Sales Department

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. This Department shall function entirely for and in the interest of the membership of the British North America Philatelic Society. Any Member, in good standing, may participate in the Department and, by his participation, attests and agrees to abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Department. Any Member, so participating, may be denied such participation for infraction of any of the Rules or Regulations of the Department.

2. The President of the Society shall appoint a Member to serve as Sales Manager who shall be responsible to the Board of Governors. The President of the Society shall appoint a Committee to serve as a Board of Examiners to examine any and all stamps or books of stamps submitted to it by the Sales Manager and to order removed any such stamps or other material entered which, in its opinion, is of a questionable character, without any responsibility or liability therefore to the owner or anyone else.

3. The Sales Manager shall keep accounts and records of all transactions of the Department in books of the Society so provided by it. He shall at specific times, provide the Board of Governors with reports of the affairs of the Department, including a full balance sheet of all bookkeeping entries and shall similarly cause such reports to be published in BNA TOPICS.

4. Members entering material for sale through the Department shall mount their material in such books as shall be prescribed by the Board of Governors. Books shall be obtained from the Sales Manager upon request and at such price as shall be determined by the Board of Governors. No other books or forms except the prescribed ones shall be used. The Department reserves the right to limit the dollar value of material entered in any one book and may reject any material which it feels will not be well received, except that such restriction shall be the joint action and decision of the Sales Manager and the Board of Examiners, without any responsibility or liability therefore to the owner or anyone else.

5. Any stamp or item which is damaged, counterfeit, re-perforated, cleaned, repaired, a reprint, or in any other way of doubtful or questionable character, must be clearly so marked next thereto by the affixer upon submission for entry in the Department books. Any such stamp or item, in any way of doubtful or questionable character not so marked clearly by the affixer, so decided by the Board of Examiners or established by any other means, in its sole discretion, and without any lia-

bility or responsibility therefor to the owner or anyone else, shall automatically cause a charge of at least 25 cents for any and each such unmarked item and be removed from the book. In instance of gross or deliberate abuse or violation of this Regulation, or where it may be deemed requisite or equitable, the Sales Manager may, at his discretion, impose reasonable additional charges, or deny the services and privileges of the Department, or both. Such gross and deliberate abuse or violation may be considered as "Conduct unbecoming a Member."

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9. The Member, upon receiving a Circuit, shall verify the number of books in the circuit, as evidenced on the Route Sheet, and that all spaces on each page of each book contain a stamp or other item, or a proper indication that the stamp or item of the space has been sold or is accounted for.

10. The buyer must use a suitable rubber stamp and indicate his Society Membership Number in all spaces from which he has removed and retained an item. Each so identified purchase shall be entered on the forms specifically provided for that purpose with each Circuit.

11. All pricings and payments are expressed and payable only in U.S. funds.

Sales Circuit Comments

J. C. LEHR, 2818 Cheshire Road, Devon, Wilmington, Delaware 19803

As I write this we have just started into November with circuit sales just over \$6M. Looks like another good year, largely because we have some good new sources of material for sale. With the interest and demand we have it would be no trouble selling \$12-15M/year if we had the material. How about turning those collections you have lost interest in, into cash for your present interests?

Although we are getting close to the 1/1/70 date when all purchasers using the circuits must have rubber stamps, the majority of members still don't have their stamp. After 1/1 I will warn those not using stamps once and then drop from the circuits on the second time until they send me a note showing their rubber stamp. Don't you get caught this way!

Incidentally, those of you who don't think you can sell more expensive material in

the circuits would be surprised at the number of \$10-\$50 stamps sold, with occasional stamp sales in the \$75 up range (per stamp). So far in 1969 only the top man has sales of \$1,035, I'm next with \$603 and numbers 3 and 4 are \$496 and \$460.

If all this has got you thinking, here are some of the types of material we always need:

1) Cancellations — we never have enough squared circles, dates, towns, flags, slogans, RPO, you name it.

2) Proofs and essays — we get about one or two books a year and could sell ten times this amount easily.

3) Revenues—our largest selling group.

