No.2 Canadian Hospital Ship Letitia went into service as a Canadian hospital ship in November 1944. She had a merchant marine crew of 210, medical staff of 198 Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, and capacity for 758 invalids. On her first voyage 745 invalids were delivered to Halifax on December 19, 1944.

On Janu 3, 1945 Letitia delivered her second group of invalids to Halifax. She then sailed to New York where she picked up 547 German prisoners of war from U.S. forces at New York. This was the beginning of the sixth P.O.W. exhange between Britain and Germany and was primarily limited to sick and wounded P.O.W.'s. Letitia carried the German P.O.W.'s to Gibraltar. Upon confirmation of the exchange arrangements, she then delivered the German P.O.W.'s to Marseilles, France.

Letitia disembarked the German P.O.W.'s to trains, under Red Cross supervision, which took them via Geneva to the formal exchange at Kreuzlingen, Switzerland. The train then carried 718 allied P.O.W.'s [Cont'd.]

to Letitia which she carried to England.

With the allied P.O.W.'s safely back in England, <u>Letitia</u> resumed her primary job of returning military invalids to Canada. <u>HMCHS Letitia</u> was the only one of Canada's eight hospital ships, in either the First or Second World War, involved in a P.O.W. exchange.



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# Information Needed for Chapter 2: MILITIA CAMP and OTHER MILITIA POST OFFICES in CANADA 1909 – 1941

By Wayne Schnarr

I have completed a draft of Chapter 2 for Vol.1 of the BNAPS Canadian Military Mail Markings catalogue series. In addition to reading books and countless hours searching the internet for information in post office and militia documents, I have just finished reviewing the 218 CMMSG newsletters on the BNAPS site. There is a tremendous amount of information but there are some gaps and anomalies.

- The open and close dates for the camps and their field post offices were often different; an occasional marking is seen dated after the post office has closed.
- Post office opening and closing dates from post office publications are not online for all years.
- For some camps, there are two post office open-periods during a year and a post
  office open-period may cover two years (such as Toronto Sub X).
- ERD and LRD are available for a few markings.
- I would like to be able to show all years for which any marking for a camp has been observed (evidence of post office activity). Some cover illustrations, along with the ERD and LRD dates, provide partial lists (see the table below - the year is shaded if a marking has been noted).

I have included the Sewell Camp section from this Chapter as an example of the format I have developed. For some camps, the number of reported cancels is low and the information is limited. However, I would be grateful for any information which will help make this catalog as complete and useful for collectors as possible. 

1. The first camp ran from 21 June to 2 July, 1910. Militia Order #436 of 27 September, 1915 changed the name of the camp to Camp Hughes [information from C.D. Sayles, Sewell Camp / Camp Hughes: BNA TOPICS, Vol. 54, No. 2, 1997, p. 47 -50). Post office records show that the Sewell Camp post office was open until 30 June, 1916 (probably just slow record keeping) and that the Camp Hughes one was open from 15 April to 3 November 1916.

Sewell Camp militia markings up to 1941 in B & T which are either in Sayles Vol. 2 or not included in either Vol. 1 or Vol. 2 are listed in this table.

### CANADIAN ARMED FORCES IN THE INDIAN OCEAN DURING THE SECOND WORLD WAR: PART I, RCAF TRANS-OCEAN FLIGHTS--By Robert Toombs

The story of the Battle of the Atlantic is relatively well known in the Second World War. However the corresponding story of the Battle of the Indian Ocean (and other seas) is less so. The Battle of the Indian Ocean is chosen with focus on Canadian-related mails. In this regard, subject headings may be considered under general headings of the air force, the navy, the army, and special groups such as the Canadian Intelligence Corps and various P.O.W. related activities.

In the first instance, selected examples of mails to or from RCAF Canadians serving with the air forces in the Indian Ocean are presented. They may be found serving with the RCAF and, more likely, as RCAF attached to the RAF across the broad arc of the Indian Ocean. This arc extends from Cape of Good Hope, up the east coast of Africa to Aden and to the Persian Gulf, across India, Burma, Ceylon (SEAC HQ), to Malaya and south east to Perth in Western Australia. Some suggested selected RCAF topics are:

# 1. RCAF Trans-Ocean Flights

- --RAF No. 209 Squadron (Kipevu, Tanganyika), No. 265 Squadron (Madagascar), RCAF No. 413 Squadron (Koggala, Ceylon)--flying boats--anti-submarine patrols, convoy escort.
- --RAF No. 200 Squadron Liberator bombers--serving out of India and Burma--anti-submarine patrols, but mostly supplying and delivering guerilla parties into Japanese occupied Burma and Malaya.

