SALES DEPARTMENT NOTES

Your Sales Department needs material in order to serve you better.

Circuit books are twelve for only One Dollar, postpaid.

To get the best sales results, your material should be classified, and if possible, one classification per circuit book. Above all, price it right. One member sold over \$500.00 last year; another with over \$700.00 of valuation sold only \$2.50.

Fees are 25c for insurance on your valuation, and 8% commission on sales. (All I get is about a thousand hours of work.) The insurance covers your property until it is retired, whether it is a year or five years.

In classifying, mount them in separate books; Early Issues, Large Queens, Small Queens, Squared Circles, RPO, Perfins, Officials, Admirals, Newfoundland, Stampless, etc., are all in demand. We have a waiting list for them in the SPECIAL CIRCUITS, and these people want your material — don't let it moulder amongst your duplicates.

Now the other side of the picture. Do you want material? Drop me a card, or letter. You have two choices;—Regular Circuits, which you receive periodically, and which contains just about everything in BNA material, from Beavers to Moons. SPECIAL CIRCUITS are selected books of the material you request in writing. Saves you going through a couple of hundred books of material you may not want. Gives you what you want to see. If you take less than \$10.00 from the SPECIAL CIRCUIT you must pay the postage both ways, including Registration. If you take \$10.00 or more, you pay only the return postage and registration. You will have 10 days to go through the SPECIAL CIRCUIT material, and upon its return to the Sales Department, we will send you another lot and so on until all the books containing mostly the material you requested have been passed through your hands.

We have till June 1, to make this the best Sales Department year yet.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. This Department shall function entirely for and in the interest of the membership of the British North America Philatelic Society. Any Member, in good standing, may participate in the Department and, by his participation, attests and agrees to abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Department. Any Member, so participating, may be denied such participation for infraction of any of the Rules or Regulations of the Department.

2. The President of the Society shall appoint a Member to serve as Sales Manager who shall be responsible to the Board of Governors. The President of the Society shall appoint a Committee to serve as a Board of Examiners to examine any and all stamps or books of stamps submitted to it by the Sales Manager and to order removed any such stamps or other material entered which, in its opinion, is of a questionable character, without any responsibility or liability therefore to the owner or anyone else.

3. The Sales Manager shall keep accounts and records of all transactions of the Department in books of the Society so provided by it. He shall at specific times, provide the Board of Governors with reports of the affairs of the Department, including a full balance sheet of all bookkeeping entries and shall similarly cause such reports to be published in BNA TOPICS.

4. Members entering material for sale through the Department shall mount their material in such books as shall be prescribed by the Board of Governors. Books shall be obtained from the Sales Manager upon request and at such price as shall be determined by the Board of Governors. No other books or forms except the prescribed ones shall be used. The Department reserves the right to limit the dollar value of material entered in any one book and may reject any material which it feels will not be well received, except that such restriction shall be the joint action and decision of the Sales Manager and the Board of Examiners, without any responsibility or liability therefore to the owner or anyone else.

5. Any stamp or item which is damaged, counterfeited, re-perforated, cleaned, repaired, a reprint, or in any other way of doubtful or questionable character, must be clearly so marked next thereto by the affixer upon submission for entry in the Department books. Any such stamp or item, in any way of doubtful or questionable character not so marked clearly by the affixer, so decided by the Board of Examiners or established by any other means, in its sole discretion, and without any lia-

bility or responsibility therefor to the owner or anyone else, shall automatically cause a charge of at least 25 cents for any and each such unmarked item and be removed from the book. In instance of gross or deliberate abuse or violation of this Regulation, or where it may be deemed requisite or equitable, the Sales Manager may, at his discretion, impose reasonable additional charges, or deny the services and privileges of the Department, or both. Such gross and deliberate abuse or violation may be considered as "Conduct unbecoming a Member."