4) Newfoundland and Provinces — particularly the scarcer material.

5) Canadian pre-1900.

Revised Library Rules

1. This Department shall be maintained and shall function entirely for, and in the interests of, the membership of the British North America Philatelic Society. Any member of the Society in good standing may borrow material from the Library. Any member may be denied that privilege for infraction of the rules of the Library.
2. The Librarian shall receive and acknowledge all contributions to the Library. He shall cause to be published in B.N.A. Topics reports of all activities of the Library.
3. A member, on written application to the Librarian may have sent not more than two (2) volumes and/or ten (10) loose articles and shall not retain such borrowed material for more than thirty (30) days, at which time, or sooner, same borrowed material must be returned in good condition by the method specified by the Librarian with all charges prepaid. The member so borrowing material from the Library shall be responsible and liable to the full value of the material until same has been received by the Librarian. A member shall make such adjustment or payment for any damage or loss to the material borrowed from the Library in such amounts as shall be determined and established by the Librarian.
4. Members shall be responsible for all postage and insurance charges. No money should accompany the request for material as this will be advised at the time of shipment. Small amounts may be paid in cash, money order or postage stamps in small denomination, either Canadian or United States. Members are requested to avoid cheques drawn on U.S. banks for small amounts.
5. To avoid long delays in the return of material to the Library, there shall be a charge of \$1.00 per week or part thereof for material borrowed from the Library and held in excess of thirty (30) days. A rental of twenty-five (25) cents or more per thirty (30) day period may be charged for any special or rare book when so determined by the Librarian.

TWO 6c ISSUES COMMEMORATE MANITOBA AND NORTHWEST TERRITORIES CENTENNIALS

Two 6c stamps to be released by the Canada Post Office on 27th January 1970,



the first produced under the guidance of the Department's new Design Advisory Committee, will give recognition to centennial celebrations in the province of Manitoba and in the Northwest Territories.

Manitoba's central geographic position, the cross-roads of Canada, is reflected in the symbolic design created for this 40 mm by 24 mm stamp by K. C. Lochhead of the province's capital city, Winnipeg. Thirty-eight million Manitoba stamps will be produced by the Canadian Bank Note Company, Ottawa, using colours of red, blue and yellow and the lithographic printing process.

Centered in the Northwest Territories 30 mm x 24 mm stamp, printed in red and black by the steel engraving process, is a reproduction of Kenojuak's "Enchanted Owl", one of the most prized prints to come from Eskimo artists in the Northwest Territories. Norman E. Hallendy and Sharon Van Raalte, of Ottawa, collaborated in producing the overall design for this stamp. Thirty million will be printed by the Canadian Bank Note Company, Ottawa.

Because of the significance of the occasions, the Post Office will keep the Manitoba stamp on sale in that province for a period of six months. A similar six month period of sale has been arranged with the Territories for the Northwest Territories issue. Both stamps will be available throughout Canada for the customary ten day period commencing on the date of issue. First Day Cover service will be provided by the Postmaster, Ottawa 2.

When it was created in 1870, Manitoba, by reason of its small area, quickly acquired the affectionate title of the "postage stamp province". It was the first province to enter Confederation after the original four in 1867. Subsequent extensions, principally by Acts in 1881 and 1912, created the Manitoba of today where nearly one million people form the population in an area of 251,000 square miles extending some 761 miles northward from the international border. Nearly sixty-five per cent of Manitoba consists of forest land and fresh water areas.

The Northwest Territories' 1,304,903 square miles are about one third of Canada's total area. It was not until 1967, coinciding with Canada's Centennial Year, that the territorial administrative seat of government was moved to Yellowknife. Prior to that, in 1963, a full time Commissioner, based in Ottawa, had been appointed to build a territorial administration.

6c CHANGE OF COLOUR

The Canada Post Office announced today that due to the continually increasing employment of mechanical facer-canceller equipment to speed the flow of mail, Canada's six cent definitive stamp will be re-issued in a new colour on the 7th of January 1970.

The current orange-coloured stamp in use since November 1st, 1968 will be changed to black, a colour with superior qualities for detection by electronic recognition systems.

