HARBOUR PRINCESS

Auction catalogues often describe R.P.O. and ship markings as "unlisted" or "unreported" by Ludlow. The implication is that as result the item is of considerable value and is often estimated at well over \$100. The HARBOUR PRINCESS cover shown below has been so described on a number of occasions. Unfortunately the "Harbour Princess" rubber stamp marking is a corner card and not a ship cancellation. The ship marking on the cover is the BURRARD INLET (T.P.O.) cancellation, which was the name of the travelling post office operating in Indian Arm. Both the SCENIC and the HARBOUR PRINCESS served on this mail route between 1908 and 1970 and the cancellation is not rare being listed as a "C" by Topping & Robinson.

Ludlow, on page 168 of the R.P.O. Handbook, explains quite clearly that for a marking to be included it must have been applied for postal purposes. A ship corner card cannot be considered as a postal marking any more than a Canadian Pacific Railway return address can be considered an R.P.O. marking. Thus, these types of markings are not listed and should be looked on for what they are and not what some dealer would like them to be.

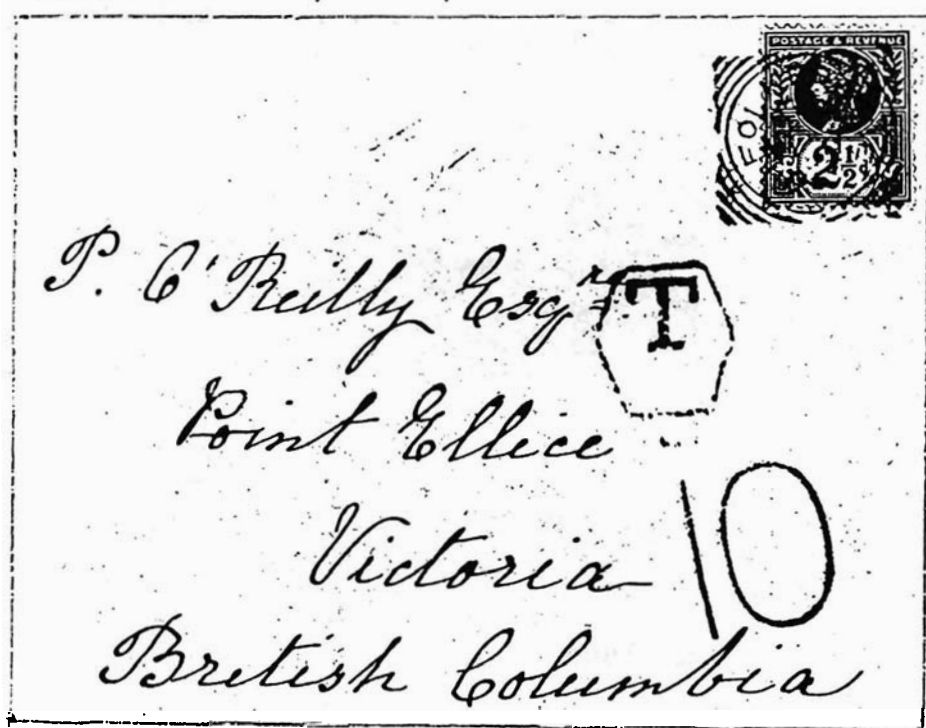
VICTORIA POSTAGE DUE "10"

Gray Scrimgeour, quite correctly, points out that the cover shown on page 124 is from SOUTH SALT SPRING not SALT SPRING as stated in the caption. He draws attention to the large "10", on the cover, which indicates ten cents postage due for the non payment of the registration fee. This was a generic Canadian marking found on covers emanating from eastern post offices. The "VICTORIA / 18 / JUN 12 / 03 / . CANADA ." backstamp would indicate that the "10" marking may have been applied at Victoria although the cover is also backstamped "LONDON / 24 / JUN 19 / 03 / . CANADA ."

Gray also enclosed a much earlier O'Reilly cover backstamped "VICTORIA / NT / MY 29 / 96 / B.C." showing the same "10" marking. In the editors collection there is a similar cover postmarked "VICTORIA WEST / MY 23 / 93 / B.C." and showing a large "2" indicating postage due. The cover is addressed to New Westminster and it would appear the "2" marking was added at Victoria.

