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OF THE BRITISH NORTH AMERICA PHILATELIC SOCIETY

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1. This Department shall be maintained and shall function entirely for, and in the interests of, the membership of the British North America Philatelic Society. Any member of the Society in good standing may borrow material from the Library. Any member may be denied that privilege for infraction of any of the rules of the Library.

2. The Librarian shall receive and acknowledge all contributions to the Library. He shall cause to be published in BNA TOPICS reports of all activities of the Library.

3. A Member, on written application to the Librarian, accompanied by all charges, may have sent not more than two (2) volumes and shall not retain such borrowed material for more than thirty (30) days, at which time, or sooner, same borrowed material must be returned in good condition, fully insured and all charges prepaid. The Member so borrowing material from the Library shall be responsible and liable to the full value of the material until same shall have been acknowledged as received by the Librarian. A Member shall make such adjustment or payment for any damage or loss to the material borrowed from the Library in such amount as shall be determined by the Librarian.

4. There shall be a charge of twenty-five (25) cents per week or part thereof for each item borrowed from the Library and held in excess of thirty (30) days. A rental of twenty-five (25) cents or more per week may be charged for any special or rare book when so determined by the Librarian.

Another Yearbook

NOTES . . . **Alex S. Juliard**, of Narberth, Penn., a regular user of our advertising columns, is entering the mail sales business, in addition to his regular philatelic activities. Mr. Juliard specializes in fine 19th century material of all countries. . . . In commenting on his "Canada Officials Checklist", which he completed recently and which was reviewed in the September issue of BNA TOPICS, **Roy Wrigley**, of West Vancouver, B.C., says: "This is a work I am glad to see finished after months of solid work—over three years. Am already working on something equally important, the price structure of the rare positions of the 5- and 4-hole perfs. Have coined a term, 'perforation frequency', as basically the frequency in which certain 'awkward' perforation was made has definitely an effect on the number of such 'awkward' positions produced, and relate to their value. We want prices down, but you cannot sell a rare stamp cheap. Am pricing my \$8,000 stock on the basis of this perforation frequency." . . . Attention is drawn to the handbook produced by the **Perfin Study Group** on "Canadian Stamps With Perforated Initials", which is the result of much hard work on the part of those concerned, and particularly Chairman Clare Jephcott and Secretary Bob Woolley. This 32-page illustrated booklet may be obtained from either of these gentlemen or from the editor, and it will soon be available from dealers. . . . **H. R. Harmer, Inc.**, of New York, have announced a record high in sales of \$801,189 for the last season, this figure being \$26,527 above the previous record of the 1950-51 season. . . . **BNAPLEX-55** will be just a memory when the issue is received by the majority of our members. However, a complete report on the Convention and Business Meeting will appear in the November issue of BNA TOPICS. Look for it. ★

PICTORIAL POSTCARDS of the Grand Trunk Railway System

IN THE FIRST (and so far, only!) edition of my book on "The Postal Stationery of Canada" an attempt was made to classify the varieties of Railway Pictorial Post Cards issued by many companies of public carriers during the later part of the 19th and early part of the 20th Century.

Since the appearance of this volume, much additional information has been sent to me by collectors owning samples of these colorful emissions. Through the courtesy of many—and particularly Mr. R. A. Peters (BNAPS 1202)—I have recently been shown so many additional varieties of the pictorial cards of the Grand Trunk Railway System as to make possible a complete rewriting of this section. It is found that certain views exist with varying inscription forms, while on other cards, similar inscriptions control different views. By careful study of dated cards, I have been able to devise a new listing method more satisfactory than the initial system of grouping all views together alphabetically, and present the revised listing herewith.

For the convenience of those who do not own my book, the basic postcards hereafter referred to by catalogue number are as follows:

- CJ2 —2c rose carmine Victoria (Holmes 1419)
- CK2 —2c rose carmine Edward (Holmes 1424)
- CL1A —1c rose carmine George, Die A (Holmes 1429)

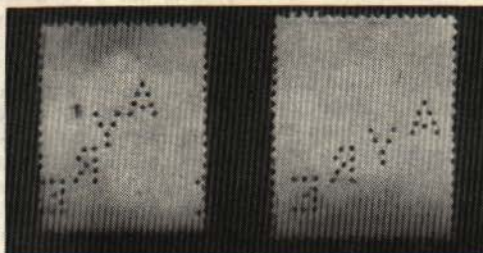

When our checklist was originally sent out, we listed only one of the Ayre & Sons designs, as we did not at that time know of the second type. There was insufficient time to recheck with all collectors who had been good enough to report their collections, and our handbook may be inaccurate as to the range of issues of each design.

