# A. F. Lichtenstein's Exhibit at N. Y. Meeting

On Tuesday, February 6, Mr. A. F. Lichtenstein honored the N. Y. meeting with a visit, and showed portions of his early B.N.A. For one hour and a half, the listeners sat amazed and thrilled while Mr. Lichtenstein, in his quiet and unassuming manner, described and from an endless fund of knowledge, explained the postal history, printing, quantities issued, plate and paper varieties and dates of use for each item. It is impossible to review here every item shown except to remark that everything exhibited was in its own right a philatelic "gem." The exhibit consisted of the Pence Issues of B.N.A., except Prince Edward Island, but included Newfoundland. The stamps were shown unused, used and wherever possible, used on cover to show the different combinations that could be used to make up the various postal rates.

BRITISH COLUMBIA: A block of four of the imperf. 2½d. A 5c unused vertical pair, the only one known. The 10c....three pairs used and unused and two used strips of three. A study of the placing of the watermark on the 10c imperf. The perforated issues were shown in unused blocks of four for all values.

Most of the stamps were shown on cover, and used copies off cover.

NEW BRUNSWICK: The Pence Issues, used and unused and on cover. 'Among the latter, a strip of three one shilling used with the 3d to Budapest. Splits were shown on cover: 6d bisected used as a 3d. The quarter of a shilling used as 3d, half of shilling for the 6d rate and the 7½d rate made up of half a shilling and a quarter of a 6d. Furthermore, a study of the Colonial Erpress Mail.

NOVA SCOTIA: A block of five unused of the 1d (Mr. Lichtenstein explained how rare blocks are and why). Unused blocks of the 3d and a strip of four of the 6d yellow green. Shillings unused and used, also both shades in pairs. A block of four 1d; a block of eight 3d; block of four 6d yellow green. The entire series were shown on cover, including a pair of the shilling cold violet used with the 6d to India. Splits: Half of 6d for the 3d rate. A quarter of a shilling for the 3d rate and a half of a 3d and shilling for the 7½d rate.

NEWFOUNDLAND: The Pence Issues in very fine condition, unused and used, including used pairs of the 2d, 6d and 1 shilling scarlet vermilion. A used block of four of the 3d. This entire issue on covers, except the shilling. The 8d split, horizontal, vertical and diagonal, used on cover often with the 3d to make an over-paid 6½d rate. The orange issue used and unused. The 4d and 6d on cover. The lake issues....used on covers with splits of the 6d to make up the 15d rate, and a split 4d used with another 4d and a split 1d to make the 6½d make.

CANADA: A complete representation of all the issued stamps of the Pence Issues, used and unused and most of them on cover. Among the laid papers: two unused 3d and a pair and a single of the 6d (rarer than the 12d). Also copies on cover. A page of the 12d black showing used copies, two mint pairs and a single and two copies on separate covers. A page of the 12d on thin wove, two copies unused and a copy on cover. A page of the 12d on medium wove, one copy on cover. Pages of the 3d on the various papers, hand and machine made, in all the shades, and in blocks, strips and pairs. All papers and shades were shown on covers. Of the 6d, there were stamps and covers to show the various shades and papers, A mint 6d on wove (rare), a strip of three and a block of six of the 6d on thick, hard paper, one canceled "late fee," and among the covers showing different markings, was one with "money letter." The 10d was shown with pages for each of the three kinds of paper, and included stamps to show the "wide" and "narrow". A beauty indeed was a used block of four of the 10d thick paper. and a cover with a strip of three of the same. The 71/2d was presented in the same way to show unused, used and on cover, also the "wide" and "narrow" stamps. A gem indeed was a used block of four of the 71/2d. The 1/2d was represented among other things with a mint block of fourteen and a used block of fifteen (the 71/2d rate). Pages of ribbed paper varieties were shown, both vertical and horizontal, of the 3d and the 1/2d, and also stamps showing the stitch watermarking both vertical and horizontal. Other items among the covers shown were two with the trial perf 14, and one with a pair of the 3d and a split 3d to make the 71/2d rate, a soldier's letter and a used first issued stamped envelope, the black brown (a rare item used). Covers bearing the U. S. 1847 5c and 10c. paid to the lines. A letter from Newfoundland to the Postmaster General of (Continued bottom next page)

#### AUCTION COMMENTARY by Dan Meyerson

At the Jan. 20 auction at the offices of Harmer Rooke & Co., the following prices were realized on some of the Newfoundland items that were offered for sale.

A superb used copy of the 2d, #2, brought \$335. A very fine unused copy of the 6½d scarlet, #7, with a large part og brought \$110, while the same stamp on cover to Nova Scotia was sold for \$112.50.

A very fine og copy of the 8d scarlet, #8, sold for \$15, while a block brought \$81, and a sheet of 20, the first to be offered in New York at auction in many a year was sold for \$420.