In size and format, 24 mm x 20 mm, the re-issued stamp is compatible with five lower denominations, all of which include symbolic views of Canada's major economic regions. The six cent value continues the use of a design recognizing the importance of communications and transportation in linking together the country's vast geographic area. Printing by the steel engraving process will also be continued.

The Postmaster, Ottawa 2, will provide customary First Day Cover Service on January 7th, 1970.

MAJOR ERROR DISCOVERED 6c CHRISTMAS 1969

The Canada Post Office announced today that a quantity of mis-registered 6c Christmas 1969 issue postage stamps were included in the 100 million stamps which went on sale to the public on 8th October 1969.

The Christmas stamps were printed by four colour lithography. The mis-register was caused by the stamps not receiving the black colour which comprised the design frame, wording "Canada Christmas-Noel", the denomination "6" and miniature year date "1969" during the production run.

Produced on a printer's sheet of 400 stamps and then guillotined into post office panes of 100 stamps, it is estimated that a total of 400 defective stamps were shipped from the manufacturer in the general distribution to post offices.

The Department has recovered 209 of the mis-registered stamps. Therefore, it is estimated that 191 of these stamps are in circulation, having been purchased by customers. The identity of the persons who purchased these stamps is not known to the Department.

It has not been necessary to make any withdrawal of the 6c Christmas issue from stock or from circulation on this account.

The interest, among collectors, in this year's Christmas issue has been above average.

After the John McCrea stamp, the 1969 Christmas issue comes next in line for varieties. I've never seen so many varieties on a one stamp subject. It just shows you how fast a stamp sheet passes in the printing press and how careless the printers are.

On the 5c stamps (plain and tagged) a thinned "C" of the word "Canada" shows on a certain stamp; also you can find "floating 'o's" here and there in the blue portion of the stamp; also is shown in the left handed booklet tagged a great big plain version and on some sheets both plain and tagged. What's curious enough, on the left

handed booklet, plain, a blue spot shows in the white margin of a stamp, just as last year's version, these also must surely exist on the tagged version, and on some sheets both plain and tagged.

On the 6c, pink spots can be found everywhere, here and there, on the sheets (plain and tagged). I've found a funny pink spot on the head of the front girl, just on top, formed as a flower, you may call this one "Flower on Head" variety. I've also found a black line on her cheek which gives the impression of a scar, you might call this the "Scarface" variety. Now, the most interesting of all, on all the sheets I've seen so far, a variety shows on stamp number 34,

the girl has a ring on her index finger, you can call this one the "Indexed Finger" or "Ring on the Index Finger" variety.

Annual Meeting

The meeting was officially opened and called to order by President Robert V. C. Carr at 11:10 a.m. President Carr asked the membership to rise in silent tribute and prayer for our departed members.

It was moved by President Carr and seconded by George Llewellyn that the meeting accept the minutes of the previous Annual Meeting as published in BNA Topics of December 1968. The motion was affirmed.

In view of the absence of the Secretary Jack Levine, the President appointed Leo La France to serve as Secretary for the meeting.

The President then read telegrams from The Lakeway wishing the success of the '69 convention and not to forget them as a future meeting site, and one from Clarence Westhaver who could not attend because of illness, wishing success and sending congratulations to the members of the Vancouver Committee and that he would miss seeing all who were present. Ed Richardson then gave the latest news of Clarence's condition and that everything looked real good at that time and that Clarence was looking forward to seeing everyone at the next meeting. He also noted that both Jim Culhane and Al Kessler were unable to attend because of health. They had both planned and looked forward to being in Vancouver.

The President then read a letter from Bob Woolley tendering his resignation as Editor of Topics. Bob had reluctantly taken over the editorship in February '69 and now because of personal circumstances felt that it would be to the detriment of the Society if he were to remain in the post of Editor. TREASURER'S REPORT

Since the Treasurer Jim Culhane was unable to attend the meeting his report was read by President Carr.

INTERIM REPORT OF THE TREASURER (1/1-8/1, 1969)

The Annual Report of the Treasurer for 1968 was published in TOPICS where we showed a surplus of better than \$1,300.00 against my forecasted deficit of \$288.00.

