

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

OFFICIAL NOTICE

The elective officers of the Society shall be so elected by ballot in the odd numbered years, during January.

Nominations may be filed with the Secretary by any 5 members in good standing not later than 90 days prior to the date of election. Each nomination so made shall be published in "BNA TOPICS" not less than 60 days prior to the election date.

An official ballot shall be prepared by the Secretary, containing all nominations, spaces for marking against each name, and space for the signature and number of the member casting the ballot. No ballot other than the official form shall be valid. Ballots shall be returned to the Committee on Elections, which shall be appointed by the President at a time prior to the election. The Committee on Elections shall canvass the vote and report the results at the election meeting and refer a similar report to the Secretary for filing and notice in "BNA TOPICS". A plurality of all votes cast shall be required for the election of a candidate. If no one candidate shall receive a plurality of the votes cast for such office, the Committee on Elections shall issue new ballots for the election to the office.

"FAKED" BOOKLET PANES OF CANADA

Much has been written and you probably have read many times the warning to be wary of booklet panes without the tab or selvedge. It has been claimed that such panes can very easily be created from the regular sheet stamps. Such efforts are not so easily and readily successful and we can use the accompanying illustration to establish our contention.

Illustrated are a block of the imperforated 2c Edward, a booklet pane of six of the same (with tab added) and a strip of three of the perforated stamp. You will note that the overall width of the pane is much wider than that of the perforated stamps, and very much wider than that of the imperforated stamps. Also, the color of the stamps of the panes is entirely different than the color of the others. Thus, by comparing a block of imperforated or perforated stamps with a pane, you can very easily determine whether it is genuine or not.

The reader may well ask where do these Edward and other panes (less tab) come from. I have seen collections that have these panes mounted just as they were torn from the booklet . . . no consideration about preserving the tab. You must appreciate that many, too many, collectors didn't collect with a consideration for condition in those days and the importance of the tab didn't warrant or receive recognition.

As for these "fakes", where are they, I have, or have seen, many tabless Canadian panes. Do you know how many "fakes" I've found . . . not one! Does anyone know where these fakes are that we are warned against? I certainly would like to know. In any event, I hope I've provided a way of recognizing them, if they exist.

The Armed Forces, Air Letter postage 10 cents—was introduced sin 1942, a special form of air mail exclusively for corresponding with the Armed Services overseas in any part of the world. The forms are available at all Post Offices. and consist of a sheet of light-weight paper (with gummed flap for sealing) folding into the shape of an envelopea combined letter and envelope. No enclosures are permitted.

In 1944 the use of the Armed Forces Air Letter was allowed for civilian correspondence, at the 10 cent fee, to the United Kingdom and several British Commonwealth countries overseas including Australia and New Zealand.

In 1942 Hon. Mr. Mulock flew to the United Kingdom to conduct a personal survey of the system of handling the Canadian Military Mails, and at the close of 1943 participated in arrangements for improved mail service to the Canadian Armed Forces in Britain and the Central Mediterranean which resulted in the establishment of a special Air Transport Command by the R.C.A.F. The new supplementary service provided, carries letters to and from the Armed Forces by Air all the way and has resulted in a tremendous time saving.

To facilitate correspondence with Prisoners of War, Air Letter Cards-postage now 5 cents-were introduced for communicating with Prisoners of War in Italy and Germany, and Special Air Mail Postcards—postage 5 cents—for sending messages by air to prisoners of war and civilian internees in the Far East.

In co-operating in the War effort with other Departments the Post Office has become Canada's leading agency in the sale of War Savings Stamps and Certificates and in 1943 the value of War Savings Stamps and War Savings Certificates sold over Postal counters totalled respectively, nearly 12 million dollars, and nearly 5 million dollars. Many millions of Certificates have been delivered to purchasers for the National War Finance Committee, and co-operation is given that body in every Victory Loan.

The Post Office has assisted in the registration of enemy Aliens, in the National Registration of Canadian Man-power, the Registration of Unemployed Males and of women, in the Re-Registration of men under National Selective

Service and in the Registration of

Nurses, urses. Co-operation has been given the War time Prices and Trade Board in Robert rationing through the distribution of forms, cards and of the first ration books and the Department assists in Gasoline rationing through making forms available at Post Offices.

The sale of Unemployment Insurance Stamps has been undertaken at Post Offices and co-operation, too, has been given in the distribution of forms, etc. for the Income Tax Division. Over 3,095,000 lb. of scrap rubber was collected in aid of the National Salvage Campaign during a special drive instituted through the Post Office by the Honourable Mr. Mulock in 1942, in rural areas in Ontario and Quebec. The Department co-operates in Examination duties with the Foreign Exchange Control Board, and until 1942 conducted the Postal Censorship.

