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- bility or responsibility therefor to the owner or anyone else, shall automatically cause a charge of at least 25 cents for any and each such unmarked item and be removed from the book. In instance of gross or deliberate abuse or violation of this Regulation, or where it may be deemed requisite or equitable, the Sales Manager may, at his discretion, impose reasonable additional charges, or deny the services and privileges of the Department, or both. Such gross and deliberate abuse or violation may be considered as "Conduct unbecoming a Member."
- 6. A charge of 2 per cent as an insurance fee shall be made of the net value of the material entered at any one time. Monies so collected shall be deposited in the Insurance Fund from which Fund claims for loss or damage to material shall be paid. The Board of Governors shall have final jurisdiction in the payment and settlement of claims.
- 7. A charge of 8 per cent shall be deducted from all sales made through the Department. Monies so collected shall be deposited in the General Fund of the Department, and all costs of conducting the Department shall be paid from this Fund. Both the Insurance and the Commission charges shall be deducted whenever a payment shall be made to an owner.
- 8. Circuits must be forwarded to the next Member shown on the Route Sheet within five (5) days of receipt by the forwarding Member, to be forwarded by him by Registered Mail insured for Five Dollars (\$5.00). Strict observance and compliance with this Rule shall be enforced by the Sales Manager and any violation shall be subject to a penalty and charge of 25 cents per book in the Circuit for each day delayed in forwarding Circuits. The loss of any material not so forwarded by Registered Mail shall be entirely the responsibility and liability of the remitter.
- 9. The Member, upon receiving a Circuit, shall verify the number of books in the circuit, as evidenced on the Route Sheet, and that all spaces on each page of each book contain a stamp or other item, or a proper indication that the stamp or item of the space has been sold or is accounted for.
- 10. The buyer must sign his name in INK (or use a suitable rubber stamp) and indicate his Society Membership Number in all spaces from which he has removed and retained an item. Each so identified purchase shall be entered on the forms specifically provided for that purpose with each Circuit.

EXTRACT FROM THE RULES OF THE LIBRARY

1. This Department shall be maintained and shall function entirely for, and in the interests of, the membership of the British North America Philatelic Society. Any member of the Society in good standing may borrow material from the Library. Any member may be denied that privilege for infraction of any of the rules of the Library.

2. The Librarian shall receive and acknowledge all contributions to the Library. He shall cause to be published in BNA TOPICS reports of all ac-

tivities of the Library.

3. A Member, on written application to the Librarian, accompanied by all charges, may have sent not more than two (2) volumes and shall not retain such borrowed material for more than thirty (30) days, at which time, or sooner, same borrowed material must be returned in good condition, fully insured and all charges prepaid. The Member so borrowing material from the Library shall be responsible and liable to the full value of he material until same shall have been acknowledged as received by the Librarian. A member shall make such adjustment or payment for any damage or loss to the material borrowed from the Library in such amounts as shall be determined and established by the Librarian.

4. There shall be a charge of twenty-five (25) cents per week or part thereof for each item borrowed from the Library and held in excess of thirty (30) days. A rental of twenty-five (25) cents or more per week may be charged for any special or rare book when so determined by the Librarian.

NOTE: It would be appreciated by the Librarian if members would include return postage when requesting books, as much of the Library's budget is used up by mailing costs.

Mr. Llewellyn, Chairman of the Board of Governors, reported to the meeting that the Board had met on September 19th and voted to authorize the Chairman to conclude a new agreement with Mission Press for at least 1 year and possibly 2 on motion by R. V. C. Carr, seconded by J. T. Culhane. Mr. Llewellyn further informed the meeting that the Board had voted affirmatively on motion by W. Westhaver, seconded by J. T. Culhane to allocate \$100.00 for the use of the Publicity Director to be used judiciously to advertise and solicit membership enrollment to Society.

REPORT OF THE EDITOR

September 1965

It is with regret that your Editor is unable to attend the Annual Convention and thus I have asked the Chairman of the Editorial Board to present this report to the Annual Meeting of the Society.

