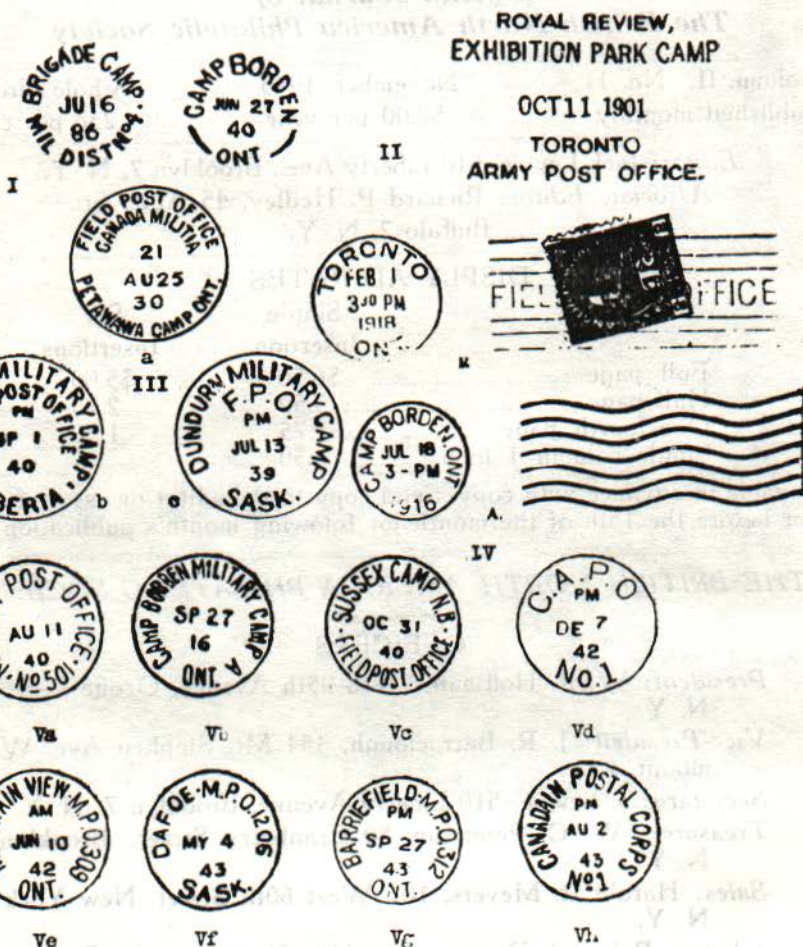

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BNAPSHOTS

by *Click*

COLOR-1C: Appears a claim that Scott is about to list a shade variety of the 10c Mountie (#223) and Click's blood pressure shoots skyward. It's not that Click objects to sub-listing of color varieties in Scott's catalogue. Gosh, no! But if such picayunities are to be admitted to the charmed circle, why does the Encyclopedia of Philately so steadfastly refuse to acknowledge the existence of other strikingly more important color varieties?

For instance they acknowledge "blue" and "dark blue" tones of the Champlain Monument stamp. . . . But where in blazes is any Scott acknowledgement that the 1c First King George I-rue may be found in anything other than "dark green"? Any neophyte in Canadiana can verify the existence of a half dozen separate, and distinct shades, ranging from pale yellow-green, through green, to dark blue-green in this stamp. Specialists can prove that certain of these hues definitely mark periods of issue. Oddly enough, Scott's "dark green" is one of the rarer shades . . . considerably under-valued at 10c mint and 2c used (which is a fair value for a grass-or yellow-green shade.)

Solution? Either for Scott to remove the "dark" from its description of #104, thus by implication conceding the existence of many shades, or for the catalogue to sub-list "green" and "yellow-green" shade varieties.

#104, by the way, is an example chosen at random. Click doesn't have to tell a bunch of expert ENAPshooters that the same thing applies to a score of Scott-mangled listings.

PANES-TAKING: Click was completely dumbfounded, but pleased, to find in the September 29th issue of *Weekly Philatelic Gossip the first* installment of BNAP-Guvnor Nelsbond's long-promised and longer-deferred study of Canadian booklet panes. EXTRACT FROM BY-LAWS

Article III—Membership

Any person, of good character, 21 years of age or over, who by their application bear witness to their interest in the fields of Philately to which this Society is devoted, may become a member. Any dealer shall be eligible for membership; but, he shall declare such professional status, and as such a professional, may not hold any of the elective offices within the Society.