Similar large postage due numbers appear to have been used up to the 1940's with "4" being reported at Vancouver in the 1920's and "8" at Kelowna in 1949. Cec Coutts in his "Cancelled with Pride" show a complete set of numbers for Chilliwack. What other post offices used large postage due numbers and what was their period of use?

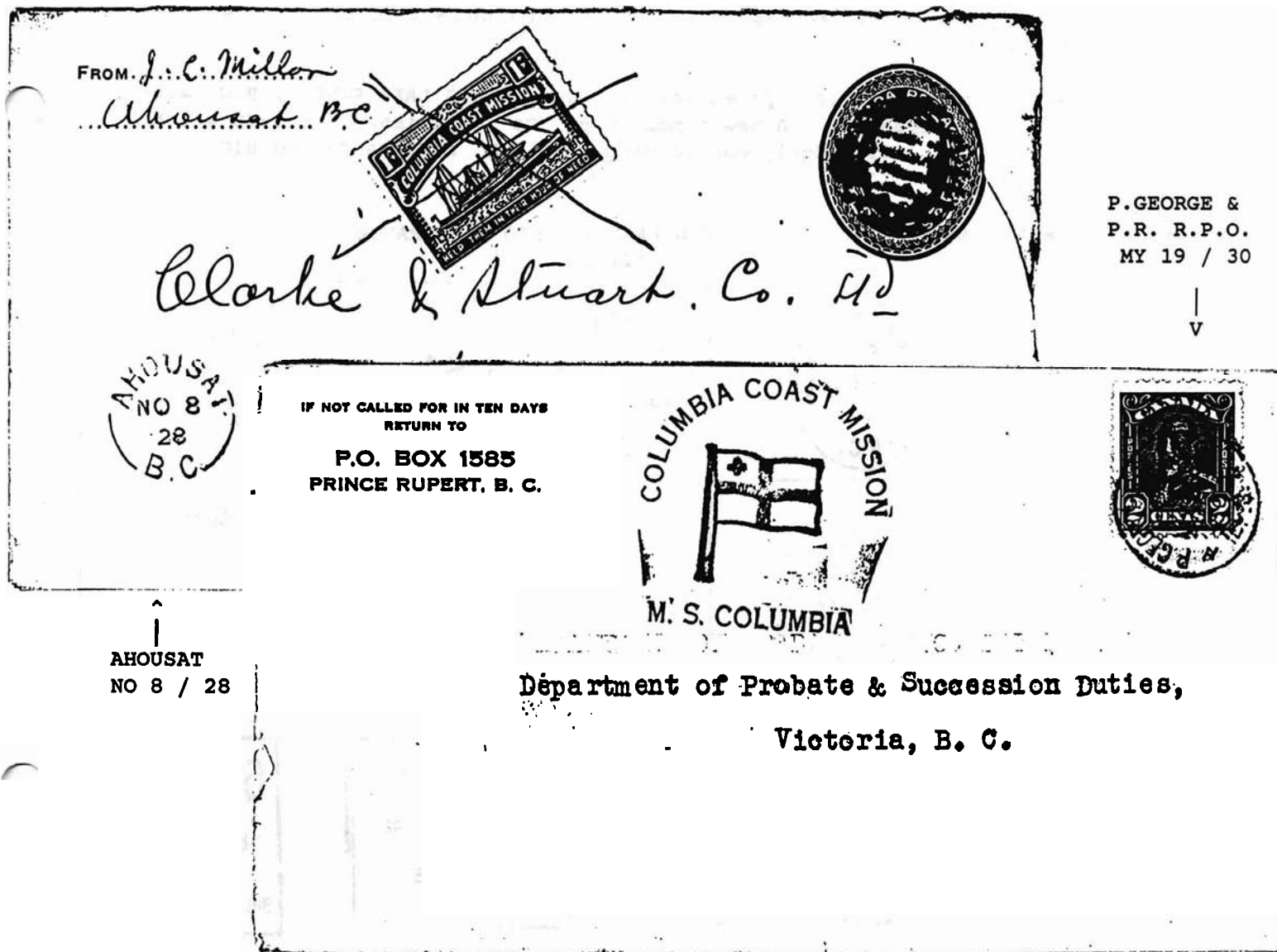

COLUMBIA COAST MISSION

Ken Ellison has supplied an interesting item on the Columbia Coast Mission ship the M.S. COLUMBIA. Much of his information is taken from Michael Hadley's book "God's Little Ships", which Ken recommends most highly.

