DEPARTMENT OF POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS -- NOTICE

(The following NOTICE is reprinted exactly as it appeared in the Newfoundland press.)

In order to speed up the transmission of correspondence between Newfoundland and the United States of America an agreement has been reached with the United States Postal Authorities under which a direct air mail service between Newfoundland and the United States will commence on the 1st January, 1947. The service will be once daily from Gander to New York and once daily from New York to Gander.

The air mail postage rate will be 10 cents per half ounce and this rate will apply in both countries. This rate will cover carriage by air over the air mail net work in the U. S. A.

The present 7c rate to the U. S. A. will

be discontinued with the introduction of the new service. The existing 7 cent rate to Canada will not be affected.

Arrangements have been made for a suitable official cachet to be applied to all mail carried on the inaugural flight on the 1st January, 1947.

Philatelic mail for transmission by this flight may be handed over the public counters at the office in St. John's or Gander, or sent under cover addressed to the Postmaster at St. John's or Gander. All such items must reach the Post Office at St. John's or Gander not later than 6 P. M. Friday, the 27th December, 1946.

HISTORY of the ARMY POSTAL SERVICES in CANADA

(Continued from Vol. 3, page 145)

CHAPTER II (cont.)

In May 1870, it was found necessary to send a military expedition, known as "The Red River Expedition" or "The Red River Field Force". Little seems to be known about the postal arrangements for the expedition but it must be assumed that the Soldier's Rate applied. The author has never seen or heard of a cover for or from the expedition.

The force consisted of Voyageurs, the 60th Regiment (Imperial) Royal Engineers, Royal Artillery, 1st Ontario Volunteer Battalion, and 2nd Volunteer Battalion.

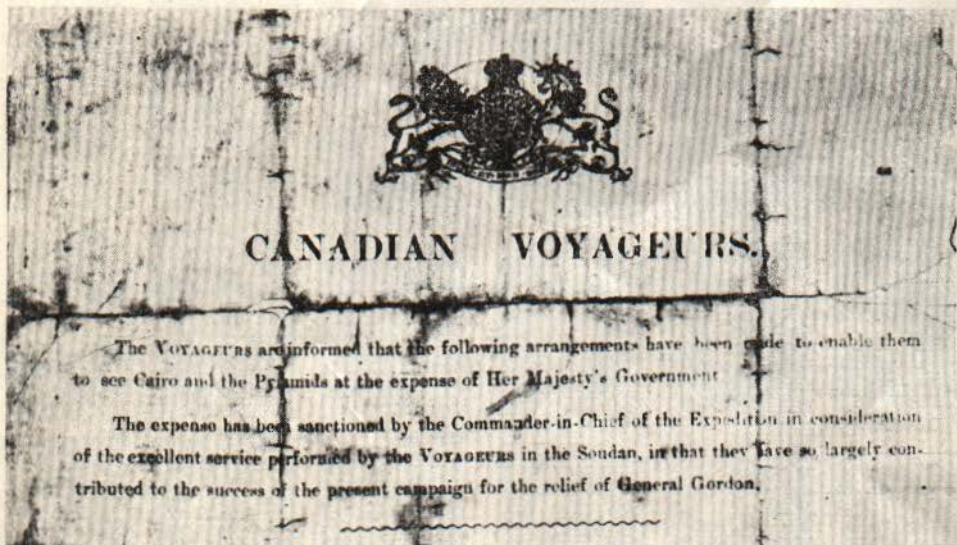
The Government chartered the two steamers "Chicora" and "Algoma" as mail boats to carry the mails and supplies between Collingwood and Thunder Bay; the first boat leaving with a party of Voyageurs on May 3rd. Successive trips, carrying the balance of the troops, etc., arrived at Fort Garry the end of August; the last troops returned on the steamer on October 1st.

Bases were established at Thunder Bay (Prince Arthur Landing), 13 Mile Camp, Wards Landing, McNens Landing (Shebangowan Lake), Youngs Landing, Kashabowi, Fort Francis, Fort Alexander and Fort Garry; with detachments at Kamanistiquia Bridge, Matawin Bridge, and the following Portages: Height of Land, Barrel, Bule, French, Pine, Maline, Deux Rivières and Rat.

CHAPTER III

CANADIAN VOYAGEURS

EGYPT 1884 - 1885



The contingent of Canadian Voyageurs which were to be attached to the Imperial Forces in Egypt sailed from Quebec about the middle of September 1884 on the troopship "Ocean King" arriving at Alexandria on October 8th.



