

CF - CANADIAN FORCES CACHETS FOR THE NAVY

Herewith is a list of CF Cachets for the navy as of Aug. 1988.

Sometime ago I was advised verbally through FMO Victoria and Halifax, that a CF cachet once allotted to a ship remained with her until she was decommissioned.


I have noticed a number of cases which run counter to this, in particular, cachets changing from ship to ship. While this may have been in vogue or resulted when the cachets changed from the single ring with "Royal Canadian at top and Navy Mail 3 at bottom", to the current CF cachets, I am curious as to what really does apply. Several of these changes are - Navy Mail 67, used by HMCS Yukon in 1965, now CF 46 on this new list; Navy Mail 3, from HMCS Ottawa in 1965, now CF 17 on list.

CF 37 from HMCS Saskatchewan in 1982 now reads CF 11 on list; CF 45 from HMCS Terra Nova in 1982 now reads CF 47 on list. It is also interesting to note that CF 45 is currently shown as a spare kit.

I do have a number of these CF cachets, including a few of the two earlier types and wonder if anyone has done research or has enough of them to show any pattern of use. Perhaps the change of numbers (same ship) reflects usage at a particular point in time or maybe the allotment to a ship until decommissioned no longer applies. I wonder what our Study Group experts have to say?

Shown here are three covers as follows:

- A. CF 8 HMCS Skeena, 4 May 1982.
- B. CF 18 HMCS Huron, 24 January 1983.
- C. CF 45 HMCS Terra Nova, 2 April 1983. Also note FMO Meter date and conflict with list of Aug. 1988 showing CF 47 allotted to Terra Nova!!

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

CANADIAN BLACKOUT MACHINE SLOGAN POSTMARKS OF WW II

The following piece is edited from an article on the subject by Harold M. Dilworth that appeared in BNA TOPICS of May 1969.

The ever increasing intensity of enemy attacks on Allied shipping during the early stages of World War II made it imperative that all possible measures be taken to preserve absolute secrecy pertaining to the movement of ships. It was felt that information pieced together from mail captured by the enemy could be of assistance in establishing a pattern governing the movement of convoys, and hence all mail from Naval and Merchant ships was censored before being put in the postal channels. This also applied to all mail leaving the country.

In addition to the above cautionary measures it was considered that postmarks themselves appearing on letters mailed from Atlantic ports might possibly enable the enemy to deduce information on ship movements. The first measure taken by the Post Office to eliminate such a possibility was the entire removal of the circular date stamp from the automatic datercancellers when processing mail bearing postage stamps that originated from ships. The few such covers noted by Harold Dilworth had only the wavy lines of the canceller in the upper right corner as well as the naval censor markings. Mail from service personnel not requiring postage was processed without going through the automatic canceller, but they bear the censor markings.

Later it was decided to eliminate the markings identifying the post office of origin from all mail from Atlantic port cities; and the Post Office Department issued special cancelling devices in a number of different forms for use at Halifax, St. John, Quebec and several other eastern ports; Montreal being a notable exception for some inexplicable reason. This took place in December 1942.

The same thing happened on the west coast by September 1943. The Pacific port cities of Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert were issued similar cancelling devices. Unaccountably the port city of New Westminster, like Montreal, was not included.

After VJ Day there was of course no need to continue the use of blackout postmarks and they were withdrawn in September 1945 in the west, but had been removed in the east in June 1945.

At the moment we are dealing only with the blackout machine cancels that used slogans in their make-up. A list and check sheet is included of those known and your input for any unreported slogans would be appreciated. Always be careful that you can confirm the proper originating city so that errors are not turned into fact.

BLACKOUT - MACHINE-SLOGAN - CANCELLATIONS

Your checklist of cities using Slogan Cancels with blackout hubs follows. The main cities are listed here but watch for other places such as Moncton, Sydney, Yarmouth, Montreal, Ottawa and Bear in mind also, that when working on slogan dates, that a city may have had a slogan in use for several different periods, i.e. HELP THE RED CROSS etc.

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Examples of blackout slogan cancels are illustrated throughout and should be self-explanatory.