This surplus is due entirely to the efforts of Jim Lehr, Bob Woolley, Russ McNeil, Ed Whiting and all the other officers and members of this Society who give their time and efforts gratis.

This year I am about to forecast a surplus and this is due solely to the fact that we received a check when converted to U.S. Funds amounted to \$1,703.00 from Ryerson Press for the royalty due the Society for the reprinting of the Holmes Catalogue. The Society is in debt to Dr. Brian Holmes and to other members of BNAPS who did the work on this catalogue. We cannot count on anything like this amount in future years. I have invested this amount in a 5% Growth Certificate where it should earn about \$85.00 yearly in interest.

As in past years, this report does not include income or expenses connected with the following: The 1969 Yearbook, The Handbooks, The Sales Department or the Library. Records for these operations are either unavailable or incomplete at this time.

The total income for 1969 through August was \$8,210.00 and expenditures for the same period amounted to \$4,957.00 leaving a balance of \$3,253.00 for the balance of 1969.

I estimate additional income for 1969 at \$593.00, while expenses for the same period should be \$3,436.00. If these estimates prove to be accurate, we should show a surplus of \$410.00. Again I warn that this surplus is a one-shot affair. The estimated expenses have a built in provision for our ever-growing Yearbook deficit.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all the officers and members for their cooperation during my years as Treasurer of this Society and it is with deep regret that the condition of my health forbids further continuance of my duties beyond this year though I assure my successor the same cooperation that our beloved Treasurer Emeritus, Bill Peterman, gave me when I took over ten years ago.

This report is respectfully submitted for your consideration, and I move its approval.

I would be glad to expand on this if there is any interest.

During 1968 we added the Holmes Specialized Canada and BNA and also the most recent edition of the Precancel Catalogue, both of which have continued to have good sales.

Following the Texas Convention the department took over the 120 copies of Ed Richardson's monographs and have disposed of 98 of these, the balance are available for purchase at this convention.

There is a demand for a second edition of our Fancy Cancellation Handbook which looks as though it will have to wait until your sales manager has more time available to prepare the copy.

Bob Pratt reports that it is almost impossible to select items from the "Trail of the Caribou" to make a handbook which would do credit to the late Dan Meyerson. We are still considering reproducing a major study which he undertook on Newfoundland Postal History.

The Annual Treasurer's report will reflect the financial results of the year's operation of the department.

At this time it was also mentioned by Bob Woolley that a Handbook was being considered as tribute to Dan Myerson called the "Conception Bay Packet".

It was also announced at this time by G. H. Melvin that a list of the post offices in B.C. including location, town names and changes along with dates and names of Postmasters was being put together in hopes

of publication in the Centennial Year of B.C., 1971. This volume would probably run to 400 pages or more.

STUDY GROUPS

Ed Richardson reported that a sizable number of groups met with a few additions over last year. Part of this due to the locale, and all groups were well attended and much interest shown. It would appear that if members would make their interests and wants known beforehand that maybe even more informative Study Groups could be held.

REPORT OF CIRCULATION MANAGER

Each year has its variations — 1969 with increased costs due to Postage and Parcel Post rate changes Nov. 1st, 1968 and production costs, the termination of our 2nd Class mailing privileges, resulting in Topics size reduction. Every department has had to scratch harder to produce the desired results. For comparison, this department anticipates: 1969 Receipts in excess of \$550 compared with \$139 in 1968. 1969 Postage Costs \$250 compared with \$84 in 1968. Telegraph and Telephone \$90 compared with \$15 in 1968.

May I thank the President, Officers, Writers and Membership for their cooperation.

The August BNA TOPICS mailed July 28th carried our President's message requesting member recipients to report to me the date they received their TOPICS and I would report to Officers. I'm not disappointed though response negligible — less than one dozen members reporting. Hamilton, Ont. 2 days; Knoxville, Tenn., 10 days; Victoria, B.C. 7 days; Surrey, B.C., 9 days; Sidney, B.C., 12 days; Worthing, Surrey, England, 3 weeks, had it been 2nd Class 5 weeks; Milwaukee, Wisc. 17 days instead of one month second class; Shrub Oak, N.Y., 24 days; Santa Fe, N.M. 14 days.

