

AN AUSTRALIAN LAC IN THE B.C.A.T.P. -- By David Collyer

A little over a month after the outbreak of the Second World War, it was announced in London on October 19 that the United Kingdom and the Empire's Dominions would institute the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan (BCATP). It was also known as the Empire Air Training Scheme (EATS).

The aim of the plan was to graduate 50,000 aircrew (pilots, navigators, bombardiers, wireless operators, flight engineers, and air gunners) each year. The plan would assist Britain to achieve air superiority. Selected volunteers would undertake their initial training in their country of residence and advanced training was undertaken in Canada. The annual make up was to be 22,000 from Britain, 13,000 from Canada, 11,000 from Australia, and 3,300 from New Zealand. The original agreement setting up the scheme was signed on December 17, 1939 at Riverdale in Ottawa.

Australian participants wore Australian RAAF uniforms and received Australian rates of pay. They were distinguished from members of the RAAF in Australia by having a specific form of serial number AUS 404 839 (the AUS indicating Australia; 40, year of enlistment, numbers ranging from 40 to 44; 4, State of enlistment, in this case Queensland; and 839, a three-digit number up to 999 for the number enlisted in that state in that year). The smaller states had only one location code number where the larger states had more than one location number. Location 9 seems to have been used as a "catch all".





This article features the correspondence from Leading Aircraftsman Laurence William Neale. He was born at Bowen on the coast of central Queensland on May 17, 1919. He enlisted in Brisbane, the state capital on December 6, 1940, and was assigned serial number AUS 404839. Neale was discharged as a Flying Officer from #1 Wireless and Gunnery School at Ballarat, Victoria on January 18, 1946. Whilst this research concentrates on his time in Canada, after graduation he wrote home from Britain in January 1942 and mail is known from India in October 1942. Later in the war he returned to Australia to the #1 Wireless and Gunnery School at Ballarat.



All but two items posted from Canada were addressed to Mrs. P.W. Neale, Post Office Residence, Fortitude Valley N1, Brisbane, Queensland. Laurence gives his next of kin as Percy Neale who probably was the Postmaster at Fortitude Valley, known colloquially as "the valley". It is located approximately one mile north of the G.P.O. Items posted on June 5, 1941 and October 7, 1941 were addressed to his elder brother Percy Edward Neale (NX 23529) who was attached to 2/1 Anti-Aircraft Regiment (part of the 6th Division of the 2nd Australian Imperial Force or AIF).

The Winnipeg postmarks are from the civilian post office and from October 1, 1941 the postmarks are from Mossbank MPO 1203 Saskatchewan. Mail from May 22 to September 23, 1941 was posted through the civilian post office and the majority of these envelopes have the crest of the RCAP on the rear flap.

The mail does not appear to have been inspected by Canadian civil censors but was inspected by Australian civil censorship authorities [domestic Canadian civil censorship often despatched from military facilities was infrequent and thought unnecessary.Ed.]. As the mail was mostly addressed to Brisbane, one would have expected it to have been inspected in Brisbane as denoted by the prefix "1" for 1st Military District (Queensland). Four items were inspected in Sydney as denoted by the prefix "2" for the 2nd Military District (N.S.W.) and the letter "S" for Sydney.

The term franking has been used to indicate the amount of postage paid. For eighteen out of twenty-three items the franking was 90¢ Canadian that prepaid airmail to Australia via the Pan American Airways service from San Francisco, California to Auckland, New Zealand and thence by TEAL (Tasman Empire Airways Limited) from Auckland to Sydney. If air was used in Australia between Sydney and Brisbane, the carrier would have been ANA (Australian National Airways) or its partner AoA (Airlines of Australia).

There are three covers franked at \$1.00 Canadian which is interpreted as having no $20 \not\in$ stamps available and the rate was over-paid by $10 \not\in$. Two covers were posted at Winnipeg on June 5; one was franked $90 \not\in$ and the other was franked at $$1.06--50 \not\in$ x $2+6 \not\in$ airmail (possibly for Canadian internal airmail).