6. A charge of 2 per cent as an insurance fee shall be made of the net value of the material entered at any one time. Monies so collected shall be deposited in the Insurance Fund from which Fund claims for loss or damage to material shall be paid. The Board of Governors shall have final jurisdiction in the payment and settlement of claims.

7. A charge of 8 per cent shall be deducted from all sales made through the Department. Monies so collected shall be deposited in the General Fund of the Department, and all costs of conducting the Department shall be paid from this Fund. Both the Insurance and the Commission charges shall be deducted whenever a payment shall be made to an owner.

8. Circuits must be forwarded to the next Member shown on the Route Sheet within five (5) days of receipt by the forwarding Member, to be forwarded by him by Registered Mail insured for Five Dollars (\$5.00). Strict observance and compliance with this Rule shall be enforced by the Sales Manager and any violation shall be subject to a penalty and charge of 25 cents per book in the Circuit for each day delayed in forwarding Circuits. The loss of any material not so forwarded by Registered Mail shall be entirely the responsibility and liability of the remitter.

9. The Member, upon receiving a Circuit, shall verify the number of books in the circuit, as evidenced on the Route Sheet, and that all spaces on each page of each book contain a stamp or other item, or a proper indication that the stamp or item of the space has been sold or is accounted for.

10. The buyer must sign his name in INK (or use a suitable rubber stamp) and indicate his Society Membership Number in all spaces from which he has removed and retained an item. Each so identified purchase shall be entered on the forms specifically provided for that purpose with each Circuit.

EXTRACT FROM THE RULES OF THE LIBRARY

1. This Department shall be maintained and shall function entirely for, and in the interests of, the membership of the British North America Philatelic Society. Any member of the Society in good standing may borrow material from the Library. Any member may be denied that privilege for infraction of any of the rules of the Library.

2. The Librarian shall receive and acknowledge all contributions to the Library. He shall cause to be published in BNA TOPICS reports of all activities of the Library.

3. A Member, on written application to the Librarian, accompanied by all charges, may have sent not more than two (2) volumes and shall not retain such borrowed material for more than thirty (30) days, at which time, or sooner, same borrowed material must be returned in good condition, fully insured and all charges prepaid. The Member so borrowing material from the Library shall be responsible and liable to the full value of the material until same shall have been acknowledged as received by the Librarian. A member shall make such adjustment or payment for any damage or loss to the material borrowed from the Library in such amounts as shall be determined and established by the Librarian.

4. There shall be a charge of twenty-five (25) cents per week or part thereof for each item borrowed from the Library and held in excess of thirty (30) days. A rental of twenty-five (25) cents or more per week may be charged for any special or rare book when so determined by the Librarian.

NOTE: It would be appreciated by the Librarian if members would include return postage when requesting books, as much of the Library's budget is used up by mailing costs.

MINUTES

of the 14th annual meeting of the British North America Philatelic Society held on Saturday, September 29th, 1962, at the Alpine Inn, Ste. Marguerite, Quebec.

The meeting was officially opened and called to order by the President, Mr. Walter W. Chadbourne, at 10:45 a.m. for the consideration of such business as should come before it.

It was moved by Mr. Rorke, seconded by Mr. Meyerson that the meeting dispense with the reading of the minutes of the previous annual meeting and that these same minutes be voted as accepted as published in BNA TOPICS. The motion was affirmed.

President Chadbourne read a correspondence from Sir George A. Williamson, President of the Canadian Philatelic Society of Great Britain, which expressed his regrets for not being able to attend the convention and extended fraternal greetings from the CPS of GB.

Mr. Meyerson advised the meeting that he had just learned of the passing of one of our early members and former president of the Society, Bury Collins Binks. "While waiting for BNAPEX '62 to open I was advised that all BNAPSers had lost a very dear friend in the sudden passing of Bury C. Binks, Vancouver, B.C. Bury was numbered amongst our first 100 members and in fact was #74. He had served the Society with great distinction as a past president and at the time of his passing was a member of the Board of Governors.