Prior to our President's request, 2nd Class deliveries during 1968 throughout the World—Norway, Airmail 5 days (same time as Packet Boat) 100 years ago. Topics mailed May received early September, June/July mailed Aug. 23rd—received Sept. 28. August issue mailed Sept. 9th, received Oct. 19th. Airmail between Victoria, Australia, there and return—10 days. TOPICS took 2-3 months. To France and South Africa 3-4 months. Present indications are that 3rd class mail deliveries this year better than 2nd class last year. May I recommend acceptance of this report.

REPORT OF THE PUBLICITY DIRECTOR

Mr. President and Fellow Members:

Following the last Annual Convention and show in Texas I compiled and dispatched to the press brief reports of the annual event. I also made an extensive report of the event for TOPICS.

During the year I have answered numerous inquiries about the Society. In July of this year I sent Publicity about this convention and show to the Philatelic Journals and newspaper columnists and on September 15 mailed stories to 24 dailies and 78 weekly newspapers in British Columbia. Copy is attached herewith.

This is the tenth year of service, as I took over from Al Kessler at Banff in 1960.

International Exhibition of Stamps for Vancouver.

Inverted Seaway stamps in a large block worth \$100,000 will be on display at BNAPEX 69, an International Exhibition at Bayshore Inn, Vancouver, B.C., October 2 to 4.

This event, staged by the British North America Philatelic Society presents an unusual opportunity to British Columbia residents to view some of the finest collections of Canadian and foreign stamps.

Pre-confederation items of the early provinces will include a pair of the rare and costly 12-penny blacks of 1851, and one on cover. Pioneer pence stamps of the British crown colonies of Vancouver Island and British Columbia, 1860 will also be in the competitive division of 200 frames.

Postal history will be exemplified by a letter to the Granville postmaster authorizing change of name to Vancouver. Way-mail and coastal ship markings will tell the story of early mail movements.

Competitive collections will include air-mails, revenues, and specialized covers and cancellations.

There will be a bourse of United States and Canadian dealers.

For registered Society members and their wives attending the three-day convention

there will be seminars, study groups, scenic and shopping tours, hospitality sessions, dinners, concluding with a banquet.

Stew Kenyon stated that he had been offered the opportunity to purchase the residue of the Edgar Black Library at the University of Vancouver for \$500. The Board members present discussed this and Bill Rockett moved with the agreement of all present that Stew be empowered and use his discretion to make such purchase. That afternoon Stew examined the Library and did make the purchase as much material was available for the Society Library as well as items that could be sold.

There were 216 frames in the competitive exhibition along with a fine bank of frames in the Court of Honor which featured a showing by the Canada Post Office that included a pane of 25 Seaway inverts, and a display of rare pioneer items from the collection of Gerald E. Wellburn.

The jury of three, V. G. Greene and J. N. Sissons of Toronto, and Gerry Wellburn of Duncan, B.C. did the unusual for no particular reason that he could give, said the latter. They combined exhibits of wives with all from the same home in a family award. There were ten medals provided but the jury found this totally inadequate for this quality show and called the executive into consultation which boosted it to 19.

The Grand Award (an engraved tray) went to Sam and Rosemary Nickle for Canada pence which included a mint pair and one on cover in his exhibit; hers was a 4-frame exhibit of unissued MacDonald Cartiers, 1914.

Five SILVERS: Miss Bonnie Eacret, a new exhibitor with Pence Issues of Maritime Provinces; A. V. Mifsud, B.C. and Vancouver Island; Jack Wallace (also Novice Award) B.C. and Vancouver Island; G. B. Llewellyn, Consorts of 1859; Harry W. Lussey, Large Queens and Helen Lussey, Fair covers.

