by new bilingual dies identical to those issued for 1970 use at prior English using offices. These can be readily distinguished as format C, since all 1961-69 dies incorrectly omitted the accent mark above the "E" of EPARGNE, but this was corrected and is present on all the many 1970 issue dies.

Just how many of the new 1970 format C dies, with the accent mark, were issued is difficult to determine. At least five of the nine province of Quebec prior using offices, plus at least one without prior use, have been seen or reliably reported in 1970. Also, ten of the 41 prior English using offices, plus two English offices without prior use are recorded. In 1971 there were additional or replacement dies in a slightly different format D, the two formats recorded as used in eight province of Quebec offices, four of them 1961-69 using offices and the other four without use in that period, plus 17 non-Quebec offices, 16 of them 1961-69 using offices and one without that usage. However, in both 1970 and 1971, there were still a considerable number of non-Quebec offices using slogan 835.

All slogan 835 dies were withdrawn after 1971, and 25 offices are recorded as using slogan 6440 formats C and D dies, mostly those with 1961-69 use, but also a few others, though it is probable that there is considerable additional unseen usage. Somewhat oddly, the only 1973 usage is an unseen report, which may well be an error, although use was resumed in 1974 and for some years thereafter.

An oddity of 1974 resumed use is that, in addition to the format C and D dies, there was added use of a final format E, again with the accent mark missing, but otherwise not matching formats A and B. There is only limited seen use in 1975-76, although considerably more is reliably reported. What has been seen is in formats C, D and E. All usage after 1976 is unseen, but Bob Thorne has reported some usage in 1977-79 and 1981-84, although usage in these periods must have dwindled down to less than ten offices in 1977-81 and probably only a very few in 1982-84. The five formats A to E are illustrated below.

As indicated by the following Appendix of offices, by year, by slogan, by format, there were 63 using offices, 10 using 835 only, 24 using 6440 only and 29 using both slogans.



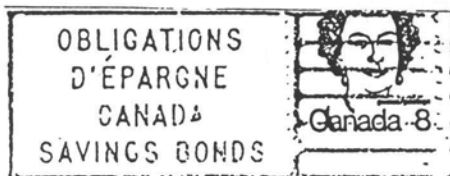

Format designation is given if available. If format is listed as "?", it is unseen use, either assumed or reported.

VANCOUVER and MONTREAL are known using two dies in several years, and therefore are assumed to have used them in each year.

In 1970 and 1971 only a few slogan 835 offices have been seen and format established, A few have been reported without any format, and some are known to have used 6440. Certainly some of the balance used 835, but which ones cannot be determined, so the listed usage is limited to those seen or reported, with no others assumed.

CHRISTMAS SEAL RELATED SLOGANS

Prior issue 34 included a classification of slogan 8670, STAMP OUT TUBERCULOSIS BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS, together with its bilingual version, 855-A. Although first sponsored in 1927 by a national group dedicated to the sale of Christmas Seals, these slogans had no further use until reissue began in 1952, and was accelerated in 1955-69, concurrently with several later multi-office Christmas Seal related slogans.

This suggests that a new organization, The Canadian Tuberculosis Association, had evolved by 1949 to coordinate most Christmas Seal distribution and slogan advertising throughout Canada, and it appears to have been granted re-issue rights for the 1927 dies, in addition to the new slogans that it later sponsored. At the same time, surviving dies of Christmas Seal slogan advertising, originally sponsored by affiliated local or provincial groups well before the 1952 reissue of slogan 8670, appear to have been then pooled into this national group for broader distribution.

Almost all of the multiple dies issued after 1955 were manufactured from master dies, so they cannot be effectively separated as were those originating earlier, although in many instances later replacement dies of these slogans were issued in clearly different formats. Unfortunately, only that part of the Post Office correspondence files on sponsored Christmas Seals slogans covering 1927-49 has been available, although the balance is on order. Therefore, much of the extensive later use must be classified based only on material actually seen or reliably reported, but the Proulx material provides an extensive base.

The amount of material included is so massive that classifying each of the many slogans involved in full detail would entail space well beyond the scope of an entire issue of this Newsletter. Accordingly, the most productive manner of publishing what has been researched is to briefly refer to each related numbered slogan in this text, and to append a single all-inclusive Appendix listing by offices, by slogans, by formats and by dies (if from the earlier separable die slogans), integrating therein the previously published concurrent usage of slogans 8670 and 855-A.

This will at least give members an indication of the extent of the usage of all of these related slogans, how thoroughly mixed their annual random reissues became, and also which of the multi-machine offices used more than one of the related slogans in a given year.