I personally met him first at CIPEX in N.Y. in 1947 and the last fond memory that I have of Bury is at BNAPEX '60 at Banff.

He was a tower of strength to the Society and all those who knew him will certainly mourn his passing.

I believe that the only one who could best describe how the members of the Society felt about Bury Bink would be Vinnie Green, who served alongside Bury in the First World War and I am sure that Vinnie would be willing to express our feeling of loss in the form of a memorial for inclusion in a forthcoming issue of Topics".

President Chadbourne asked the meeting to rise and observe a minute's silence in respect and memory of the deceased.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This is my second official report to you as President of our Society. Following last year's pattern, I shall make it short and, for the most part, confine it to a resumé of the list of appointments and resignations for the past year.

Without question the most significant action was that of accepting the resignation of the incumbent Editor of Topics, Gordon P. Lewis, and the appointment of John H. M. Young as successor. I can assure the membership that this step was taken only after the most mature consideration and with the advice and consent of those officers of the Society most involved in the situation. Continuity of publication and continuation of the high calibre of editorial workmanship has been preserved and we wish the new Editor well.

My thanks to a Nominating Committee consisting of Ed Richardson, Bury Binks, Harry Lussey and Willard Rorke. May I also say "well done" to that small group of laborers in the vineyard, the Ballot Committee whose efforts are often forgotten and unsung; in the present instance, my fellow Wilmingtonians, John Siverts, Robert Grimble, and Paul Hoyer.

I should like to close by thanking the many members, my co-officers and committees, whose willingness to do all the many large and small things has made it a pleasure as well as an honor to have served.

It was moved by Mr. Greene, seconded by Mr. Meyerson that the President's Report be accepted as offered. The motion was affirmed.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

Last year, it was my unpleasant duty to have to report, for the first time in the Society's history, that our total membership had shown a loss in numbers. This year, I am able to offer a slightly more favorable report showing the small increase of 2 over last year — 1034 compared to 1036. The following Membership Summary will explain these figures:

From the foregoing summary, we note the total decrease of 75 against the total increase of 77 resulting in the additional 2 members to our membership numbers. I am reminded and would like to repeat here and now some of President Chadbourne's observations and comments to last year's meeting — (Quote) — "It is difficult to believe that the potential of new B.N.A. collectors is pointing in the downward direction or even that we had previously saturated the total market. Our problem, I believe, is one of raising new membership per year back to the 1958-'59 level of 100-125 and that requires the efforts of all of us here and a spreading of the news to all members of the Society." (End quote). Your Secretary similarly remarked in his report last year that it was obvious that greater efforts must be made in recruiting new members. Let us now study the following comparative analysis for the years 1960, 1961 and this year, 1962:

Our first observation is that our 1036 total membership as of 1962, while 2 more than in 1961, is still 18 below our standing in 1960, the last year of 17 years of continuous increase in membership each year. Before considering the other items in the foregoing comparative analysis, let me continue on and with the most important consideration of returning to our custom and habit of increasing our membership numbers for at least another 17 years. In last year's report for the awarding of "The President's Certificate" for the recruiting of most members during the year, 39 members were listed as having so recruited new members. In this year's report, 43 members will be so listed — an improvement

and evidence of some greater effort by more members but still not enough more to reach the cited 1958-1959 level of 100-125, closely duplicated in 1960 with 99. I've said it before and I'll repeat it now — BNAPS is THE Society that offers and provides any and all the services and benefits the B.N.A. collector could want and expect — BNAPS is THE Society for the collectors of B.N.A. These reasons are and, to me, always will be the best ever for any collector. All we have to do is tell it — tell it individually and collectively — tell it personally and publicly.