During the past year the number of articles sent in for publication has been decreasing and it was necessary to appeal to our members for help. I am pleased to report that the following members came to our aid: K. Bileski, Frank Campbell, Harold M. Dilworth, Peter J. Hurst, N. A. Pelletier, Stanley Pollard and E. A. Smythies. Some of their articles will be published in the October issue. I also wish to thank our other contributing authors namely, Dr. Kenneth Day, Jacque Houser, Ted Kilish, Dr. Mercantini, Max Rosenthal, N. W. Scales, Col. L. W. Sharpe, E. A. Smythies, Clarence Westhaver and John Wilsdon.

As this is a time for throwing laurels, I definitely want to express my appreciation to our columnists, Clarence Kemp and Dr. Whitehead, Col. R. H. Pratt and Daniel Rosenblat. Two new columnists have joined our ranks namely, Sidney T. Harris with Newfoundland News and Mervyn Quarles with "P.D.O."

Last year we printed only the Yearbook and 9 issues of BNA Topics rather than ten. Unfortunately this was due to the loss of all the Convention Reports and when they were finally located a month later it was necessary to combine the Yearbook with the December issue. This was explained to the members at the time and it is hoped that it will not happen again. Delays in publication during the first half of this year seemed to be continuous with problems with our engravers, late reports and sickness. Our printers, Mission Press have been most tolerant. Lately, we have been back on time but in the future I wish to state that the magazine will not be issued much before the 10th of each month. With postal delays and transit the members cannot expect it before the 15th. The reason for this is as follows. Advertising copy is closed off the 1st of the month before publication and thus is not received by the Editor until approximately the fifth, e.g. the October issue-Advertising and Secretary's Report closed off September 1st. Received around September 5th. We need a full month from this date to get the October issue organized. typeset, proofed, proofread, corrected, made up into page form, proofed again, corrections checked, printing, shipped to binders, folded bound, cut and stapled, shipped to mailers, envelopes stamped and stencilled. envelopes stuffed, shipped to the Post Office and finally mailed. Thus we have reached October 5th-10th, It is then up to the post office. I want to point out that the publication date printed on the front cover of the magazine is the date that it goes on the press. So it is a number of days after this that it finally reaches the mailer.

As noted in my last report there was a problem of the number of engravings and their cost. Accordingly, at the request of the

Board of Governors, the Editorial offices cut back on engravings and a savings was made. This meant an increase in typesetting which was a cost which had to be borne by the printer, Mission Press, as they were on a contract price. I understand that they have asked for an increase in the contract price which has not been raised for 2 years. Talks did take place last year with Dan Meverson regarding an increase that was to come into effect January 1965 but the printers did not press the matter when Dan passed away during the middle of negotiations. I strongly recommend that the Board of Governors accept the increase as it would be difficult, if not impossible to find a cheaper rate for the same quality. I wish to point out that our printers is owned and operated as a non-profit organisation by Roman Catholic Church Extension Offices. They do most of the church printing for the Archdiocese of Toronto and only take side work such as ours to keep their men working steadily and to balance their costs. Their profits are a bare minimum and sometimes not at all as has been the case for the past year with our magazine. Arthur Robson, Mission Press general manager has always been fair and honest. Mission Press appreciates the magazine our society gives them but if they do not receive their costs I suspect they might have to search for a more profitable job. Their men are unionized so they have to pay the standard labour rates.

I solicit the Board of Governors vote in favour of an increase in order not to jeopardize our position.

I respectfully ask Vincent G. Greene to submit my report for discussion and move its adoption.

We wish to extend the Board's especial thanks to Max Rosenthal who has written so many articles for Topics for the past year. He has submitted over 20 more which we plan to publish in the future. It is hoped that the Board of Governors will allow us to sanction the use of 2-3 engravings with each of these manuscripts. I personally have offered the editor the use of any material in my collection which would tie in with Mr. Rosenthal's articles.

I have received a letter from Mission Press which reads as follows:

The handbook published by the CPS of GB on the Registered Letter Stamps and Cancellations has enjoyed better demand than we anticipated resulting in our being short of supplies on occasion but this situation is now corrected and all copies ordered

are in the mail.