First, there are listed and illustrated those earlier related proprietary slogans that were not involved in subsequent pooling, used at one office only, either for one or more years. These are followed by the later related proprietary slogans, sponsored by a local group independently of the national organization, in the post 1952 period.

There was very early proprietary use from 1913 at TORONTO and HAMILTON of slogans soliciting financial help for hospitals dedicated to aiding consumptives, an early term for those suffering from tuberculosis, but this was probably before the introduction of Christmas Seals, and their adoption as a means of fund raising, so they are omitted from this classification. Later there were the following, in their order of issue.

CHICOUTIMI - 1930 - ACHETEZ DES TIMBRES DE NOEL, omitted from the Proulx catalogue.

LONDON - 1938-39 and 1941-42 - slogan 850, BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS, decorated with a single Cross of Lorraine, the symbol of the Christmas Seal issuers.

VANCOUVER - 1939-46 and 1950 - slogan 850-A, the same wording as above, but decorated with two Cross of Lorraine symbols.

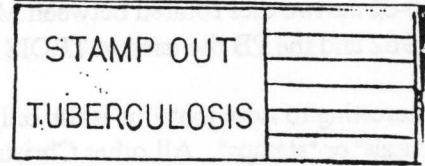
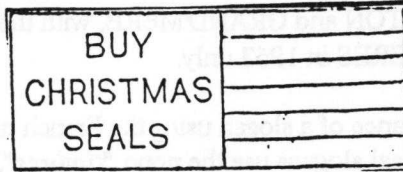
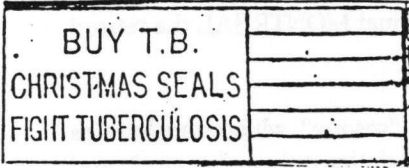


CHRISTMAS SEAL SLOGANS continued

TORONTO - 1946-56 - three concurrent dies of slogan 880, BUY T.B. CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS. This use preceded TORONTO use of other related Christmas Seal slogans.

HAMILTON - 1947-48 - slogan 849, BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS, the same wording as 850, but without decoration. Oddly, this HAMILTON proprietary die was revived at VANCOUVER in 1953 and again in 1963.

BRANTFORD - 1947 and 1949 - slogan 8668, STAMP OUT TUBERCULOSIS.

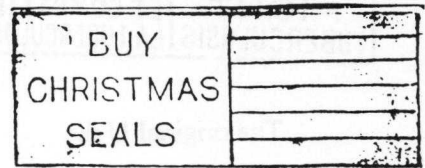
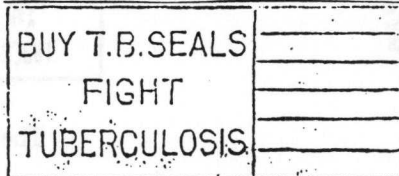
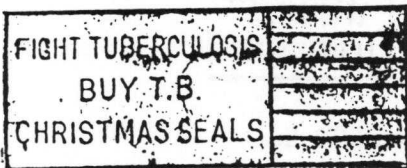


ST. JOHN - 1950 and 1954-55 - slogan 3445, FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS BUY T.B. CHRISTMAS SEALS.

OTTAWA - 1951 - slogan 9350, THE CHRISTMAS SEAL PROTECTS YOU AND ME. Proulx listed, but not included with his material, nor documented. As OTTAWA used 9353 in 1951, it is unlikely that this slogan exists.

WINNIPEG - 1953-59 - slogan 883, BUY T.B. SEALS FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS.

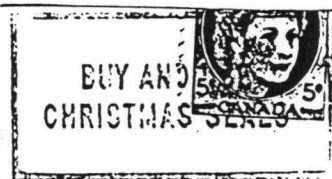
VANCOUVER - 1953 and 1963 - slogan 849, BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS, the die used by HAMILTON in 1947-48.



SYDNEY - 1954 - slogan 3440, FIGHT T.B. GIVE NOW. Proulx listed, but not included with his material. Possibly based on a single CPSGB report from its least reliable member, so the usage is very doubtful.

DUNCAN - 1960 - slogan 814, BUY AND USE CHRISTMAS SEALS.

