Alex Price writes:

"The very early, or first Vancouver hammers interest me and you may know the answer. Alex continues - "I have a cover postmarked Vancouver May 24, 1886. I do not know of an earlier date but, of course I could stand corrected. The strike is a full circle and is not shown in the proof book. My imagination likes to tell me that this was the first Vancouver hammer which, in all probability, was lost in the fire of June 13. The cover contains the letter which confirms the date. The dates I have for this period are as follows:


April 6, 1886 Vancouver incorporated

April 6, 1886 Vancouver incorporated April 30, 1886 Vancouver post office opens

From April 6, to April 30 Granville hammer continues in use. I have two Granville covers for this period, April 12 and April 19, 1886.

May 1, 1886 First Vancouver hammer in use.
June 13, 1886 First hammer probably lost in fire.

My next Vancouver item is a postcard dated Vancouver, June 30 1886 seventeen days after the fire. It is a split ring."



Only 1886 reported Type "B" hammer for Vancouver - dated MY 24 / 88.

### Granville - Vancouver - 1886


#### Editors note -

The Proof Books do not record a proof for the Type "B" hammer shown on Alex's cover but they do record three Type "A" - split ring hammers proofed in 1886. It is assumed the Type "B" hammers was destroyed in the fire of June 13. The Type "A" hammers were all proofed after the fire and are dated JU 17, JU 24 and JY 6. [see below]. For purposes of identification I have called these A1-1, A1-2 and A1-3. A carefull examination of the three hammers shows that the letters are slightly different shapes but the easiest method is in the length of the arcs and the spacing from the back of "B" in B.C. to the period after "C.".

Almost all the cancels I have seen are of from hammer A1-2. The "A" Type hammers appear to have been withdrawn when the office moved to new quarters in 1887.

# **PENDER ISLAND POST OFFICES -** conclusion continued from Vol. 2

PORT WASHINGTON 1912 to 1980

The PORT WASHINGTON Post Office was established as a result of the sinking of the Puget Sound Navigation Company's ship the "Iroquois" in 1911. In 1902 the original PENDER ISLAND Post Office had moved from Post Washington to the new dock at Hope Bay leaving Port Washington without regular Mail service. Following the sinking of the "Iroquois" the CPR took over the mail contract and as the "Princess Royal" already served both Hope Bay and Port Washington a second Post Office was quickly established at Port Washington. Post Washington dock had been named after Washington Grimmer, first Postmaster at PENDER ISLAND, by Captain Harry Bishop of the "R.P. Rithet" at the time first mail delivery to the island in 1891.




The PORT WASHINGTON hammer was proofed February 12, 1912 and the Post Office was established on March 1, 1912 with S. Percival as Postmaster. In all six Postmasters operated the PORT WASHINGTON Post Office. (See list below) In February 1980 David Nance served briefly as Postmaster before PORT WASHINGTON office was combined with PENDER ISLAND Post Office on March 31, 1980. He continued as Postmaster of the new PENDER ISLAND Post Office which was relocated in a more central location in the Driftwood Mall.






Last day of service PORT WASHINGTON - 31 III / 80 / B.C.

## <u>SOUTH PENDER</u> - 1903 to 1970

Arthur Reed Spalding and Charles Long took up farming on South Pender Island about 1890 and between them they acquired the greater portion of the island. About the same time regular steamer service between Victoria and New Westminster was established and mail for the Gulf Islands was dropped off at PLUMPER PASS on Mayne Island or FULFORD HARBOUR on South Salt Spring Island. Residents of the other islands had to collect the mail as best they could. In 1900 the steamer "Iroquois" started regular service from Sidney to the Gulf Islands with stops at most islands including South Pender Island.

In 1901 a wharf with a small shed, which served as the Post Office, was built on the north side of Bedwell Harbour on South Pender Island and this served a regular stopping point for the "Iroquois". No regular Post Office existed so a mail bag for the island was simply dropped off on the wharf where it appears Mrs. Spalding assumed un-official postal duties. By 1903 the need for a regular post office was seen and under Postal Authorization F6977, dated May 2, 1903, a post office was authorized to open June 1, 1903. Mr. A.R. Spalding was named the official Postmaster but the duties were actually carried out by his wife who officially became Postmaster after his death on 24 January 1932. Newspaper reports claim she actually started her postal duties on 1 April 1900 with the first arrival of the "Iroquois" and continued for 43 year until she retired in April 1943 making her one of the longest serving Postmasters in Canada. After her retirement a number of other Postmasters served for periods of a few years to ten or more years until the SOUTH PENDER Post Office closed July 7, 1970.








Post Office shed from wharf shortly before closing of Post Office c.1969

A number of changes in cancelling equipment have taken place at the Vancouver and Victoria Post Offices in the past few months. These include new parcel cancellers, new culler-facer-cancellers and new coding machines, presently used on the back of the envelope. A problem seems to exist with year dates as 1992 dates are reported and impossible dates are common.



# BRIT COL cancellations - Research Report

In Volume 1 Number 2 page 16 a request was made for information on "BRIT COL" cancellations. These cancellations had been extensively researched by Jim Pike and it was considered limited new information would be found. The updated list contains 4 additional listings, mainly new hammers, and 18 newly reported dates. These results speak very well for the ability of the Research Group to provide new research information and it is hoped this will encourage more collectors to request assistance from the group on their pet topic. These results should debunk the position held by a number of leading American Socities that claim all philatelic research has been done and the Research category should be dropped from future stamp exhibitions.

#### WHERE ARE THEY NOW? - A FOLLOW UP.

Jack Wallace quite correctly pointed out that the colonial "27" marking taken from Frank Campbell's "Canada Post Offices 1755 - 1895" and illustrated on page 47 of the last News Letter is not from the original instrument as stated by Campbell. The Frank Campbell illustration is repeated below as is the marking from the Wellburn Collection and shown on page 162 of "The Stamps & Postal History of Vancouver Island & British Columbia". Two other examples are included, one from a recent Bob Lee sale and one from a cover in the editors collection dated SPENCES BRIDGE / MY 28 / 79.

The question still is "Where are they now?" And, is the Campbell illustration a drawing, as are most of his illustration or did he have a hammer that could be used in making forgeries?







Speaking of forgeries - a Metro Vancouver dealer has recently acquired a collection of examples of work of Alex MacMaster and others. The lot consists of 14 item, mainly the CENTS and DOLLAR overprints on Colonial British Columbia stamps. All item are crudely done and the wording on the stamps is overprinted incorrect - see example.