The MISSION SHIP COLUMBIA was built in 1910 by the Westminster Marine Railway Company of New Westminster for the Anglican Church of Canada. It was designed to be used as a mission boat along the B.C. coast and included a small hospital and a chapel. The Columbia Coast Mission was started, in 1904, by Rev. John Antle, a transported Newfoundlander, to provide spiritual guidance among the settlers, loggers and fishermen of the coast. In the 1930's the M.S. COLUMBIA was sold and re-named the WAYWARD LADY and is reported to have been used as a rum runner.

To the postal historian the M.S. COLUMBIA is interesting in that it also carried mail at a charge of 1 cent per letter. A special postage stamp showing the COLUMBIA was produced, although it is reported that the stamps were actually issued to raise money for the mission. Between 1928 and 1930 the M.S. COLUMBIA also applied a brown hand stamp to the mail it carried. On reported covers the marking is used as a "way mail" marking rather than to cancel the stamp and as a result is not listed in Ludlow. A number of other Anglican Mission Ships, including the M.S. RENDEZVOUR, the M.S. FREDNA, and the United Church ship the THOMAS CROSBY, all served on the B.C. coast but no markings from any of these boats have been reported.

Big Lake Ranch has a long association with mail activities in the Cariboo although the Post Office at Big Lake Ranch did not open until May 15, 1941. In the early 1900's the owner, William Parker, not only owned the ranch but also owned the "150 Mile House - Quesnel Forks Express" which held the contract to carry "His Majesty's Mail" in the Cariboo.

The Big Lake Ranch Post Office opened May 15, 1941 as BIG LAKE RANCH, B.C. with Mrs. F.P.W. Harris as postmaster. A new hammer Type "Cc" was issued in 1978 which read BIG LAKE, B.C. / VOL 1G0. Equipment reading both BIG LAKE RANCH and BIG LAKE were used in the 1980's.

No official name change from BIG LAKE RANCH to BIG LAKE is shown in the postal records but in theory the name changed to BIG LAKE at the time of the issuing of the new Type "Cc" hammer in 1978. On June 1, 1989 the office became a temporary R.P.O. called BIG LAKE RANCH, R.P.O. 1 and on February 3, 1992 it became a Franchise B under the name BIG LAKE. Officially the office is still called BIG LAKE but early in 1992 the POCON was changed to read BIG LAKE RANCH.

Post office name kept by Big Lake

The folks in Big Lake Ranch didn't take kindly to federal bureaucrats messing with the name of their post office.

Canada Post decided to change Big Lake Ranch Post Office to Big Lake Retail Postal Outlet Number 1 when it contracted out postal service to the owner of the general store last year.

But Ed Deak, a 60-year-old local farmer and furniture builder, rustled up a posse of sorts — a 40-name petition — to head off the move.

The local post office had the original name for more than 30 years, and that was fine with the 125 families in homes and farms scattered in the community 56 kilometres northeast of Williams Lake, Deak said.

Not being a town, there isn't much officially marking the location of Big Lake Ranch besides the post office.

But the new name was a "convoluted bureaucratic monstrosity" more suited to a penal colony than a community, Deak and his neighbors objected in their petition.

They also noted Big Lake Ranch is a historic name used on all maps since the Cariboo gold rush, having been a way station, though the ranch itself no longer exists.

But Canada Post got wind of trouble brewing and backed down from putting up signs bearing the new name, said Ron Harder, who operates the post office from his Big Lake General Store and Restaurant — a lone building on Likely Road that is as close as you get to a town in Big Lake.

