This letter from the "Purdie Branch" of the Canadian Legion on St. Antoine Street in Montreal, addressed to Capt. Hugh Peck, No. 1 Canadian Armoured Corps Reinforcement Unit, Canadian Army Overseas, was postmarked at Montreal on April 1, 1944. After passing through the Army Post Office SC11 machine cancelled (Sayles #H126) on April 10, 1944, it reached the CPC HO Directory Service the next day per the faint mark at right on the reverse (Sayles #F373).



After receiving endorsements saying that Capt. Peck was neither at No. 1 CACRU nor the Non-Effective Transit Depot (NETD), on May 4 it arrived at the General Delivery office at the Headquarters of the Canadian Postal Corps Overseas where the "Poste Restante" handstamp (Sayles #F370) was applied on the reverse. Somewhere in the process the large "S.O.S. TO CANADA" handstamp (Sayles #F349) in red was added on the front.

On May 18 the letter passed through MPO 318 in Ottawa (Sayles #D590) (with CDS) and was then apparently sent to the No. 4 District Depot in Montreal where the boxed unit handstamp (Sayles #D603), also in red, was applied and Capt. Peck's home address, 1 Belvedere Rd. in the Westmount district of Montreal, added.




#### 1918 MONTREAL TO R.F.C. PRISONER OF WAR--By A. David Hanes

This is a gem mailed from Montreal on March 11, 1918 to a Lt. McKim in London, England. This address was marked out and a new address, "18 Sqdn, R.F.C., B.E.F., France" was added. In pencil, upper left, is "R.F.C." and the signature of J.G. Gillanders, 2 Lt. The "18 Sqdn." etc. was marked out in blue crayon and in upper left was pencilled in red "P (Prisoner) of War".

Presumably the ship was in port and the writer was able to tour the General M.M. Patrick and obtained



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# CANADIAN JOINT STAFF OFFICIAL MAIL FREE FRANK 1955--By Mike Street



In Endnote 2, page 255, of his <u>The BNAPS Catalogue of Canadian Military Mail Markings</u>, Vol.3: From Victory in 1945 to Afghanistan, Doug Sayles wrote:

[Cont'd.]

"Mail from Canadian Defence Liason Staff (CDLS) (CFPO 5051) in London was eligible for the 'Commonwealth Forces to Homeland' rate. This concession allowed mail to be sent to the Commonwealth homeland for the current British domestic 1st class letter rate, rather than the much higher overseas rate. Examples of such usage can be identified by the CDLS return address, and a handstamp or manuscript indicating 'Commonwealth Forces to Homeland'. All examples I have seen bear then current British stamps, which are cancelled by a civilian post office".

A free franking marking has now surfaced. The green marking on the preceding cover reads "Canadian Joint Staff/Official/Mail/London S.W.7.". The red machine cancel reads "LONDON.S.W.1./3 45PM/15 JNE/1955/GT. BRITAIN.F.", with "OFFICIAL/PAID" across the wavy line canceller. The return address is "Canadian Joint Staff, 66 Ennismore Gardens, London, SW7, England".

[Here is a similar cover, dated April 29, 1957 (cropped) addressed to the former commander of the Canadian Military Mission, Far East during the Korean War period. Frank Fleury was the Liaison Officer responsible, in part, for contact with the Commonwealth Occupation Forces in Japan and with the U.N. Command. He was later despatched to London with the Canadian Army Liaison Office. This frank is in black ink.Ed.]





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JUNE 24, 1912, STAFF OFFICERS AT GODERICH MILITARY CAMP -- By Colin Pomfret







CANADIAN/SWISS P.O.W. COVERS 1940/1941--By Charles LaBlonde