The new 1965 edition of the Noble Precancel Catalogue has also been added to the list of handbooks available and we have had good distribution.

As you will see from these figures, during the last year 692 handbooks have been shipped at wholesale prices to dealers and 235 to collectors at retail for total sales of \$1530.60. The purchases by dealers is particularly encouraging as without their sales it would hardly be economical to the Society to publish these very important guides to the collection of Canadian stamps.

Our exchange relations with the CPS of GB and the RPSC whereby we handle their publications at a discount allowing us to supply both dealers and collectors remains satisfactory and is much appreciated.

Arrangements to distribute the commercially published catalogues

Revenue and Noble's Precancel also add to the income through the handbook committee and contribute to the success of our venture into the handbook field.

You will note that the Perfin handbook is completely sold out. Consideration will be given during the year for a reprint with an addenda listing the few additions and new identifications. At present there is no new handbook in preparation although the committee is still hopeful of seeing a Flag Cancel handbook in the near future. The committee would be interested in discussing further handbooks with member authors.

REPORT OF THE SALES MANAGER

Sales Manager Lehr advised the meeting that he anticipated sales for the year to reach the \$3000.00 mark and possible more depending on the co-operation of the members in sending books to the circuit sales especially such containing Proofs & Essays, Airmails, Booklets, Revenues and early used. 70 new books were added to the total of 277 in circuits sent to members — 113 circuits to 180 members. Mr. Lehr stressed the need for additional books in the circuits and solicited the help of the members.

REPORT OF THE ADVERTISING MANAGER

Mr. Whiting reported that his efforts for new advertisers were showing some results and that he was encouraged to expect even better results.

Ed. Richardson reporting on behalf of the Membership Committee complimented J. N. Sissons and C. A. Westhaver for their special efforts and results in enrolling new members. He requested that Mr. McIntyre check with him on free advertising possibilities before paid advertisement for new members. Mr. Richardson stressed the fact that individual efforts were most important in recruiting new members.

Speaking about Study Groups, E. A. Richardson advised the meeting that response at this convention to the called Study Group meetings was excellent. Six were held and all were well attended and very active.

Dr. Day, speaking for the Fancy Cancellation Study Group asked the membership to continue to submit any unusual markings or tracings of them for publication.

President Westhaver offered the floor to Sam Nickle who confirmed the dates for the 1966 annual convention at Calgary, Alberta, on September 15-16-17. Mr. Nickle assured all who would attend a wonderful time in the true custom and tradition of BNAPS conventions.

The locale for the 1967 convention is Montreal and Mr. Richardson entered a bid for 1968 convention to be held at San Antonio, Texas. It was moved by J. Levine, seconded by V. G. Greene, that the meeting accept the bid of Mr. Richardson. The motion was affirmed and so ordered that the 1968 convention be held at San Antonio, Texas.

Under the call for new business, Dr. Balassa was appointed as Chairman of a committee of 3 to 5 whose purpose shall be to investigate the Part Perf issues of the Admirals and return with a report to the next annual meeting of their findings.

J. S. Siverts, Chairman of the Election Committee, reported to the meeting that 237 ballots were returned for the election of three new Board members to the following results: Messrs. Cook, deVolpi, and Llewellyn duly elected to the Board of Governors for the periods of 1966-1969.

The meeting rose to express a vote of appreciation to Clarence Westhaver and his Host Group for a wonderful convention.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, it was voted adjourned at 12 noon on motion by L. A. Davenport.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN FOR 1965

During the past year, the most noteworthy feature of the affairs of the library has been the increased use of its resources by the membership.

Outstanding acquisition of the year has been the completion of the file of the Society's journal, **BNA TOPICS**.

Further progress has been made in the cataloguing of the file of articles extracted from journals.

A review of rules governing the use of the library has been initiated.

Friends of the library have continued to send in much needed material as well as eash for bookbinding. Such gifts account chiefly for the growth in the library.

And so forth, leaving the collector with the problem of "where to go from here".

The corollary question is the fate of the old collection. Again there are alternatives;

- 2. Keeping some sections for incorporation with the new project, and disposal of the balance.