Referring back to the comparative analysis, we note that the total decrease figure of 75 for this year is 12 less than last year and 3 less than 1960. This, of course, is a gratifying sign when it shows our losses are lessening. It also serves to again emphasize that, should our new memberships be increased, we'd be well on our way to the next 17 years of continuous increase in numbers. Especially gratifying is the reduction in resignations from 48 last year to only 33 this year with most of the resignations being for reason of ill-health, discontinuance of collecting and sale of collections. The 26 dropped for reason of non-payment of dues (5 so dropped for reason of present address unknown) while not better, is not any worse than last year's 26 but 4 less than 1960's 30. In all, a more favorable report than last year's — certainly a step in the right direction.

The President's Certificate

Each year "The President's Certificate" is awarded to the member who proposed the most new members during the year. indicated a surplus of \$359.00, due to non-recurring items in the amount of approximately \$300.00.

I will now give you a summary of the financial operations of BNAPS for the first eight (8) months of 1962.

As in the past, this report does not include income or expenses in connection with the current Yearbook for which records are not complete, nor does it contain anything pertaining to the Handbook operations of the Society for the same reason. The total 1962 income to August 31st from all sources was \$4,540.56 and the total expenses for the same period was \$3,719.06, leaving a balance of \$821.50 of 1962 funds for use toward paying expenses through the balance of the year.

It is estimated that the income for the balance of 1962 will be about \$460.00 and the expenses for the same period will be about \$1,474.00. If these estimates prove to be accurate we should show a loss of \$192.50 for the 1962 year.

The above estimated expenses include a loss of \$100.00 on the 1962 Yearbook, so let us all give our yearbook ads to Bert Llewellyn to help eliminate any loss on the Yearbook.

I wish, once more, to thank Bill Peterman, our Treasurer Emeritus for all the help he gave me during 1961 which was my first year as Treasurer and particularly for his wonderful assistance in the preparation of the 1961 Annual Report.

This report is respectfully submitted for your consideration and I move it's approval.

REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN, BOARD OF GOVERNORS

If letter writing in itself is any indication then I must agree that the Board of Governors had their busiest season ever. It seems as though I as Chairman had continual need to circularize the Board and I'm in hopes that all loose ends were tied up last year and that this year will be much similar.

As prescribed by the Constitution the Board discharged all of its obligations, such as having the books audited, passing on the budget and also having its committee pass on the membership applications. Immediately after BNAPEX '61, the Board was circularized and affirmative answers received to the effect that the power of the permanent Convention Committee should be strength-

ened and that all future Nominating Committees appointed by the President be advised beforehand that they must have some regard as to the geographical location of the nominees and make certain that they were not all from the same sector of any one country. Then before the close of last year the Board okayed a change in the rules of the Circuit as recommended by Al Cook, Circuit Manager. Early in January the Board okayed the printing of a new Handbook "CANADA FANCY CANCELS" as recommended by Bob Woolley, Handbook Chairman. Then the Board had the very unpleasant duty to fill the office of Vice President due to the untimely passing of our very dear friend Arnold Banfield. The Board was very fortunate in getting Dr. Clare Jephcott to fill the unexpired term. Once Dr. Jephcott had moved up to Vice Presidency it created a vacancy on the Board and the Society offered the unexpired term to Dick Compton, the runner-up in the 1961 balloting. The last official matter covered by the Board was one concerning non-return of philatelic material by one member to another. While ordinarily the Board does not involve itself in these matters because membership in BNAPS is not a guarantee, in this case the Board felt that they should take action because the material sent had been sent only as a result of an advertisement in the 1961 Yearbook. Fortunately the matter was settled without any further action required and we trust that 1962-63 will be far more peaceful.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Compton and voted accepted.

REPORT OF THE EDITOR

It is with great pleasure that your editor is able to attend the annual convention of the society and present his report in person.