A horizontal og block of 8 of the 3d on thin paper, #11a, brought \$23 and a copy on cover changed hands at the same price.

A superb fresh og copy of the 4d orange, #12, came close to realizing full catalog when it sold for \$260. Two used copies of the 6d orange, #13, with full margins each brought \$41.

The rare 1d reddish brown, #16, with clear margins but no gum sold for \$255.

Complete sheets of 20 of #18, 20 and 21 brought \$26, \$22, and \$112.50 respectively.

Two og copies of the 5c blue rouletted seal, #40, sold as one lot for \$15. The Gilbert set in fine og condition realized \$14.50.

A mint Do-X sold for \$25, the Labrador set in the same condition for \$11.50. and the Balbo for \$23.

At the February 1 and 2 sale of Vahan Mozian some excellent prices were realized for the Newfoundland material.

Mint panes of 20 of #18, 20 and 22 brought \$45, \$22.50 and \$62.50 in that order.

An og Cabot set sold for \$11, while a used Caribou set realized \$10.25. The Publicity set. #131-144, in used condition was knocked down for \$8.75, while #145-159, in used condition brought \$6. 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## Further Notes on Newfoundland Booklets

by Dan Meyerson

At the time that I wrote the article on Newfoundland Booklets that was published in the November issue of "TOPICS," there was one phase that was not covered at all. That was the question as to whether or not separate plates had been laid down for the printing of the booklet panes or whether the panes of 8 in the case of Type 1, or the panes of 4 in the case of Type 3, 4 and 4A, had been torn from the tops of the regular sheets issued to the Post Office.

Cursory examination would lead the collector to believe that the stamps were torn from the regular post office sheets since the panes in the booklet in all cases are perforated all around. The only bit of information that would tend to make one believe otherwise is found in an article written for "STAMPS" by George B. Sloane, several years ago. In discussing the Type 4A Booklet, Mr.

Sloane has the following to say, and I quite:

"In the second, and later printings, while the panes are again in blocks of 4, and perforated all around, it is evident that the stamps were printed from plates specially designed for use in the production of stamp booklets. The blocks show wider margins all around the outside edges, and one booklet I have shows definite proof that the stamps are from a special plate. In this, a block of the 1c stamp shows not only the sheet margin at top, but also an extra margin at the bottom, which is wide and with no traces of any stamps below it. These special plates are probably so arranged that the stamps are grouped in a series of double horizontal rows, with a sufficient space between each double row so that when the printed stamps are perforated, and the stamps divided into blocks, each block will have the necessary sheet margin at the top for binding. Very likely there is also a wider vertical spacing than usual separating each two vertical rows, which accounts for the wider margins at the sides of the stamps."

Not being satisfied with the above logical explanation I wrote directly to Whitehead Morris Ltd., producers of the stamps in the Type 1 Booklet, and to John Dickinson & Co. Ltd., who subsequently secured the contract for the stamps that appear in the Type 3, 4 and 4A Booklets.

Both of the firms mentioned were kind enough to reply, and Whitehead

Morris Ltd. had this to say:

"In reply to your letter, I have made inquiries regarding the Newfoundland Pictorial set of Postage Stamps. The booklets were made up of stamps cut from the standard sheets of 100 as supplied to the postal Authority; no special plate was engraved for the booklet order."

The answer that I received from John Dickinson & Co. Ltd., is as follows: "In reply to your letter regarding the Newfoundland Stamps we regret that we cannot give you any definite information since all our records were destroyed when we lost our offices by enemy action in 1941. As far as our memory goes, the stamps that were supplied in booklet form were taken from the regular sheets of 100 and no special plates

were prepared."

In conclusion, judging from the contents of the above two letters, it is with certainty that we can say that no special plates were laid down for the printing of the Newfoundland Booklet panes, and that all of the stamps used in the booklets came directly from the standard sheets of 100 that were supplied to the Postal Authorities.

A vote of thanks is due to Whitehead Morris Ltd., and to John Dickinson & Co. Ltd., for taking the time and trouble to answer a question that has long posed a philatelic problem.

### Letters to the Editor

Congratulations on the fine articles appearing in the TOPICS. You are really getting in some very interesting material even for the serious collector.

I was very interested in W. W. Chadbournes article on the Prince Edward Island covers. I'd like to write to him and compare a few notes. He did not say anything about bisects or registered covers. Here's something I just discovered while going over some stampless covers.

I have a stampless cover from Queenston, C. W., addressed to Charlotte-town with the PAID 3, Jarrett's No. 606, in black and Queenston paid in black, on the face of the cover. Backstamped: Clifton, Ont., June 26., St. John, N. B., June 29.... Charlotte-town, P.E.I., July 1. The letter contained in the envelope is acknowledging a post office order for 6-9-7, apparently issued at Charlotte-town P. O. on May 27, 1872.