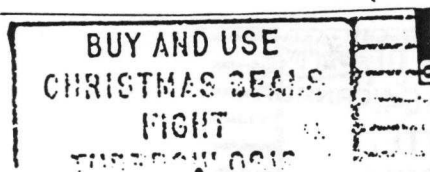

MONTREAL - 1963 - slogan 30, ACHETEZ DES TIMBRES DE NOEL BUY AND USE CHRISTMAS SEALS

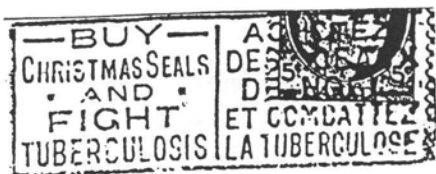
REGINA - 1965-66 - slogan 1660, CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT T.B. The die showed damage early in its 1966 use and greater damage later, but was nevertheless retained to early January of 1967. Proulx lists undated ST. JOHN'S use in addition to REGINA, but it is more probable that it was proprietary to REGINA, and ST. JOHN'S usage does not exist.



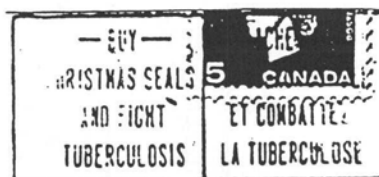
In addition to the above, there is also a group that can be called semi-proprietary, normally consisting of one or a few dies rotating by year among only a small group of offices. These consist of the following.

Slogan 852 - BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS AND FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS ACHETEZ DES SCEAUX DE NOEL ET COMBATTEZ LA TUBERCULOSE. One of the two dies of this slogan was probably the earliest with the words CHRISTMAS SEALS, having been used at MONTREAL only in 1924-25, then retired for over thirty years before being revived in 1959. However, in 1956 a new PB die with the same wording was issued to MONCTON, with use there through 1958. In 1959 the original U die was revived at MONCTON and the PB die rotated to GRAND'MERE. In 1960-62 the two dies rotated between MONCTON and GRAND'MERE, with the original MONTREAL die retired after 1962 and the PB die used at TROIS RIVIERES in 1963 only.

It is interesting to note that this is the only instance of a slogan using the French noun "sceaux", which translates as either "seals" or "stamps". All other Christmas Seal slogans use the noun "timbres", translating only as "stamps", and this caused some confusion at a later date. In 1964, the Post office issued the first of its annual stamps with a Christmas motif, and at the same time advertised them with slogan 860, BUY CHRISTMAS STAMPS NOW. This slogan was bilingualized in 1970 by adding the words ACHETEZ VITE VOS TIMBRES DE NOEL, which makes it appear as though it was a sponsored Christmas Seal slogan, rather than a postal directive.

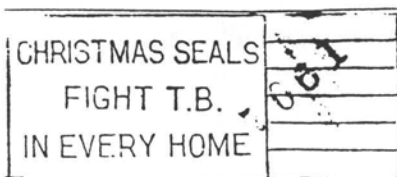


The original U die



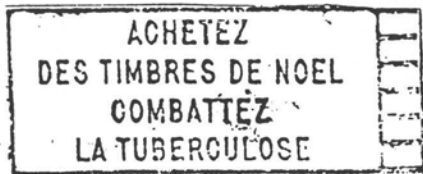
The additional PB die

Slogan 1662 - CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT T.B. IN EVERY HOME. The single die originated at WINNIPEG in 1952, was probably pooled thereafter and it has been recorded at NEW WESTMINSTER in 1955 and at SASKATOON in 1956-60.

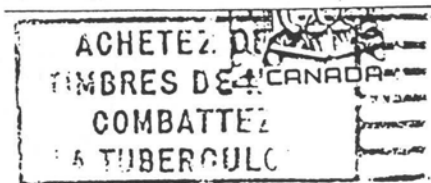


Slogan 33 - ACHETEZ DES TIMBRES DE NOEL COMBATTEZ LA TUBERCULOUS. Proulx numbered the bilingual of slogan 8670 as 855-A., suggesting that it was a version of 855, but that is not the case. This is the French only version of 855, BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS, although 855 had both earlier and later use.

Two non-separable dies were issued in 1958 and rotated through 1962 at QUEBEC and TROIS RIVIERES. However, in 1960 use is also recorded early at CHICOUTIMI and later at QUEBEC, possibly a third die, but more probably shared use. The QUEBEC 1962 use shows damage, and neither die is recorded thereafter. A separable third die is recorded at ALMA in 1965 only and at TROIS RIVIERES in 1967. There are unseen reports of additional use to 1969, including use at CHICOUTIMI, but these are not yet confirmed.



One of two 1958 dies



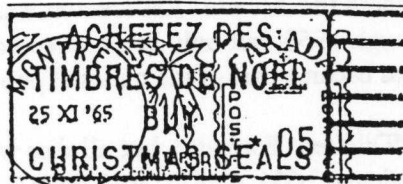
The single 1965 die

CHRISTMAS SEAL SLOGANS continued

Slogan 32 - ACHETEZ DES TIMBRES DE NOEL BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS. This exclusively province of Quebec slogan does not translate as a version of any English slogan. Usage was initiated at MONTREAL in 1959, from one format A die, not thereafter recorded. From 1963 to 1966 other dies are recorded at QUEBEC, MONTREAL and GRAND'MERE, too similar to be separated other than as format B. One is also recorded at HAWKESBURY in 1969.