Postal arrangements were under the care of the recently formed Army Postal Corps. The cancellations used were similar to that illustrated herewith. The author has never seen a cover mailed from a member of the contingent.

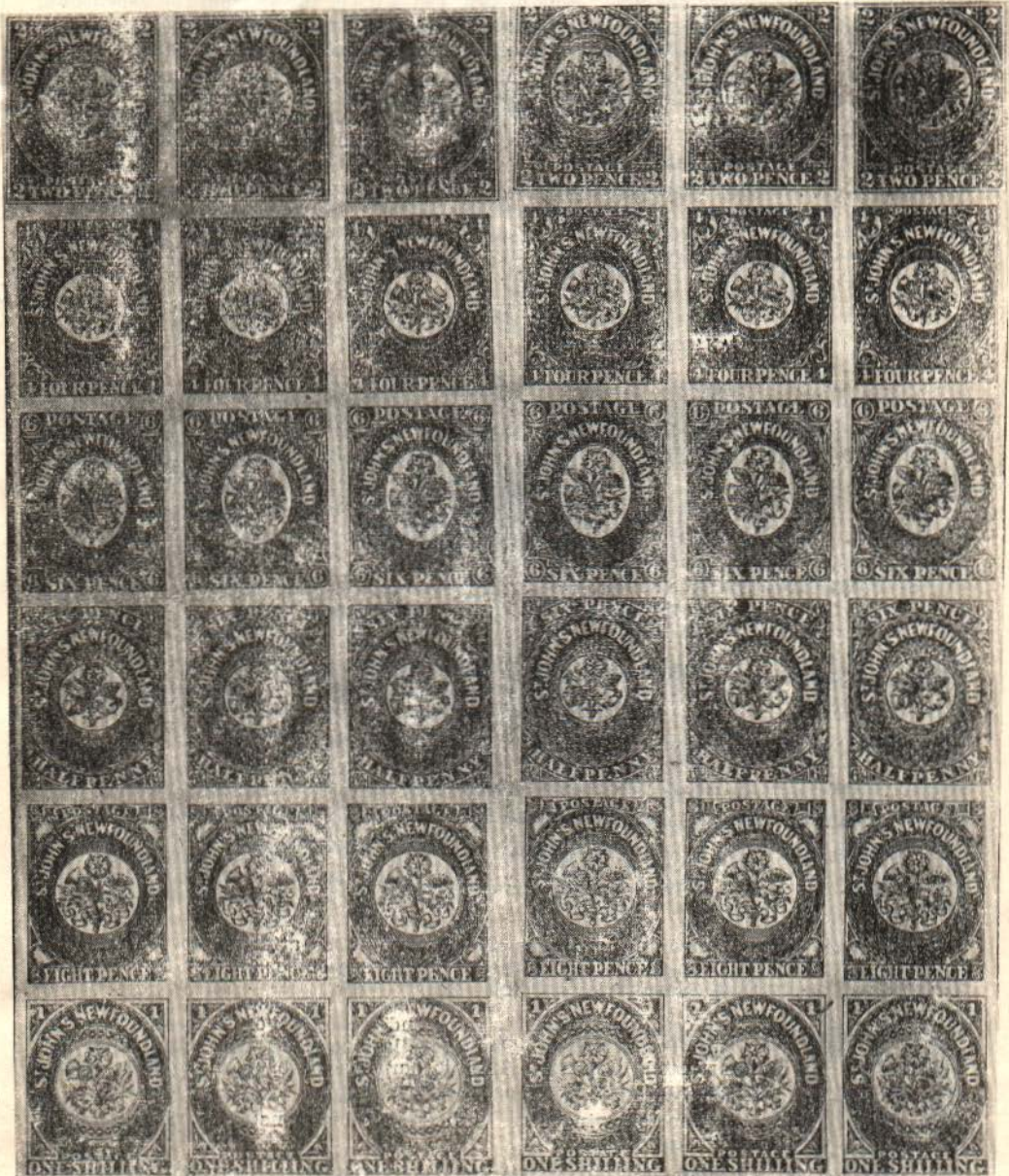
The following dates indicate the locations of the Forces during their stay in Egypt:

Assiout—9 October. Assouan—21 October. Korosko—24 October.

Wady Halfa—26 October, and 18-29 January, 1885. Gemai—29 October, 8 November.
 Tanguan Island—2 November. Sarkamelto—4 November. Dal—various dates between 29
 November and 19 December. Cairo—5 February, 1885.