Ten BRONZE: Stewart S. Kenyon, Threecent Small Queen issue of Canada; John Payne, Quebec Tercentenary Issue; H. A. Price, B.C. Squared Circles; C. B. D. Garrett, No. 15, oldest member, 87, Rapid Cancels of Canada; W. E. Topping, Ship Markings of B. C. Coast; Fred Goodhelpsen, Experimental Coils of Canada; Wilmer C. Rockett, Canadian Revenues; Lt. Col. R. H. Webb, Canadian Military Mail; Ed A. Harris, Western Territorials; David Crane, Postal History of Yukon.

A special convention post office was provided with special hammer and machine slogan cancels, also supplied with philatelic bureau mint and plate block stock; John MacKinnon, Dick Trudel and Roy Horgan in charge.

There were 11 tables in an active bourse which skirted the exhibition: Fred Jarrett, George S. Wegg and Stan Lum, all of Toronto; R. M. and Mrs. Lamb, Kitchener; Ray Peters, Phoenix, Ariz.; K. Robertson, Victoria; Luis Schlesinger, Los Angeles; H. G. Wallburn, Okanagan Centre; Stamp Den, Seattle; Col. Fred Eaton, Vancouver Stamp Auctions; Stanley Stamp Co., Vancouver.

STUDY GROUPS

Eight study groups convened with an average attendance of 16 under direction of Ed Richardson in absence of C. Westhaver. Sam Nickle talked to 16 about Canada Pence, giving numbers issued; Harry Lussey on Admirals to 12; Gerry Wellburn to 26 in a nostalgic talk on B.C. Postal History; Lt. Col. R. H. Webb to 10 on Military Mail; Ed Richardson to 15 on Flag Cancels; Wilmer Rockett to 15 on Revenues; Jim Pike to 20 on Modern B.C. Cancels; H. G. Wallburn on Precancels to 8; Western Territorials by Ed Harris to 12. There was no meeting on Patriotics due to absence of C. Westhaver.

Mr. Nickle said that of 1510 copies of the 12 pence issued many more mint copies, nearly 100, have survived than of the six and 10 pence. Answering a question about the earliest stamp collecting in Canada, he said the first serious collector was active in the 1860s and 1870s, roughly 20 to 25 years after the first adhesive stamps. Ribbed was not a kind of paper but a condition recognized by collectors, and due to vibration in the belt on machine made paper, Gerry Wellburn told them that the first three post offices serving the area about Burrard inlet included Granville, 1874-1886 when its name was changed to Vancouver. Several express companies operated into the Cariboo gold country 1868-1871. F. J. Barnard tried steam but found the trail too rough. Others were B. C. Victoria Express, Deitz & Nelson, Ballous Fraser River Express, 1860. U.S. stamps were used on Wells Fargo Express covers southbound mail as late as the 1870s.

The BNAPS Fun Society, Order of the Three Beavers, founded at TEXPEX '68 initiated two new members with Ed Richardson and Fred Jarrett officiating and presenting wide white hats to Vinnie Greene and Gerry Wellburn.

Annual meeting was attended by 52. President Bob Carr paid a compliment to the sponsors for the fine program provided. During the year most of the problems met by the society had been resolved and the society can scarcely handle all offers of convention sponsorship, a sign of a healthy society. He asked Vice-President Sam Nickle to speak and the latter said society had been competently managed by the executive.

Secretary Jack Levine reported by mail a membership of 1,072 on September 1, for

a gain of 24. He regretted he was unable to attend.

The Greene award for best article in Topics went to Max Rosenthal of Toronto.

Trophy for securing the most new members was won by S. S. Kenyon.

Dr. Carr said that the special BNAPS edition by Linn's Weekly brought a fine response.

He stated that high printing costs forced an increase in the advertising rates. Increased fees would not be necessary this year.

He reported that Treasurer James T. Culhane had resigned due to ill health and that Leo J. LaFrance would accept the post. The report showed a surplus of \$1,200 instead of predicted deficit of \$288.

Chairman Llewellyn reported that it had been unnecessary to call the board to deal with any matter of discipline, the sole complaint being cleared by one letter.