It is unfortunate that I have to report the loss of our past editor, Mr. Gordon P. Lewis due to the pressure of business. When your president approached me in February to assume the position of Editor I withheld an answer until I had discussed the matter thoroughly with members of our past and present executive. When I decided to take the position, I found Mr. Lewis most co-operative. It had been decided by the Board of Governors to have the magazine printed by Mission Press of Toronto, our former printers. The employees were of great assistance and have continued to help with each issue of the magazine. No change in size or paper has been made.

With regard to the actual magazine, it

was decided to place the official section at the beginning, the advertising at the end and articles and columns in the body of magazine. It is my intention to continue this format unless improvement can be made.

It is disappointing to report that at the present time there is a very small backlog of articles and once again I make an appeal for single or serialized articles. We have begun the column Sketches of BNAPSers by V. G. Greene which has helped to add personal interest to the magazine.

Your editor also assisted with the editing and proof-reading of the new handbook "Canadian Fancy Cancellations" by K. M. Day, M.D. and E. A. Smythies, which was released last Friday, September 21, 1962.

SALES MANAGER'S REPORT

Mr. Cook rose to report to the meeting that operation and results in the Sales Department was both very satisfactory as his regular reports in BNA TOPICS indicated. He expressed his sincere appreciation to Bill Hassan for his many hours of help to himself and the department. He also thanked the members for their fine co-operation and strongly urged and requested that they continue to offer material to the department and that they enter such material mounted according to exhibition classifications, one class of material in each book entered. Such separate book mountings would help the vendor by helping the buyer.

REPORT OF THE ADVERTISING MANAGER

Income from Display Advertising in 1961, exclusive of the Yearbook, amounted to \$904.93, just slightly under the all-time high of \$912.19 realized in 1960.

The 1961 Yearbook set a new record in display advertising revenue, grossing \$643.50 versus \$493.88 in 1960, an increase of 30.3%. Naturally we would like to do as well or better this year, but up to the present, Display Advertising received amounts only to \$422, and next Monday, October 1st, is the deadline for copy.

Unless we receive additional support in the form of advertising copy from those members present at this convention, who have not previously supported the Yearbook, the Society will sustain a substantial loss on its publication and distribution. Obviously, copy mailed after adjournment

of the Convention will not be received before the deadline. Therefore, those of you who wish to make the Yearbook a financial success, should do so by submitting their advertising to me before we adjourn on Saturday night.

I respectfully submit this report and move its adoption.

REPORT OF THE HANDBOOK COMMITTEE

BNAPS—Annual report of the Handbook committee—1962 Mr. President and members.

It is a pleasure to be here with you and to have the honour of presenting the annual report of the activities of the handbook committee. It would be appropriate to review the handbooks handled by the Society during the past year.

In September of last year, in time for the Elmira Convention we published "The Constant Plate Varieties of the Canada Small Queen's" by Hans Reiche. We had a printing of 1000 and during the past year have sold 134 at wholesale and 38 at retail. These sales have been a little disappointing. Apparently the varieties are not as popular with as many collectors as are the cancellations to be found on this issue.

As we plan printings of these handbooks in sufficient quantity to last approximately 5 years we hope that these will move better and will eventually be in demand.

"Canadian Stamps with Perforated Initials" published at the same time was a second edition, revised and re-arranged by the Perfin Study Group of BNAPS. A printing of 500 was ordered and to date we have sold 130 to dealers and 58 at retail. Our trade sales includes 50 copies to the American Perfin Club who think very highly of the study made by our group.

"The Squared Circle Postmarks of Canada" by Dr. Alfred Whitehead — 1959 — was a revised edition of which we had 1000 printed and I am very pleased to report that these have moved very well. During the last year, however, sales have slowed down and we have had requests for only 66 at wholesale and 5 at retail.

As this was published only three years ago the 150 copies still on hand will no doubt last until a third edition already proposed by the Squared Circle Group is ready for publication.

We have also had listed since October 1960, the balance of the stock, 38 copies, of McCready's "Canadian Flag Cancellations" through an arrangement made by Ed. Richardson who is busy preparing a revised edition which we hope to publish next year. This issue is now sold out.

