A CURIOUS NORWAY-NEW YORK VIA CANADA COVER--By John Wannerton

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This cover [reduced 74%] poses a few questions which, I hope, members may be able to answer. It is from Haugesund, Norway to the U.S.A. and dated September 1, 1941. The cachet in red at top "BY AIR" is under the censor's tape. On the reverse we have the usual type of German censor marks, "E" denoting Frankfurt. Two small boxes with

"334" and "356" are presumably German. What is their function? I understand the "EXAMINED BY CENSOR C.36" is Canadian but where was it [Halifax? Ed.]? If by air, why would an aeroplane flying to a neutral country land in one that is not? I would appreciate any information that might be forthcoming through the Newsletter. [Can members help with more information on this interesting cover? Ed.]

## CURIOUS NORWAY-NEW YORK VIA CANADA COVER--A RESPONSE

In what may be the quickest response of a question and answer in the <a href="Newsletter">Newsletter</a> (!), Chris Miller (Editor of the BNAPS WWII Study Group and Secretary of the Civil Censorship Study Group) kindly provided a few comments about John's cover and wrote:

"The cover was censored in the Auslandsbriefprufstelle (ABP) at Frankfurt/Main using censor handstamp Riemer Type E-3b and resealing tape Type E-51. The small numeral handstamps are known in black, blue or red and they are typical for ABP Frankfurt. These are chop handstamps used by sorters and censors. Sometimes up to four of these can be found on one cover or postcard. The pencil number notation on the front under 'Par Avion' is the number showing that the cover has been registered in the censorship file."

Many thanks Chris for your help. Now can members solve the puzzle about the cover's travel to Canada? [Ed.]

## R.C.A.F./R.A.F. INDIA COMMAND--By W. Plomish

This cover was posted on October 11, 1943 at Victoria, B.C. to R.A.F. India Command. It was correctly paid at \$1.00 per  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz for airmail service on the Miami-Brazil-West Africa route. R.C.A.F. personnel were stationed with R.A.F. Forces in the Middle East; many of whom were in India. A Bombay R.A.F. Base Postal Section datestamp is on the reverse.



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## THE 1939 ROYAL VISIT--By Wilf Whitehouse

Many thanks to all who wrote in connection with the 1939 Royal Visit article ( $\underline{NL}$  128, pp. 276-77;  $\underline{NL}$  133, p. 327; and  $\underline{NL}$  136, p. 339), particularly those who sent along items they felt would be of interest to the members.

Originally the trip to Canada was scheduled to be aboard the Battle Cruiser  $\underline{\text{H.M.S. Repulse}}$  (Fig.1 opposite), but this arrangement was later changed in favour of sailing aboard the Canadian Pacific's  $\underline{\text{Em-press of Australia}}$  with escort provided by the Cruisers  $\underline{\text{H.M.S. Glasgow}}$  and Southampton.

The arrival date at Quebec City was May 17, not May 15 (as stated in  $\underline{NL}$  128, p. 276). Poor weather in the Atlantic apparently caused the delay in arrival which was scheduled for May 15, 1939 (Fig. 2). The issue of the three Royal Visit stamps (Scott 246-248) went ahead as

Page 418 planned on the 15th.


A retired member of the R.C.M.P. provided the postcard (Fig. 3) of the Royal Couple with four Mounties outside Government House in Halifax. The four, Sergeant H.W. Williams, and Constables J. Langlois, J. Coughlin, and R. Portlance, had accompanied the King and Queen throughout the tour. The photograph was taken just prior to Their Majesties' short drive to the harbour where the Empress of Britain was waiting.

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## SECOND WORLD WAR SERIAL NUMBER PREFIX LETTERS

It is often interesting to know where a soldier enlisted with the Canadian Army through his or her Regimental Number; especially when a name and number are associated with a cover. Each of the Military Districts had a letter prefix which appeared before the serial number of the individual. The following may be useful to members:

The Canadian Army Order 6247 (December 5, 1945) introduced the letter "S" prefix for other ranks, and "Z" for officers to be used in conjunction with the other prefixes.

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## NOW FOR A FEW CORRECTIONS/ADDITIONS....

John Daynes wrote: "I have received the CMMSG Newsletter [#140] which, as always, I found interesting--however I am afraid Mr. Robinson has misread the FPO number on his West African cover [p. 406]. The FPO is in fact 475 from Gibraltar (this is confirmed by the half arrow above the date--475 was the only FPO to ever have this). Also the censor mark is recorded from Gibraltar. I expect the Canadian Officer was either on his way to West Africa or was able to send it by air to Gibraltar (by hand of pilot) from where it was sent to Canada by surface mail. Nevertheless an interesting item."

...and from David Whiteley: "With reference to John Frith's item on HMHS Letitia in the May edition [NL #140] at page 405, I would like to add the following comments. The Letitia was [...] converted to a hospital ship in November 1914 and was in service until August 1, 1917; mainly being used by the Indian Army. I have the following reports of her service and illustrations of two handstamps reproduced below. In April 1915 she was at Gallipoli, sailing for England on May 1 with wounded from HS Galeka. In December 1915, and for the next twelve months, she made frequent calls at Alexandria. On November 27, 1916 she picked up survivors from the City of Birmingham sunk ninety miles east of Malta. During January 1917, she served in the Salonika campaign, returning to England from Alexandria on February 17, 1917 with mental patients.