Resignation of Bob Woolley as editor of Topics has been received. He has been carrying on since the resignation of John Young at TEXPEX. The vice-president has been authorized to investigate switching publication to the Calgary area.

The nominating committee reported election of three to the Board of Governors: Dr. R. A. Chaplin, S. S. Kenyon and W. C. Rockett.

Speaking for the editorial board, V. G. Greene said its most pressing problem was to get an editor.

Librarian S. S. Kenyon said progress was being made in the binding program. High cost of postage greatly hampers mail lendings.

Sales Manager Jim Lehr reported 195 new books and sales mounting to \$5,000 to date, so earnings will exceed \$1,000.

Ed Richardson said handbook sales were down almost 100. Work by the Holmes handbook revision committee had brought new income. Study groups constituted a new and important feature since 1963 and any member who failed to participate was missing an important service.

Bob Pratt had experienced some difficulty in trying to condense material from Dan Myerson's Trail of the Caribou column in TOPICS. This brought under consideration publishing a major monograph as a brochure.

Circulation Manager Russ McNeil, who is retiring for health reasons, said that postal rates on TOPICS have tripled and

delivery as third class matter was taking from 17 to 21 days.

CONVENTIONS

The Publicity Director reported making usual advance stories and after convention publicity on the results.

Ray Peters, convention chairman, reported plans well under control for Baltimore in 1970 next Fall and at Halifax in 1971. The 1972 date for Los Angeles seemed only possible if combined with SESCAL, a plan not much approved, as the society has only one or two members in the area. So 1972 is left open. Plans are in hand for the July 1973 meeting in Calgary, and the 1974 convention in Williamsburg Sept. 12-15. Bob Pratt said the 1975 meet could be staged in Newfoundland. The 1976 show had been slated for Philadelphia but the holding of giant centennial celebrations there pose problems and leaves its future unsettled.

Vinnie Greene reported that a life membership has been subscribed for John Young in appreciation of seven years service as TOPICS editor.

CLOSING BANQUET

The Bayshore provided good food and service for the closing banquet at which W. E. Topping, convention chairman, presided. Head table personnel included Harry Sutherland, president of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, the Carrs, Llewellyns, and guest speaker Gerry Wellburn.

Dr. Carr made a gift to Russ McNeil for his letter writing.

Gerry said that he has been charged with catering to the old ladies in searching for early letters and stamps. Certainly it was from them he acquired many of his pioneer philatelic gems. During his talk at the study period on B.C. Postal History he recalled how he got some finds of historic merit. At the banquet he produced some of the early letters sent from Victoria to Britain, and regaled his hearers with choice comment on early conditions written for home consumption in the Old Land.

POT OF GOLD

L. A. Davenport came to the front and provided a surprise. He had headed the Canadian Association of Philatelic Exhibitions formed about 1947 principally with the object of staging CAPEX '51, an extensive stamp exhibition to celebrate Canada's postal centennial. Many philatelic societies took advantage to hold their annual meetings there. There was a cash balance which was invested.

Recently it was decided to dissolve the organization and divide its assets between the two leading philatelic societies. Accordingly he presented cheques for \$700 each to President Sutherland and President Carr, noting that it was a one-time windfall, unlikely to be repeated.

Dr. Carr now enters his second year in office.

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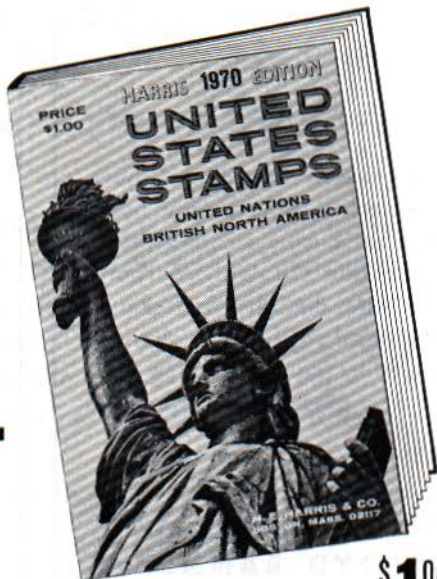
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