Neale was writing at least one letter per week but FAM 19 only flew to Auckland once a fortnight. The following table correlates letters with the dates of flights. It was common for more than one letter to be carried on a particular flight. From when FAM 19 started from San Francisco on July 12, 1940, Los Angeles was included at a stop over.


The American Clipper service departing San Francisco on June 28, 1941 arrived at Honolulu, Hawaii on June 29, 1941 but was delayed until July 5, 1941 with engine failure. Auckland was finally reached on July 8, 1941.*



The Trans-Tasman Sea air service from Auckland to Sydney was operated by Tasman Empire Airways Limited (TEAL); later to become Air New Zealand using Short S-30 flying boats. This service started in March/April 1940 as weekly but by mid-1941 it was probably twice weekly. The air service between Sydney and Brisbane was flown by ANA (Australian National Airways) in partnership with AoA (Airlines of Australia) and both companies used DC2 and DC3 aircraft.

The Neale mail shows how airmail was handled from British Commonwealth Air Training Plan camps in Canada to destinations in Australia using the Pan American Airways FAM 19 service from San Francisco to Auckland, connecting with the Trans-Tasman air service and finally with Australian domestic air services.

Mossbank hosted No.2 Bombing and Gunnery School (Oct.28, 1940-Dec.15, 1944); see pp. 354-355, 357. There were some 9,606 RAAF BCATP graduates from 1940-1945 (p.361).Ed.]





THE BNAPS CATALOGUE OF CANADIAN MILITARY MAIL MARKINGS: VOLUME I


[Wayne Schnarr has sent this update on the above project and seeks input from the members:


"There will be six chapters in this catalogue, with the following chapter headings:

- 5. Canadian Expeditionary Force--Siberia
- 6. WWI Internment Operations

- --William Henry (now Sorel)--is there any evidence for a military post-master in the early to mid-1800's; is there an article on the William Henry civilian cnacels previously thought to be military?

CMMSG MEETING, BNAPEX 2015, NIAGARA FALLS

The CMMSG meeting was held Saturday, September 12, 2015 at 1600. Twelve study group members and other interested BNAPSers were in attendance. Interim group Chairman Mike Street asked if there were any nominations for, or interest in, the Chairman's position. There was no response. Mike introduced Wayne Schnarr, who has taken over the task of finishing Volume I of Doug Sayles' Catalogue of Canadian Military Mail Markings. Wayne asked for assistance from all members and will have a note in the next Newsletter outlining the items he is looking for.

Mike then introduced guest speaker and presenter Mike Powell, who showed some very interesting Great War P.O.W. and Internment material. Mike P. is working on both a handbook and a BNAPS Exhibit Series book on this subject.

To close out the meeting Eugene Labiuk showed those present some of the material he had gathered for his project entitled "Operation Magic Carpet, Manila Camp"; the story of the repatriation of the WWII British and British Commonwealth Liberated Prisoners of War (LPOW's), including Canadians from the Far East on their way home via Manila. Gene would like to hear from any study group member who has pertinent material or information.

Military mail exhibits on view included Earle Covert's "Armed Forces Letters" (Gold); David Hobden's "In Defence of the Border" (Gold/Sam Nickle Award); Doreen Fitzgerald's "World War I: Messages Home in Silk" (Silver); Darcy Hickson's "Sewell Camp: The White City, 1915" (Gold); and Jon Johnson's "Canadian Military Hospitals at Sea" (Gold). The "E.R. 'Ritch' Toop Memorial Award" for the best Canadian/B.N.A. military mail article or book published anywhere in 2014 was awarded to Eugene Labiuk for "Philippine-Canada Mail, 1941-1945" in the PHSC Journal (Vol.158, Summer 2014), pp. 11-27.

The bank balance is \$747.79 and the newsletters cost about \$150 per issue. Dues are now required for 2015-2016. A reminder was announced that more articles are always solicited for the newsletters.

CMMSG sponsorship of an exhibit award for BNAPEX was suggested due to the expiry of the Sam Nickle Award. 