# 2. RCAF Overland Supply Flights

- --RAF No. 216 Squadron (Cairo--the fore-runner to RAF Transport Command, 216 Group, Cairo to Karachi), communications and supplies to the Persian Gulf Areas of Iraq and Iran.
- --RCAF No. 435, 436 Squadrons in South East Asia--RAF Transport Command, DC-3 transport aircraft--jungle battle zone supply drops.
- --RAF Transport Command (RAFTC), No. 45 Group, controlled from Dorval (Montreal)--the delivery of aircraft from factories in the USA and Canada flown to greater India.

# 3. RCAF Land-Based Radar Stations--India, Ceylon

--RCAF radar specialists, attached to the RAF radar group, at land-based stations throughout India and Ceylon. RCAF Canadians, numbering 6,000+ servicemen, constituted more than half of RAF radar group around the world.




FIG.1. Indian Ocean Basin during the Second World War. Communication Flights-Land and Ocean-based. Dates of use vary.




FIG.2.A post-free O.A.S. cover to Canada, postmarked February 24, 1943 at Durban, South Africa. Censor is Colley & Garrard Type R38. The sender is Canadian RCAF radar specialist F/O M.H. Maltby, C8112, seconded to RAF No. 265 Squadron, East Africa. This Catalina flying boat squadron was engaged in convoy escort and anti-submarine activities on the East African coast. At Durban Harbour, the flying boat control tower built during the war still stands to this day at the end of a row of waterfront restaurants (private communication with Joh Groenewald).





FIG.5. AMLC to Canada from F/O F.V. Cairns, C7922, RCAF radar specialist attached to RAF NO. 209 Squadron operating Catalina flying boats on anti-submarine patrol in East African waters (faint Colley & Garrard censor Type R11/979).



Postal marking is E.A./A.P.O. 81 (Port Reitz, Mombasa) dated 14 XII 43. It is postage free.

The AMLC is addressed to Lt. G.W. (Bill) Boss in Italy, with the 1st Canadian Corps, where he was a Public Relations Officer in charge of escorting journalists to the front lines. Subsequently Capt. Boss, as a war correspondent, was attached to the Canadian Press where he reported from the front lines on the liberation of the Netherlands. He later reported from the front lines in the Korean War

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# The Boxed Numbered RCAF WWII Censor Marks, Page 1497 Newfoundland and Labrador, 1942 – 1945 by Paul Binney

Like many members of this study group, I have in my collection the common numbered RCAF censor markings used in Newfoundland and Labrador during the Second World War. It was not until I obtained a less common Censor 19 marking that I decided that these censor marks might benefit from a closer look, similar to my investigations of the Canadian Army Circular Censor marks used in Newfoundland and Labrador<sup>i</sup>.

The markings in question are shown in table 1 with an initial classification. Measurements may vary ( $\pm$  1.5mm for box,  $\pm$  0.5mm for text) due to the manufacturing process (rubber casting). Obvious differences are the one, two, or three boxes surrounding the text, but variations in 2-box markings are found in the text font and size.




Figure 1: Cover from CAPO 3 (Botwood) to New Jersey. Censored by RCAF Censor 7 (type RCAFb2ii). Mailed on Sept 23, 1942.

RCAF Censor Marks 2 to 8 and 10 are fairly common and were mainly used at Headquarters in St John's and active airbases. They are usually found with associated CAPO postal markings that allow one to locate their origins (St. John's, Gander, Botwood or Torbay). A typical cover is shown in Figure 1. Within this series I have not seen examples of Censor # 1 or #9<sup>ii</sup>. Censor marks 11 to 19 are much less common, and in most cases unknown to the author. These marks apparently were issued to the many radar stations (Radio Units) located in Newfoundland and Labrador during WWII. The mail from these bases was sometimes handled through civil offices (Censor 12 markings on mail handled through Port aux Basques), but in other cases mail was handled through a nearby military base (eg. Censor 18 and 19 markings were on mail handled through CAPO 5, Torbay).

I would like to caution that many of the above statements are generalizations and suppositions based upon a limited data set (Table 2). I am appealing to members of the Military Mail Study Group for information that I can compile and publish to provide a more complete understanding of the distribution and use of these censor marks. Many questions remain to be answered. How many censor numbers were used by the RCAF? Where were they used, especially the lower # markings like 1 and 9? When were the 2 box markings placed in use if there are at least three styles, suggesting three periods of manufacture? Why was the 3 box marking issued at Goose Bay (CAPO 10) when the war was drawing to an end? Perhaps some of these questions do not have answers, but a concerted effort to compile all available information could advance the understanding of the manufacture and use of these censor marks.