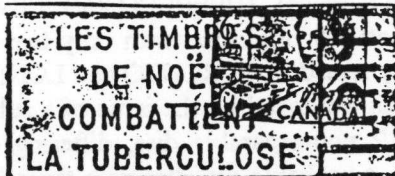


Format A die



Format B die

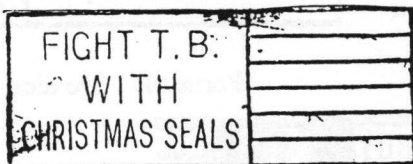
Slogan 5340 - LES TIMBRES DE NOEL COMBATTENT LA TUBERCULOSE. This all-French slogan was issued in 1966, and the wording is precisely that of the French portion of OTTAWA's 1961 proprietary slogan 1663. It had use exclusively in Quebec province, but only three offices have been recorded, each in a different year. This gives the appearance of a single die, rotated in each year from 1966 to 1971, but Proulx lists use at ten unnamed offices in that period, though his material does not reflect anything like this amount. The only recorded use is at HULL in 1966, THETFORD MINES in 1969 and ARVIDA in 1970. It is illustrated below.



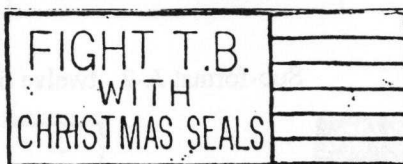
The major usage is from a considerable group of multi-office multi-year slogans, some of which also have bilingual versions. Slogans 8670 and 855-A, which originated in 1927 and were revived from 1952, have already been classified in the previous issue. The balance are listed in the order of their first usage.

Slogan 3442 - FIGHT T.B. WITH CHRISTMAS SEALS. Sponsored by the Alberta Tuberculosis Association in 1946, with pre-1953 use in Alberta only. The original dies were pooled in 1953, with three added then and two more in 1960, so post-1953 use became diversified. There were eventually twelve dies in five formats. Proulx lists use at 16 offices in 1946-67, but only 15 are recorded in 1946-66. If Proulx's 1967 use is correct, it may be the 16th office.

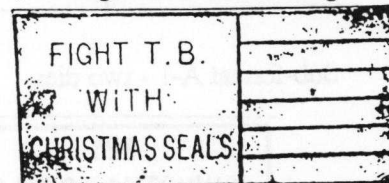
The original issue was one Pitney-Bowes and two Perfect three-line dies in 1946., designated format A, plus one PB die in a larger lettered format B. Format A had a P die added in 1947, and two PB dies in a smaller lettered format C were added in 1949. In 1953, after the earlier dies were pooled, one P and two PB dies were added in a two line format D. Two small lettered three line format E dies were finally added in 1960, serving most 1960-66 usage.



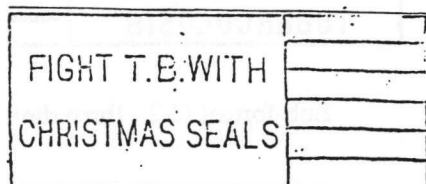
Format A - four dies



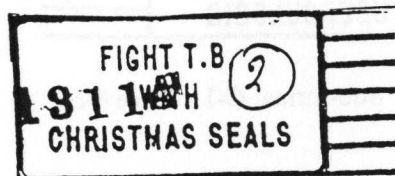
Format B - one die



Format C - two dies



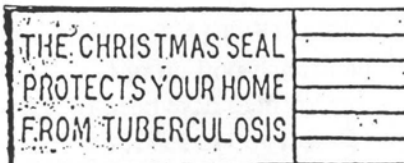
Format D - three dies



Format E - two dies

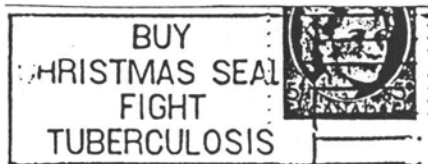
Slogan 9353 - THE CHRISTMAS SEAL PROTECTS YOUR HOME FROM TUBERCULOSIS. Sponsored in 1949 by the Canadian Tuberculosis Association, a national grouping of 228 affiliated local committees, which for the first time since 1927 undertook to issue Christmas Seal slogans on a national basis, and eventually pooled existing dies sponsored by its affiliates. The initial issue consisted of 3 Perfect and 4 Pitney-Bowes dies for use in seven of nine English speaking provinces. The exceptions were in B.C., where VANCOUVER was using its proprietary slogan 850-A, and in Alberta, where the Alberta Association was using dies of slogan 3442. All seven dies were used in the same provinces through 1952, but only two are recorded in 1953 and there was no usage in 1954. In 1955 the remaining serviceable dies became part of the national pool, and were randomly reissued until 1958.

