# Paper on CANADIAN PHILATELIC LITERATURE

Canadian Philatelic Literature

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:-I thank you for the invitation to be present at your Annual Banquet. I have considerable contact with fellow collectors thru correspondence, but only on rare occasions have the opportunity of personal contact as is possible to you who live in larger centres where there are stamp clubs. As far as I know, I am the only stamp collector within 20 square miles in the section wherein I live. Thus there is not much opportunity for a local club or get-together of stamp collectors. However, there are thousand of "lone wolves" (as it were) like myself in towns and villages and country spots across the Dominion. That's one of the special features of collecting stamps—one may enjoy it in city or rural parts.

With your invitation was another asking if I would care to say a few words on a philatelic subject. So many of you know more about stamps that I that I hesitated on that score. however, when I started publishing "Popular Stamps" and dedicated it to things Canadian I was curious as to what had gone on before in the matter of Canadian stamp magazines and other Canadian philatelic literature. I also anticipated acquiring a useful reference library as well as

satisfying my curiosity.

In this respect I thought a brief mention of some of my conclusions and observations on collecting Canadian philatelic literature might pass a few minutes for you. I will be brief as

possible.

Since 1864 when Samuel Allan Taylor, that prince of rogues with bogus stamps, brought out "The Stamp Collector's Record" at Montreal, the first stamp paper in Canada and, indeed, in North America, there have appeared around 135 or 150 so-called Canadian stamp magazines. Some never laster more than one issue, several up to a dozen or 15 issues and a few for five or six years-some with two or three changes of Many of these were pretty publishers. amateurish and contained little of worth in editorial matter. A number were boy efforts. Being an editor or publisher has always had an appeal to a certain few. All it needs is a desire to be such, and an optimistic printer. No thought is given to ultimate printer's bills until they arrive. The conclusion is that many of these so-called stamp magazines died a-borning when the printer had to be paid and subscription and advertising revenue failed to cover the bill.

On the other hand there were some well—done stamp magazines both editorially and typographically, and printed on expensive and high quality paper. In their instance one could conclude that cost of production ran so high, and the possibility of wide circulation and revenue in Canada then (and possibly even yet) was too narrow to provide for continuous publication.

As mentioned, many of these magazines carried little of lasting worth other than the advertisements. Some amusement may be gained from reading the controversies built up between rival editors. Another feature was blacklists published in those early days naming offenders and their addresses, also amount in default. I imagine such a practice today might run very close to being libelous. Some few had scholarly articles in the matter of stamp research. Probably naming a few of these better magazines might be of interest.

"The Stamp Collector's Monthly Gazette," St. John, N.B., published in 1865.

"The Canadian Philatelist," Quebec, P.Q., 1872, first apostle of variety collecting on this side of the Atlantic.

"The Philatelic Courier" by Henry Hechler, Halifax, N.S., 1881-85.

"Toronto Philatelic Journal," 1885-88. Well edited and ran for 25 issues.

"Halifax Philatelist," 1887-89, probably the best of those early efforts in offering worthwhile articles.

"Dominion Philatelist," Belleville, later Peterboro, 1889-95. An outstanding record of its time. "Canadian Philatelist," London, Ont., 1891-96. One of the best of Western Ontario productions.

"Philatelic Advocate," Berlin, now Kitchener, Ont., ran 1896 to 1901 without missing a single issue, probably because the publishers had their own printing plant.

"Montreal Philatelist," 1898-1902. This was a smart appearing magazine, filled with news and comment.

"Hobbyist," Winnipeg, Man., 1908-9, the most attractive stamp magazine to be published in Western Canada.

"Stamp Herald," Kitchener, Ont., 1922-28, came to Canada from the United States with Vol VII, No. 6. A valuable asset to any library.

"Canadian Philatelist," Toronto, 1928-29. This was one of the best of more recent stamp magazines. Its demise after eleven issues was a distinct loss to the hobby.

There are others, but the aforementioned items are among the best in my opinion. In passing, and referring to Ottawa, three stamp magazines from this point came to my attention: "Gossip" which was published here in 1887, "Ottawa Philatelist" in 1892 for four issues, and "Stamp Collector's Digest," Bentham, 1950, for one issue. I have made no mention of Club papers, of which there are some excellent ones, designed for members use only and not for general circulation as in the case of those we are reviewing. Nor do I mention those common syndicate pamphlets whose only merit, if any, is to afford various and sundry advertisers a vehicle to publicize their offerings.

