

# HISTORY of the ARMY POSTAL SERVICES in CANADA




Fig. 10. First Contingent Cover mailed on H. M. Troopship "Sardinia" and transfered at sca to the S. S. "Rangatira," en route to London. Morgan Collection.

### CHAPTER V.

### THE BOER WAR 1899-1902

The Boer War was declared on October 10th, 1899. Shortly afterwards, on October 30th, the First Canadian Contingent sailed on the Troopship "Sardinian". This Contingent consisted chiefly of the Royal Canadians.

On November 13th, the troopship passed Cape Verde Islands without stopping. Three days later, they sighted the S.S. "Bangitara" of the Shaw, Sabill, Albian Line, en route from New Zealand to London. Both ships halted and exchanged newspapers and two large pillow slips of mail from the troops. Thus, the first Active Service Mail of the Canadian Contingent was dispatched.

There weren't any stamps available for affixing to letters so none were applied; letters addressed to Canada being free of postage, but those to the United States were taxed Postage Due. Fig. 10 illustrates the front and back of such a cover to the United States, showing the Postage Due marking. The letter is from R. C. B (ach) of Coy. E. of the Royal Canadians (See p. 26)




Fig. 12. Earliest known cover bearing Canadian Postal Corps postal markings, Siver

Fig. 11 is a reproduction of a souvenir Patriotic cover prepared by Capt. Ecelstone and Private Johnston of the Canadian Postal Corps. The earliest recorded use of the Canadian Postal Corps Orderly Room Stamp or postmark was April 3, 1900, (see Fig. 12), and the latest in December 1900. This marking was applied to all mail passing through the Postal Corps base office and is always a later date than the Field Post Office cancellation.

Fig. 14 illustrates one of the very scarce Canadian Contingent covers bearing a Canadian 3c stamp. Fig. 15 is a type of cover given to the troops by the Y.M.C.A.




Fig. 13. Chart 3. Overseas (Attached) Forces. Field Office Postal Markings.

CHART 3, Nos. B2-B8 inclusive (Fig. 13) illustrate the different main types of Field Postal markings used by the Imperial Army Postal Corps to which the Canadians were attached. Dates indicated in the following are the earliest and latest date of use recorded by the Author with the gracious assistance of many fellow-collectors, too numerous to mention by name, and to whom I here express my sincere appreciation:

# CANADA'S PROVINCES

It may interest some of the readers to learn how Canada and its nine Provinces received their names. The name Canada, and four of the Provinces, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Quebec, were all derived from the Indian equivalents.

Cartier, the great French explorer, left a record of the word "KANADA" as of the language of the Huron Indians; the translation being "village". Many of the Indians observed by Cartier lived in villages along the St. Lawrence River. This led him to speak of that region as Kanada, or Canada.

Ontario is translated as meaning "Beautiful Lake" and both the Huron and Iroquois tribes have similar words for 'lake'. Ontario has a greater population than any of the other Provinces.

Quebec took its name from an Indian word meaning "The Narrows". There was a small settlement beside a narrow part of the St. Lawrence River and this was called Quebec. Later, the name was applied for the territory far around that settlement,

In the Province of Manitoba is a large lake. This lake has a narrow part which the Ojibway Indians used to call "Manito Bau", meaning "strait of the Manito (or spirit)". Thus the name of the Province and of Lake Manitoba can be traced to the Indian name for this strait.

Saskatchewan's name goes back to the Cree tribe. In the Cree language, Saskatchewan has the meaning "fast flowing river". In addition to the Province, we have the long and very important Saskatchewan River.

Nova Scotia is derived from the Latin and means "New Scotland". Many of the early settlers in Nova Scotia came from Scotland.

Prince Edward Island, the smallest of the Provinces, was named in honor of Edward, Duke of Kent. This Prince never rose to the British throne but his daughter, Victoria, became Queen.

New Brunswick is said to have derived its name from the town of New Brunswick in New Jersey after settlers moved from New Jersey to Canada.

Alberta honors a member of the British Royal Family. A daughter of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert was named Louise Caroline Alberta. This Princess was married to the man who was Governor-General of Canada when the name Alberta was given to that part of Canada.

British Columbia carries in its name the fact that it was a British Colony before it became a Province of Canada. It also honors Christopher Columbus.

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