Proulx states "Different Formats", but all dies were in the same format, with no replacements, except that it is very probable that slogan 1664, CHRISTMAS SEALS HELP PROTECT YOUR HOME FROM TUBERCULOSIS, first issued in 1958, is a replacement for slogan 9353. Since there is only one format, it is illustrated with a single die.

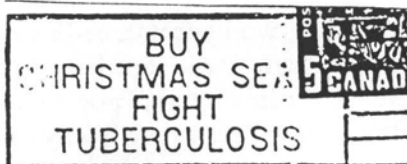


Slogan 855 - BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS. Eventually issued in three formats of non-separable dies, but two with sub-formats. It originated with only two dies in 1956, four-line wordings in large letters, designated format A-1, originally issued to TORONTO and LONDON in 1956-58, with later use of one die at other offices. In 1957 use was much expanded by the issue of a sub-format A-2 and two new formats. Sub-format A-2 consisted of a probable 12 non-separable dies, differing only slightly from sub-format A-1, with decreasing use to 1970. Also in 1957, a probable five dies with three-line wording in smaller letters, designated format B, were issued with decreasing use to 1962. Finally in 1957, at least three dies with four-line wording, designated sub-format C-1, were issued with declining use to 1966, when three replacement sub-format C-2 dies were added, with declining use to 1969.

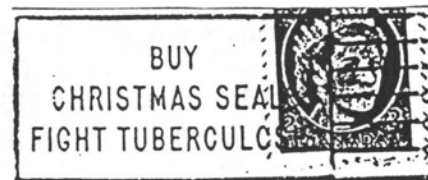
Total use was probably of 23-25 dies, from 1956 to 1970, recorded at 26 offices, but major usage was from ten offices, each of which used the slogan in from ten to fourteen of its fifteen-year span. The majority of the dies were unserviceable after 1966, and there is no evidence of any post-1967 replacement dies being issued. Proulx lists 29 offices in 1956-69, but at least one use has been seen in 1970. Only 26 offices are recorded, based on the Proulx material, but a few others are certainly possible. Illustrations of the formats and sub-formats follow.



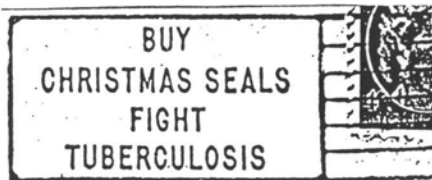
Sub-format A-1 - two dies



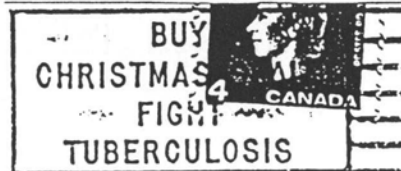
Sub-format A-2 - twelve dies

Sub-format C-2 - three dies

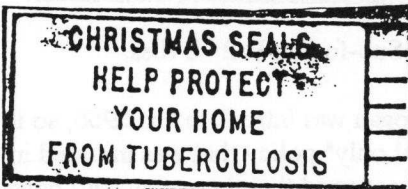
CHRISTMAS SEAL SLOGANS continued

Slogan 1664 - CHRISTMAS SEALS HELP PROTECT YOUR HOME FROM TUBERCULOSIS. This second slogan to reference "protecting your home", after slogan 9353 above, was issued in 1958, concurrent with declining use of 9353. It was probably intended to supplement and extend the ten year 9353 use. There are two formats, designated A and B, the same except that the wordings on the third and fourth lines differ. However, format A dies are recorded in six sub-formats, the differences being partly width of the slogan box and also slight differences in letter placement.

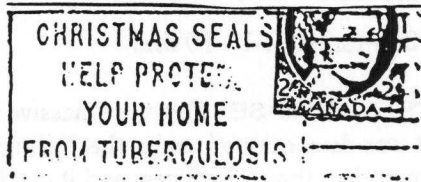
Twenty-one non-separable sub-format A-1 dies were issued in 1958 to twenty-one offices, and reissued to the same offices in 1959. A single sub-format A-2 die was added in 1955, so that TORONTO could use it and its sub-format A-1 die concurrently. This die probably had unrecorded use in 1960, but is recorded as used at SAULT in 1961. It suffered considerable damage in that year, and further use was unlikely.

