
4-HOLE OHMS PERFIN MAIL: FOREIGN DESTINATIONS 1939 - 1952

By federal decree, OHMS perfin use became mandatory as of July 1, 1939. While the aim of the introduction was stated to be better management of postal expenses, the real reason (like all users of Perfins before) was to reduce stamp theft by employees. As a by-product of this introduction, a new branch of Canadian philately – Officials – emerged. While the vast majority of 4-hole OHMS stamps were prepared and used for domestic use, a small percentage of mail was destined for the United States, Great Britain and other overseas nations. This exhibit focuses on calendarizing the use of the Federal Government's 4-hole OHMS perfin mail to Foreign Destinations. Stamps were procured and perforated centrally by the Post Office Department in Ottawa and distributed to all Federal Departments in all 9 provinces and 2 territories across the country. (Newfoundland was added in 1949.) The items shown chronicle the earliest (August 10, 1939) and latest (June 10, 1952) known foreign uses.

GETTING STARTED WITH TREASURY BOARD APPROVAL

To protect revenues, a Treasury Board directive of March 28, 1939, resolved to order a B.F. Cummins Model #53 single-lever 10-Die perforator for the purpose of perforating stamps for use on all government mail. It was to be managed and operated by the Post Office Department for use beginning on July 1, 1939. The 10-Die machine used a pattern with the letters "OH" above "MS" in 2 lines – OH/MS which is an abbreviation for "On His Majesty's Service". The vertical legs of the H and M have four holes in them, hence the name "4-Hole OHMS". The 6th Edition online BNAPS Perfin catalogue records this pattern as O9. The earliest known foreign destination cover was sent by the Deputy Postmaster General on a Montreal First Flight cover to Southampton, England, August 10, 1939. This machine was replaced in mid-1946 with a very similar machine. So similar was the machine that it took until the 1980's for perfin collectors to positively identify the subtle differences in the OH/MS pattern it produced. This second machine is known as BNAPS perfin pattern O10 and detailed elsewhere in this exhibit.

THE ONLY KNOWN MIXED 5-HOLE & 4 HOLE OHMS COVER TO USA – JANUARY 3, 1940



This National Revenue cover dated January 3, 1940 is *the only known* 5-hole & 4-hole OHMS hybrid perfin cover to the USA. Pays the 3ϕ first ounce surface rate for a 90-minute drive from Sarnia, ONT. to Northville, MICH. The 3ϕ postage rate is paid using 1ϕ 5-hole OHMS (O8-231-1) and a 2ϕ 4-hole OHMS (O9-232-4).