Ed. also kindly donated 35 copies of Canadian Philatelic Literature (McCready). Of this latter we have only a few copies on hand.

Our exchange arrangements with the CPS of GB are still very convenient and advantageous to the officers and members of both Societies. As agents for the CPS of GB we have distributed 150 copies of "The Canadian Map Stamp of 1898" by Fred Tomlinson. The latest information from Stan Cohen, who is now chairman of their handbook committee is that they have a revised edition of their "Duplex Cancellations of the 19th Century" in preparation and should be ready within a few months.

You will all be pleased to see our most recent publication: — "Canadian Fancy Cancellations of the Nineteenth Century" by Doc. Day and E. M. Smythies. This is by far the most ambitious of our efforts in the publication field and we of the handbook committee are most grateful to the authors for the privilege of publishing their work. Advance sales have been most encouraging and we have orders on hand from the CPS of GB and the Stamp trade for 150 copies in addition to retail orders. We have ordered a printing of 1000 and 50 case bound copies. The way the latter have been ordered we will have to have more bound.

It is not the policy of the Society to make a profit from these publications and they are priced as close to estimate of cost as we can. Because of the high proportion sold through trade channels the wholesale price shows a very small margin of profit if we are able to dispose of an entire printing.

So far we have been able to sell out first editions of the Squared Circle and Perfins handbooks, and the others which we still have on hand are moving well enough that we have no worries about them.

I leave the financial report of our activities to the Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE PERMANENT CONVENTION COMMITTEE

Mr. Kessler, Chairman, advised the meeting that he had requested replacement to his office and that such a replacement would be selected by the incoming President elect. He expressed his sincere appreciation to the members of his committee for their excellent assistance and co-operation during his term as Chairman.

REPORT OF THE REVENUE STUDY GROUP

Mr. Rockett, Chairman, advised the meeting that present membership of the Group numbered 85. Of this number, 15 had been recently enrolled as a direct result of the Group's new Yearbook and NEWS-LETTER, both of which received very favorable publicity in the philatelic press. All members of the Group were and all new members became members of the Society. Mr. Rockett extended an invitation to any members who collected Revenues to join the Group if they didn't already belong.

There being no unfinished business for the consideration of the meeting, the President, Mr. Chadbourne, opened the floor for the consideration of any new business as should come before it. Mr. Cook suggested that the Permanent Convention Committee should each year, for each convention, appoint a committee of three (3) members to serve and function whereby such a committee shall handle and have available books from the Society's Sales Department during each convention. The President called on Mr. Meyerson, Chairman of the Board of Governors, to report on any resolutions, rules or amendments which the Board had voted at their meeting the previous day, September 28th, with the following in attendance. Messrs. Chadbourne, Jephcott, Culhane, Levine, Meyerson, Compton, Kessler, Peterman and Rorke. Mr. Meyerson reported to the meeting that the Board of Governors had resolved to amend the By-Laws whereby the Board shall be expanded to thirteen members with the four additional members being the elected officers of the Society when and as so elected to their office and that such officers as members of the Board shall have each full right to vote. The Board further resolved that the By-Laws be amended whereby ARTICLE V, Section 5, Duties of the Secretary, para 2 shall read, "He shall submit to the Editor the Official matter to be published . . .". Further, the

Board, by virtue of the majority of its membership being present at its meeting, unanimously approved the creation and establishment of a committee to be known as "Study Group Liason Committee" whose purpose and function shall be to encourage and foster the formation of additional study groups to specialize in the study of a branch of B.N.A. philately not now so specifically a specialized study. Such committee to also serve and function to activate and advance, when it deems required, any presently established study group. The Board took cognizance and realized that, while it had been so decided to publish a geographical listing of the membership, in consideration of the change in Editors, such a publication of the geographical listing had placed undue hardship on the new Editor at this time and the such publication would have to be delayed.