There was also damage done to the sub-format A-1 dies in 1959, and use of it decreased sharply until it is finally recorded at only one office in 1966. However, by 1960, 14 or 15 new dies were issued as sub-format A-3, as were one new die of sub-format A-4 and two of sub-format A-5. The final sub-format A-6 consisted of two dies issued in 1961. By 1962 attrition of the dies required at least nine or ten replacements or additions, designated format B.

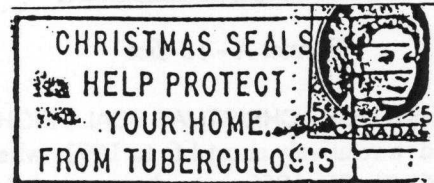
Use is recorded from 32 offices in the period 1958-69, but major use was from 14 offices, each using the slogan in from seven to ten years of its twelve-year span, Use decreased sharply after 1964, and the relatively few dies recorded from 1966 are the earlier format A residue, the format B dies appearing to have become unserviceable after only a few years of use. The formats and sub-formats are illustrated below.



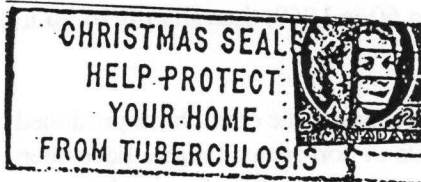
Sub-format A-1 - 21 dies



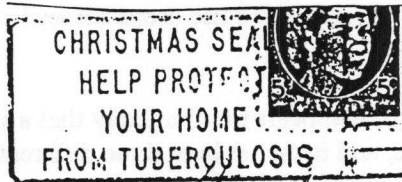
Sub-format A-2 - one die



Sub-format A-3 - 14-15 dies



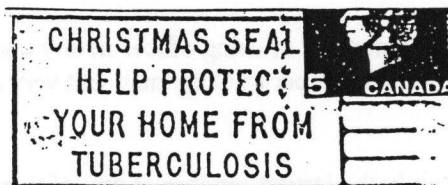
Sub-format A-4 - 1 die



Sub-format A-5 - two dies

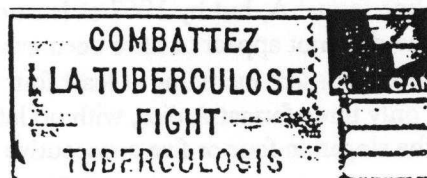


Sub-format A-6 - two dies



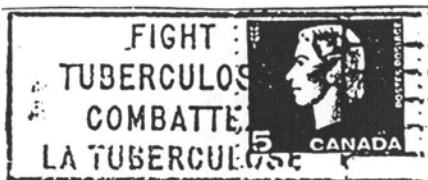

Slogan 1820 - COMBATTEZ LA TUBERCULOSE FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS. This French-over-English bilingual was first used in Quebec province only, but has later use at BELLEVILLE in 1965 and KITCHENER in 1966. It is reported as used at ALMA in 1961-63 and seen in 1962 from a single sub-format A-1 die. Proulx lists an unseen 1960 use, which if correct would likely have also been used at ALMA. The use at the two non-Quebec offices are from a separable sub-format A-2 die and a separable sub-format A-3 die has been recorded at QUEBEC in 1966 and at MONTREAL in 1969, with unseen 1967-68 use probable. Finally, a new sub-format A-4 die is recorded at QUEBEC in 1969 and 1971, with 1970 use there probable. As sub-format differences are minor, only one illustration is used.

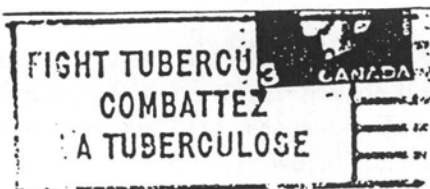


Slogan 3447 - FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS COMBATTEZ LA TUBERCULOSE. This English-over-French slogan is a reversed bilingual of slogan 1820, introduced in 1963, somewhat later than 1820, for use at non-Quebec offices. It is possible that the single die of 1820 that had use in two non-Quebec offices was intended to be a part of 3447, but had the wording inadvertently reversed. Proulx lists the 3447 usage as at 29 offices in 1963-70. Recorded use is from 28 offices in 1963-70, but a 29th may very well exist. In any event, the slogan is very unusual in introducing bilingual usage at non-Quebec offices well before the 1969-70 policy to do so.