To provide reading matter to the Armed Forces the Postmaster General arranged for all Post Offices to become collecting depots for books and magazines handed in unwrapped and unaddressed.

AIR MAIL

The Trans-Canada Air Mail Systemone of the world's greatest networks-is proving of inestimable value to wartime Canada. In the vast gearing up of this country's war production, documents, orders, specifications, price quotations and other data are rushed across the country in a few hours, and the use of Air Mail for business and social correspondence likewise is saving time and money.

This system, consisting of a main artery 3,301 miles in length from Halifax to Victoria, is intersected at strategic points by branch and feeder lines linking up important cities and areas off the main route and forming a vast gridwork across the map of Canada from east to west and from the U. S. border to the Arctic.

Trans-Canada Air Mail was inaugurated on nightly schedule each way on March 1, 1939 between Montreal and Vancouver and since then has been greatly extended, and frequencies have been increased to meet the public need.

Today a letter leaving Halifax shortly before noon is due in Vancouver or Victoria the following morning and deliverable by afternoon. Over the new 3,900 mile route from St. John's Nfld., to Victoria, B. C., a letter can travel in little more than a day.

Canada's Air Mail system connects with the U. S. Air Mail network at various points, and with services to Bermuda, the West Indies, Cuba, Mexico and Central and South America.

Trans-Atlantic Air Mail Service, inaugurated in 1939 to the United Kingdom was greatly improved in 1944 and several trips are operated weekly. Our Air Mail system also connects with trans-ocean services to Europe, Africa, and Middle East, India, Ceylon, unoccupied China, Hawaii, Australia and New Zealand. Before the war in the Pacific, Air Mail connection was made with the Philippines, Eastern China, Japan, etc.

The Post Office transmits Postal Money Order remittances overseas by Air to the United Kingdoms without extra cost to the senders.

Domestic Air Mail volume is increasing monthly and statistics prove that this facility is being generally regarded as a vital everyday necessity. In the fiscal year 1943-44, 7,220,554 lb. of mail was carried by Air in Canada, the miles flown with the mails totalling 12,799,218 compared with 5,373,021 lb. and 10,799,670 miles the year before.

To gain time use Air Mail and Special Delivery—10 cents in addition to Air Mail Postage—and request an Air Mail reply.

Air Mail may be sent Registered or C.O.D. by adding regular Postage charges.

Because it recognizes that Air Mail is a necessity the Post Office calls for the support of each patron in the use of this service and asks each to influence others to do likewise.

This review of Postal History must convince you that rapid communication and progress have gone hand in hand. More convincing than statistics or the written word is the practical experience to be gained by each individual through the practical use of Air Mail whenever time or special appeal are considerations

To form a true picture of the vital part the Post Office plays in the national life one need only imagine the chaos resulting if its services were withdrawn, or ceased to function under existing conditions. Not only would national progress be halted but the retrogression would be disastrous.

This period of progress is sufficient proof of the alertness of the Post Office in catering to the welfare of the Canadian public.

NORTHWEST REBELLION

Everybody has heard of the Northwest Rebellion, but nobody seems to know just how the mail was handled. From the accompanying illustration of the front of a cover and from part of the letter illustrated, it will be seen that the old Postal Act of 1st Jan'y, 1865, authorizing the prepayment of military mail at a 2c rate, was still in effect.

The mail was signed by the Commanding Officer, carried to Winnipeg where a 2c stamp was added and cancelled. This letter was written on May 22nd and postmarked Winnipeg, May 25th, 1885.

It would be interesting to know whether other collectors have similar covers both

from this and earlier campaigns.

But if this auction sale isn't made to order for B.N.A. collectors, maybe I'd

better pick up a needle and thread.

In Canada, we start right in with imperf Beavers and keep going to the end of the books, with a long sojourn among the 1897 Jubilees, with dozens of premium copies of the dollar values, both mint and used. Those "tough" numbers you are laying in in quantity such as #158, 159, 176, 210, C2, C4, J4—they are all there.

In Newfoundland, the money end is in the popular sets from the Cabot on, rather than in the heavy early issues, though they too are present. All the good sets are there, several of them in blocks, and plenty of the scarce air mails as

well.

In Booklet Panes, the featured country again is Canada with a fine showing of exploded booklets and individual panes, including three of the scarce 2c Green George V, with French inscriptions. Quite a number of the scarce panes described so euphoniously in Scott as "pane of four and two labels" are also present.
