He has authored\* several books on Canadian definitives, served as website developer for numerous philatelic websites (including the BNAPS website); is a local and national exhibitor; is a life member of Royal Philatelic Society (and is an RPSC *Fellow*), BNAPS (and recipient of *OTB Lifetime Achievement Award*) and the American Philatelic Society. He was past president and editor of the Winnipeg Philatelic Socitey and has served as a member of Canada Post's Stamp Advisory Committee.

Robin is married with two university-age children. His company, Adminware Corporation, develops customized database software (using Microsoft Access) and websites (Dreamweaver, PHP, MySQL). He lives in central Canada.

#### SPEAKING OF POSTAL RATES

In the most recent issue of *The PHSC Journal* Bill Longley wrote a short article in which he included a postal rate chart from 1790 which is available on the PHSC website (members only). Also available is a great collection of early post office documents which have a wealth of information. You can join the PHSC, receiving an electronic copy of their journal, for an annual fee of \$15.00 CDN - a bargain.

I did a Google search for a table of distances and found an 1825 Quebec Almanac which had an early table of both distances and rates. Here's the web address:

To find the Table of Distances within the almanac press Control-F and search for the word – distances.


#### KATHY HARTLEY LEAVES GREENE.
