TWO POST CARDS WITH UNUSUAL FRANKINGS -- By Colin Pomfret




This post card was posted at Niagara M.P.O. 203 on July 3, 1942. It was mailed at the two-cent post card rate with an additional ten-cent special delivery fee.

The following post card was mailed at the six-cents per ounce* domestic letter rate. It was posted at Debert M.P.O. 603 on June 29, 1942 and bears the "PASSED BY CENSOR DB/452" handstamp. (*air mail)


R.C.A.F. STATION, CHATHAM, N.B. -- By A.D. Hanes

Here is an air mail cover sent from R.C.A.F. Station Chatham, New Bruns-wick with a CDS dated June 11, 1965. It also bears the straightline office handstamp.

The above cover to Niagara Falls, Ontario was sent from the Canadian Fleet Mail Office, Londonderry, Northern Ireland with an FPO 213 dater (FPO SC 803) of November 17, 1944. It also bears a blue two-line "FROM H.M.C. SHIP/EXAMINED BY DB.N 964" censor marking. Thankfully, the cover bears the sender's name and ship!


H.M.C.S. Orkney was a "River" class frigate, used primarily for ocean work and escort protection for convoys. She was built by Canadian Yarrow (Esquimalt) for the Royal Canadian Navy and was launched on September 18, 1943. She displaced 1,370 tons (1,865 tons full load) and was just over 300 feet. She had a complement of 140 officers and men. Orkney (Pt.No. K.448) was named as a mercantile ship Violetta in 1947. She was sold to the Israeli Navy in 1950 and renamed the Mivtakh. In 1959 the Sinhalese Navy renamed her the Mahasena. She was eventually sold to a British shipbreaker and arrived in Singapore in September 1964 where she was scrapped.

TYPE 2 CENSOR MARKS UPDATE -- By Colin Pomfret

/Members will recall Colin's previous work on this particular censor mark in NL#175 (May 2006, p.864). He's recently written to update his research and notes: "I found this cover in my filing cabinet...2/2422 was censored by J.J. Penhale, 1 Div. Ammo Column. This cover places 2/2421 as having been used by the 1st Div. Heavy Battery and Ammo Column.



This cover solves all the problems I have had, and all that I need now are reports on No.2435-No.2437 and the series will be complete. A revised list is enclosed.

FPO 2.X IDENTIFIED: NO.1 FIELD AMBULANCE, C.A.M.C.

Thanks to Colin's listing of No.2 censor marks, I've been able to identify the recently-obtained cover! The FPO 2.X is dated February 19, 1915 and was sent to the famous Harrod's in London, England. The sender, and presumably censoring officer, was an R.H. McGibbon. The No.2 type censor device was No.2432 in pink. Now, where is one to go from here?



Checking No.2432 against Colin's previous listing, I presumed that the cover originated from a member of the No.1 Field Ambulance, C.A.M.C. Because both the sender's signature and address were in the same hand and ink, I presumed that the sender was R.H. McGibbon. Luckily, I have at my resource desk a copy of the early nominal rolls of the No.1 Field Ambulance (obtained before the introduction of the Internet!). Upon checking the rolls, I found the information I was seeking.

Capt. R.H. McGibbon was listed under "C" Section and was identified as Roy Hosmer McGibbon, a Canadian who was taken on strength at Valcartier on September 14, 1914. His next of kin was listed as a Mrs. R.H. McGibbon (presumably his wife) of Sherbrooke, Quebec. Given this information I can now pursue more research on McGibbon in the future.

FPO 2.X was located in the Armentieres area, France from February 10, 1915 until March 27, 1915. The cover also bears a segmented rubber clerk hand-stamp and filing number "B40607" when it arrived at Harrod's.

Thankfully, all of the pieces were able to fit the above puzzle. Research and the sharing of vital information is essential for us as military postal historians. I hope that other members will continue to share their findings through these pages!

INTERNMENT MAIL IN CANADA, 1914-1919 & 1939-1946: A REVIEW

Members will have already seen the new issue of the above BNAPS Exhibit Series No.21 (revised) edition announced in the April-June 2007 BNAPortraitS. Our member Steve Luciuk's award-winning exhibit has been reprinted using today's advanced digital scanning technology in both black and white (ISBN 978-1-897391-01-3; C\$33.95) and colour (ISBN 978-1-897391-00-6; C\$85.00). The colour reprint will be reviewed here.

One of the essential questions any reviewer must ponder is this: does the new offering significantly contribute anything beneficial for one's library that an earlier version did not? The answer, in this case, is a resounding "yes".

Members studying internment mail and prisoner of war covers know that the material usually offers a range of miscellaneous markings in colour. Often these rubber handstamps (usually) do not readily avail themselves over the years as strong, legible (and reproducible) strikes. In most cases, the colour reprint of this exhibit book features these markings in very clear illustrations and very much adds to the overall significance of the collection. I am sure that the black and white scanned version is equally clear.