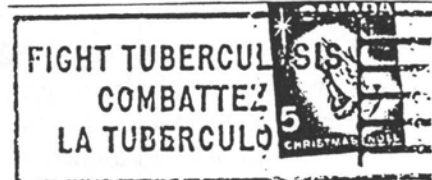
The initial use was in a four-line format A, with eight dies recorded in 1963 and the usage pattern suggests as many as five more. It has been recorded in diminishing numbers through 1967. Several dies must have suffered damage in 1963, since a new three-line sub-format B-1 was introduced in 1964 to replace at least seven of the format A dies at the same using offices as in 1963. A decision appears to have been made in 1965 to much enlarge the usage, so a few additional sub-format B-1 dies were issued, plus probably eight new sub-format B-2 three-line dies. As many as 26 offices have been recorded in 1965, using all three die styles. There do not appear to have been any further replacements, and recorded using offices diminish to only four in 1969 and three in 1970. The illustrations follow.

Sub-format B-1 - 10 dies



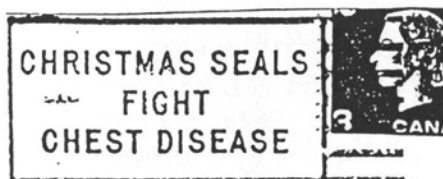
Sub-format B-2 - 8 dies

Slogan 1658 - CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT CHEST DISEASE. This very massive slogan was introduced in 1966, so it had a relatively short life to 1971, when it was discontinued under the "bilingual only" policy that was initiated in 1969-71. The 1966 use has been recorded from no less than 77 offices, and it can be assumed that there may well have been several others. Almost all of these offices are also recorded in 1967, with those omitted being nearly balanced by some additions, so the total recorded is 72. Recorded use drops somewhat to 60 in 1968, than sharply to 36 in 1969, 22 in 1970 and only nine in 1971.

In the light of the usage of prior related slogans, it appears most unlikely that a single master die could have produced the between 70 and 80 required working dies, and in fact at least three different sets of non-separable dies have been seen, but their differences are very minor. If the impression is anything less than very clear, die identification becomes difficult, so it seems advisable to omit their listing, rather than to offer something quite uncertain.

It is also possible, considering the unusually large number of using offices in any one year, that dies were rotated during the normal Christmas Seal usage period of mid-November to Christmas, but very seasonal slogans of this nature were not normally subject to rotation.

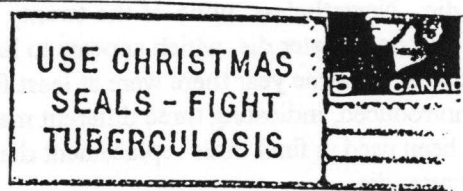
The total of recorded using offices is 107, certainly the largest number of any of these related slogans. Since the several die formats have not been listed separately, only one of them is illustrated below.



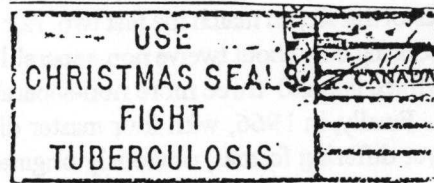
Slogan 9815 - USE CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS. This slogan was introduced in 1966, and appears to have had twelve dies issued in a three line format A, but by 1967 at least one replacement or additional die was required. As before, the original master die does not appear to have been available, so a format B four-line die was introduced. By 1968 at least sixteen offices were recorded, including at least four format B dies. Thereafter use of both formats declined until 1971 is recorded for only three format A dies, with no later use. Total recorded use is from 27 offices, of which at least seven had use of the slogan in four or five consecutive years of its six year usage period. The two formats are illustrated on the following page.

Slogan 9815 illustrations



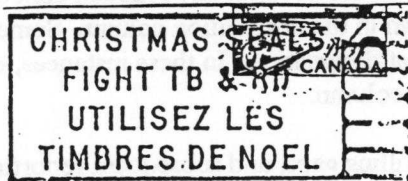
Format A - three lines



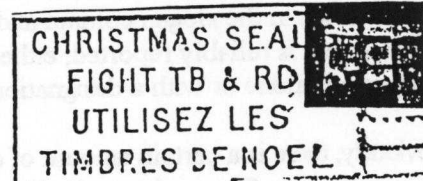
Format B - four lines

Slogan 1661 - CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT TB & RD UTILISEZ LES TIMBRES DE NOEL. This bilingual was the last of the major Christmas Seal slogans, issued in 1969, with use extending into the 1980's. It was issued in accordance with the P.O. policy established in 1969, to phase out all English only slogans by 1972. The usage was largely in the English speaking provinces, but also included the few Quebec province offices still participating in the campaigns. The original 1969 issue probably consisted of 20 format A dies, with slightly thinner lettering that about 10 format B additional dies issued in 1970. Since none of the later use has been seen (the Proulx collection more or less terminated by 1980, and was rather weak in the 1970's), it cannot be determined whether additional formats were introduced, but it seems very probable that some replacement dies were required in the late 1970's, and that they would have differed slightly in format.