Harder said he did not want to "stir up the community" by hanging the sign and "I told the guy if you send me another sign, I won't hang it up."

Canada Post spokesman Mike Bradshaw denied a conflict exists between the post office and the community about the name change, saying "it's fine with us. They can call it whatever they want."

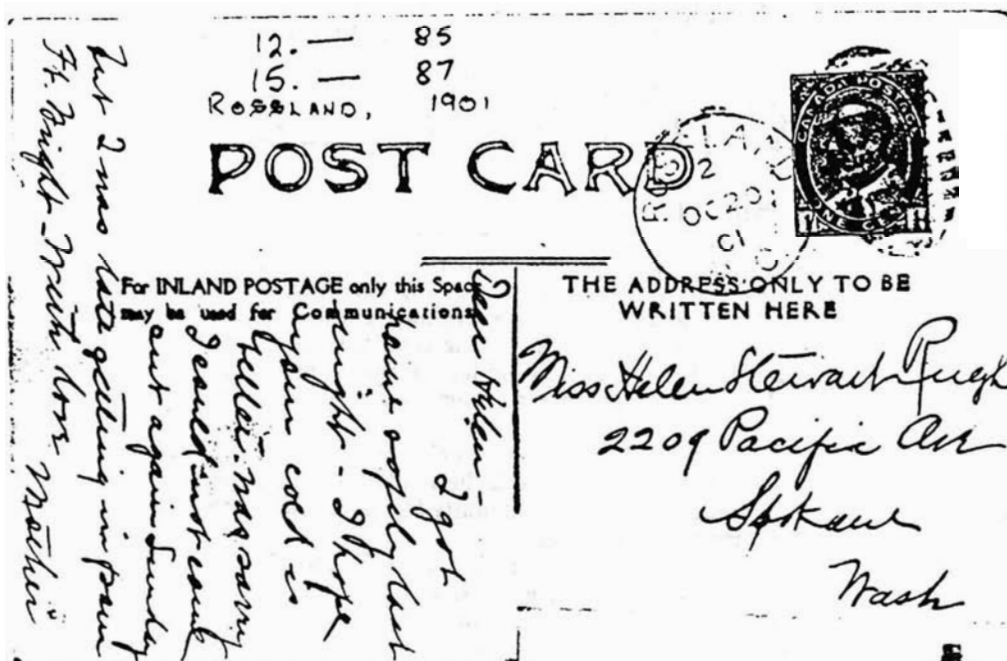
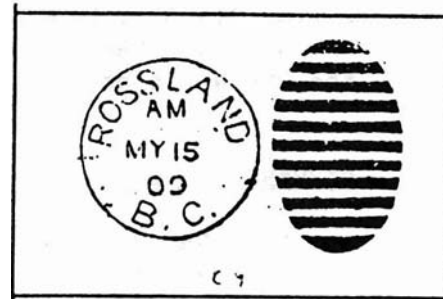
Harder said he agreed to take over the post office Dec. 11 as a service to the community, although he does not make money from the operation.