The troops sailed for Canada, via Malta, on the 6th February, 1885, from Alexandria.

A NEWFOUNDLAND "FORGERY"

The accompanying illustration is a reproduction of a sheet of 36 (6 x 6) engraved forgeries, allegedly by Panelli. The sheets were printed in all of the three issued colors of the 1857-1863 imperforates; scarlet-vermilion, orange and rose. The 2d, 4d, 6d, 6½d, 8d and 1/ values all appear on the one sheet, each value occupying a complete horizontal row of six impressions. The 2d appears at the top row of the sheet and the succeeding values occupy a complete horizontal row beneath, each in the order of their denomination to the 1/ value, which appears on the bottom row.

The forgeries are not too well executed and should not deceive the serious collector. There are innumerable differences in engraving, paper and shade of color.

Since the publication of my article on "The Early Postal History of Canada" which appeared in last month's issue of *BNA TOPICS*, December 1946, I've learned some new information about the town of Caldwell Manor about which I requested any additional information.

Caldwell Manor was a short time Post Office in Missisquoi County in Quebec during 1820-1821 with Wm. Bowron as Postmaster. It required much research to learn in what County above was located, but finally it was "run down" as being a predecessor to the later Clarenceville, which was established permanently on April 2, 1832. No marking is known for Caldwell Manor.

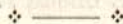

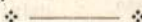

SALES DEPARTMENT NEWS

WHY—ask several members—must circuits be forwarded by First Class Mail?

THE REASON—No, dear friend, not because we like to have you spend your money on postage stamps, but because it is a ruling of the U. S. Post Office Department. They allow the Sales Manager of a circuit to send stamps by Parcel Post because, they rule, he is selling merchandise. Members, and that means all members **MUST** forward circuits by First Class (Registered) because, as ruled by the Washington authorities, a circuit sent by a member to another is not sent for sale by that member. Further, when a stamp is removed, the price under the removed stamp, is no longer indicative of the price of the merchandise, but becomes ordinary writing, and is subject to First Class rates. That is the way we get it from the Assistant Postmaster General in charge. If a circuit is lost which has been forwarded by Parcel Post contrary to these rules, and a claim is filed for loss, how can we collect when in making the claim we state details regarding the nature of the contents, and the Post Office finds that the circuit has been sent contrary to the law?

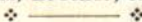
MORAL—Don't gamble a few cents against a possible loss of a Hundred Dollars or more—Remember **YOU** are responsible for the circuit until it is safely in the hands of the next on the list. And, by the way, use commens on your mail, or if none are available, use blocks.

ADVERTISING AROUND THE STAMP BY HERMAN HERST, JR.



King Solomon may have been jealous of the space he called his "sanctum sanctorum", but Post Office authorities in different countries of the world have been no less jealous of the space on an envelope in which the stamp is destined to be placed.

Occasionally business firms use this sacred space for advertising, and almost without exception, their blasphemy does not last long. The long arm of the law soon steps in, and they are made to desist. In the United States, attempts to circumvent the law forbidding any printed matter appearing on the right hand third of the address side have been numerous. Many large business firms, from the Nesbitt firm (who printed our first stamped envelopes) down to Funk & Wagnall in this century, have adopted advertising envelopes with commercial matter adjacent to the stamp. The Government has turned a deaf ear to their pleas that the supply be used up, and they have been forbidden the mails. The result is that while one can find *unused* specimens at times, those that actually saw postal use are not too commonly encountered. It has in fact made an unusual specialty for philatelists to collect.

That Canada had similar experiences with its advertising-minded Post Office patrons is of course to be accepted. An exceptionally fine specimen of this is shown herewith, in the form of a bi-colored post card with an advertisement of Buntin, Reid & Co., of Toronto. The card is a beautiful thing, showing a flag pole in yellow, the firm flag with the initials "B.R. & Co." superimposed, black and white on red, with a pennant in blue above reading "Private Postal Card".

The user of the card (and note the philatelic use, oddly enough) unkindly placed the adhesive, a 1c Victoria, in such a position that it nullified the advertising value of the card, but the beautiful involute Toronto 1899-postmark compensates a bit for the thoughtless act.

It is not known how long this card was permitted to be used, or even whether Alex Barclay, of Toronto, sender of the card, might have happened on a supply of them unused, and thriftily used them up, circulating the stamp trade for wholesale lists, the message on this card reading:

Dear Sir,

Toronto, Oct. 18, 1899

Please send me your wholesale price list of all stamps you have for sale. When buying from you, how will I send the money to you for them?