We would like to hear from any collector who may be able to extend the range of usage of either.

In checking for earlier usage, Scott No. 83, the 3c Queen Alexandra, was issued in June 1898 in an orange shade. However, there was an emergency wartime printing from the old plate in June 1918. This later printing is in red orange on bluish paper and can be distinguished from the earlier

printing which had been in use from 1898 to 1910.

The Perfin Study Group wishes to pay tribute and express our thanks to Gordon Lewis, our genial editor. Only by his help and professional guidance in the planning and production of the handbook have we been able to put out such a reference work which we believe to be a credit to the Society.

Gordon is a very unassuming sort of chap who works endless hours for the benefit of us all and only we contributors realize the amount of time and effort he gives to BNA TOPICS each month.

War Tax Study Group

A few months ago, collectors interested in the Admiral issue got together and formed a small study group to work on the War Tax issue. The original group was made up of members of the RA Stamp Club in Ottawa. With the writer as chairman of the group, the following members joined in this undertaking: R. J. H. Laurin, who has been collecting varieties for a long time; W. A. Nesbitt, an ardent student of the Admiral issue and varieties in general; J. J. E. Beaubien, another worker on the Admirals. A few weeks later another collector joined the group, W. Ray McClelland, of the Ottawa Philatelic Society, who has recently become very interested in this field. At the same time the group asked D. A. Young of Toronto to become a contributing member as he has an outstanding knowledge of the Admirals and has won many prizes with his fine collection. Hon. George C. Marler has expressed to the chairman a number of times his great interest in the study group, and he has consented to help in any way possible whenever time allows. J. R. Carpenter of the Post Office Department has promised the chairman to help in any questions related to the Canadian Bank Note Co., who printed these stamps. With the additional help of others through correspondence, it is felt that this very specialized group should be able to do some useful work which should be of interest to all collectors of Canadian stamps, and especially to students of the Admiral issue.

The reason for choosing this subject is very simple. As Major White points out in his plate block catalogue, the War Tax issue is the orphan of all Canadian stamps, and no work has even been done, or at least, has never been published. The first task of the group has been to study the literature on the subject, but this is practically non-existent. Next the records of the post office have been scrutinized and although there was little information there, everything of interest has been noted. Further informa-

tion is being obtained through Mr. Carpenter from the Canadian Bank Note Co.

The second phase is the study of the stamps themselves. Attempts will be made to classify various varieties found in the issue and relate them to certain periods of printing, plates and, if possible, positions. Varieties such as re-entries, retouches, dies, paper, color, etc., will be carefully studied according to a plan which has been agreed upon by the members of the group. The plan is not a rigid schedule but merely a list of questions serving as a guide to the members for a logical approach to some of the problems.

It is the intention of the group to use BNA TOPICS as a medium to report later on in the form of Notes on the War Tax Issue, the findings of the study group. This will take time as there is a lot of information to be collected and much research to be done. In the meantime the group welcomes inquiry or any help from others interested, in the form of material on loan, purchase or otherwise for study, since this is one of the most important sources of information. The group can be contacted by writing to the undersigned, who is the chairman.

Trail of the Caribou

By DAN MEYERSON (BNAPS L3)



LAST month we discussed one of the interesting covers from John Siverts' collection, and this month we will discuss a card that we feel will be of interest to our fellow collectors. It is a card sent out by the General Post Office and posted on Jan. 14, 1898. It supplements the card discussed in BNA TOPICS back in November 1953, at which time we listed the stamps available at the Post Office back in 1896. The list printed on this card is as follows: The entire Cabot set (Scott Nos. 61-74), with the notation that the 1c and 2c values (Scott Nos. 61 and 62) could not be obtained outside of full sets. Then we have a listing headed "Former Issue"—nine varieties, viz: ½, 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 10, 12 and 24 cents, at 64 cents the set, and it is only available in the set. Scott Nos. 79 and 81 were also available, as were the 1c and 2c card, as well as the 4c reply. The complete set of envelopes and wrappers was listed at 19 cents. One of each of everything listed could be purchased for \$3.28, including 20 cents for postage and registration. We would appreciate word from anyone who may have any other cards or lists such as these in their possession.