Mr. Meyerson, Chairman of the Board of Governors, advised the meeting that the Board, at its meeting, had been appraised of the results of the voting and, knowing of the passing of Bury Binks, realized that an immediate vacancy was created in the Board and voted to fill such vacancy with and by the candidate on the

ballot who had received the next highest number of votes for the office after the third required elected candidate. Accordingly, Dr. James J. Matejka, Jr., was voted by the Board to be elected to the Board. The Board also considered the fact that one of its members had been elected to a second office and that such holding of two elected officers was not allowed by the By-Laws, voted to elect the next highest in number of votes received to be so elected to the Board. Specifically, Mr. Clarence Westhaver, being a member of the Board and now elected to the Vice-Presidency, thus the ineligibility to hold two elected offices, was replaced by Dr. Robert V. C. Carr by vote of the Board.

The meeting was advised that the bid for the 1965 convention in Los Angeles had been retracted but that there was the possibility that San Francisco might take over as Host for that year. Mr. Westhaver rose to enter a bid for Boston to hold and host the 1965 convention in the event that the San Francisco possibility does not materialise. Mr. Nickle was recognized by the Chair and suggested the advisability of the 1967 convention being held in Canada in conjunction with the centennial of Dominion and extended the invitation for such convention in Canada in 1967 to be in Alberta. Mr. Davenport informed the meeting that it was very likely that an international show would be held in Canada, possibly in 1968, and that participation in such event would and should be a likelihood of the Society. After some discussion, it was resolved on motion by Mr. Rorke, seconded by Mr. Meyerson, that consideration of locales for conventions of 1965 and the years following be referred to the Board.

On motion by Mr. Greene, seconded by Mr. Sissons, the meeting rose to applaud Mr. deVolpi for the wonderful convention provided all visitors.

There being no further business offered for the consideration of the meeting, on motion by Mr. Llewellyn, seconded by Mr. Culhane, the meeting was voted adjourned at 12.30 p.m.

Report of Publicity Director

A. W. McIntyre of Edmonton, Publicity Director, personally reported: During the past 12 months I sent out reports of BNAPEX '61 awards and the election at Elmira to philatelic monthly and weekly journals, also stamp editors of daily newspapers. I have received clippings from several publications but find it difficult to

achieve any complete check of its usage.

Recently I dispatched 25 news stories about the Alpine Inn event. Having experienced some difficulty in securing advance information about these annual affairs, I offer a suggestion. When setting up convention committees, the host group might well appoint a press representative for liaison

with the publicity director of the press of the home city.

On several occasions members have made the suggestion to me that a list of dates and places for coming conventions and exhibitions of the society be carried in every issue of Topics. I hope that something of this kind may be done.

THE ALPINE INN SHOW

By A. W. McIntyre, Publicity Director

More than 100 persons registered for the 14th annual convention of BNAPS and BNAPEX '62, held in the delightful Alpine Inn, 60 miles from Montreal, September 26 to 29, with the Alpine Group hosts, and Charles P. deVolpi of Westmount the energetic chairman.

There were 30 exhibits and 128 frames on album pages mounted under acetate sheets on three-ply corrugated board. The Grand Award went to the six-frame exhibit by Dr. C. M. Jephcott of proofs and essays of 19th Century Canada, the gold to W. E. Lea of England for Canada stampless and pence, 1790-1852 showing early correspondence from Fort Simpson, N.W.T. and the Maritimes.

The jury, Vinnie Greene, Dr. Kenneth M. Day and Ed Richardson, declared that the exhibits were of much higher quality than the usual show.

Among those attending were Dr. G. M. Geldert of Ottawa, president, and Allen H. Christensen of Westmount, vice-president of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada. Visitors included several professionals from Montreal and Toronto. Eight dealers had tables in the bourse.