A Robert Thorne inventory is available, which permits much of the unseen later use to be listed as "reported", but without format designation. This inventory, plus other seen use, includes at least 105 using offices, with some use to 1984, and in the case of BARRIE, to 1988. This compares with Proulx's listing of 76 offices, with 1969-77 use. The two seen formats are illustrated below.

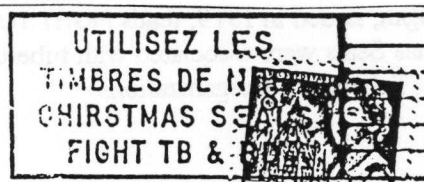

Slogan 9882 - UTILISEZ LES TIMBRES DE NOEL CHRISTMAS SEALS FIGHT TB & RB. This slogan, used exclusively in Quebec province, appears to be a French-over-English version of slogan 1661. Proulx lists use at CHICOUTIMI and QUEBEC in 1973, but all use seen is in 1972 only, from DRUMMONDVILLE and CAP DE LA MADELAINE in addition to the other two offices.



Researching this group of related slogans raises major questions pertaining to the usage of master dies. There is documentation indicating that they were introduced in late 1955 or early 1956, that they cost considerably more than a single normal die, but much reduced the cost of preparing multiple dies, which it had been assumed could be struck off from the master die in any required amount. However, a study of the usage of these slogans strongly suggests that the master dies had limited utility, since more than one of a given slogan are recorded in the same year, and subsequent replacement or additional dies could not always be produced from the original master, but required a new master.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SLOGANS continued

Take, for example, slogan 855. It originated with two dies issued in 1956, but since these are non-separable from one another, they must have originated from a first master die. Nevertheless, none of the twenty or more subsequent dies of this slogan match the first two, nor are they all from a second master die, which appears to have been capable of producing only about twelve non-separable dies in 1957, since in the same year there were at least five more non-separable three line and three more non-separable four line dies introduced, indicating three different master dies in 1957 alone. Finally, in 1966, with four master dies already having been used, a final three replacement dies appear in a similar, yet differing format, obviously originating from a fifth master die.

This puzzling situation is not unique to the Christmas Seal related slogans, since much the same pattern has been observed for most multi-office slogans introduced in the 1956-70 period. No reasonable explanation comes to mind, but any theories pertaining to the problem are solicited.

To summarize this group of 29 related slogans, with use from 1924 into the 1980's, more than 1,500 usages, by office, by year, by slogan are involved. Using offices recorded or reliably reported total 175. At least eleven of the offices, all with more than one machine, used two or more dies in one or more years.

The rather massive Appendix A which follows lists each usage by office, by slogan, by year, with die or format designations where applicable. Although the usage seen is very considerable, there are nevertheless gaps in what appear to be extended periods of use, sometimes entirely of one slogan, but in some cases with a mixture of randomly reissued concurrent slogans.

These gaps have been filled in one of two ways. If the gap occurs in what appears to be the continuous use of a given slogan, the probable slogan number is shown in the slogan column and the word "probable" is shown in the designation column. If the gap occurs in what appears to be the continuous use of randomly reissued concurrent slogans, a "?" is shown in the slogan column and the word "probable" is shown in the designation column. Some data has not been seen, but is reliably reported, either with or without die or format designation. In these instances, either the word "reported" alone or with a designation is shown in the designation column.

Obviously, there is a certain amount of conjecture in this method of filling gaps, and subsequent reporting by members may either confirm or deny what is presently shown. Although every effort has been made to include all slogans referencing Christmas Seals, one or two minor ones may have been omitted, and reports of these are solicited. What has been deliberately omitted are a number of slogans advertising X-rays as a means of detecting tuberculosis. While these are T.B. related, they do not relate to Christmas Seals. Also, it should be noted that slogan 860, BUY CHRISTMAS STAMPS NOW, does not refer to Christmas Seals, but rather to the annual issue of postage stamps with a Christmas motif that originated in 1964.

It is of interest to note that a U.S. slogan, issued in 1919, reads FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS WITH RED CROSS CHRISTMAS SEALS, indicating that Christmas Seals were associated with tuberculosis at this early date, but were distributed by the Red Cross, rather than by a Tuberculosis organization.