J. Millar Allen (BNAPS 966) of Lisburn, Northern Ireland, is in with another note concerning the CAPO cancels. This time he gives us a list of his earliest and latest dates of use and he asks us to supplement it. We immediately had recourse to the November 1945 TOPICS to see what Ian Morgan had to say about opening dates, and the balance of this list is a mixture of the dates out of Morgan's article, Allen's letter, and our collection:

In "Stamp Collecting" for August 5, 1955, in his column W. E. Fyndem espouses the cause of one of the more recent Newfoundland stamps. It is his considered opinion that the 48c (Scott No. 266) is a stamp that will become increasingly good. In the same issue of the magazine, Geo. C. Ginn & Co. advertise some Newfoundland items and included among those advertised is a copy of the 4c (Scott No. 189) in the line perf., at 7/6.

N. W. Scales (BNAPS 1058) of Evansville, Ind., has just made a purchase of a considerable number of the "AND" perfin on cover and among the new varieties he has uncovered are the following: Normal, Scott Nos. 145, 147, 164 and 173; reversed, 132, 164 and 173; read up, 132 and 147, and in the read down variety the new listings are Scott Nos. 131, 145, 147 and 166.

All of our readers who are members of the C.P.S. of G.B. should be certain to read in "Maple Leaves" the column written by Dr. Willen and titled "Newfoundland Corner". We understand that the column is to be a regular feature and if future columns are as interesting as this one in its discussion of the Guy Tercentenary Issue, then count us in, and we are already anxiously looking forward to the next instalment. ★

NEW BRUNSWICK IMPRINTS

IN BNA TOPICS of October 1950, a writer described how he had acquired a mint sheet of the 5c green (Queen), and that it was devoid of any imprints (i.e., American Bank Note Co. New-York), and that he rejoiced at this "find" because he had "maintained for years that the first issue bore no imprint".

The sheet referred to could hardly have been the first printing of the 5c as this is the "sap" or "olive" green shade which is very rare even in pairs or blocks. If it is the yellow or bluish green shade it is a later printing, which of course does not prove the author's contention—on the contrary, it shows that some of the LATER printings had no imprints.

Over the last few years I have acquired several complete sheets of the cents issue (they are very difficult to find, unlike the Nova Scotia cents issue). As a result I can give some more evidence on this question.

1 cent lilac (the first printing was brown-purple and I have never seen a complete sheet). I have four mint sheets of the lilac shade; all these have eight imprints, two on each of the four sides. Late printing.

2 cents. This has 14 imprints, three top and bottom and four at the two sides (incidentally the imprint at the bottom is inverted). As the 2 cents was issued in 1863, this is a "late" printing.

5 cents. I have two sheets of the yellow-green but neither has sheet margins, so that my evidence here is inconclusive. Late printing.

10 cents. I have one mint sheet with large sheet margins and it has NO imprints. It is believed that there was only one, the early, printing.

12½ cents. I have not a complete sheet but a large corner block with full sheet margins on three sides. There are NO imprints. Here again it is believed that there was only one, the early, printing.

17 cents. I have one complete mint sheet, but without sheet margins except a tiny piece at the bottom showing part of the imprint, "Bank". It is believed that there was only one printing of the 17 cents but there is strong evidence that this stamp was not issued until after the others. It may therefore be wrong to class this stamp as an "early" printing although it must have been issued soon after the others as it was required for the 17 cents rate to Europe and

for the postage to England via a U.S. port.

I have no evidence of the actual date of issue of either the 5 cents sap green or the 17 cents black, but I would imagine that July 1860 would be a reasonable guess—about two months after the issue of the 1, 10 and 12½ cents stamps. The earliest 5 cents sap green on dated cover of which I have knowledge is dated July 18, 1860 (in the collection of H. L. Darnell, No. 1043).

Most of this evidence is in favor of the contention that there were no imprints on the early printings, but the 5 cents without an imprint suggests that some of the late printings had no imprints, unless the sheet mentioned in the October 1950 TOPICS is a unique one of the early 5 cents sap green. Even the sap green can hardly be described as "early" since there was some delay in its issue owing to the Connell controversy.

It would be most interesting if other collectors would throw further light on this question by checking up on any complete sheets in their possession. ★

ITEM 22:

The West-End Philatelist, January-February 1953.