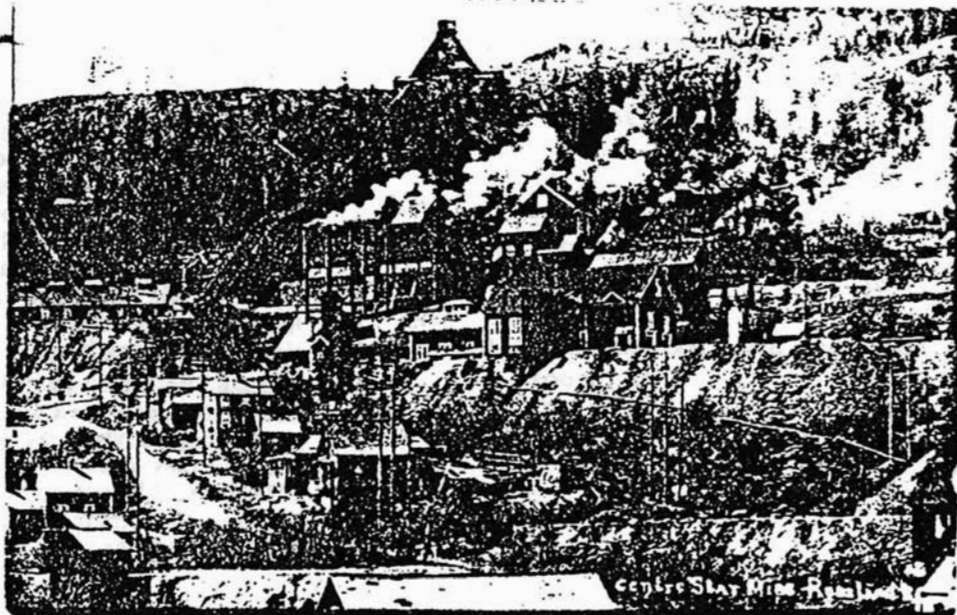
1. Rossland Duplex DBC-324

A recent inquiry from Don Abel re. BC duplexes, holdings, tradables etc. spurred me into making a proper inventory of my BC duplex holdings. As I came to DBC-324 which is a Rossland B-11 type of cancel, I ran into an oddity. Bob Lee's second edition (1993) of Canadian Duplex Cancellations gives the proof date as May 15, 1909 and the known time span of usage as May 20, 1909 to April 1, 1919.

I have six copies in my collection which run from July 29, 1909 to March 25, 1919 and then this freak shows up dated Oct. 20, 1901. (See photocopy attached). The only other B-11 it could be is a DBC-325 which however is 23mm in dia. versus the larger 24mm of my copy in question. All other physical measurements check out identically with the proper DBC-324 which brings me to the postulation that the P.M. probably had too much demon rum in his tea or was too preoccupied with the local mining stock activities and inserted the wrong date. Since this is the year date however, he would only do this at the beginning of the year and by the time October 20 rolled around, we should see several of these misdated copies. What does the collective expertise of our newsletter readership feel? Are there copies of other dates within the 'same year'? Should the year be 1910 with the 01 reversed? Has anybody seen a proper '10' for the year 1910?

THE D.L.O in B.C.

Research Paper #1

B.C.Plain

In the *Report of the Deputy Postmaster-General 1898-99*, one reads "On July 1, 1898, the Dead Letter Branch, heretofore centralized in Ottawa, was decentralized, branch offices being established at Toronto, Victoria, Montreal, Halifax and Winnipeg for the treatment of dead letter matter of all kinds.....". A post office CIRCULAR, dated 1898-6-1 indicated that all postmasters and Railway mail clerks "will direct (all classes of) dead mail from the Province of B.C. and the Yukon District" to Victoria.

This event had been much anticipated in Victoria and reports in the *Times Colonist* (21/05/98 and 16/06/98) in the "Notes from the Capitol" column attest to this fact. The office was duly opened on July 1, 1898 however its function quickly reverted to the handling of dead and undeliverable mail to and from Vancouver Island, the greater District function being taken over by the rapidly expanding Vancouver postoffice, which by 1902 also had its own Branch Dead Letter Office. The Victoria office seems to disappear from the picture by the early 1920's with the last reported marking from this office being July 22, 1921.

The proof dates of the early Victoria hammers are unknown as they were proofed in the 1898-1908 period when the proof strikes are missing.

A total of 7 different D.L.O. markings from Victoria have so far been identified encompassing 4 different types [Ref: PHSC Journal #70 Page 40]

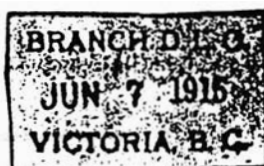

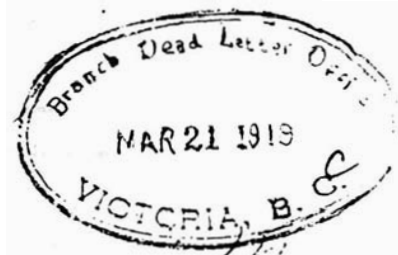