Two handstamps used during the period are: 1) an unframed three-line mauve endorsement [...] used in conjunction with BAPO Z, April 1, 1916 to April 26, 1917, and 2) a double-framed rectangular 31 x 57mm three-line inscription within a box with chamfered corners (reported in November 1916). This appears similar, if not identical, to the marking reported by John Frith. A third handstamp in mauve (not illustrated) is an oval cachet 37 x 54mm with "H.M. Hospital Ship 'LETITIA'" reportedly used in Alexandria's BAPO Z between December 31, 1915 and April 26, 1916.



This is a copy of a card I got from Operation PRUDENCE--the Canadian Contingent with the United Nations Mission in the Central African Republic (MINURCA). [Thanks John for this nice illustration--the CFPO-BPFC 5001 is one of the largest I've seen! I can add the following information: The Canadians are to provide a "stable environment for the U.N. operation." A group of forty-five personnel, most from Valcartier and a few from Kingston and Montreal, are operating U.N. communication equipment in Bangui, the capital of the C.A.R. There is a Force Headquarters (four personnel) as well as subordinate contingents. Ed.]

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## RCAF 75TH/NATO 50TH FROM CANADA POST

Canada Post will release stamps celebrating both of these anniversaries in a few weeks. A sixteen-stamp pane of aircraft will celebrate the RCAF and a stylized NATO symbol and member flags is scheduled for September. Preliminary images are impressive.

BALFOUR, B.C. MILITARY SANATORIUM -- By J.C. Campbell

While searching Wrigley's British Columbia Directory, 1910-1919, I found a reference to the above Sanitorium. A brief account follows.

Originally built in 1911 as a Canadian Pacific Railway Hotel, it was located overlooking Kootenay Lake, eighteen miles northeast of Nelson, B.C. An impressive Victorian structure, its accommodation was opulent for the time with everything available to the travelling public. Access most commonly used from Nelson and Kaslo was by the steamers Moyie and Kokanee.

With the outbreak of the First World War, tourist travel declined and the hotel closed in 1916. The Military Hospitals Commission then requested a lease from the C.P.R. to use the building as a military hospital for tubercular patients. A five-year lease was signed effective February 1, 1917. Accommodation was arranged for 150 patients and staff. Captain H.B. Olson was in charge.

By the fall of 1920 a decline in the number of patients brought about the closure of the hospital, with the few remaining patients transferred to Kamloops. In 1929 the buildings were torn down and much of the salvaged material was used in Nelson for construction of several fine homes.

This is the notice in Wrigley's  $\underline{\text{Directory}}$  which prompted this article: BALFOUR

[A] post office and settlement on Kootenay Lake, in Trail Provincial Electoral District, 18 miles southeast of Nelson, reached by C.P.R. Nelson-Kootenay Landing steamers, and Nelson-Kaslo-Lardo boats. Nearest telegraph, C.P.R. at Proctor, distant 2 mile. Here is located the Balfour Military Sanitorium, Capt. H.B. Olson in charge. Fruit growing and poultry raising.

It should be recorded here that two postmasters served at the Bal-four Post Office during the period between August 1, 1911 and March 23, 1945. Their names were N.A. McFadyen and C. Holt. Who will be the first to find a cover bearing the "Balfour" postmark dated within the hospital's period of service? Perhaps the letter was written by one of the patients.

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## RE-USE LABELS AND ECONOMY ENVELOPES--By W. Pekonen

Many Commonwealth governments and military groups used a variety of methods to conserve paper during the Second World War and other periods when paper shortages were experienced. The information is dealt with more fully in a photocopied booklet containing almost 200 pages of material. This booklet is published by the Pacific Northwest Regional Group as a fund raiser.

The following includes some extracts that may be of interest to military mail collectors. The information is based on the combined knowledge of about ten collectors. It is preliminary in nature because this writer suspects that there could be many variations out there somewhere. It is, however, based mainly on this writer's collection of government envelopes which is probably the largest in captivity. This is not to brage-it is a simple and humble admission of the fact that



few other collectors have bothered collecting this type of material—so it is easy to lay claim to the "championship" title up to this point. The main collection is based on a bulk lot of covers obtained many years ago from Roy Wrigley.

The numbering system used throughout is based on the chronological printing order date. It was the practice of the government of the day to record the date and print quantity on the face of the envelope. In most cases this information can be relied upon. There are a few exceptions because some envelopes with distinct differences, but bearing the same description, have been observed. On the whole, however, this progression enables the insertion of newly-found material in sequential order without disturbing an otherwise conventional numbering system. The exceptions noted so far belong mainly to one group only.

A typical number is 12.40.8. The "12" identifies a special envelope printed by the R.C.A.F. The "40" indicates the year 1940. The "8" indicates the month of August. A further subgroup might indicate the print quantity, usually included as part of the print description found on the envelope. Some of the groups had very limited printings—one as low as 10,000. Some of the uses are very scarce and can add a premium when in combination with other more common or just as scarce uses for other reasons.




Fourteen or more of the thirty-seven groups are strictly military, while some of the others can be a combination of private and military. Six of the thirty-seven include mail from other countries. One of the more interesting groups is the re-directed mail labels. These are not seen very often, and it is common to see British labels used on mail addressed to Canada. Some envelopes are re-directed on the face without a re-direct label.