An Interesting Variety—Canada 1916 7c Yellow Ochre: Recent examination of a complete mint sheet of this stamp enables us to clear up one or two doubtful points. Firstly, the sheet [pane] is the upper left from plate 6 and was thought to consist of stamps of two types—one normal, and one from a re-cut die. However, even if this could be so, the variation would be similar in every case; as it is not, then the re-cutting must have been done to the plate and not to the die. Secondly, the retouch occurs not on seven only, but on all ten stamps in the first vertical row. It consists of a vertical line connecting the horizontal shading behind the crown in the top right corner.

In some cases the retouching continues into the oval line around "POSTAGE" to the outer frame line. On stamp No. 1 a slight slip has caused a short line to appear extending inwards from the outer frame line, near the bottom of the recut line. On stamp No. 81 the vertical crosses the curved line. On close examination, slight differences can be seen on the other stamps in the row, chiefly in the thickness or length of the vertical line.

International Dog Team Mail — A few days before Christmas, Postmaster Alden Puslifer of Minot, Me., well-known dog team driver who drove New England's first official mail-carrying dog team from Minot to Boston, Concord and Albany with letter

from Governor Brewster to the Governors of Massachusetts, New Hampshire and New York (in 1927), will drive a team of genuine Eskimo dogs from Lewiston, Me., to Montreal and return, passing through Montpelier, Vt.; St. Johns, Que., Granby, Sherbrooke, Berlin, N.H., and Augusta, Me.

He and his brother, George, will carry letters of holiday greeting from Governor Brewster, Governor-elect Gardiner, Mayor Wiseman of Lewiston, Mayor Walton of Auburn, officials of civic organizations, as well as thousands of greetings from the American Snowshoe Union, the Eskimo Club of America, and other winter sports clubs.

... although the affair is international in scope, it is conducted and used by the people of Maine as a unique method of sending their Christmas and New Year greetings to friends in neighboring states and Canada. It should not be confused with government mail. No United States mail will be carried.

A special mark of distinction will be placed upon each message to show that it was carried on the First International Dog Team Mail.

... Letters addressed to towns off route should be accompanied with two cents extra for each ounce for postage through regular channels. ★

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Bringing News About People and Stamps

By REV. JOHN S. BAIN (BNAPS 19)

LOOKING OVER part of the collection of a local BNAPSer (Fred Grumm), I came across an item which I think is worth recording from several angles. I noticed a Canadian registered cover bearing the scarce booklet pane, Scott No. 107c, the 2c green Admiral Issue, George V, without the tab, and dated October 29, 1928. The cover was sent from Norman R. Hendershott, the well-known dealer in the Windsor-Detroit area, to our own famous dealer, BNAPSer William T. Adams! Little did Norm think in that day that his cover would be one of Canada's booklet rarities, and Bill Adams received an item that he most likely could never duplicate. I have never seen this pane on cover before with such an early date. Continuing about Norm Hendershott, I understand that he has re-entered the philatelic field again after a long absence. His reappearance was marked by a visit to the local club with some of his stock which still had the pre-war prices on it. I am reliably informed that he did a roaring business that night, for they cleaned him out!

Another money order cancellation to add to your list. I found this one going through a dealer's counter box: Province of Quebec—Ste. Anne de Bellevue, in black. This is a registered cover and has the money order cancellation used as back stamps, and is addressed to Sacramento, California.

While looking through the fabulous catalogues of the Colonel E. H. R. Green collection for an item, my eyes were arrested by a description that I had never read before. Part XVII of the Green sale, lot No. 323, reads: "Jeffray's Fraser River Express. Large part of cover bearing 'Kerr's City Post' 3 pence label on green glazed paper. Circular 'Paid' cancel in black; 'United States Paid 6c' in red. Scarce." This, of course, brings back to memory our old friend, S. Allan Taylor, the pioneer of Canadian stamp dealers and publishers. This "Kerr's City Post" is the earliest of Taylor's fictitious emissions, and has no relation to

this cover UNLESS it is an example of Taylor forging a cover. It would be interesting to have an illustration of this item. Can any BNAPSer help out? The price realized for this cover is also noteworthy—it brought \$160. At the very best it can only be a combination of a phantom and a genuine cover, or a complete forgery, as Taylor did issue facsimiles of express companies.

BNAPS

The chase is on for the early experimental wire stitched booklet of the 1950 George VI Revised issue, Scott No. 254a. Stocks of this item are non-existent. A complete pane in used condition is a very difficult item. I understand that in a certain local club auction one of these booklets brought \$7.50. This pane certainly is the real "sleeper" in recent Canadian issues, excluding, of course, the "officials", which have performed very well. ★