Two questions naturally arise: why were they using the PAID 3 up in Ontario in 1872 when stamps were being used since 1857 (I know this was a common practice, but why?). Secondly: Why was the Postmaster at Charlotte-town issuing money orders in pounds, shillings and pence when that province had adopted the decimal system on April 17, 1871, and the post office was selling the cents value stamps over the counter since January 1, 1872. I have several dated covers for the year 1872, one of them February 20 bearing the cents value stamps. Maybe someone can provide the explanation for these questions.

There have been many opinions expressed in the various stamp magazines about the possibility of the Canadian Government issuing a "Victory" set to acclaim the event. Such a set was not issued after the first war and it is reasable to venture the opinion that the same precedent will be followed. Personally, I feel that those affected by this war will not need or want any reminder of what. preceded the victory.

If a new series of stamps will be provided to replace the present issue, I would offer the suggestion that our Society sponsor the idea for such an issue as was set forth in our magazine some time ago by "Quebecca"; that is National Parks depicted on stamps. Canada has its "National Parks" and these are located in the different provinces. A set portraying a park from each of the provinces will symbolize this beauty of Canada as found throughout the whole dominion. Such pictured beauty will more readily help to forget the war than a set of stamps which will in any way refer to the war.

I cannot presume that all the members are in full accord with my attitude but if such is the concensus of opinion, I would suggest that those members who do agree, should evidence their expression in a letter to the President, Mr. Hoffman. Then, our Society could submit our suggestion to the proper authorities. I do not hope to be premature, but I feel as most of us feel, that the victory is inevitable, and post war planning is in order.

Since the object of our Society is to learn as much as possible about the stamps of British North America, and since it is altogether too much to expect that one or two or several diligent students should do all the research, all the writing, and all the reporting on these, I have a suggestion to make.

I should like to see each member of the Society "assigned" ONE STAMP as his "annual project." This need not be a rare or valuable stamp....in fact, I believe much more work has been done in the past upon these acknowledged rarities than upon the common stamps.

But each member should accept one stamp as his "project" for the year. He should then go to work on this stamp. He should grab it, shake it, twist it, worry it as a dog worries a bone, until he has extracted from it every last scrap and particle of interesting information. He should specialize on this item; in fact, he should "super-specialize" on it... finding out how many copies were issued, when, why, where, how, by whom first conceived, drawn, engraved. He should give us all the varieties, real and fancied, even down to such minutae as shades of inking and gum. In short, he should finish the year with a comprehensive report on this stamp. His report, placed into the files along with the reports of a couple of hundred others, should one day enable us to prepare a

final and authoritative handbook on Canadian stamps.

I would suggest that a Committee appointed by the President to assign a stamp to each member, and to work out the details of this plan. Naturally, all of us would cooperate with each other, to the point of lending notes, knowledge, or even stamps themselves for study.

Hoping some merit will be found in this proposal.

# Precancel News PRECANCEL COMBINATION BLOCKS

In my block collection of precancels of Canada there are eleven that are in combination as follows:

Three where two stamps are precanceled and two of the other stamps are not precanceled. For instance, one is V-106. The left pair are not canceled, but the right pair has bars.

Four blocks where the lower pair are double and the upper pair single cancellations.

Two blocks where the upper pair is double and the lower pair is single can-

One block where the right pair is double and the left pair is single cancellation.

One block of Bridgeburg where the right pair is precanceled BRIBDGE-BURG and the left pair has the correct spelling.

To my list of oddities should be added the Carleton Place precancel as described by Jack Levine in the December TOPICS.

# New Brunswick Numeral Cancellations

W. W. Chadbourne

In the January 6, 1940 issue of Stamps, there was published an article of my authorship in which I advanced the theory that the New Brunswick numerals were alloted to the postoffices in alphabetical order, with the exception of St. John, which was given number one, and Grand Falls, which was listed as number nine. This brought into question some of the numerals in the Jarrett and Poole lists, and at that time I set forth the reasons why I believed some of their numeral listings to be in error. I also stated that I could not account for the out-of-place position of Grand Falls.

Since that time I have had correspondence with other collectors and have added covers to my own collection confirming my theory. I am now prepared to make one more assertion, namely, that no number nine was issued and that the ascription of this number to Grand Falls was an error on the part of Jarrett or Poole, who had so listed it. This is advanced ofter reading J. R. Barraclough's "Incomplete Notes" in B.N.A. Topics. of September, 1944, where, in his list of Canada numerals taken from Jarrett, the notation is "9 (not issued)."

Why not issued? Because it would be confused with six!

The complete list, as it appared in Stamps, with the amendment, follows. If any are wrong, the author would be glad to receive information that would set the record straight.
