#### THE CANCELLATIONS

The Imperial Type 1 replica was submitted by the Editor to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Flags "1896-1996" This was placed in a Pitney Bowes Model K machine serial # 3402.

The BICKERDIKE Type 3 replica was submitted by Chairman John with the original request and by Doug Lingard when actual designs were requested by the show committee it was used in an International Peripheral Systems model HD2 machine serial # 5017.

These are illustrated along with the possible Hub Die combinations that could be prepared by the manipulation of machines. None are expected to have any historical value as unusual strikes but they sure look as they belong on the Victoria Jubilee Cards.

THE EXHIBITS

ROBERT HEASMAN - CANADA'S BICKERDIKE MAIL MARKING MACHINES

Bob showed the Bickerdike cancellations of Canada from their introduction as experimental use in 1896 to the final use in 1902. I was really pleased to guide one of the security guards through the exhibit before the opening of CAPEX. Yes, it was good enough to interest the non-collector. A great showing of unusual uses including all the tough non-flag cancels. Bob received a LARGE SILVER.

#### DAVID SESSIONS - CANADA - CLASSIC FLAGS AND ASSOCIATED CANCELLATIONS

David showed the entire period from the Imperial machines to the end of the Bickerdike's in 1902. David had the unusual experience of being able to write an explanation of the history of machine cancellations for the CAPEX '96 Catalogue and then submit the source of his research. The exhibit was like a text book with all the good stuff illustrated. For the first time in international competition David received a taste of gold - a VERMEIL.

DOUG LINGARD - CANADIAN FLAG CANCELS - 1896-1919



## ENLIST NOW

The Flag cancels have probably been researched as thoroughly as any aspect of Canadian postal history, and other than the likelihood of finding the occasional day or two earliest or latest recorded use, there is not much prospect of further significant discoveries. However, there does remain one area of challenge which, with enough cooperation, seems probable of yielding a very nearly complete solution.

The Flag Slogan ENLIST NOW is quite unique in that it involves a pre-scheduled rotation of a restricted number of dies. With the exception of OTTAWA, which retained its Pitney-Bowes die without rotation, the initial usage, prior to later replacements, consisted of one other PB die and ten Perfect dies, which were each rotated over a one year period between two or three offices. Accordingly, no less than thirty offices were able to make use of these twelve dies.

The number of rotations between the office groups appears to have varied somewhat, together with the length of time for which each office retained the die, with the larger office usually retaining it longer than for the smaller offices.

The rotation between TORONTO and HAMILTON is quite well established, since impressions from these two offices are quite common, but in the case of such minor offices as TRURO, MONCTON, BRANDON, NORTH BATTLEFORD and LETHBRIDGE, from which impressions are much less common, the usage badly requires enhancement.

The presently available data is indicated on the following pages, together with probable, but as yet unrecorded use. If all members would check their holdings against this data, and indicate to the Editor any use outside of the dates indicated, then a much clearer picture of at least the number of rotations and their duration should emerge.

It should be noted that during the 1941-42 period of use, there was concurrent use of some other slogans, notably BUY VICTORY BONDS, which had priority over this slogan. That was not a problem for major offices with more than one machine, but many of the using offices had only a single machine, and therefore could not make use of all, or even any, of their originally scheduled use from time to time.