The gathering was saddened by the sudden death in Vancouver on the eve of the convention, of Captain Bury C. Binks, a past president and noted collector.

Awards were presented at the annual banquet which featured some of the finest cuisine of the Laurentians. Mr. deVolpi presided and six past presidents attended.

Annual Meeting

President Walter M. Chadbourne preside over the annual meeting which was well attended. He reported an exchange of greetings with Sir George Williamson, president of the Canadian Philatelic Society of Great Britain. He paid tribute to the memory of Bury Binks who had been among the first hundred members, and

"was a tower of strength" in the society.

The Greene Cup for the best article provided for BNA Topics during the year went to Horace Harrison, and was presented.

Officers reporting: Secretary Jack Levine (membership has gained five to 1,036); Treasurer James Culhane; Sales Manager Al Cook; Dr. Jephcott for editorial board; Topics Editor John H. M. Young (who said he found his predecessor, Gordon Lewis, most co-operative); Advertising Manager George B. Llewellyn; A. H. Kessler, retiring chairman of the permanent convention committee; Publicity Director A. W. McIntyre; Robert Woolley, chairman of the handbook publications committee; W. C. Rockett, chairman, Canadian Revenue study group (now boasting 85 members). The veteran librarian, R. J. Duncan of Revelstoke was reported ill and unable to attend.

Elections Held

John Siverts reported for the nominating and elections committee. In the result Dr. C. M. Jephcott was elected president and Clarence A. Westhaver of Milton, Mass., vice-president. Re-elected by acclamation were the veteran secretary Jack Levine, and the treasurer, James T. Culhane. Four vacancies on the board were filled by C. P. deVolpi, G. B. Llewellyn, Dr. James J. Matejka Jr., and Dr. R. C. V. Carr.

The board of governors recommended setting up a liaison committee to help in organizing new sidelines and study groups.

During 1962 a new handbook, The Canadian and BNA Revenue Yearbook was recently issued by the Revenue Group. At the convention a large new handbook containing more than 1,000 illustrations, Canadian Fancy Cancellations of the 19th Century, by Dr. K. M. Day and E. A. Smythies, came from the presses and met an appreciative and keen demand.

A lively discussion of locations for future

conventions took place. The 1963 meet will be in Virginia and the 1964 event, hosted by Toronto, will likely be held at Prudham Gardens near St. Catharines in the Niagara Peninsula. Lou Ludlow who sponsored the 1965 bid to San Francisco but having moved to Japan, the date remains unconfirmed.

Clarence Westhaver promptly made a bid on behalf of Boston for 1965, and Sam Nickle of Calgary for 1967 on behalf of Alberta, stating that year would fit into Canada's centennial of confederation celebrations and Olympics which are likely to be held near Banff.

Ed Richardson said that west coast collectors must have an opportunity to attend a national convention of the society, so that 1965 should be held open for California, at least until Ray Peters visits Los Angeles this Fall. Dan Meyerson suggested that since it was the custom to alternate across the border, why not California in '65, Boston in '66 and Alberta in '67.

Jim Sissons said avoidance of any near clash with international show dates was desirable and as the Canadian Philatelic Ex-

hibitions Association was planning another international, it might have to move ahead to 1968 as another international exhibition was mooted for New York in 1966. (Toronto or Windsor have been talked about for it.)

Leslie Davenport recalled that when CAPEX was held at Toronto in 1951, annual meetings of ten philatelic organizations were held there, and due to many coming centennial events, it might be hard to get into Toronto space during 1967. Mr. Levine reminded the meeting that after the CAPEX experience, the society had decided to avoid staging their annual event at the same time and place as an international.

It was agreed that all dates beyond 1964 are tentative, and the matter was referred to the board.

Folders depicting the beauties of Williamsburg, Virginia, along with registration blanks for BNAPEX '63 were distributed by the convention chairman for the 16th annual meeting, Jack Levine, and co-chairman Jim Culhane.