And while there is not time to deal with the more pretentious Canadian philatelic literature, I feel a brief mention should be made before closing. In my search I acquired nearly 100 books and booklets on Canadian philatelic matters. These cover postal issues, cancellations, stationery, precancels, revenues, etc. Some are from vest pocket size, other 6x9, to the voluminous 2-volume Boggs' Canada. Like inventions where the machine perfected is often the culmination of prior work and research by others along the same line the final one to perfect it must acknowledge the work of his predecessors; so, too, is it with much of our

philatelic literature. Considerable credit must be given to the earlier efforts of others.

To mention a few outstanding efforts in this latter class of philatelic literature the following might be selected:

"Postage Stamps, Envelopes and Postcards of the North American Colonies of Great Britain," 1899, by the Philatelic Society of London, England, the first serious study on philatelic matters relating to Canada.

"Canada, Its Postage Stamps and Postal Stationery," by Clifton Howes, B.Sc., F.R.P.S.L., 1911, is prized for its authoritative information.

"History of the post Office In Canada" by Wm. Smith, 1920 offers much of value to the philatelic student delving into the progress of postal service in Canada.

"Standard British North America Catalogue and B.N.A. Book, Stamps of British North America," by Fred Jarrett, 1929, still a topmost authority on stamps of Canada up to 1929.

"Holmes Handbook and Catalogue of Canada and B.N.A.," 1st Edition, 1943; 2nd Edition 1945.

"Boggs's Canada," 1946. Two volumes.

Those are the highlights on Canadian philatelic literature, but much of value is to be found in the lesser lights. Any of the booklets be Bertram W. H. Poole on the Provinces, written about 30 years ago are still valuable for their information, particularly his book on Canada, now very scarce.

Ottawa is represented in Canadian philatelic literature by "Georgian Postage Stamps of Canada" by Capital Stamp & Stationery Co., 1936, "Three Penny Beaver" by Wilfred Sprung, 1945, and "Canada's Major and Minor Varieties from 1897 Up" by Hans Reiche, 1951. Probably there are others. Also I like to consider Senator J. A. Calder's "Some Phases of the Canada '59 Issue," published in 1939, as credited to Ottawa.

The collecting of philatelic literature is a fascinating hobby and has quite a following. Probably the urge to acquire is more predominant than the desire to make scholarly use of the material. But isn't acquisitiveness the urge that makes us all collectors? —A. L. Mc Cready.

#### PHILATELIC LITERATURE

by. A. W. Bullock.

Philatelic literature, in these days when so much is claimed for the advancement of philately, is not what it should be.

Not that there is a lack of magazines, and so-called magazines, all of which aspire and pretend to fill the popular demand for high class publications. There are, alas, too many of these, a glut which only time can and surely will reduce.

But after the years of experience, that some of our journals have had, and the undeniable genius of a few well known contributors, there should be a better literary style and a higher order of writing prevalent. Literary genius, directed into the channels of philatelic journalism by inspiration, and the natural tendency of its authors, has certainly a field for much wider scope of subject, thought and treatment, than is at the present time given. And that we have literary genius in our ranks is an undoubted fact, for it has shown forth in our writers in the past, and is daily becoming more apparent. It is unnecessary to mention the names here, for our principal writers are known to the world of our fraternity.

A writer of genius is not he who expresses his own sentiments, but the deep, united feeling of his class or people. There is ample room for thought, and subject for study, and brilliant expression in the article which is in its nature wholly philatelic. What thoughts, what sentiments, what memories, are there not in the dreamings of every true lover of our fascinating pursuit? There are, I venture to say, unlimited. Let them then be expressed in deeper, more serious and carefully composed productions.

The publications which lay claim to being philatelic magazines in America are of a large and widely varied order, but of these there are few which can truthfully hold the name of first class journals. There are, I believe, at the present time journals held in high regard in the philatelic reading circles, which are considering the question of a better class of matter, and making an endeavor to obtain it. Their enterprise is to be commended. It should have come before, but it is never too late to mend, and their reward will be prosperity, certain and sure, whether they be young or old. The ambition of the rising generation is unbounded, and of the American youth, who after a year's stamp collecting, does not think he can start a great stamp journal, there are few indeed. This, in a measure, accounts for the number of weak would be stamp journals which have in the past two or three years rose, and which are now rising monthly, and dying a natural death after a few issues, in such astonishing numbers.

This class of publication has, without a doubt, done much to retard the development of better philatelic literature. The publisher does not appreciate the value of it, nor could he pay for it if he did, consequently the demand is not stimulated. Let the heavier and more enterprising of our magazines take up the matter, and their readers and the public generally will show their appreciation in stronger support.