The colour version contrasts the great difference between some coloured covers and their markings. Although the colour illustrations and text have been slightly reduced from the original version, they nevertheless offer the reader an eye-catching array of some rare and unusual material. The Banff Detachment 1916-1917 Christmas card, the varied YMCA I.O. cards, and the P.O.W. Franking Labels are almost as perfect as the originals!

Strangely, the colour version did not pick up markings clearly shown in the original version (the Vernon YMCA card, p.14 for example), but overall this is a minor observation. The light strikes of the original markings are often difficult to reproduce in any process.

The additional nine pages of supplementary material, including illustrated I.O. forms, opening and closing dates of the various camps of both world

wars, and a reference bibliography were all most appreciated and greatly add to the study. An author/collector biography is always interesting and one is contained within the new version.

One of the significant contributions of this BNAPS Exhibits Series is that it retains a permanent record of the exhibit/collection before it is dispersed. As members know from previous issues, Steve's exhibit and P.O.W. collection will be sold this June by Charles G. Firby Auctions, Waterford, MI USA. Despite the fact that many rare and unique items will find new homes, this new reprint offers anyone interested in Canadian military postal history or internment mail a wonderful opportunity to own excellent facsimilies of the real versions!


WWII STUDY GROUP BLACKOUT CANCEL SURVEY

Members of our BNAPS sister group has recently announced in their newsletter War Times a new survey of the above markings. According to the group's Chairman Bill Pekonen, the new data will "combine known information into one reference source to encourage further research." (War Times, 35, p.475). The group intends upon expanding the research already done by Harold Dilworth, H.E. Guertin, Ron Leith, and the BNAPS Blackout Study Group. There are many blanks, Bill notes, and there is hope to include as many collectors as possible in the new study. The group is interested in expanding reports (early and late dates), including miscellaneous blackout markings (including blobs, rollers, bars etc.), slogan and non-slogan machines etc., and examining dubious items. There is also a quest to confirm some of Guertin's East Coast locations including: Fairville, Fredericton, LaMalbaie, Bergerville, LaDurantaye, St.Roch, St.Magloire, Hauteville, Loretteville, Kentville, and Tufts Cove.



1915 2ND FIELD AMBULANCE, BELGIUM -- By Colin Pomfret






Members may recall seeing a slightly similar card from John Frith's "No.4 Canadian General Hospital" article (NL#76, Nov.1987,pp.3-4).




90TH VIMY MEMORIAL -- By Steve Luciuk



A 1917 REDIRECTED NAVAL COVER--By Colin Pomfret




The cover above was sent from Portage La Prairie, Manitoba to Gnr. H.R. Bullmer who was serving in France with the 67th Battery, C.F.A. After much redirection by the Canadian Record Office in England, and the APO 2 CAN SEC in France, it was finally addressed to the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.



As no trace was found, the cover was directed to the General Post Office, London, as evidenced by the boxed handstamp "G.P.O./Not known in R.N.A.S./Return to Sender.". From there it was sent to the Dead Letter Office in Ottawa (February 22, 1918).

At this time Surg.Sub.Lt. Bullmer was with $\underline{\text{H.M.S. Petunia}}$ in the Mediterranean.

SECOND WORLD WAR "K" MAIL BAG TAGS: A QUESTION



Members will be quite familiar with the above tags which were first used on May 1, 1941 and identified mail sorted by the Base Post Office in Ottawa for distribution to the various internment camps. There were several different printing dates. On p.301 of The Major E.R. Toop Collection of Canadian Military Postal History, Vol. \overline{I} (C.R. McGuire, R.F. Narbonne, Editors, 1996, BNAPS), the tag appears to have a date of "1942". Can any of our members or P.O.W. specialists provide the full date? The 1941 tag above is also illustrated in Steve Luciuk's Internment Mail in Canada, 1914-1919 & 1939-1946 BNAPS Exhibit Series book (p. $\overline{43}$).

I've attempted to find others but these three dates, March 31, 1941, ?1942, and September 5, 1944 are the only ones I can find. Would members please send me other dates for inclusion in a future issue?

Now that spring is here (for most of us) it is time for another issue. Thanks are extended to several members who sent in material. It's always appreciated!

Congratulations to OWEN WHITE for his exhibit entitled "German Military Mail in China: 1900-1906" which obtained a Vermeil at the Edmonton Spring National Show.

Our last issue noted the sad passing of member GEORGE DOUGLAS. Kim Dodwell noted that he and George corresponded in the 1980's and was very helpful with Kim's research. Kim wrote that George went in with the initial assault at Graye-sur-Mer on D-Day with the Canadian Scottish (1st Bn.) and sustained a shoulder wound during the attack on Caen (and was sent back to the line nine days later). He was captured in the Scheldt Pocket (October 28, 1944) but managed to escape a week later. He was wounded again with a grenade near the German border (Deventer). George was a nineteen-year old Private when he first landed in Normandy and ended the war as a Platoon Commander; serving two years after the war with the Permanent Force, PPCLI.
